# Spring Bombs 'sent a message'

WASHINGTON (AP) - The White House today declared the U.S. military strike against Libyan terrorist targets a success that "struck a blow against terrorism and sent a message" to Libyan leader Moammar

Spokesman Larry Speakes confirmed that American military and diplomatic facilities have taken security precautions across the world, and said it was too early to say whether an attack in Japan was retalia tion for the bombings.

Speakes, summed up the White House view in a mid-morning briefing for reporters that provided little new detail on the extent of damage to terrorist facilities in Tripoli or Benghazi.

He did confirm that one Air Force F-111, and its crew of two, remained unaccounted-for and is the subject of a naval and air search.

He said the middle-of-the-night air strikes had "successfully accomplished" their objective. "We're determined to put an end to terrorism and make Khadafy pay the price," he said.
"When we can clearly identify persons responsible for terrorist attacks

we will hold See related stories, photos pages 2, 3

them accountable," Speakes s a i d . H e repeated statements from Monday night that American intelligence had considerable evidence that Khadafy had planned a series of future anti-American attacks.

'The president said he would be prepared to do it again," Speakes said when asked about the prospect of Libyan

retaliation. He said 5,836 telephone calls to the White House gave the president "an 80

percent approval rating." "In our assessment we believe we have struck a blow against terrorism and we have sent the message to Khadafy," Speakes said.

Speakes was asked about reports from Japan concerning an explosion at a U.S. military facility and he told reporters in the White House brief-'At 6:10 Eastern time this morning, a truck exploded at the gate of the

U.S. facility. Japanese police responded. There was no loss of life or injury. The truck contained rocket launchers which exploded. He said it was the only such incident at an American facility.

Speakes declined to say whether or not the military operation against Libya was complete.

"I don't think it serves any purpose for me to discuss the tactical operations of the United States government in this mission...we have done that (sent a message), now we will wait and see (what Khadafy's reaction . is)," he said.



# Search for one missing U.S. bomber continues

**WASHINGTON** (AP) — U.S. forces are making every effort to locate an F-111 missing in the wake of a lightning strike by American bombers on two Libyan cities, Secretary of Defense Caspar W Weinberger said today

Eighteen F-111 bombers based in England participated in the raid. Sixteen returned to their bases today. The 17th made an emergency landing at Rota in Spain after an engine overheated, and the 18th was missing.

"We are continuing to make every effort to locate the one plane that is still unreported," Weinberger said on ABC's "Good Morning America' show.
"We don't think that there were

any planes that we know of that were hit by fire. As far as this one plane is concerned, we just don't know what has happened to it," he Weinberger said the bomber had

been reported missing after it failed to link up with a tanker after the aerial raids U.S. military bases and em-

"I would add that the military installations around the world are also on full alert for attacks - terrorist attacks of any kind from any quarter," Weinberger said Monday

"All our embassies are on alert, of course," added Secretary of State George Shultz.

Weinberger today sidestepped questions about civilian casualties and damage to residential buildings and the French embassy in Tripoli.

The secretary said there were military targets very close to the French embassy "that we believe were hit, and we'll have full reports on the damage assessment later

this morning. 'We don't know what hit it (the embassy) at this point. What we know is that Libyan sources are reporting it and there were also a substantial amount of attempts through machinegun and other local air-defense systems to try to

In Tripoli, foreign reporters taken for a tour of one of the city's residential neighborhoods by the Libyan government press office said the back of the French embassy was heavily damaged, and windows were blown out. They also reported five or six heavily damag-

ed civilian houses. Weinberger said the U.S. planes 'made every effort to avoid collateral damage," but he added:
"There were people of all nationalities working in and around the headquarters of the Libyan terrorist activities and we made that as one of our targets.

"One way or another, you have to show that there is some cost to terrorist acts. And that's essentially what the president's decision was to do last night.'

In other developments this morning, Pentagon spokesman Robert Sims dismissed claims by the Libyan news agency JANA that the American attacks were continuing and that "at least 20" U.S. planes had been shot down.

# Air raid leaves many scars on Tripoli area

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — Several buildings in a Tripoli neighborhood lay in ruins after today's early morning U.S. bombing raid. An elderly man in his nightgown was found dead half buried in rubble, and residents feared that relatives might be among the casualties.

Foreign reporters who were escorted by government press officers to the upper middle-class neighborhood of Bin Ashur, saw collapsed buildings, shattered cars, spouting water mains and people wandering in a state of angry shock.

The reporters were not immediately taken to the raids' military targets.

Dr. Fathi Benghazi of the Central Hospital said 60 to 100 people were brought in with wounds, but that many of them had received superficial injuries and had been treated and released. Benghazi said some were admitted but there was no tal-

## This's how it happened

Beginning at about 2 a.m. local time, loud explo-sions rocked the city. As bombs struck Tripoli, rounds of anti-aircraft tracer shells lit up the sky. Within 10 minutes, all lights were out in som

# Khadafy calls for strikes against American targets

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) - Col. Moammar Khadafy's government today called on Arab nations to strike American targets worldwide after the nighttime U.S. bombing raid of military targets near the port cities of Tripoli and Benghazi.

Libya state radio called it a "cowardly" attack, and said scores of innocent people were killed and residential areas were bombed. Several buildings in downtown Tripoli were blasted to

Khadafy did not appear in public today, did not immediately make any broadcast statements, and there was no indication of his whereabouts. A government official said Khadafy survived the bombing raid.

U.S. military bases and embassies around the world were reported on full alert to guard against terrorist attacks

President Reagan said the raid was to retaliate for Libyansponsored terrorism, in particular the April 5 bombing at a Berlin nightclub frequented by American

Eighteen British-based F-111 fighter planes joined 15 A-6 and A-7 U.S. Navy attack jets based on carriers in the Mediterranean and thundered over Libya at 2 a.m. (6 p.m. CST Monday), the Reagan administration said.



# Congressional review mixed

Harte-Hanks Washington Bureau WASHINGTON - The U.S. military strike in Libya Monday night drew mixed reviews from Texas congressmen — from Sen. Phil Gramm's commending the president to Sen. Lloyd Bentsen's expressing doubts the bold move will do any good in combating

Bentsen, a critic of President Reagan's military posturing in the Mediterranean Sea, said he doubts the strikes by U.S. war planes in Libya will stop terrorism inspired by Moammar Khadafy.

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'The president and I agree that Col. Khadafy's been responsible for much of the terrorism in the world today. We agree that we

must put a stop to his activities. We disagree, though, on the best way to go about this.

"Unfortunately, I doubt that military strikes are going to stop Khadafy's bringing about acts of terrorism, Bentsen said.

"I believe Khadafy is ripe for a coup and that we should be supporting dissidents in Libya - particularly in the military - and overthrow Khadafy," the Texas Democrat said.

U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm, D-Stamford, said the attack was fully justified in light of evidence that Libya had been involved in the disco bombing in West Berlin.

If Libya responds with further

"That policy is that any country that trains, supplies or harbors terrorism to attack the United States is going to be held responsible and where we can identify the culprit, we are going to use military power

"I am sorry we have reached the state of affairs that calls for this policy," he said. He praised Reagan for being "deliberate and meticulous in putting together the evidence against Khadafy.

# Thatcher faces tough questioning

LONDON (AP) — By using U.S. Air Force bases in Britain to launch today's attack on Libya, President Reagan focused attention on a potent relic of World War II bomber commands.

The question of who controls the bases, never given a full public answer, will face Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher today in Parliament where the opposition Labor Party is certain to demand a thorough explanation of Britain's role in the attack.

Mrs. Thatcher's office refused early comment on the multiple strikes against installations claimed by Reagan to be used by terrorists.

Sometimes called just another U.S. aircraft carrier, Britain is home to just under 30,000 American military personnel, about 300 combat aircraft, seven major air bases, one working base for nuclear-tipped cruise missiles and another cruise base under construction

The F-111 fighter-bombers that attacked Libya in coordination with U.S. Navy jets from aircraft carriers in the Mediterranean are capable of carrying a wide range of nuclear weapons. With the cruise missiles recently deployed in Britain and other West European countries, the fighter-bombers are



The Air Force keeps about 150 of the swing-wing supersonic planes at two bases in England — the 48th Tactical Fighter Wing at Lakenheath and the 20th Tactical Fighter Wing at Upper Heyford.

In addition to fighter-bomber versions of the F-111, 12 of the Raven version of the plane, which

is designed for electronic warfare are located in Britain.

The F-111 bases are among 64 U.S. installations in Britain, according to a list published by the Ministry of Defense in 1983, when the U.S. military presence became a dramatic political issue with the approaching deployment of cruise missiles. The Labor Party wants U.S. nuclear weapons removed from Britain.

The question of control bedeviled Mrs. Thatcher's government in the argument over deployment of the cruise missiles. Her opposition argued for a "dual-key" arrangement in which Britain would have to approve any U.S. decision to launch cruise missiles

But then-Defense Secretary Michael Heseltine said dual-key control would be expensive and unnecessary. He said it also implied that Britain did not trust the United States as leader of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The U.S. air bases, most of which date from World War II when the U.S. Air Force and the Royal Air Force bombed Nazi-held Europe from Britain, are officially listed as RAF bases, though one seldom sees British uniforms after passing their main gates.

Over the weekend the U.S. Air Force in Britain was reinforced

planes for in-flight refueling. There was speculation that they would be used to help the F-111s fly to Libya, but Air Force spokesmen said they were only part of a NATO maneuver and rejected speculation about an attack on Libya.

British television news reports late Monday, before the attack was announced, showed film of the bases crowded with the giant tanker planes and sentries wearing protective gear against chemical warfare. Camouflage-painted F-111s were shown taking off.

At the same time, British officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, added to the element of surprise by saying that Mrs. Thatcher was reluctant to permit the use of British bases for attacks on

Mrs. Thatcher was said to have told special U.S. envoy Vernon Walters on Saturday that first the United States would have to prove conclusively that any military action against Libya would be in self-

But in Washington, Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger said Britain had given approval for use

Britain itself has been a victim of Libya-related terrorism, and has identified Libya as a major source

"Are we to stand by and allow terrorism directed by Libyan authorities to continue absolutely unchecked when they have been appealed to by peaceful means through the U.N. Security Coun-Howe said in a radio interview.

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet media today said the U.S. air strike on Libya was a "barbarous attack" that caused dozens of civilian casualties, and dismissed charges of Libyan involvement in terrorism.

Swedish Prime Minister Ingvar Carlsson said after meeting today with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev that the Soviet leader expressed "strong concern" about the situation in Libya. He refused to provide further details.

But there was no official government statement on the attacks, nor any hint at what action, if any, the Kremlin would take in support of

The official news agency Tass said it was too early to consider the consequences of the attack, "But the infamous action launched by the American politicians and military will certainly end in ultimate failure.

## Texans cheer U.S. bombing

Texans at home applauded the U.S. bombing of strategic sites in Libya for terrorist acts against American citizens, but some questioned whether the raids will end terrorist activity Many who fear reprisals by Libyan Col. Moammar Khadafy said it

is now the terrorists' next move and their target is uncertain. But one Texan who has defied President Reagan's order to leave Libya said Reagan was "insane" for ordering the attacks. A random poll conducted by the Dallas Morning News Monday

night showed 75.9 percent of respondents in favor of the air strikes. But only 48 percent of those polled said they believe the air strikes

will stop future terrorism. The air strikes were opposed by 13.4 percent of those polled, and

10.7 percent of respondents had no opinion. In a copyright story Tuesday, the newspaper reported 30.6 percent of respondents said they do not believe the strikes will curb terrorist

activity and 21.4 percent had no opinion. The poll questioned 702 people selected at random from Dallas, Tarrant, Collin and Denton counties and has a margin of error of no more than plus or minus 4 percentage points. The poll showed a slight difference between male and female

compared to 70.9 percent of the women. Much of the reaction across Texas indicated a growing frustration, starting with Vietnam and building up through the Iranian hostage situation and subsequent terrorist attacks.

## Constitution commission serves only to generate controversy

By JACK ANDERSON and JOSEPH SPEAR WASHINGTON - In nearly two years of

bureaucratic wheel-spinning, the Commission on the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution has yet to accomplish anything more substantial than creating an occasional controversy. First the commission angered the press and other

interested parties by closing its meetings to the public. Then, as we reported recently, historians were outraged at a commission staff proposal to erect a \$150 million monument to the Constitution on the already overbuilt Mall in Washington - even though the precious document's existing repository, the National Archives, is badly in need of repairs.

Now the commission is beset by rumors of another strange plan: sending an actual page of the Constitution aloft in the space shuttle.

A commission spokesman told our associate Donald Goldberg he had no knowledge of such a proposal, but added, "That doesn't mean it didn't happen." National Archives officials acknowledged having heard the bizarre rumor, but no memo or formal proposal was ever received from the commission or

the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. But an internal Archives memo indicates the idea was taken seriously, if only for a short time. 'This is not to say that NASA was not interested in

the idea," the memo states in reference to a Dec. 10 interagency meeting sponsored by the commission. 'At that meeting a woman representing NASA suggested that her agency might like to borrow a page of the Constitution to send up in the space shuttle. There was no discussion of her offhand remark.

According to the Archives memo and interviews with a number of officials, the commission prepared a fall-back position for a spaced-out Constitution: sending posters of the document up in the shuttle if Archives declined to make the real thing available.

The proposal almost got off the ground. Commission staffers contacted Archives production officials about the possibility of obtaining 100 copies of the Constitution poster that tourists have been buying for years. The posters would be sent up in the shuttle, then autographed by the astronauts and "other dignitaries" on the shuttle's return.

The signed posters would be distributed to state governors for display in their capitol buildings; commission members would also get copies for their recreation room or office wall. Colortone Press, a Washington printer, was contacted about providing the posters and agreed to do it for free.

Unfortunately, the posters are printed on heavy

stock, and would have taken up too much room. Officials could not say whether consideration was given to an obvious alternative: printing smaller, lighter posters.

Archives officials say that's the last they heard about the aborted project. "To the best of our knowledge." the memo writers stated with evident relief, "that is the extent of (Archives") involvement in the 'Constitution in Space' fiasco.

WHAT'S IN A NAME: Henry E. Hudson, county prosecutor in the Washington suburb of Arlington, Va., has been nominated for a U.S. attorney's opening by President Reagan. Local police admiringly dubbed him "Hangin' Henry" for his dogged pursuit of crooks, while civil liberties activists have been uupset by his anti-pornography zeal, which led to the removal of soft-core magazines from local stores. Would Hudson's conservative fans be shocked to learn that he is a charter member of the Hookers Club, made up of Arlington cops and prosecutors? No cause for alarm; it's a fishing club he has belonged to for more than 10 years.

UNDER THE DOME: One reason so many members of Congress are opposed to aid for the Nicaraguan contras is that, no matter how staunchly anti-communist the rebels may be, they're not the kind of people you'd want to leave your wallet with for safekeeping. The General Accounting Office recently reported that it had been unable to trace tens of millions of dollars given to the contras over the past five years. But our sources say the auditors' disclosure of what actually happened to the millions was censored out of the final report. "They stole it," one source said of the contras. "But they couldn't put that in the report."

MINI-EDITORIAL: Will wonders never cease? A high Justice Department official has actually admitted that it was a mistake to pay a consultant to read sexually explicit magazines and report on their treatment of children in articles and cartoons. A \$734,371 mistake, it was. When we broke the story last year, Justice officials stoutly denied that it was a waste of the taxpayers' money to pay people to read Playboy, Hustler and Penthouse looking for kiddie porn. We're gratified that the bureaucrats have finally come around to our view, but frankly, we'd rather they'd had their second thoughts before spending the money in the first place.

## Pets are good for people

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: I am elderly and live alone, and I get a great deal of comfort and companionship from my two pets. Do you think there is anything wrong in that, and does the Bible say anything about pets? - Mrs. H.D.

DEAR MRS. H.D.: The Bible mentions pets, and it is clear that people in Bible times had various animals as pets. In the book of Job (which many scholars believe may be the oldest book in the Bible), God speaks about a large ferocious animal (perhaps a crocodile) and then asks, "Can you make a pet of him like a bird or put him on a leash for your girls?" (Job 41:5) thus indicating pets were common and accepted even then.

When the prophet Nathan rebuked David for his sin with Bathsheba, he told a parable about a poor man who had a lamb that grew up with him and his children. It shared his food, drank from his cup and even slept in his arms. It was like a daughter to him" (2 Samuel 12:3). The Bible also underlines our responsibility to take care of animals: "A righteous man cares for the needs of his animal" (Proverbs 12:10).

Be thankful, therefore, for what your pets mean to you. At the same time, let me caution you not to let them become the center of your attention and take the place in your life that properly belongs to other people and to God.

For example, although it may be hard for you to do everything you used to do, ask God to help you reach out to other people who may also be lonely, or who need the wisdom and love you can give. Even if it is mainly through a letter, or by praying for them, you can help others.

In addition, realize that you are never alone if Christ is in your heart, and let these years be ones in which you grow closer to Him. If ou nave never opened your neart to Christ, take that step of commitment today. He loves you, and He wants you to know the joy of his presence every day.

## Tax deadline is today

Perhaps 10 million couples and individuals waited until the final day of the tax-filing season to drop their returns into the mailbox. The Internal Revenue Service estimates another 4.4 million were taking automatic four-month extensions. Some were leaving the country today, which won them an extension to June 16. And still others were simply plann-

ing to miss the deadline and pay a penalty.

The great majority of the 104 million couples and individuals who are expected to file returns this year had done so before the

## Libya pushes oil ban

GENEVA - The Libyan oil minister said today he would ask an OPEC conference to consider imposing an embargo on oil shipments to the United States in response to American military strikes against Libya.

Fawzi Shakshuki was asked by reporters in a Geneva hotel whether he would ask his OPEC partners for an oil embargo in retaliation for the U.S. air strikes against Libya early today. He replied: "We did ask it one time. We did ask it." Asked if he would renew the call, he said, "Yes, we will ask it again."

He would not provide details about any proposal for banning oil sales to the United States or other Western countries. Libya itself ships no oil directly to the United States and OPEC as a group supplies about 10 percent of U.S. oil consumption.

## Duvalier's assets frozen

BERN, Switzerland - Swiss authorities announced today they have moved to freeze any assets that deposed President Jean-Claude Duvalier of Haiti might have in Switzerland.

The action was requested today by the new Haitian government in a telex to the Swiss Federal Police, a Justice Ministry statement

Haiti asked for a freeze on any Duvalier accounts in banks in Geneva, Zurich and Lausanne, the statement said. It did not list the banks or how much money was believed

VIENNA, Austria - The Jewish Center here recently received an anonymous postcard addressed to the "Jewish Swine Department," advising Austrian Jews to clear out for Israel and adding, "Hitler should have gassed you all.

Jewish community leaders say prominent Jews are being harassed by a flood of anonymous telephone threats, and some parents have begun escorting their children to religious instruction out of fear a Jewish school bus might become a target of violence.

### OPEC ministers meet

GENEVA - OPEC oil ministers gather today for a new round of talks on ways to boost oil prices, but industry analysts said they say little chance of a meaningful agreement.

Crude oil prices on the open market fell sharply Monday, one telltale sign that oil traders doubted OPEC could reach an accord. May contracts for the most popular grade of American oil fell 64 cents a barrel, to \$12.97, in light trading on the New York Mercantile

Oil industry sources in London who spoke on condition they not be identified quoted Kuwait's oil minister as saying Monday that he held out little hope the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries could resolve its differences soon.





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

## Drugs beat Wegener's disease

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am recovering from Wegener's disease. It involved my kidneys, which failed, also my upper respiratory tract. I had biopsies of both the kidneys and the nose. I hear that in severe cases it can be fatal. Now my blood and urine tests show I am back to normal, so my medicine is being reduced gradually. My doctor has told me that not much is known about Wegener's as to cause. He said the big breakthrough was use of cancer drugs for it. I wonder if you can expand on this. — B.M.

Not too much. You have the straight scoop on Wegener's granulomatosis. It is inflammation of blood vessels with destruction of

the upper and lower parts of the respiratory system. In those systems the parts involved in getting oxygen to the blood are affected. The person with this disease has a destructive form of sinus inflammation, perhaps eventual ulceration of the nasal passages. The lung, too, becomes involved. Sometimes, the kidneys are affected as targets of the same destructive process.

The guess is that it is another of the immune related selfdestructive processes. Cancer drugs have turned things around for Wegener's patients. Even though it is not cancer, drugs used against cancer seem to turn off the Wegener's process. Grim statistics

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used to be part and parcel of this illness. Now, eight times out of 10, it can be controlled with the chemotherapy. I am happy to hear you are coming back from it so


