Holiday Ham and Tortilla Tree


Ingredients:

- Approx. 1 lb. of leftover Cook's Bone-In Ham 6 ozs cream cheese whipped
- 1 cup (4 ozs) sliced sharp Cheddar cheese

½ cup red bell pepper, sliced into thin strips 6 (6 inch) spinach flour tortillas (maked small tree).


