# Robber hit by Pepsi leaves money behind

A robbery attempt at Lowe's Grocery Friday August 24 was foiled by a couple of bottles of Pepsi. The bumbling bandit confronted assistant manager Pat Upton and two female employees as they were leaving the store about 10 p.m.

The trio was exiting a side office door after closing the store when a male suspect with a bandana over the lower part of his face pushed the two females back into the office after spraying them

with pepper spray. Upton was behind the two ladies and the suspect hit him in the face with pepper spray also. Upton retreated back out into the store area where the robber demanded "all the money in the vault."

"I raised my hands and said okay," Upton said. "But he turned back into the office where the two girls were trying to get out the door." The suspect attempted to grab one of the girls as she was trying to get the door

open. "When he grabbed her I hit him in the back pretty hard with the Pepsi," Upton said. He had earlier purchased two bottles of Pepsi to take home and had them in a sack.

After Upton threw the soft drinks he grabbed the young man around the chest from behind but the suspect managed to spray him again in the face with the pepper spray. When Upton let go the robber ran out the door at that point empty handed.

He is said to have fled in a vehicle that was parked in the alley behind the store but none of the Lowe's employees were able to provide a description of the vehicle.

Friona police are continuing the investigation. Chief Salinas says they have evidence they feel will result in an arrest soon but no arrests had been made at our press time. If you have information that could help solve the case contact the Friona PD at 250-2711.

# Chiefs on safari to Antelope country

The 2007 version of the Friona Chieftains will open the season Friday August 31 as they travel to Abernathy for a rematch with the Antelopes. Last year Friona won 12-7. The Chieftains had a 9-2 record last year and swept district undefeated before losing to Canadian in the area round.

Bob Ferguson starts his sixth season as Chieftain head coach Friday. The Chiefs have been district champs two years in a row and look to threepeat. The Chiefs return 15

lettermen, four starters each on offense and defense. The returning starters are DB Ritchie Casas, TE Chris Haile, OL Trent Hudson, QB Sawyer Reed, DB Alonzo Rojas, LB Dillon Welch, OL Alex Dunnam, and LB Joey Mendoza.

Both Rojas and Welch are expected to also play at running back this season. Ryan Schwab and Casas will be the top go-to receivers for the talented arm of senior QB Sawyer Reed, last year's District

2-2A Offensive MVP.

Coach Ferguson told the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal the team is strong on offense this year but the only question will be at running back. Welch injured an ankle during the Levelland scrimmage but is expected to play. Rojas is excited about his try at running back after two good seasons as a defensive back. Coaches say he sees the field well and has good speed. Only game experience will tell. The Lubbock newspaper's special

edition picked Muleshoe to win district and Friona as second place and Tulia third.

Friona's defense had six shutouts last year and held opponents to 74 points in regular season (42 of those given up to Littlefield).

Ferguson told the AJ, "I don't think we are going to be as strong defensively. It's going to have to be a true team effort."

"Until somebody knocks us off," he said, "we're going to call ourselves district champions."

## straight from the cow

Milk with cream on top. The "Got Milk" campaign has made milk a popular drink. Our school lunch menus include 'ice cold milk'. We can get it in several varieties: whole, 1%, 2%, skim, or soy. (Not sure what animal soy milk comes from). There is goat milk, yak milk, and coconut milk. Let's not forget chocolate.

Patricia Gardner, Hereford Brand agriculture writer, had a story this week about a dairy near Hereford that has started selling raw milk. It is not pasteurized or homogenized so the cream rises to the top "just like in the old days" she wrote.

Adam and Jennifer Jackanicz are retailing raw milk, complete with cream on top, through their business, Brown Cow Productions. They had to get permitted to dispense raw milk products. They told Gardner "Six Jersey milking cows and a ton of paperwork later" they are licensed by the Texas Department of Health to sell Grade A raw milk and are enjoying doing it.

In the mid-1950s at Barnard Grocery in Hillsboro it didn't take a ton of paperwork to

sell raw milk. The standard quart milk bottles with the round cardboard stopper were everyday items in Barnard's freezer case. Mr. Barnard bought the milk from a local farmer that also ran a small dairy. I doubt either one was too concerned about government health requirements.

The farmer brought the full milk bottles to the store and picked up the empties. I think customers paid a nickel deposit on the bottles. One of my jobs was to put the milk in the freezer case and help him carry the empties out to his truck. I never thought to ask how or whether he sterilized the empty bottles before refilling them. There were no "use by" dates on bottles in those days.

We learned to use the milk before it spoiled. You figured that out by smelling of it. My recollection is Barnard's Grocery always sold out of the milk quarts before spoiling became a problem.

I can't remember what a quart of the milk sold for. Maybe 25 or 50 cents. Saturdays were long days at Barnard's Grocery. We

worked from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. On Saturday morning I would buy myself a quart of the milk, put it in the meat freezer in the back of the store, and chug it on and off through the morning. You had to shake the bottle every time to mix the cream back in.

When the milk was gone we often rinsed out the bottle, filled it with water, and put that in the freezer to drink all afternoon. I think we sold Borden's milk in cartons too but the raw milk in the bottle was way better and more popular.

Raw milk was also used by families to churn butter. I have hazy memories of my grandparents churning butter in that wooden churn, working the paddle up and down until the milk turned to butter. It was real butter too, no comparison to the stuff we call butter today. We never thought of any of it as unsanitary. It is a wonder we have lived so long.

The pasteurizing process removes cream from milk. Raw milk with cream has a higher fat content which the Jackanicz of Hereford say many of their customers are

looking for. He says his milk is about 4-percent fat and can be purchased as whole or skim milk. Some of his customers buy just the cream.

Under the laws of his permit customers must come to the farm to buy the milk. Normal shelf life of the milk is 7-10 days when kept refrigerated. They are installing a 600-gallon storage tank to expand their supply. The milk is presently processed and bottled at milking but with the storage tank, which holds the milk at 30 degrees, they can bottle when they choose.

The Jackanicz told the Hereford Brand, "Folks can come to the dairy located one mile west of the Barn Church on County Road K between county roads 8 and 9 to see how milking is done and to purchase the raw milk. Visitors should call ahead before they come. The number is 806-289-5796.

If you go visit and the milk is in a glass quart bottle with that round cardboard stopper on top, bring me back a quart. I'll pay you double for it and promise this.

I won't let it spoil.

## Neugebauer asks Ag secretary to okay disaster relief

Congressman Randy Neugebauer spoke with Secretary of Agriculture Mike Johanns regarding the importance of getting long overdue agriculture disaster relief payments into the hands of farmers and ranchers. Over the past few weeks, Congressman Neugebauer has held meetings across the 19th District to discuss important agriculture issues.

"Throughout my meetings across the 19th District, one thing was made clear by agriculture producers: they need the disaster relief they have been promised. I have been stressing the importance of

federal assistance for two years now," Neugebauer stated. "I assured the people of the 19th District that I would contact the Department of Agriculture on their behalf and work to initiate disaster assistance as soon as possible. Congress and the President approved this relief three months ago, but the federal support has yet to be delivered. Much of this money addresses disasters that occurred back in 2005 and is desperately needed to assist those producers who were hit hardest.

"In my conversation with Secretary Johanns, I encour-

aged him to employ this relief sooner rather than later. The Secretary was very receptive to my concerns, the needs of the people of the 19th District, as well as the importance of this assistance to all agriculture producers across the nation," said Neugebauer.

Secretary Johanns also conveyed to Neugebauer that federal assistance for disaster relief would start next month with signups for livestock beginning in September and crop relief in Octo-

ber. Payments will be made the following month.

"I remain skeptical regarding the Administration's approach to deliver the federal assistance needed and the status of the current 2007 Farm Bill. While my conversation yesterday with Secretary Johanns was very positive, I will continue to follow through to ensure the relief money is delivered and the priorities and needs of the agriculture producers of the 19th District are met," Neugebauer concluded.

#### beef, catfish, vouchers, prayer...!

Think on these things.

In Lubbock a Mexican company called Macsa is building a 23,000 square foot building to process 12 million pounds of white corn into flour. They plan to sell the flour to tortilla producers across the Southwest. The story didn't say where tortilla producers get their flour now or why it is okay for a Mexican Company to come to the U.S. and not okay for Mexican people to come to the U.S.

Some folks make a living promoting catfish. The Catfish Institute, located in Mississippi, teamed up with Tabasco on a tour to promote U.S. Farm-Raised Catfish. They say there are problems with imported catfish and to be safe, look for catfish labeled US Farm Raised. If chewing on China products will make us sick, we sure don't want to fry any foreign catfish.

After much research the Texas Beef Council says it will release four new cuts of beef in 2008. Haven't we cut beef in every way possible? Apparently, not. The four new cuts from the chuck roll include tender steaks for grilling, an affordable roast for dry roasting, boneless country style ribs, and a fully cooked roast. TBC research also says steer meat is more tender than heifer meat. Enough said about that.

The Equity Center advocates school finance equity and adequacy in Texas. In the August newsletter they say "the only effective and efficient solution to a failing public school campus is to fix that campus." The subject was vouchers, which would allow students in bad schools to attend private schools using public school money. They say vouchers would make a bad situation worse. They did not, however, explain how they would "fix that campus".

Some kids will not improve in any situation. Having said that, we think parents should be able to decide what is or isn't best for their kids. Problem is parents need to maintain realistic expectations of their child's abilities.

Finally, a meatpacking plant in Nebraska is being pressured by Somali Muslim workers to provide prayer times during work. Earlier this year 120 workers at the Swift & Co. Grand Island plant quit because they weren't allowed to pray at sunset. Now the plant is said to be "tweaking" their break times to accommodate the workers prayer demands.

If we were Swift & Co. we would demand to know exactly what it is the Somali Muslim workers plan to pray for. To the ones that quit, how do you say "so long" in Somali talk?

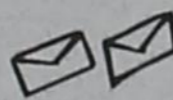

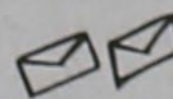

## Troopers say "Drink. Drive. Go to Jail."

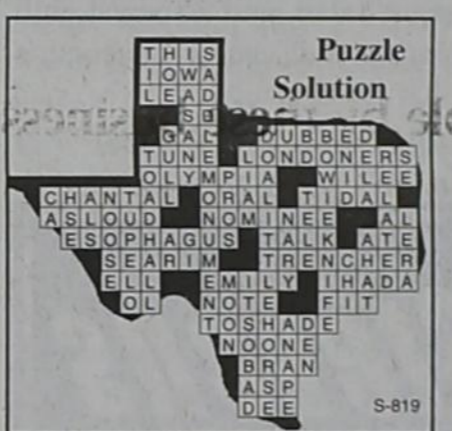
Texans planning to celebrate the last three-day weekend of the summer should know that the Texas Highway Patrol will be out in force looking for people who are driving while intoxicated. During the Labor Day weekend, (August 31 to September 3), all available state troopers will be out on Texas roadways in support of the "Drink. Drive. Go to Jail." program. "We are serious about enforcing this law," said Col. Thomas A. Davis, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety. "Too many innocent people are killed every year in this state when drivers choose to consume alcohol and then operate a motor vehicle. We intend to do our part to find those intoxicated drivers and get them off the road." It is illegal in Texas to operate a motor vehicle with a breath alcohol content of 0.08 or above. During the Labor Day weekend in 2006, DPS troopers arrested 887 people across the state for driving while intoxicated. The punishment for a DWI conviction: First offense: Fine not to exceed \$2,000 and/or a jail term of 72 hours to 180 days; participation in an alcohol education and treatment program even if probation is granted; license suspension from three months to one year. Second offense: Fine of up to \$4,000 and/or a jail term of 30 days to one year; mandatory 72 hours in jail even if probation is granted; license suspension from six months to two years. Third offense: Fine not to exceed \$10,000; prison term of two years to ten years; mandatory jail term of ten days even if probation is granted; license suspension from six months to two years. Intoxication manslaughter: Fine up to \$10,000; prison term for two to 20 years; license suspension from six months to two years. DPS also is a participant in Operation CARE—Combined Accident Reduction Effort—a nationwide effort by police agencies to reduce fatalities on major interstate highways during holiday weekends. In addition to intoxicated drivers, troopers will be looking for speeders and those who are not wearing seatbelts as required by law.

## How 'bout some chilly soup

It is hard enough sometimes to get your family to eat vegetable soup much less cold vegetable soup.

There was an article in the Lubbock newspaper recently about gazpacho. It is a chilled soup made with vegetables. Supposedly it is of Spanish origin. During my travel agent career I had occasion to eat gazpacho at a few fine restaurants and on several cruise ships.

During my 12-years as a Panhandle resident I haven't seen gazpacho on any menus. Maybe cold soup is not a country thing but gazpacho is a nice, classy soup, usually served before the meal. You'll either like it or you won't. The secret is to serve it chilled. The Lubbock newspaper published this recipe. I'm passing it on to liven up your next big family meal.

### Gazpacho

Start to finish: 1 hour 15 minutes (15 minutes active). Serves 8.  
8 large tomatoes, peeled, seeded and finely chopped (about 5 cups)

3 cloves of garlic, minced  
2 yellow bell peppers, seeded and coarsely chopped  
1 large Vidalia onion, diced  
1 large cucumber, peeled, seeded and coarsely chopped (about one cup)

2 jalapeno peppers, seeded and minced  
3 tablespoons sherry wine vinegar  
Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste  
Cayenne pepper, to taste (optional)  
1 cup croutons  
Extra-virgin olive oil

1. In a large mixing bowl combine the tomatoes and garlic. Set aside.

2. In a food processor combine the bell peppers, onion, and cucumber. Pulse until finely chopped, then transfer to the bowl with the tomatoes. Add the jalapenos and mix well. Add the vinegar, mix again, then season with salt, pepper and cayenne.

3. Return about 1/3 of the mixture to the food processor and process until smooth. Return to the rest of the soup and mix.

4. Cover and chill for at least an hour. Adjust the salt and pepper, as needed. To serve, ladle soup into individual serving bowls, then top with croutons mounded in the center. Drizzle each serving with about 1 tablespoon olive oil.

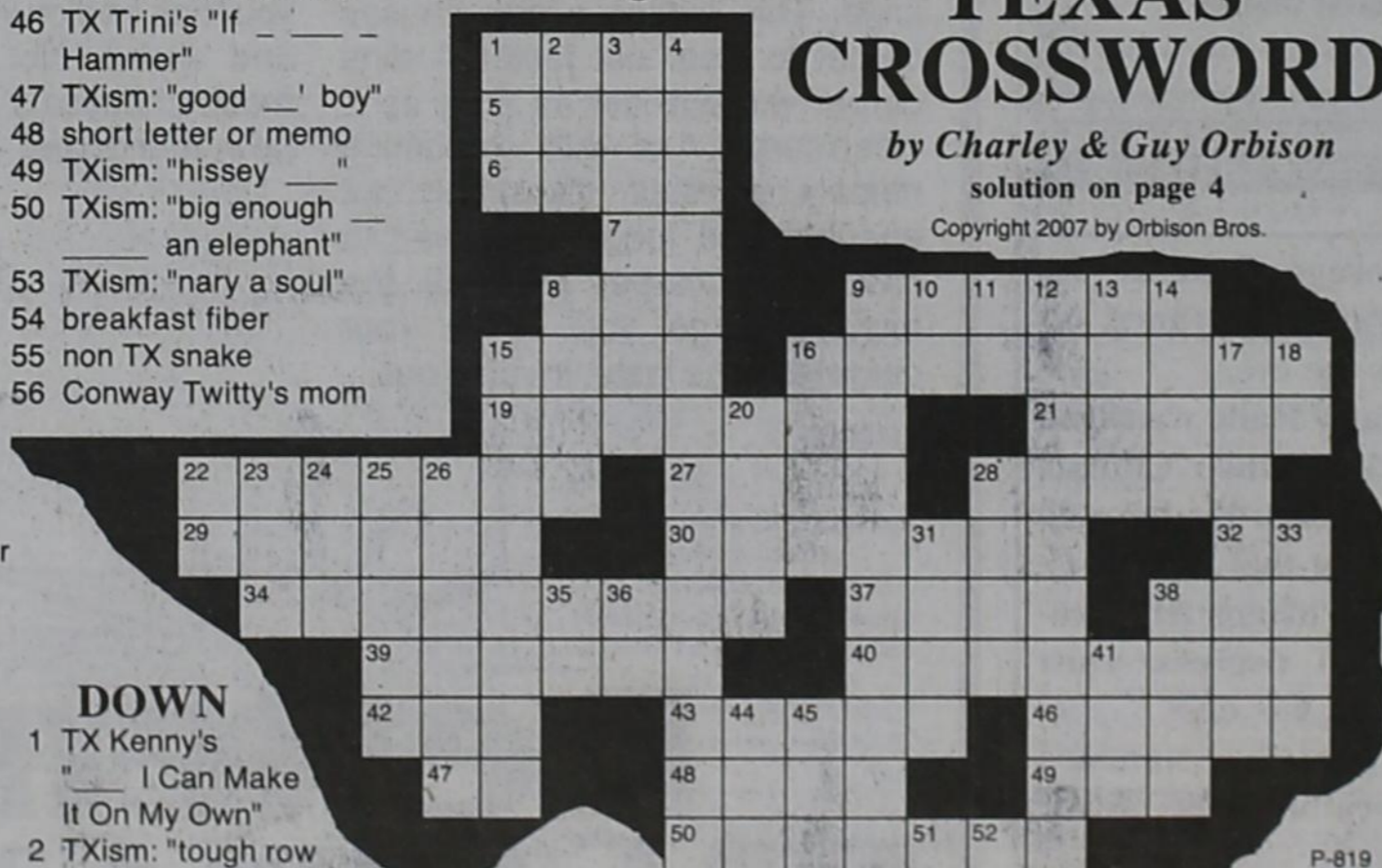
