The council, meeting in emergency session Thurs-
day afternoon, clamped a minginght-t.6. a a m. curfew
through Satuday. The town of about 4,500 residents is
some 40 miles east of Abilene.
Three suspects were in custody Thursday night. assuming the fires would stop.
In addition to the curfew, members of the citizens watch group patrolled the streets Thursday night, and
frustrated businessmen also assisted the seven-prso police force in the watch, said city manager Michael
Moore.
"We're a small West Texas city and we're awfully proud of our town. That's what mak
like this so frustrating," Moore said
Jim Bob Cozart, 21, of Cisco, was charged with arson and was being held without bond at Eastland County
Jail. The other two suspects, ages 20 and 22 , are also of Cisco, said Cisco Policee Offiferer Rick Kirkland.
Cozart was arrested about 3 a.m. Thursday a block
and a half away from a fire at Webb's Inc. warehouse
and Dixon Auto Store, Kirkland said. The other two suspects were arrested a short time later at the scene of the fire, he said. ed to distract attention from burglaries at other businesses.
"We are investigating the possibility that the fires
were set to deter us from burglaries that were being wommitted," he said.
While a Tuesday fire caused an estimated $\$ 150,000$ to a warehouse at the Cisco Lumber Co. owned by Mayor
Joe Wheatley, the Dean Pharmacy was burglarized of Joe Wheatley, the Dean Pharma

Break-ins were discovered early Wednesday at the Taylor Center convenience store and at the Cisco

register were reported missing, Kirkland said.
A firefighter broke his leg when a wall of the Cisco Lumber Co. warehouse blew out and buried him in rubble. A second firefighter suffered minor burns while
trying to help the first firefighter.
The warehouse rubble was still too hot Thursday for fire investigators to probe it thoroughly for a cause.

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) -
