Everywhere I go, I see people that shine with a remarkable talent that I'm not always sure they're aware of. I've been to the Friona girls and boys' basketball games, and it's not hard to pick out who is hands down amazing at the game. Yet there are some players which I wish could see how much potential that they have. They are a bundle of hard work, self-discipline and good morale that are the raw materials to make great athletes.

It is not only in athletics. I've seen great writers beat themselves up and think lowly of their writing. We reduce our output because of doubt. We question our skill, our potential, our talent, in order to sink back into the mode of average. Average is easy. There are plenty of untalented people. You do not get singled out if you are like everyone else.

I say "we" because I know that I am classified in this group. I didn't get my blackbelt because I thought I couldn't handle the pressure. I have re-written the first chapter of my novel 37 times because every time I read it over, it's not good enough. I stutter because I get so nervous about people's opinion when meeting or interviewing them. Sometimes I don't speak at all because of my stutter.

I know, personally, that it is hard to be confident in a nation filled with incredibly talented youth. It is hard to say, "I'm good enough," when there are plenty of people surrounding you to show and tell you that you aren't. Yet there is nothing that these stars possess that you do not. I know it may take me years to overcome this, but I hope that in light of this article, I can help others like me to stand up and take the shot.

Texas minimum wage increase

Section 62.051 of the Texas Minimum Wage Act automatically adopts the federal minimum wage as the Texas minimum wage. This May Congress passed and the President signed legislation increasing the federal minimum wage from \$5.15 to \$7.25 per hour over the next two years.

Effective July 24, 2007, both the federal and Texas minimum hourly wages will increase from \$5.15 to \$5.85. Effective July 24, 2008, the federal and Texas minimum wages will increase to \$6.55 per hour and effective July 24, 2009, both will increase to \$7.25 per hour.




The Bible is full of statements like these. Every great man and woman of God, down through the ages, was known for their thankfulness to God. We need to cultivate the habit of gratitude!


