Judge rules for county in Griggs estate lawsuit

United States District Judge Mary Lou Robinson issued a summary judgment in the case of Rosemary Monzon and the Estate of Phillip Morris Griggs, Jr., Phillip M. Griggs, Sr., and Brenda Griggs vs. Parmer County.

On February 22, 2004, Phillip "P.J." Griggs, Jr. hanged himself from the bars of his Parmer County jail cell. The death occurred in the old jail facility and was ruled a suicide. (The new Parmer County Detention Center opened in March 2004.)

A lawsuit filed February 17, 2006, asked for \$8 million plus interest, costs, and attorney fees in behalf of Rosemary Monzon, grandmother of Zachary Monzon, Griggs, Jr.'s son, and parents Griggs, Sr. and Brenda Griggs. Among other issues, the suit alleged that Griggs, Jr. should have been given a mental health evaluation and follow-up during his jail stay.

He had been incarcerated since February 1, 2004 and, with other inmates, had been helping with the completion of the new Detention Center. Sheriff Randy Geries and Chief Deputy Wayne Gruben were originally named in the suit but were excluded by the court earlier.

Judge Robinson's final judgment stated: "Parmer County's motion for summary judgment having been granted, it is hereby ORDERED, ADJUDGED, AND DECREED that Plaintiffs take nothing in their claims against Parmer County. IT IS SO ORDERED."

The order was signed June 15, 2007. Sheriff Geries said the county had also been notified by their attorneys that appeals in the case have been denied.1

The Committee also approved language that will finally allow full implementation of Mandatory Country of Origin Labeling for meat in the Farm Bill. This language is a victory for consumers who overwhelmingly support the program. It includes three categories of labeling, one that indicates product was born, raised and slaughtered in the United States; one that indicates that product was not exclusively born, raised and slaughtered in the U.S.; and one that includes products entirely from other countries. For ground meat, products can be labeled with a list of countries where product may

have originated. During the Committee's business meeting held July 17-19, the Agriculture Committee considered H.R. 2419 and an "en bloc" amendment that included additional important programs that the Committee wants to include in the Farm Bill but that require additional funding.

The House of Representatives is expected to vote on the Farm Bill before the end of July.
