Plans To Hold A Callahan County Fair Are Progressing Very Favorably

Plans for a Callahan County Fair were started at a meeting of interested people in the county agent's office last week. Tentative plans were set to have the fair on September 24. This is the last Saturday in September. Jerry Loper, Commander of the American Legion in Baird, said that the hall would be available that day and would be glad for the people of Callahan County to use it for a fair.

Plans were made for the setting up of general agricultural or educational booths by the various clubs, communities, organizations and schools of the county. Awards will be made for the booth judged to be the most outstanding.

There will also be classes for 4-H clubs and FFA boys, farmers and livestock men to show their crops and livestock. These boys and men will compete against each other for prizes and ribbons. Types of livestock to be shown are beef cattle, dairy cattle, pigs, sheep, and poultry. Crops to be shown are small grains, hegar, milo maize, corn, cotton, sweet potatoes, wetch, watermelons, apples and any others that there may be a demand for. Combed honey and strained honey will also be shown.

Mrs. Evelyn Scott, County Home Demonstration Agent, says that the ladies of the County Home Demonstration Clubs will hold their annual dress review and show their dresses at the fair. Space will be allotted for commercial concerns to set up exhibits at the fair. This is always a good attraction at any fair.

An added attraction to the livestock end of the fair will be the special pig show for boys who were given gilts by the Sears Foundation last May. Along with this will be a show to see which boy has the best pen of three fat market hogs that were raised out of the first litter of pigs from a sow a boy was given in 1948. The winner of this show will go on to the district show in Abilene the next week and compete against winners from six other counties.

All the details of the fair are not complete, and anyone who has any good ideas concerning a fair should contact county agent, O. F. Werst, or O. B. Edmondson of Cross Plains, or E. L. Reese of Baird, who are the vocational agriculture teachers in these towns.

Anyone who wishes to enter crops, livestock, or have a booth or display should contact one of these men, also. Closing date for entries will be announced at a latter date.

COUNTY AGENT ATTENDS 2-WEEKS SHORT COURSE

County Agent Oliver Werst left Saturday to attend a two weeks short course in Sheep and Wool Production at A & M College. The first week of the course will be spent at College Station. The second week will be spent on farms and ranches near the Bluebonnet Experiment Station at McGregor, and the Sonora Agriculture Experiment Station. Feeding, breeding, care, and range management of sheep will be studied. There will also be courses in shearing and preparation of wool and in scouring, processing and cleaning wool for market.

This community was saddened when news was received here that Harold C. Foy, 41, Brown County Water Improvement District manager, died at Brownwood Wednesday, following a four-month illness.

Foy was a former resident of Baird, having been born and reared here, and funeral services will be held at the Baptist Church at 4 p. m. today, with the local pastor, Rev. A. A. Davis being assisted in the service by Dr. A. S. Gafford, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Brownwood. Services will be held at the First Methodist Church in Brownwood at 10:30 this morning conducted by Rev. Lord, Methodist District Superintendent, assisted by Rev. Gafford. Burial will be in Ross Cemetery.

Foy, a member of the Texas Engineers Association and the National Association of Engineers, was a native of Baird. He graduated from Baird high school in 1924 and attended Texas A&M.

Foy married the former Ava Griffin of Clyde on July 12, 1931.

He was with the Texas Highway Department as an engineer in Abilene, Wichita Falls, Dalhart and Amarillo. Foy went to Brownwood when Camp Bowie first started, then moved to Corpus Christi to aid in the construction of the Naval Air Station.

Foy returned to Camp Bowie as head of the utilities department with the post engineers. He was named district manager of the Water Improvement District a year ago when Herman Bettis moved to Abilene to enter the advertising business.

Foy was a well known golfer. He played in the Abilene invitation tourney in 1948.

Killing Rattlesnakes Is Great Sport For Those Who Like Thrills

Another rattlesnake was also killed at the same time, but it was only about three feet long and they did not bring it to town. The men working on the fence line were not exactly hunting for snakes, but they never pass up the fun of killing them wherever they turn up. Rattlesnake hunting is a sport that, even though it is dangerous, is becoming quite popular throughout this section. Hunters seek out their dens in the winter months and by the use of a wire with a sharp hook on it, the snakes are pulled out and killed. It is said that sometimes the hunter brings out a ball of the rattlers at a time, all of them buzzing and squirming, and then its every man for himself until all the snakes are killed.

Clyde Man Held In Holdup And Rape

Charges of rape, burglary and assault with a deadly weapon were filed Thursday morning in Abilene against J. T. Jones, Jr., 32, of Route 1, Clyde, according to a news report in the Abilene Reporter-News. The Reporter-News account continues:

They were the outcome of reports given to city police and the Sheriff's Department at an early hour this morning of the alleged forcing of a 17-year-old Abilene girl to get out of an automobile in which she was parked with a boy friend, and forcing her to go in another automobile with another man to an abandoned ranch house, where she was allegedly raped.

Dist. Atty. Esco Walter filed the charges in Justice of the Peace W. A. (Bill) Ward's court. The complaints will be considered by the 42nd District Court Grand jury.

Jones was arrested about 3:50 a. m. today on the Colony Hill Road a few miles southeast of Abilene, by Police Sgt. L. A. Arnold and Sheriff H. T. Fleming.

About an hour and a half earlier, Charles Fikes, Route 3, Merkel, reported to police that while he was parked with his girl friend at the south end of Oak St., a man drove up, forced him at the point of a double-barreled shotgun to get out and start walking, and then compelled the girl to ride away with him.

Also prior to the arrest, the girl got in touch with police and told them the same story. She said that a man blindfolded her and drove what seemed about eight miles before removing the blindfold. She described a deserted house where, she said, he raped her.

She told police that the man hid his shotgun on the Colony Hill Road after raping her, and then took her home. She accompanied officers to the place she said the gun had been hidden.

Arnold and Fleming arrested Jones on the Colony Hill Road, headed toward Abilene. Fleming said he had a shotgun in the car.

Police Identification Officer H. L. Price, Dist. Atty. Walter and Sheriff Fleming, accompanied by the girl went to the area this morning where the girl said the alleged offense occurred.

They located the abandoned Red Sumrall ranch house, on a country road about a mile south of the Abilene-Potosi road. Fleming said the house fit the description given by the girl.

A door had apparently been broken open, as the girl had said. The sheriff said fresh tracks inside and cigaret butts in the house indicated someone had been there recently.

Fleming quoted Jones as saying he knew nothing of the alleged occurrences. He said the Sheriff's Department might take Jones to Austin today for a lie detector test.

Charges filed this morning allege that Jones raped the 17-year-old girl; that he committed an assault with a deadly weapon upon Charles Fikes; and that he burglarized the Red Sumrall abandoned ranch house.

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HEALTH FACTS Austin — Correct posture in school children, and adults as well, is necessary to proper physical and mental development, says a warning from the Texas State Department of Health. "Good posture is a sign of self respect and plays an important part in winning the respect of others," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "Many of the ills of childhood and the deformities of adult life have their beginning in poor posture acquired during childhood," he said, "and it is particularly important that the child's posture conform to nature's dictates. Most children are born in good physical condition and yet examination of large groups of school children show a high per cent to be suffering from poor posture. Malnutrition and fatigue are productive of poor posture. These lessen the size of the chest and decrease the lung capacity. Abdominal organs may also be pushed out of natural position, which may seriously interfere with their action. These conditions must be corrected before the body is able to attain normal weight and nutritional standards. "School children who have poor posture are said often to average lower in attendance and in school mental and physical activities than those who have good posture. A child may be forced to hold his body in an unnatural position by a desk that is too high or too low. Desks and work tables should be just high enough to allow the feet to rest on the floor and the forearms and hands to rest upon the tops without the shoulders being hunched up. "Begin early in life to teach your children to stand straight and sit straight for health and

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

PROPOSING an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is, hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

SEC. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

PROPOSING an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 or Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries

shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on vote of the qualified electors of grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

SECTION 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon,

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

SECTION 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

PROPOSING an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for each twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest

and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller."

SEC. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session.

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4-5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

SEC. 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

SEC. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

SEC. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

PROPOSING an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast

are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

SEC. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay expenses of such publication and election.

County Agent's Column

FALL GARDEN TIME

It is time to begin the fall garden. The recent rains should make it possible to get the garden off to a good start. Before beginning the plowing job, clean off all the weeds and grass for if turned under now, they'll cause the soil to dry. If well dried barnyard manure is available, spread it over the garden and plow it under five or six inches deep. It adds plant food and increases the water holding capacity of the soil. Three to five pounds of 5-10-5 fertilizer per 100 feet of row space will also help increase the yield.

Tender vegetables that should be planted immediately and mature before frost are beans, Irish potatoes, and mustard. Turnips, beets, Swiss chard, cabbage, and carrots are semi-hardy vegetables and will withstand a slight frost, therefore they can be planted a little later. The hardy vegetables that will withstand a heavy frost and can be planted in September are onions, spinach, collards and English peas.

The Bliss Triumph Irish potato is the best variety of potato to plant this time of the year as it will mature in about 70 days. Good varieties of other vegetables to plant are pinto beans, Bermuda onion sets, Creole shellots, Purple Top turnips, Detroit dark red beets, Lucullus Swiss chard, and First and Best English Peas.

Since germination of seed is not good at this time of the year, about 1-4 more seed than normal should be planted so that you will get a good stand.

LOOPHOLES in the Law By WILL WILSON. Past President, Texas District and County Attorneys Association. Includes a portrait of Will Wilson.

Editor's Note - (This is one of a series of short case histories, all taken from court records, showing how legal loopholes often enable criminals to escape punishment in Texas. Will Wilson, of Dallas, is chairman of a special steering committee of the State Bar, which is working for revision of the antiquated Criminal Code and Code of Criminal Procedure in order to eliminate these loopholes.)

Having drunk more beer than he could handle, Joe started a great disturbance in a tavern. The county sheriff was called. When he reached the tavern he tried to quiet Joe by talking to him. But Joe was in no condition to listen to reason. He threatened to kill the sheriff.

The sheriff was unarmed, so he went back to his car and got a pistol. When he returned to the tavern Joe had been carried to the back door by two men. The sheriff followed the men and approached Joe. As he came close, Joe stabbed him in the chest with a knife.

The wound was wide and went to the rib. It would have produced death if it had not struck a rib. Since that happened, however, the wound was not serious and the sheriff had to make only one visit to a doctor.

Joe was arrested, of course, and charged with assault with intent to murder. He was convicted of that charge. But when the case was appealed the high-

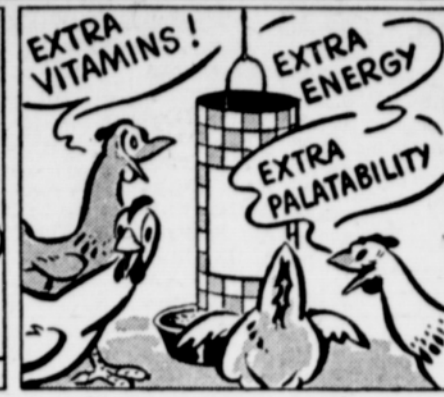

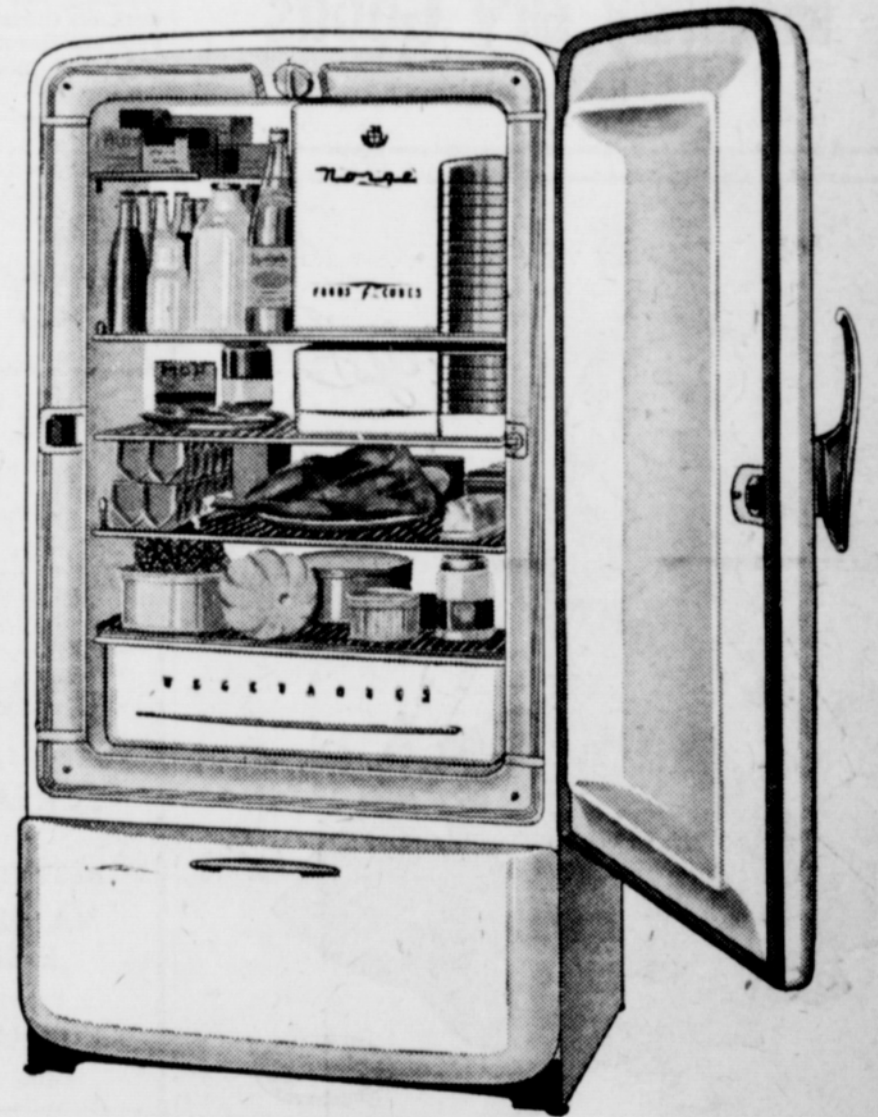
