The Friona city council has passed an ordinance requiring itinerant vendors, peddlers, and solicitors to purchase a license to do business.

The ordinance, No. 2007.10.16, becomes effective November 1 and applies to door-to-door salesmen and vendors setting up on vacant lots, street corners, etc.

Applications for the license will be available at the Friona Police department. Official legal notice of the new ordinance is published in this week's Friona Star.

Sweet & Sour Winter Veggies

1 cup raw turnips, diced

1 cup raw parsnips, diced

1 cup raw sweet potato, diced 1 cup raw carrots, diced

2 Tbs. extra-virgin olive oil 3 Tbs. chopped fresh rosemary

Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

2 Tbs. maple syrup 2 Tbs. balsamic vinegar

¼ cup 99% fat-free chicken or vegetable broth

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

Toss vegetables with oil, rosemary, salt and pepper, then spread on shallow baking pan. Bake 40 minutes or until tender, stirring once or twice.

Meanwhile combine syrup, vinegar, and broth in a small saucepan. Simmer vigorously until reduced, about 5 minutes. Drizzle over vegetables in oven and bake 5 minues.

Remove and put in a bowl, stir and serve. Serves 4.

Lemon Pudding Cake

3 tablespoons butter, room temperature

1 cup sugar

4 eggs, room temperature ½ cup fresh lemon juice

¼ teaspoon salt

3 tablespoons all-purpose flour

1 cup milk Fresh raspberries

1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Lightly grease a 9-by-5-

inch loaf pan or a 6-cup souffle dish.

2. Beat butter and sugar until fluffy. Separate eggs yolks and whites. Add yolks to butter mixture and beat well. Add lemon juice, salt and flour; beat well. Add milk; stir until

well blended. 3. Beat egg whites until stiff. Gently fold into lemon mixture. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake 50 minutes, covering with foil during the last 10 minutes if the top gets too brown. Serve warm or chilled with raspberries. Serves 6.

Nov. 6 is time to mess with Texas.....!

Sixteen amendments to the state constitution (propositions) are on the ballot for a November 6 vote. Most of you probably won't bother.

This is another batch to add to the 1,000 or so amendments already stuck on the Texas Constitution. These 16 include adding Angelo State University to the Texas Tech system, allows severely disabled veterans a 100% exemption from property tax, sets a 10% cap on homeowners' property appraisals, and authorizes the state to borrow up to \$1 billion for various projects.

All together the 16 propositions give the state about \$10 billion in extra cash to repair roads, maintain parks, cancer research, etc. Proposition 15 would okay the state to borrow and spend \$300 million per year for ten years (\$3 billion) for cancer research and prevention.

Experts say the total would be closer to \$4.6 billion including the interest on borrowing. Cancer is an emotional topic. Of course everybody wants to find a cure, Mention money for cancer research and everyone does a big shout

But is it the state of Texas' business to borrow money and pay interest with your tax money to invest in cancer research. We say no. There is no language in the proposition to assure where the money is spent, what type of cancer is

being researched, and who has control of the money. There are already national cancer research programs. The congress should relax experimental drug rules and allow the FDA to bring new drugs to market sooner and at significantly less expense. When politicians, including Gov. Perry and his minion midgets, get their mitts on truckloads of money the results are often not in your favor.

The Amarillo Globe-News editors suggest voters vote "yes" on all 16 propositions. We suggest you vote "no" on Proposition 15. We predict that about 10% of eligible Parmer County voters will actually go vote November 6.

That is a shame. This is the Republic of Texas. Be a true Texan. Go vote or else don't complain about higher taxes and bumpy roads.
