Martin reunion with farm worker and family featured in LA Times

Clarence and Wynona Martin recently visited the home of Samuel Perez in Pacoima, California, where they were surprised by television cameras and staff from the Los Angeles Times. Mr. Perez was employed by the Martins here in Friona in the late 50s. He went on to a long career with GM and raised 11 children, all of whom now have college degrees. Mr. Perez credits the Martins for helping him become a citizen and be successful. It is a nice, warm story. We know you will enjoy

Samuel Perez never spent a single day on American soil as an illegal immigrant, thanks to Clarence Martin.

More than 50 years ago Perez entered this country as a teenager on a federal program that allowed him to work as a bracero, a field worker, at Martin's cotton farm in Texas.

In the narrative of the Perez family, Martin is a legend, in large part because of the opportunity the burly farmer with a Texas drawl gave the Mexican teen: In 1957 Martin told Perez he was going to get him





Sweet potatoes drizzled with lime

BY RON CARR

This recipe won in the 'sides' category in a recent nationwide sweet potato recipe contest. It was submitted by Candace McMenamin of Lexington, South Carolina.

In my vast cooking experience, which consists of reading the directions on a Swanson chicken pot pie box, I haven't come across drizzling with charred limes. Also you will need some rosemary sprigs (sounds like a girl I had a crush on once).

Sweet potatoes are versatile and healthy. Enjoy!

Rosemary-roasted Sweet Potatoes with Charred Lime Drizzle

Yield: 6 servings Prep time: 15 minutes Cook: 50 minutes

3 sweet potatoes (approx 1 ½ lbs) unpeeled

1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil 1 tbsp finely chopped fresh rosemary

2 cloves garlic minced

1/2 tsp ground coriander 1 tsp sea salt

1/8 tsp ground cayenne pepper

2 limes cut in half

Garnish: rosemary sprigs

Preheat oven to 375. Lightly spray two 15x12 inch rimmed

baking sheets with cooking spray; set aside. Cut sweet potatoes into spears by halving them lengthwise and placing flat side down on a cutting board. Halve again and cut each wedge lengthwise into 1/4-inch slices.

In a large bowl combine sweet potatoes, oil, rosemary, garlic, coriander, sea salt, and cayenne pepper. Toss to coat evenly. Place potatoes in a single layer on prepared baking sheets. Roast for 45 minutes until tender.

Spray a skillet with cooking spray. Place lime halves in skillet cut side down. Cook over high heat for 2 minutes or until just charred. Let cool to the touch.

Place roasted sweet potatoes in a serving dish and drizzle with charred limes. Garnish with rosemary sprigs (and tell her I said hello).

Coffee Memorial employees R. C. Quiett, donor recruiter, and Andy Tiner, community relations liaison, hosted a meeting in Friona Thursday, February 19, at Hardin's Steakhouse. Council members attending were Bessie Holt, John Gurley, Andy Montana, Teena Hughs, and Ron Carr.

The Amarillo blood center serves 30 counties and 32 medical facilities in the high plains region. The need for blood averages 135 units per day, 675 per week, or approximately 35,000 units per year. Mr. Tiner said, "There are not many new places to go in the region to expand the blood drive efforts. We need to draw more

Statistics from previous Friona blood drives show a drop in donations from a high of 34 units in 2006, to about 25 units per visit in 2008. The December 18, 2008, blood drive collected only 17 units. The blood center has scheduled four drives per year in Friona but plan to increase to five visits in 2009.

The next blood drive will be Tuesday, March 19, from 2-7 p.m. at the Calvary Baptist Church fellowship hall. Each donor will receive a t-shirt. Other drives are tentatively set for June 11, September 24, and December 3. An appointment is not required to donate blood. Additional details about each blood drive date will be published in the Friona Star as received. The minimum age for donating is 17.

The Self

BY REV. BUCK MALONE, Congregational Church

I wonder if this is true - it seems to be so as I get older: The nature of all people is selfish; no one loves another person more than they love himself or herself. To me, that seems a little strong, and I wonder if it's not true. The more I observe, the more I think it's true.

Even in those times when I give (when I offer help, or when I love), at the core is the feeling and the reality that I got something from those times. Don't get me wrong it's not bad to do things for others, even if it makes one feel good. But there is a flip-side, an almost sinister side. Doing things for others to avoid feeling bad. Doing things for others to not feel guilty. Doing things for others to appease or amend not being seen as less than expected. And doing things for others so that an old passive action of avoidance will some how magically be purified, made whole, and clean, simply by buttering-up the person next time. Sorry, I don't think that works too well.

My guess is that the number one way humans relate is in a selfish way. "What do I really get out of it?" is the question we all have at the base of most, if not all, thoughts and actions. Is this bad? No. It's normal. But sometimes it's insane.

The most insane thoughts I've had are those that revolve around thinking that I know what another person is thinking, what another person wants, and what another person needs. The big question is: What assumptions have I made, and how many were correct? My response for myself is, "Almost none have come true, and even worse none have ever come true in the way I thought!" Makes me want to pause when I assume.

I've noticed that reaction turns into over-reaction nearly every time I assume. As we get to Lent and on to Eastertide, may we become aware and drop those things that keep us from being selfless, those thoughts and actions we automatically assume are true, which turn out to do the most harm.

If it is chocolate that keeps you from being aware, then let it go, but I am more aware that it's not just chocolate that I need to "give up for Lent". Yes, there are tangible items to give up, but less tangible and more dangerous are a whole boatload of assumptions.

Recovery rebate credit

If you missed the economic stimulus payment, or you are eligible for a higher payment based on your 2008 income, you may be eligible for a recovery rebate credit when you file your 2008 return. If you have qualifying income, such as wages, social security benefits, or VA disability benefits of at least \$3,000, you may be eligible for the credit even if you aren't required to file a return.
