Comptroller announces July sales tax revenue

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced that the state collected \$1.63 billion in sales tax revenue in June, up 9.3 percent compared to June 2006.

Combs sent July sales tax allocations totaling \$446.4 million to cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, up 8.3 percent compared to July 2006. "Sales tax collections continue to grow at a steady pace," Combs said. "Growth in the construction, oil and gas, and retail sectors are helping the current strength of the Texas economy."

State sales tax collections in June and local sales tax allocations in July represent sales that occurred in May and were reported to the Comptroller in June. USDA: Important FSA deadlines approaching

Earlier this week U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Teresa Lasseter reminded farmers and other landowners that several important dates are on the horizon.

Lasseter explained that farmers and other landowners with base acres and yields have only until August 3, 2007, to enroll in the 2007 Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment Program (DCP) without incurring a late enrollment fee. Producers failing to sign up by August 3, 2007, but before September 30, 2007, will pay a late-file fee of \$100. The final date to enroll in the 2007 DCP is September 30, 2007.

Enrollment in DCP for the 2007 contract period began October 1, 2006. FSA extended the DCP sign-up deadline in March 2007 to August 3, 2007. The original DCP enrollment deadline was June 1, 2007.

The deadline to enroll in the 2007 Direct and Countercyclical Payment Program is rapidly approaching and Lasseter encouraged all eligible producers to enroll in DCP before the August 3 deadline to avoid paying a late fee.

DCP provides payments to eligible producers on farms enrolled for the 2002 through 2007 crop years. There are two types of DCP payments - direct payments and counter-cyclical payments. USDA computes payments using the base acres and payment yields established for the farm. The Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (2002 Farm Bill) authorized DCP.

Lasseter also reminded farmers and ranchers that they have until August 1, 2007, to nominate eligible candidates to serve on local FSA county committees.

FSA county committees assist local farmers through their decisions on commodity price support loans, conservation programs and disaster programs, and by working closely with county executive directors.

To hold office as a county committee member, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area in which the person is a candidate.

A complete list of eligibility requirements and additional information are posted online at http://www.fsa.usda.gov; click on News & Events, then County Committee Elections.

Individuals may nominate themselves or others as candidates. Also, organizations representing minorities and women are encouraged to nominate candidates.

All nomination forms for the 2007 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on August 1, 2007.

The county committee nomination period began June 15. Voting takes place in the fall. Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters by November 2. The final day to return voted ballots to the local USDA Service Center is December 3. Newly elected county committee members take office January 1, 2008.


The older friend stares at her, looking very distressed, says nothing for two full minutes, and finally says, "How soon do you have to know?"






