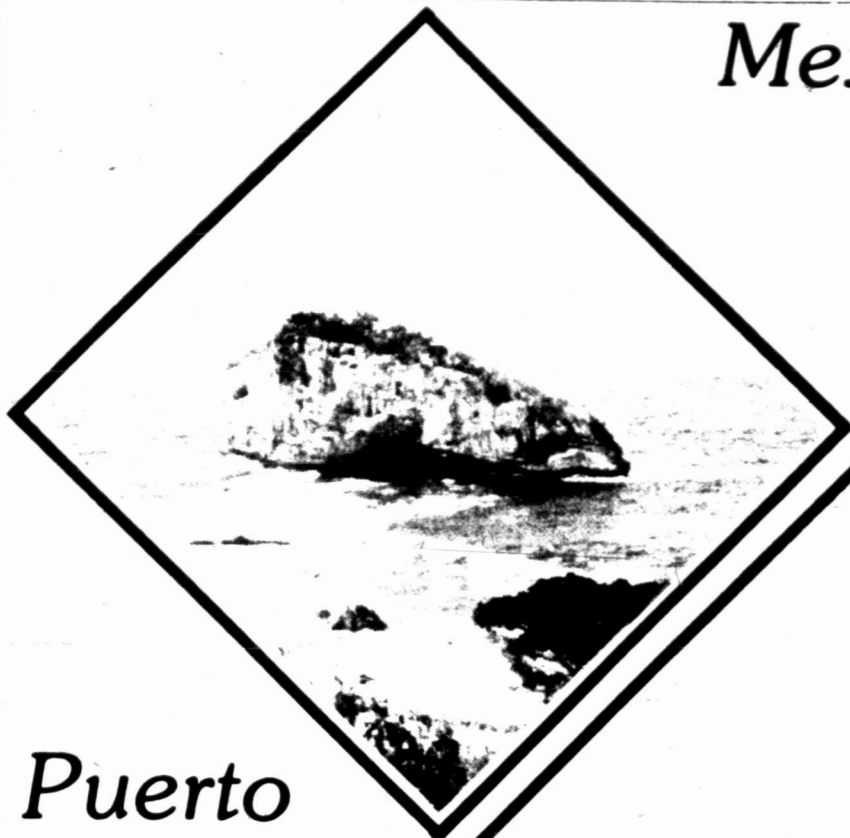
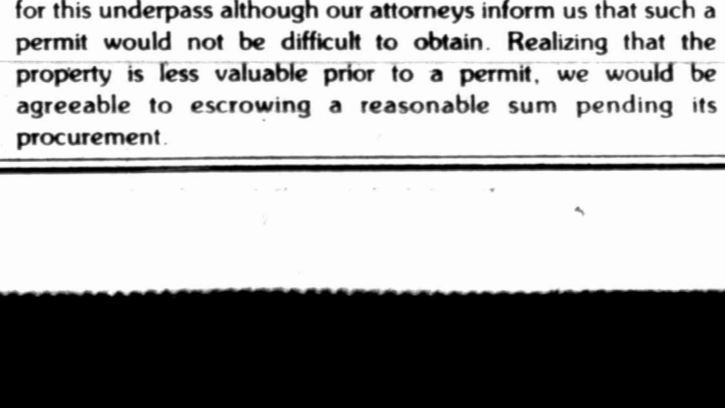
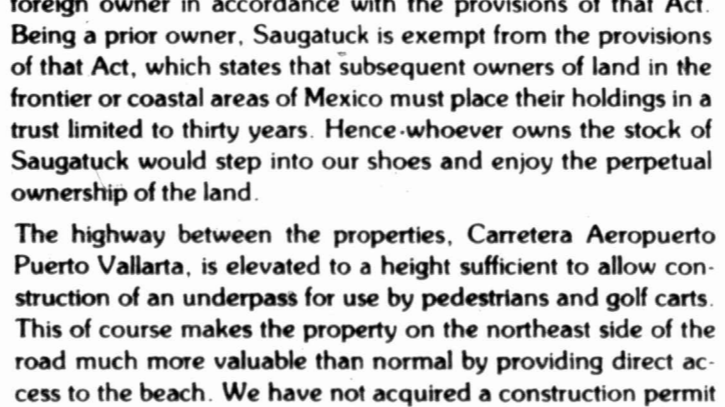
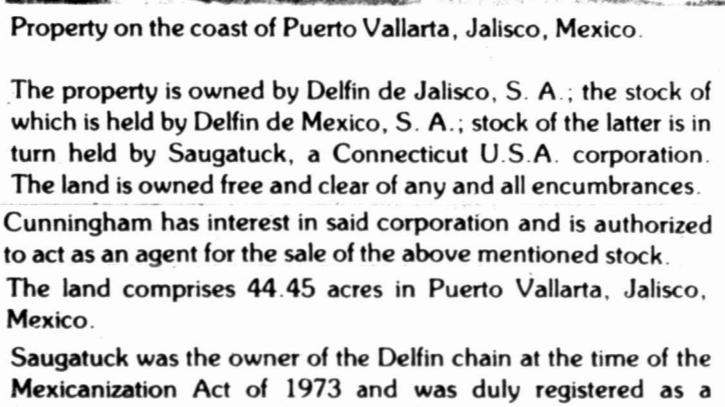


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Puerto Vallarta

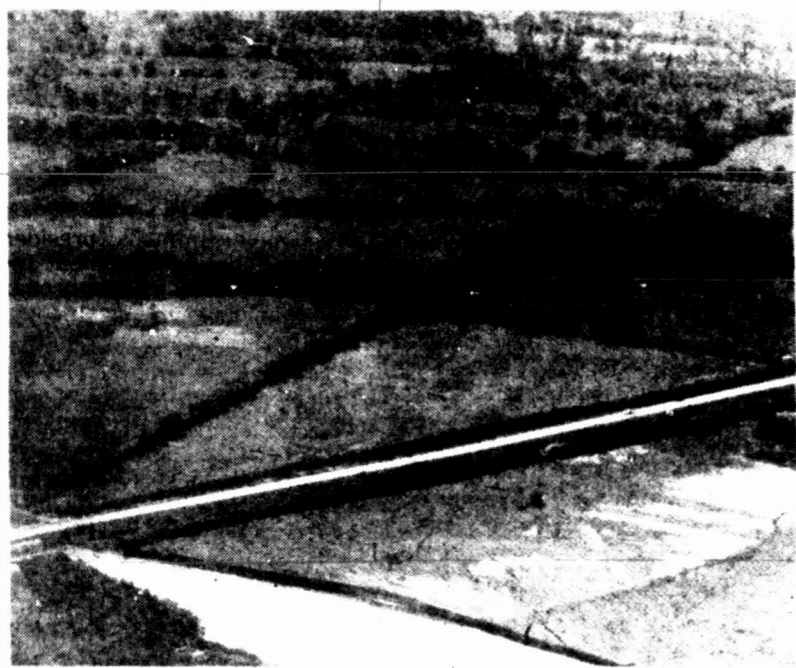

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Without Spud and 'Nique, Air looks clear

Jordan looks like a cinch

AP Sports Writer SEATTLE (AP) — There's no Spud Webb, no Dominique Wilkins, so it's Air Jordan against the world Saturday as the NBA puts on its annual flying show, also known as its slam-dunk contest.

Air, who under the name Michael Jordan leads the NBA in scoring with a 37-point per game average, has never won the slam dunk contest — he was runner-up to Wilkins two years ago, then missed Webb's victory last year when he was sidelined with a broken foot.

But he became the man to beat this week when Wilkins withdrew, complaining of soreness that won't keep him from being a starting forward for the East in the All-Star game Sunday but will prevent him from soaring and twisting in Saturday's contest at the Kingdome. Webb, Wilkins' 5-foot-6 Atlanta teammate, is sidelined with a knee injury.

"There aren't many players, maybe Dominique, who can think of doing some of the things he does," Atlanta general manager Stan Kasten says of Jordan. "That's the spontaneity. He has genius like an artist has genius."

Wilkins' defection left brother Gerald, who plays for the New York Knicks, as both the defender of the family honor and the principal threat to Jordan. Gerald made it to the semifinals last year.

"The contest is a lot of fun," Gerald says. "I want to come out strong and get established with the crowd and win them over. You have to do that to get into the second round."

In last year's contest, Gerald dunked over a man sitting in a chair. This season, in the interest of safety, the NBA has ruled that props are out.

Instead, players may use more than one ball in a dunk attempt.

"They took the chairs away from me but I have some other ideas that are creative," Gerald says. "I'll be throwing the ball in the air the way Spud Webb did last year."

Another contender figures to be Terence Stansbury of the Seattle SuperSonics, who made it to the

semifinals the past two years as a member of the Indianapolis Pacers.

The other Slam-Dunk competitors are Johnny Dawkins of the San Antonio Spurs, Ron Harper of the Cleveland Cavaliers, Tom Chambers of the Sonics, and Clyde Drexler and Jerome Kersey of the Portland Trail Blazers.

Also scheduled Saturday at the Seattle Coliseum, home of the Sonics, are the NBA's three-point shootout and an old-timers' game.

Larry Bird of the Boston Celtics is favored to win his second straight three-point title against a field that includes Craig Hodges of the Milwaukee Bucks. Hodges lost in last year's finals to Bird.

Also entered in the three-point event are Michael Cooper and Byron Scott of the Los Angeles Lakers, Dale Ellis of the Sonics, Detlef Schrempf of the Dallas Mavericks, Danny Ainge of the Boston Celtics and Kiki Vandeweghe of the Trail Blazers.

In Sunday's All-Star game, the West starters will be Akeem Olajuwon of the Houston Rockets at center, Chambers and James Worthy of the Lakers at forwards and, Magic Johnson of the Lakers and Alvin Robertson of the Spurs at guards.

Starting for the East will be Dominique Wilkins and Bird at forwards, Moses Malone of the Washington Bullets at center, and Jordan and Julius Erving of the Philadelphia 76ers at guards.

The other West All-Stars are Kareem Abdul-Jabbar of the Lakers, Mark Aguirre and Rolando Blackman of the Dallas Mavericks, Eric Floyd and Joe Barry Carroll of the Golden State Warriors, Walter Davis of the Phoenix Suns and Alex English of the Denver Nuggets.

Also on the East All-Stars are Charles Barkley and Maurice Cheeks of Philadelphia, Bill Laimbeer and Isiah Thomas of the Detroit Pistons, Robert Parish and Kevin McHale of Boston, and Jeff Malone of Washington.

K.C. Jones of Boston is the East's coach while Pat Riley of the Lakers will coach the West.

Landry says no to hiring defensive coordinator

IRVING (AP) — Dallas Cowboys Coach Tom Landry, who tries to keep his options open these days, says the search for a defensive coordinator has stopped, but he is still considering hiring someone to work with the receivers.

Landry said Thursday he is not sure he will add anyone to his staff for 1987 other than offensive line coach Jim Erkenbeck, who replaced the retired Jim Myers.

"I'm not sure yet what we're going to do," he said. "Our major thing was to replace Jim Myers. We did that and I'm happy with that. Now, we're just going to think and review and see what we want to do."

Landry said he talked to several coaches about the benefits of hiring an assistant to work with receivers. But he has not interviewed anyone for the job.

Paul Hackett worked with the quarterbacks and receivers last season because he installed a new offensive system. A receivers coach would allow Hackett to spend more time with the quarterbacks.

"It's not imperative that we have a receivers coach," Landry said. "But it needs to be done fairly soon if we're going to do it because we're going into our offensive preparations."

He said the coaching staff will spend the rest of the month evaluating the team's offense and making decisions about players.

Landry said once the staff finishes its evaluation of the offense, he will turn his attention to the defense. Wade Phillips, defensive coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles, was in Dallas two weeks ago to discuss a similar position with the Cowboys.

But he returned home and with a few from consideration, officials said.

Landry said Dallas no longer plans to add a defensive coach.

"Not at this point," said Landry. "I'm going to do a lot of work on defense this year, much more than I ever have before."

Commodores stun giant killing Irish

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Reserve center Randy Neff hit three free throws in the final 15 seconds Friday night to lift Vanderbilt to a 60-56 non-conference basketball victory over Notre Dame.

Neff's free throws blunted a final-minute Irish comeback that had seen Notre Dame trim a 57-50 Vanderbilt lead to 57-56 with 16 seconds to play.

Notre Dame, now 13-6 for the year, had an opportunity to tie the contest at the 16-second mark, but forward Donald Royal failed to convert a free throw play after pulling the Irish within one point on a follow shot.

Neff put Vandy up 58-56 with 15 seconds remaining by hitting the front end of a one-and-one opportunity, then followed a Notre Dame turnover with two free throws with three seconds left.

Vanderbilt, 14-9, snapped a four-game Notre Dame win streak that included a 60-58 victory over then-top-ranked North Carolina last Sunday.

The Commodores took the lead for good at 26-23 on a three-point shot by guard Scott Draud with 17:24 remaining in the game.

Vanderbilt went on to lead by nine points on two occasions, the last at 40-31 on two free throws by Barry Goheen with 10:34 to play.

Notre Dame pulled within two points twice, the last at 51-49, before Vandy went on a 6-1 run for its 57-50 lead.

The Commodore victory spoiled a spectacular second-half effort by Notre Dame's Royal, who scored 17 of his 21 points in the final 20 minutes.

Royal was the only Irish player to hit double figures, while Vanderbilt had four players with 11 points or more.

Draud led Vandy with 14 points, while Goheen and center Will Perdue each had 13 points and Neff finished with 11.

St. Johns 65, Boston College 50 BOSTON (AP) — Senior Willie Glass scored 25 points and Mark Jackson added 23 as 19th-ranked St. John's rolled to a 65-50 Big East victory Friday night over Boston College.

Glass scored for 17 points in the second half, including 10 in the first nine minutes of the half as the Redmen opened a 46-32 lead with 8:49 remaining.

Boston College guard Jamie Benton hit a jump shot with 1:49 re-

maining to pull the Eagles to 57-46, but the Redmen shot 6-for-8 from the foul line down the stretch.

Junior Tyrone Scott led the Eagles with 12 points, while sophomore Dana Barros added 10.

Septien's future to be decided in March trial

DENTON (AP) — Dallas Cowboys kicker Rafael Septien will go to trial March 30 in this North Texas city on charges that he sexually assaulted a 10-year-old girl, it was determined in a hearing today.

Septien was about 10 minutes late for a morning hearing before State District Judge Sam Houston, who initially forfeited Septien's \$10,000 bond but changed the order when the 33-year-old football player appeared in court with his attorneys.

Septien will appear in State District Judge John Narsutis' court for trial, said Sandra Marsh, the criminal court coordinator.

The Cowboys' all-time leading scorer, Septien was indicted Jan. 22 by a Denton County grand jury for allegedly abusing the daughter of a friend.

Narsutis issued a gag order in the case Jan. 30 to prevent those associated with the case from speaking to reporters.

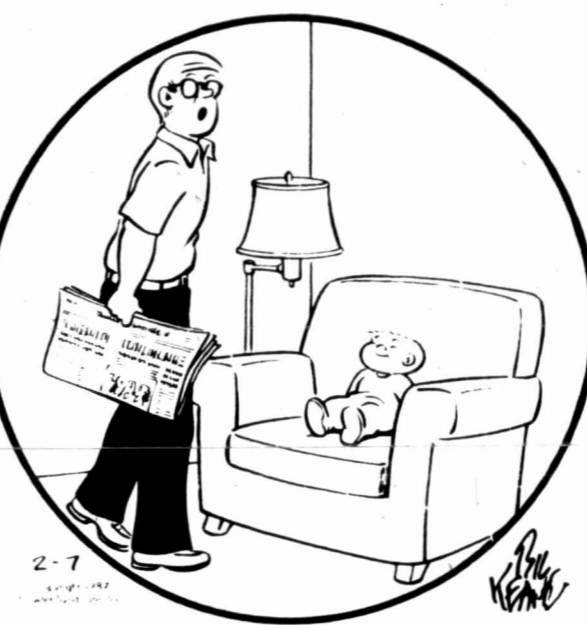

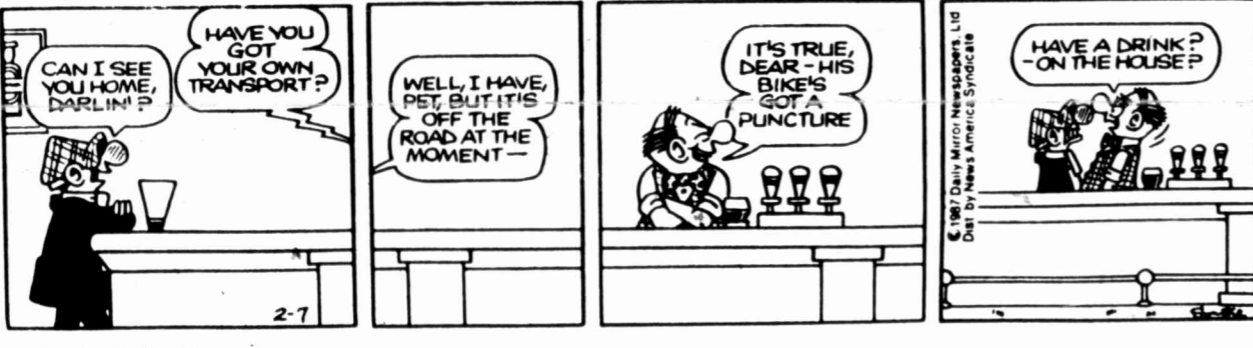
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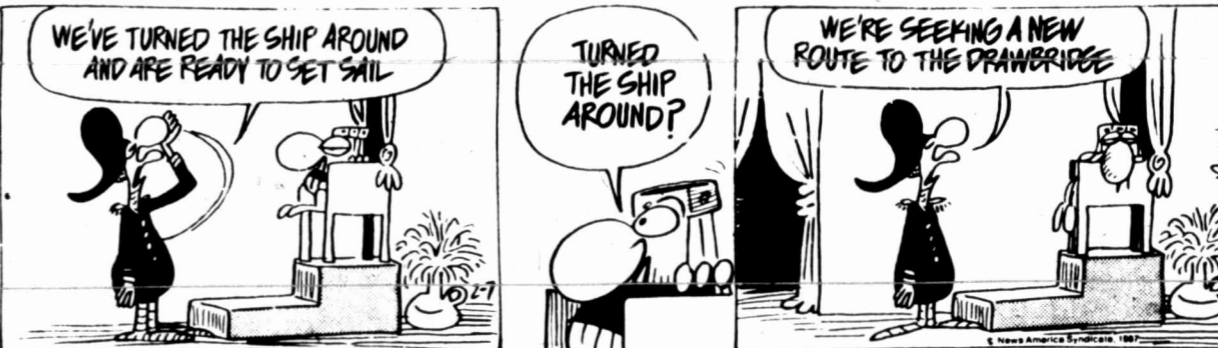
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
