

Snake endangers Stacy plans

A tiny water snake is again putting a crimp in plans for construction of Stacy Dam, according to a just-released Army Corps of Engineers environmental impact statement.

The decision to build the dam could ultimately be made by U.S. Secretary of Interior Donald O'Dell within the next several months, a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service official said this morning.

The Fish and Wildlife Service, an interior department agency, has determined that building Stacy Dam would threaten the existence of the Concho Water Snake by altering 48 percent of its proposed critical habitat, according to environmental impact statement

Alternatives listed for project site

Colorado River Municipal Water District officials, however, are optimistic the project will ultimately succeed. The water district has planned the Stacy reservoir as a means to provide water to the West Texas area.

The corp has scheduled a public hearing on the proposed reservoir July 23 at 6:30 p.m. in the Ballinger

High School Auditorium. Fish and Wildlife Service public affairs officer Tom Smylie said from his office in Albuquerque, N.M., that documents showing the snake as threatened are on the regional directors desk waiting to be signed and sent to Washington.

"Our responsibility is that if a this morning species is in trouble, it needs protection," he said.

Smylie said the package will be reviewed in Washington by the fish and wildlife service's national director, Frank Dunkel, and then forwarded to Interior Secretary O'Dell

Once it reaches the secretary's desk, the decision to place the will be more political than biological, Smylie said.

Further political leverage may be brought to bear on the project by two bills before Congress, water district manager Owen Ivie said

House Resolution 4693 sponsored by Congressman Charles Stenholm and Senate Bill 2347 drafted by Sen. Lloyd Bentsen would circumvent the snake issue, Ivie said. The two bills have the support of the entire Texas congressional delegation, he said, adding "We feel pretty optimistic about all that.

The fish and wildlife report said snake on the threatened spieces list the project would flood 23 percent of the total range of the snake and 35 percent of its proposed critical habitat.

Also, changes in intensity, duration, frequency and water quality would have adverse effects on the

snake's downstream habitat, the report stated.

The fish and wildlife service listed three possible alternatives to the proposed Stacy site:

 Transporting water from existing reservoir sites such as Lake Buchanan.

 Selection of an alternate dam site on the Colorado River.

 Obtaining water supply from other proposed sites such as on the Llano or San Saba rivers.

But Ivie maintains there are no alternatives to the Stacy site.

The suggested alternatives are akin to Big Spring going to Odessa and "gathering up all the fire hydrants there" without permission, he said.

Rain ushers in mosquito crop

Staff Writer Like the dastardly Dr. Frankenstein creating his uncontrollable monster, Mother Nature has again mixed her summer brew of June rains and summer heat to create that most pesky of little monsters, the mosquito.

Big Spring Public Works Director Tom Decell said a direct correlation exists between the amount of rain and the number of mosquitos, and that the mosquitos are more abundant this summer than in past years.

We've had more water backed up around town than usual, especially on Memorial Day weekend," he said. "With the rain, the grass and weeds grow and hold the moisture down.

County extension agent Don Richardson explained that it takes only 10 to 12 days from the time eggs are laid until the mosquitos

He said the female mosquito will lay eggs in water in clusters of 50 to 200. The eggs hatch in two or three days, and within a week change to pupae, a wormlike state.

Two or three days after becoming pupae, Richardson said, they become flying mosquitos.

The mosquito's tendency to irritate is well known, but Richardson said they also transmit disease. He cited sleeping sickness and encephalitis as the most commonly transmitted diseases. Mosquitos also represent a major disease threat to horses, he said.

"The best way to control mosquitos is to destroy their breeding grounds - leaking faucets, old

tires, anything that holds water,' Richardson said. "Even a small amount of water can grow a lot of mosquitos.

Richardson said the county doesn't have a spraying program because spraying so large an area would be impractical.

The city has a two-pronged plan for battling mosquitos, Decell said. One prong entails killing the mosquito larvae before they hatch by dropping a larvaecide capsule in stagnant bodies of water, Decell said, stressing that larvaecide is not used in creeks or lakes where

Residents who know of stagnant ponds should inform the public works department, he said.

Prong two, Decell said, is aimed at killing flying mosquitos. This is accomplished by fogging trucks that spray a chemical approved by the Environmental Protection

words that homeowners must help in fighting the pests.

"I've been chasing mosquitos for years, and I've gone to people's houses who had complained, and I found them growing their own mosquitos," he said. "One person in a neighborhood can help by turning over cans or putting a drop of kerosene or oil on water."

He explained that certain areas of town, such as the Jones Valley on the west side, have more mosquitos because of the topography.

Low elevation, weeds and an abundance of water containers mark the worst areas, he said, adding that mosquitos don't have a large range of flight.

Six convicted of ship hijacking

GENOA, Italy (AP) - A jury today convicted six Palestinians of hijacking the Achille Lauro cruise ship and killing an American

two judges and six civilians also convicted five other defendants in connection with the hijacking.

It acquitted four defendants for lack of evidence.

Four defendants were present in court when Judge Lino Monteverde announced the verdict. They shouted, "Long live Palestine!" in Arabic from their steel-barred courtroom cages. Their shouts were translated by a courtroom interpreter.

The Genoa-based luxury liner was hijacked Oct. 7-9 with 413 people aboard. Four Palestinians commandeered the vessel after it made a port call in Egypt, and demanded the release of 51 Palestinians jailed in Israel.

A wheelchair-bound American passenger, Leon Klinghoffer, 69, of New York, was shot to death during the ordeal and his body dumped overboard.

The jury found three hijackers. Abbas and two other fugitive leaders of Abbas' Palestine Liberation Front equally responsible for the hijacking, the taking of the ship's passengers and crew has hostages and the kill-

Under Italian law, planners as

well as participants in any crime that results in a death are as guilty of the killing as the person who actually commits it. There was no separate charge of murdering Klinghoffer, because a killing that occurs during a terrorist kidnapping is considered more serious under Italian law than other killings.

The hijackers were among five defendants in custody. Abbas and the two PLF officials were among 10 defendants tried in absentia.

Abbas' two associates also were sentenced to life in prison. They are Ozzuddin Badrakkam, 39, the PLF military leader, and Ziad El Omar, 35, who was charged with buying the hijackers' cruise tickets

Youssef Magied al-Molqi, 23, the hijacker accused of shooting and killing Klinghoffer, was sentenced to 30 years in prison. The prosecution had asked for a life term.

Ibrahim Fatyer Abdelatif, 20, also accused of being one of the pirates, was sentenced to 24 years and two months

Ahmad Marrouf al Assadi, 24, a hijacker who had cooperated with authorities, was sentenced to 15 years and two months. He was not present when the verdict was read. In New York, Klinghoffer's daughters, Lisa and Ilsa, said today on ABC's "Good Morning America" program that they were outraged Molqi was not sentenced **CONVICTED** page 2A

U.S.-Soviets agree to talk on arms limit

WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States and the Soviet Union have agreed in principle to discuss problems of verifying underground testing of nuclear weapons, administration officials said today.

The discussions, probably later in the summer, would be the first under the Reagan administration with the Soviets on ways to make sure limits set by an unratified 1974 treaty were being observed.

The United States would hope to gain from the talks "some sort of technically acceptable means of inspection," said one of the officials, who demanded anonymity. He said this would call for some form of on-site inspection of Soviet testing

facilities. The administration has proposed that the Soviets allow monitors to sink cables that would record the force of test detonations, but the procedure, known as CORTEX, has elicited little interest in Moscow, the officials said.

President Reagan, in a report to Congress, has accused the Soviets of exceeding the limit of 150 kilotons on underground

The PUC approved a \$35.4 million revenue hike for Southwestern Bell on June 25. The company wanted a \$277.1 million increase


John Loehman, a Southwestern Bell assistant vice president in Austin, said today that the Metromedia purchase was made with shareholders' money and has no effect on ratepayers.

During the rate case, the PUC refused Consumers Union's request to conduct a study of Southwestern Bell's subsidiaries.

"We call on the PUC to reconsider its refusal to investigate Southwestern Bell's empire building," Ms. Barger said at a news conference.

"At the conclusion of the current rate case. Bell officials whined about how little revenue they were awarded and threatened to lay off employees and make other cuts. Four days later, this purchase was announced," she said.

A weak high-pressure ridge triggered showers and a few thunderstorms over Southeast Texas and the upper Gulf coast today while scattered rainshowers dampened the area west of the Pecos River, and forecasters expected more rainfall.

Panhandle to lower 70s in the southeast and Big Bend valleys.

Meanwhile, a low-pressure trough developed over the northern High Plains. The National Weather Service said other showers and thunderstorms, some producing heavy rain, developed offshore along the coastal plains in the northwest Gulf.

Skies were partly cloudy across most of West and Southeast Texas, while clear skies covered the rest of the state.

Winds were south to southwest across most of the state at 5 to 15 mph and light and northerly over far West Texas.

Early-morning temperatures were in the 60s in the western mountain region. Readings in the 70s were common across the rest of the state. The extremes ranged from 67 degrees at El Paso in far West Texas to 81 degrees at the Naval Air Station in Corpus Christi.

under water. Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev has tried to persuade Reagan to cease underground tests, as well, but Kenneth L. Adelman, the director of the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, and other senior officials say the tests are necessary to make sure U.S. nuclear weapons are safe and effective.

In related news, White House spokesman Larry Speakes said Wednesday that Reagan will respond to the Soviet Union's latest arms control proposal in a letter to Gorbachev. But Speakes said there is no timetable for the reply.

Speakes said Gorbachev outlined the Soviet proposal in general terms in his letter and we will do the same in our reply." A more detailed response will be presented when the Geneva arms talks resume in September, he added.

Although Speakes declined to discuss specifics of the response, The Washington Post reported in today's editions that administration officials have discussed a plan under which deep cuts in the superpowers' offensive weapons arsenals would be traded for a delay in the deployment of a "Star Wars' missile defense system.

The newspaper said Secretary of State George Shultz is interested in the idea, but that Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger opposes any limits on 'Star Wars' deployments.

The agreement to meet says the two sides are free to raise any concerns on testing, and the Soviets were expected to press for a total test ban, according to a report in The New York Times. The United States was expected to raise concerns about verification of existing treaties and to explore Soviet willingness on on-site verification.

Former CIA Director William Colby and Walter Slocombe, a former Pentagon official who worked on the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty of 1979, told reporters Wednesday that Reagan's tentative decision to scrap the accord would deprive U.S. intelligence of important information.

Slocombe said the treaty gives the United States easier access to information on Soviet missile tests and other useful data. "It is not in the overall U,S. interest to see the treaty collapse," he said.

Slocombe said the Soviets have violated the treaty by disguising missile tests, but said said if the treaty is abandoned, "they can begin putting covers on things, shifting around."

'We have to be very careful to guard against cutting off our nose to spite our face," he said. Adelman challenged Colby's assertions

"We know less today about Soviet strategic forces than we did when SALT II was signed,' he said in an interview. "What's startling is the degree to which the Soviets are violating the provisions on intelligence matters in SALT II. Soviet concealment and deception has increased over the years," Adelman said.

PORTSMOUTH, Ohio — A state prison inmate took a student nurse hostage today at a hospital, officials said. There was an unconfirmed report that the man was armed with a knife.

Police said the Southern Ohio Correctional Facility inmate, who was a patient at Mercy Hospital, took the nurse hostage at about 8:45 a.m. Radio station WNXT said he was armed with a razor-type knife, but authorities refused to confirm the report.

Tessa Unwin, a spokeswoman for the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction, identified the inmate as Jerome Evans, 22, of Montgomery County. She said initially that Evans was serving a sentence for convictions on charges of rape, aggravated robbery and kidnapping, but said later checks showed Evans had been sentenced to 7 to 25 years for his convictions on charges of rape and attempted rape.

Man held for observation



Heat wave kills chickens

Triple-digit temperatures were predicted for parts of Georgia and South Carolina today, but the area affected by the heat wave was expected to diminish as a cold front pushes showers and thunderstorms into Virginia and North Carolina, the National Weather Service

Second explosion

Fumes hurt 92; residents evacuate again

MIAMISBURG, Ohio (AP) — A chemical fire in a ruptured railroad tank car continued to burn today, spewing a toxic phosphorus cloud that had already forced thousands of people from their homes for the second time in two days.

But officials said the fire was beginning to die down as firefighters allowed it to burn unchecked. The burning tanker was carrying white phosphorus, a volatile and highly toxic chemical that causes nausea, and throat and eye irritations when inhaled. In some cases, exposure can be fatal.

"I can say that it has calmed down a little bit, but it is still burning," said Shawn Mabry, a city computer programmer who was working at the city's disaster headquarters. He said residents still were not being permitted to return to their homes.

Dave Bush, the Dayton-based trainmaster for CSX Transportation, the railroad on which the tanker derailed, said officials decided Wednesday night to let the fire burn.

"That's about the only way to get rid of that stuff,"
Bush said. "Right now, it's just a waiting game ...
there's nothing more up there to ignite."

At least 80 people were treated at six Dayton area hospitals Wednesday night after the tanker exploded, sending a poisonous plume over the same area that had been evacuated the previous night. Another dozen people were treated at a Red Cross shelter in downtown Dayton.

Most of the people treated complained of shortness of breath, irritated eyes or sore throats, officials said. Three people were hospitalized.

Henry Guzman, an aide to Gov. Richard Celeste, estimated that up to 25,000 people had fled their homes, but local authorities reported a smaller figure.

Miamisburg officials said they believed the evacuation included all of the town's 15,000 residents. In Moraine, officials said about 1,500 residents had left their homes. Officials of other areas had no estimate.

Temporary shelters were set up at the University of Dayton Arena and, later, at the Dayton Convention and Exposition Center, where officials estimated 2,500 people had registered to spend the night. Another 2,000 people were being housed elsewhere, a Red Cross official said.

The Miami Valley Regional Transit Authority used buses to evacuate nursing homes and the handicapped. Shoppers and workers at Dayton Mall were ordered to leave Wednesday evening as the fumes neared.

For a while, motorists on Interstate 75 were not allowed to use exits into the communities being evacuated.

Vic Blankenship, who owns a used appliance store in
Miamisburg and lives above it, said he ignored the

order to evacuate the city.
"I snuck back in; I didn't have any other place to go," Blankenship said. "The rest of the places are all

go," Blankenship said. "The rest of the places are all sleep-on-the-floor, and I wasn't going to do that."

Tuesday's derailment involved 15 cars of a 44-car CSX Transportation Southland Flyer. A car carrying white phosphorus, which is used in making rat poison.

white phosphorus, which is used in making rat poison, detergent and weapons, ruptured and began burning. The fumes sent more than 250 people to hospitals to be treated for nausea, burning eyes and other symptoms, but none was seriously injured.

Crews tried Wednesday to drag the phosphorus

tanker away from the wreckage, before fire spread to a tanker carrying sulfur, but found that a new white cloud began forming each time workers reduced the amount of water being poured into the tanker. Flames flared again Wednesday when workers rais-

Flames flared again Wednesday when workers raised the tanker and the white phosphorous, which ignites at 85 degrees Fahrenheit, came in contact with the hot, July air.

Many of the estimated 17,500 people who left their homes in Miamisburg, Moraine, Miami Township and West Carrollton Tuesday night had returned by the time the tanker exploded Wednesday.

Vietnam leader dies

BANGKOK, Thailand — Le Duan, who succeeded Ho Chi Minh in 1969 as Vietnam's most powerful leader, died today in Hanoi. He was

The official Voice of Vietnam said Le Duan, who was secretary-general of the Vietnamese Communist Party, died after "a period of serious illness" but did not elaborate. Japan's Kyodo news service said he died of kidney disease.

The Vietnamese broadcast, monitored in Bangkok, called Le Duan's death "a great loss for our party and people" and announced five days of national mourning. It said a state funeral will be held Tuesday.

Six killed in gun battle

ROSH HANIQRA, Israel — Israeli soldiers fought a two-hour battle with Arab guerrillas today after forcing their rubber dinghy ashore a few hundred yards inside Lebanon, officials said. Two Israeli soldiers and four guerrillas were reported killed.

Israel's military command said two Israelis died and nine were wounded in the battle that began about 2 a.m. when an Israeli navy vessel intercepted the dinghy and forced it to land in southern Lebanon across the border from Rosh Haniqra, this kibbutz on the Mediterranean Sea.

Police annex bombed

PARIS — Two policemen injured in the bombing of a police headquarters annex in central Paris that killed a police inspector have not regained consciousness and were reported today in very serious condition.

The officers were among 27 people injured in the blast Wednesday that killed 54-year-old inspector Marcel Basdevant, authorities said.

The powerful bomb, apparently placed in a fifth-floor toilet, blasted out chunks of the 3-foot-thick walls, scattering documents around a courtyard, shattering glass and demolishing the ceiling.

Union meeting ban lifted

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — A trade union today hailed the lifting of a 2-day-old ban on meetings of most unions and antiapartheid groups in the Johannesburg area, calling it the first government backdown since the state of emergency was declared last month.

"We hope it means that hawks in the Cabinet are starting to lose momentum, and people with a bit more sense are starting to see what they've got themselves into," said Bernard Fanaroff, senior organizer of the Metal and Allied Workers Union.

His group was among four unions representing a total of 300,000 workers that appealed Wednesday to the Rand Supreme Court to overturn the meetings ban.

High court tries to draw the line

For 175 years, the partisan redistricting performed by state legislatures has proved to be exceedingly contentious and unnecessarily intricate.

The U.S. Supreme Court, however, tried to draw the line at the unjust practice of gerrymandering by delivering a pair of complex rulings that could well have far-reaching impact in

The term "gerrymandering" was coined in 1811 to describe the self-serving creation of congressional districts by Massachusetts Governor Elbridge Gerry. Now, as then, a gerrymandered district is oddly shaped, bears little relation to community boundaries or topography, but maximizes the voting power of the reigning political party.

In the age of the poll and the computer, it has evolved from an art to a science.

The case before the Supreme Court involved a 1981 redistricting plan designed by Indiana's Republicandominated legislature. Indiana Democrats had argued and won in a lower court that the gerrymandered plan "had a built-in bias favoring the majority (GOP) Party." This contention was supported when Democratic legislative candidates in the 1982 election captured 52 percent of the total vote but won only 43 of 100 seats.

Together, the court's rulings are highly unusual. In a 6-3 vote, the justices declared gerrymandering unconstitutional. But they swung around to a 7-2 vote in upholding. Indiana's GOP-drawn legislative districts.

Why? The court noted that control of the Hoosier legislature often rotated between the two parties and that more than one election was needed to prove that gerrymandering was disenfranchising voters.

"Unconstitutional discrimination," wrote Justice Byron White. "occurs only when the electoral system is arranged in a manner that will consistently degrade a voter's or groups of voters' influence on the political process as a whole.

But by ruling that lower courts can strike down the more extreme examples of gerrymandering, the justices have cleared the way for such lawsuits all over the country. This will prove beneficial to the extent that courts ensure that the old and frequently abused practice of redistricting is made more equitable.

Doubts and problems delay **American Embassy project**

By JACK ANDERSON and JOSEPH SPEAR

WASHINGTON - The six-year, multimillion-dollar effort to build a new American Embassy in Cairo is a near-perfect symbol of the United States' on-again, off-again Middle East policy: hagridden by doubts, beset by fear of offending, hopelessly hesitant.

Like U.S. policy, the embassy project began with the best of intentions. It was originally to be a gleaming 20-story tower - modest by the standards of Chicago's or Manhattan's modern-day pyramid builders, but certainly impressive in the low, drab skyline of Cairo.

There was no doubt of the need for a new and larger embassy. In the aftermath of the Camp David accords - and the billions in U.S. aid that were the price of the agree- the U.S. mission in Cairo quickly grew to more than 1,000 people, one of the biggest American outposts in the world. Embassy employees scattered in smaller buildings all over Cairo would be brought together in a single, efficient office building.

But second thoughts soon came into Foggy Bottom on little cat feet, following attacks on American embassies in Tehran, Islamabad and Tripoli, and the assassination of Egyptian Presidenit Anwar Sadat

The doubters wondered if an imposing high-rise embassy would 1) present too tempting a target for terrorists, and 2) offend sensitive Egyptians. A senior diplomat in the Cairo embassy wrote a memo to Washington titled: "Why I Oppose the Proposed Chancery Plan." The anguished memo read in part:

'An 18- to 20-story tower ... (is) inappropriate to a low profile U.S. government official presence in Egypt. Following the assassination of President Sadat, it is especially important to be discreet. We must be especially sensitive not to appear to be 'pulling the strings' on a puppet government in Egypt.

The 20-story tower "would be a visible symbol of an overwhelming

U.S. presence," the diplomat continued. "It could be at best a subject of public comment and ridicule ... and at worst a potential lightning rod for demonstrations or more serious problems

An Egyptian contractor was chosen in 1982. The embassy would cost about \$27 million, and be finished by January 1986.

It soon became obvious that the contractor wasn't up to the task. State Department and General Accounting Office documents obtained by our associate Lucette Lagnado listed the "classic signs" of trouble: subcontractors and workers complaining of not being paid, a halt to the contractors' contributions to Egyptian social security, and a Noticeable slowdown in actual construction.

By the time the State Department finally fired the contractor, in January 1985, there was only a three- to four-story shell of a building. A department official explained that it had taken a long time to gather the documentation needed to cancel the contract without a legal battle.

Even while the search for a new

contractor was going on, the old argument over height was revived. A few high-rise buildings had been erected in Cairo, including the 21-story Ramses Hilton, which would make a taller embassy less conspicuous. And the number of embassy employees had grown. In the end, though, the depart-

ment decided to stick with the 16-story plan, with perhaps a makeshift 17th floor added. A Japanese/Ameican consortium got the contract, and work is proceeding apace. But the price tag is now \$40 million.

That cliche turns out to be naitright. It's the heat and the humidity that make a miserable and sometimes deadly combination.

> The National Weather Service in Texas now routinely issues a heat stress index when both high temperatures and humidity persist for two consecutive days. High humid heat takes a greater toll of life than lightning, hurricanes, ternadoes, floods or earthquakes, according to the U.S. Department of

Heat kills, doctors say, by taxing the body beyond its capabilities.

The body dissipates heat by varying the rate and depth of blood circulation, by losing water through skin and sweat glands and, when the blood is heated above 98.6 degrees, by panting.

As the heat rises, the heart desirable conditions.

begins to pump more blood, blood vessels dilate to accomodate this flow and the blood is circulated closer to the skin's surface. Water diffuses through the skin as perspiration. The skin handles about 90 percent of heat

dissipation. Sweating does nothing to cool the body unless the water is removed by evaporation. And this is what high humidity prevents. As a result, the danger of heat-related illness or death increases.

From 1936 to 1975, 20,000 Americans were killed due to heat and humidity. In 1980, a disastrous heat wave killed 1,250 people in the United States.

Government epidemiologists point out that these are direct casualties. No one knows how many more deaths are hastened by heat-wave weather, such as diseased or aging hearts that would have continued functioning under more

Take a look at a typical early summer day along Texas' coast.

Temperatures range from 75 to 92, with 89 as the average. Humidity at mid-afternoon ranges from 54 to 85, with an average of 70.

Put the two together and the result is an average apparent temperature of 103, which calls for caution in prolonged physical activity out in the sun.

The heat stress index is based on shade and light wind conditions, not on exposure to full sunshine. Sunshine can raise the index by 15 degrees or more.

Heat disorders occur because the body no longer has the ability to shed heat by circulatory changes and sweating, or because a salt imbalance has been caused by too much sweating.

As a result, the temperature of the body's inner core begins to rise, causing heatstroke, sunstroke, heat cramps and heat exhaustion.

With age, heat disorders become

more severe. What causes heat cramps in a 17-year-old may cause heat exhaustion in middle age and a heatstroke in a person over 60.

When the heat and humidity are both high, consider these precautions:

· Slow down; reduce your activities and stay in a cool or airconditioned place as much as

• Drink a lot of liquids but no alcohol. If you are outside for an hour or two, drink plenty of water as soon as possible.

 Take a look at your diet; foods like proteins which increase your metabolic heat production also promote water loss.

• Dress for the weather. Wear lightweight, light-colored and loose-fitting clothes, along with a hat of some sort and dark glasses. If you are in the sun, be sure you are wearing a sunscreen. Don't forget to put more on if you are



Houston detective goes extra mile for victims

HOUSTON (AP) - Crime victims in this town have a cop on

Detective Art Woolery, a sex crimes investigator for the Harris County Sheriff's Department, believes there is more to law enforcement than catching criminals. "It goes beyond that to doing whatever it takes to help the victim," Woolery says.

As an officer of two victims' rights organizations and the sheriff's liaison to the state attorney general's Victims' Compensation Office, Woolery is concerned with victims of all types of crimes.


For example, he recently started an outside fund for a family that had experienced an incredible chain of bad luck, including the murder of their son. "They were such super nice people, so down on their luck that I had to do something," Woolery says.

But over the years his main work has been with sexual assault victims. When they need help that Woolery cannot provide as the investigating detective, he steps forward as a concerned citizen to organize people, lobby the Legislature, and change the system that is sometimes unresponsive to crime victims' needs.

Sexual assault victims may not know how much better they are treated in the courts, hospitals, and police stations because of reforms Woolery helped to bring about. They just know that he was there when they needed him, says Cassandra Thomas of the Houston Area Women's Center.

"For many sexual assault survivors, it is such a relief to find a detective like Art Woolery," Ms. Thomas says. Rape victims have seen the movies about others who went to police, only to be treated like criminals, she said. This may make them afraid to report the crime at all. But when they go to Woolery, they find a gentle, caring officer who gives them the support

"I have seen Detective Woolery working with sexual assault survivors, and he is excellent," Ms. Thomas says. "Many have told me that he just became their best friend. He's real loving in a very professional way. He really does go the extra mile. He has gone out on a limb for sexual assault survivors

Woolery admits that he has a soft spot for people who have veen victimized by a crime. "I can't say no," he explains. "I can't sit at my desk with a victim and see this look in her eye and know she is reaching out for help without doing what I can for her

That can give the crime victim time to cry and talk about her feelings before asking for the hard facts he needs for his investigation. It can mean referring her to counseling, making sure she has a safe place to stay. It can mean giv-

ing her a hug if she needs one, or offering a cup of coffee.

It also means being there when she needs him, Woolery says. He tells the rape victim what to expect from the investigation and trial process, then keeps her up to date about the case. Woolery often encourages her to call him at home if she has a question or just wants to talk. "Sometimes she just wants to call and cuss you out because she's had a bad day and nothing is going right and you're there to take the heat," Wollery says.

Rheumatoid arthritis affects the family

ATLNTA (AP) - In addition to the pain and suffering rheumatoid arthritis (RA) causes, it can also dramatically affect the family structure, according to the Arthritis Foundation.

The foundation says the divorce rate for people with RA is 70 percent above the rate for the general population. In addition, 59 percent of the people with RA are unemployed, and 85 percent have had to change their

Arthritis can have a devastating impact, physically, emotionally and economically, the foundation points out, adding that, "Anyone who thinks of arthritis as a minor problem should learn the facts about the condition."

Some women get sunbath itch

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Why is it that my skin reacts with such a terrible itch and rash after sunbathing? I am a 28-year-old woman. The itch I get lasts about a week, then disappears, only to pop out again as soon as I go out to sunbathe again. Can this be prevented? I tried sunscreen lotion, but it doesn't help. - M.H.

I wonder how many other women have this experience? This seems to be a form of photodermatitis that has been given a name benign summer light eruption. Your description certainly fits that. A woman (usually 20-35) is exposed to intense sunlight, then has the rash a couple of days afterward.

The rash is confined to exposed areas, lasts about a week, then subsides. Sunscreens don't prevent it. And although the rash subsides in about one week, it reappears with the next sun exposure.

You can talk to a dermatologist, who will have run into this subject in the professionial literature, and will know what to tell you. Some doctors, I understand, have tried a mixture of certain drugs along with ultraviolet light treatment. There

has been some success with this. A few males have noted this reaction, but most patients are women. We're not sure why women are so much more prone to the problem. The same problem (the itch) can occur with ultraviolet light

lamp exposures DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Your statement that sometimes migraine headache prevention is headaches as they appear interested me. You mentioned beta blocker medicine as a preventative. You have to take it continually to avoid the headaches. But how is the decision made to take the prevention route or the other? - Mrs. T.N.

The decision isn't the easiest to make. Many factors are considered.

How many headaches are occurring monthly? How long do the headaches last? How efficiently do the abortive medicines (ergotamines, etc.) work in alleviating the pains? How debilitating are the headaches to the person, in his work, socially,

Dr. Donohue

Sometimes the preventive medicines (like the beta blockers) can be used periodically. For example, women who tend to have the headaches in association with their menstrual periods might be able to use such drugs temporarily milligrams (mgs.) will have 400 at such times.

If there are only a couple of headaches a month, and if they are not too prolonged, and if they can be controlled effectively with the aborting medicine, then that is the way to go. If not, then the prophylactic appraoch (with the preventive drugs) might make more sense. You'll find a more indepth discussion of the problem in my new booklet, "Headache: Causels-+Symptoms-Cures." You will, of course, have to tell

any doctor in the future tht you had this experience. It is important for him to know tht.

As to your question about future use of such X-rays, yes, it is possible to have them if it is absolutely necessary. Under normal circumstances, they would not be taken, since you h ad the reaction once. But if nothing else will do but use of the staining material, you can be given medicines to block the allergic reaction.

Moses prevails; Lewis fails

MOSCOW (AP) — They were the heroes of summer, the gold-medal stars of the 1984 seconds," he said. "I knew that I could come in

Two years ago, Edwin Moses was skimming over hurdles and winning his second Olympic championship. At the same time, Carl Lewis was sprinting, leaping and passing the relay baton, a man winning four Olympic titles for the first time in 48 years.

Things have changed for both athletes since then, and it was apparent Wednesday night at the inaugural Goodwill Games.

The final day of track competition at the international festival was highlighted by Ben Johnson's victory over Lewis in the 100 meters in 9.95 seconds — the fastest ever at sea-level. The United States and the Soviet Union

women's basketball teams both registered closer-than-expected victories, and will meet tonight in a showdown of unbeaten squads. And for the fifth time a world record was set,

this time in cycling. A Soviet team lowered the world mark in the four-kilometer pursuit to four minutes, 12.830 seconds Moses, starting a comeback from almost two years of back and leg problems, sped away

from the field to win his 111th consecutive 400-meter hurdles race in 47.94 seconds. It was nowhere near his world record of 47.02. and even farther away from the sub-47 second clocking that he set as his goal. According to Moses, however, for someone with his recent

experiences, it was fine

"I was glad to be able to run under 48 here and win. I was expecting to have a good race. With the training I've had over the last two weeks, I felt I could do well.

Chidi Imott of Nigeria was second in 100 with Lewis, clocked at 10.06, third behind Johnson, a Canadian who now has beaten the American three consecutive times and just loves it. "When I beat Carl the last time, he was com-

plaining. This time I beat him pretty good,' Johnson said. "I just wanted to see what he will say this time.

Lewis said Johnson had much the better

"I didn't get off to a good start and Johnson ran a great race," he said. Johnson, who finished third in the 1984 Olym-

pics, blasted out of the starting blocks and finished just .02 seconds off Calvin Smith's world mark of 9.93. The time tied Jimmie Hines' winning mark in the 1968 Olympics. Both Smith and Hines ran their races at high

altitude - Smith in Colorado Springs, Colo. in 1983, and Hines at the Mexico City Olympics in 1968. Moscow is much closer to sea level and the heavier air gives more resistance to runners. Later, Lewis anchored the U.S. men's 400-meter relay to victory in 37.95, the thirdfastest time ever. Lewis was the anchor on the two faster squads

The U.S. women's 400 relay team also won, with Evelyn Ashford anchoring a run of 42.12

Mike Conley of the United States won the triple jump with a leap of 58 feet, 1/2 inch. The world record holder in the triple jump, Willie Banks of the United States, pulled out of the competition at the last minute with an ankle injury sustained Monday at a meet in Finland.

In the high jump, Doug Nordquist of the United States won at 7-8, the best leap outdoors by an American this year.

Olga Vladykina of the Soviet Union won the women's 400 in 49.96, and her teammate, Tatyana Samolenko, won the women's 1,500 in 4:05.50

And twin brothers from Portugal, Domingos and Dionisio Castro, finished first and third, respectively, in the 10,000 meters. American Gerard Donakowski was second.

The U.S. women's basketball team struggled in the early going before beating Bulgaria 67-58, with Cheryl Miller scoring 20 points. The Soviet Union came from far behind to beat Brazil

The U.S. women's volleyball team, which has been eliminated from medal contention, won its first match of the tournament, beating Czechoslovakia 11-15, 16-14, 15-10, 15-4, and the American men's water polo beat The

Netherlands 12-5. Soviets swept the modern pentathlon gold medals, with Vakhtang Yagorashvili winning the men's title and Tatyana Chernetskaya the women's. American Lori Norwood took a bronze medal in the women's competition.

Murphy had seven hits in his last 39 at-bats, and has 14 homers and pinch hit at times during the streak, and Tanner agreed what the 30-year-old outfielder needs was an occasional day's rest.
