Wind towers on city council agenda

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Monday, June 8, at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers at 619 Main St.

Among items on the agenda will be consideration of an ordinance to adopt provisions relating to the development and installation of

wind towers inside the city limits. At this point no wind tower requests have been received for inside the city but the council will adopt regulations in anticipation of any requests.

Other items to be considered are a public hearing regarding the 2008 Drinking

Water Quality Report. The hearing will be open for public comments.

Also on the agenda is a third and final reading of a 5-year franchise agreement with Atmos Energy; approve changes to the City of Friona personnel policy; approve an agreement with Oller Engi-

neering for administration services for the East Booster Pump improvement project; and consideration on a loud music problem from resident Donna Baker.

The items noted are tentative until the official final agenda is posted on the window at city hall Friday,

June 5, as required 72 hours in advance. The council members are Mayor John Taylor, Jim Atwell, Martha Barker, Mark Osborn, Ronnie Stevick, and Charlie Pope. City manager is Patricia Phipps. All council meetings are open to the public.

Blood drive sets local record with 75 donations received

The Coffee Memorial Blood Center's blood drive last Thursday was a huge success. The Blood Center reports that 75 pints of blood were donated.

A steady stream of donors kept the technicians busy from the 2 p.m. start time

until after 9 p.m. The blood drive was dedicated in honor of Percy Parsons who suffers from a bone marrow disease requiring a minimum of two units of blood every other week. Donors at Thursday's drive signed a Tree of Life certificate, which

was presented to Mr. Parsons.

There were several potential donors that came to the drive but were unable to donate due to health and other issues. Mr. Parsons expressed thanks to everyone that donated and to those

who intended to donate but were turned down.

The 75 pints surpasses Friona's previous high of 54 donations according to local blood drive coordinator Bessie Holt. The Blood Center expressed thanks to all who participated and to Cal-

vary Baptist Church for the use of their fellowship hall.

"We thank Friona for their great turnout and for their patience as we processed a record number of donors throughout the afternoon and evening," a Blood Center spokesperson said.

TxDOT to conduct data collections

Throughout the month of June, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will conduct a data collection operation at 2,026 locations across the Lubbock District's 17-county service area, including Parmer County.

"The operation will collect traffic counts for various "on-system" roadways-maintained by the state-during a 24-hour period," said Stacey Young, TxDOT pavement engineer. Statewide, traffic count operations are conducted yearly for a variety of purposes other than determining average daily traffic on a roadway, Young added.

"This year, TxDOT is conducting a simple traffic count operation, but tube counters can range from those that only count cars to tubes that can detect vehicle type and weight," Young said. TxDOT uses the traffic count data to develop pavement design standards, follow traffic patterns and make other improvements to the Texas transportation system.

A highlight of this project was the "Got Milk" photos featuring the senior Chieftain football team and cheerleaders that were distributed to all Primary and Elementary children. Nutrition guidelines and featured recipes are on the Friona High School/Consumer Science web page.

Interpersonal Communication-Second Place: Amber Roberson and Jessie Jamerson made a DVD with tips for communicating with the hearing impaired. They showed it to the Personal and Family Development classes.

Chapter Service-Senior Division-Fourth Place: Brittny Herbert featured 100 years of

education in Friona for this Chapter Service project. She taught other students many significant events about Friona School history, including facts that Friona was the first school in Texas to have school buses and the first to integrate.

A highlight of her project was inviting former student and teacher, Mrs. Valoris Osborn, to speak to students about her school memories. Mrs. Osborn was instrumental in starting what became FCCLA in Friona. Brittny made videos and also a web page on the Friona School/Consumer Science site.

Chapter Service Display-Occupational Division-5th Place: Staci Fairweather, Melissa Gallego, and Monica Saenz, also Early Childhood Professions students, were concerned that some Primary children needed help with word rings and basic literacy skills. They combined a career education emphasis by going around Friona, featuring local businesses while using puppets to tell about colors, shapes, numbers, letters, and sounds. They edited the video into a DVD for each kindergarten student to have for use at home to learn and review these important concepts. Their project also included tips for learning on the Friona School/Consumer Science web site.

National Programs in Action-Occupational Division-Fifth Place: Natalia Posada, Monica Dominguez, and Lupita Vazquez, concerned about teen issues such as pregnancy, alco-

hol, drug abuse and suicide, began their project with research. After they discovered these problems stem from low self-esteem, they partnered with a research project that was done in Spain, Portugal, Italy, and Finland. They administered the same survey and discovered that Friona students scored the same on many questions indicating that teenagers around the world face many of the same concerns.

They used survey results to develop and present workshops and videos addressing low self-esteem and strategies for dealing with problems at school and at home. More information about their project is on the FHS web site.

Illustrated Talk-Sixth Place: Bianca Soto and Lacey Lookingbill taught other members and students about different ways of communication and the value of thinking about all of the messages being sent as you communicate at school, work, and at home with family members.

Their project included presentations with a self-test, information, and activities to practice verbal and nonverbal communication skills. Tips for better communication and warning signs for problems are included on their section of the FHS web page.

On the written leadership exams, Friona won 12 Gold medals and five Silver medals.

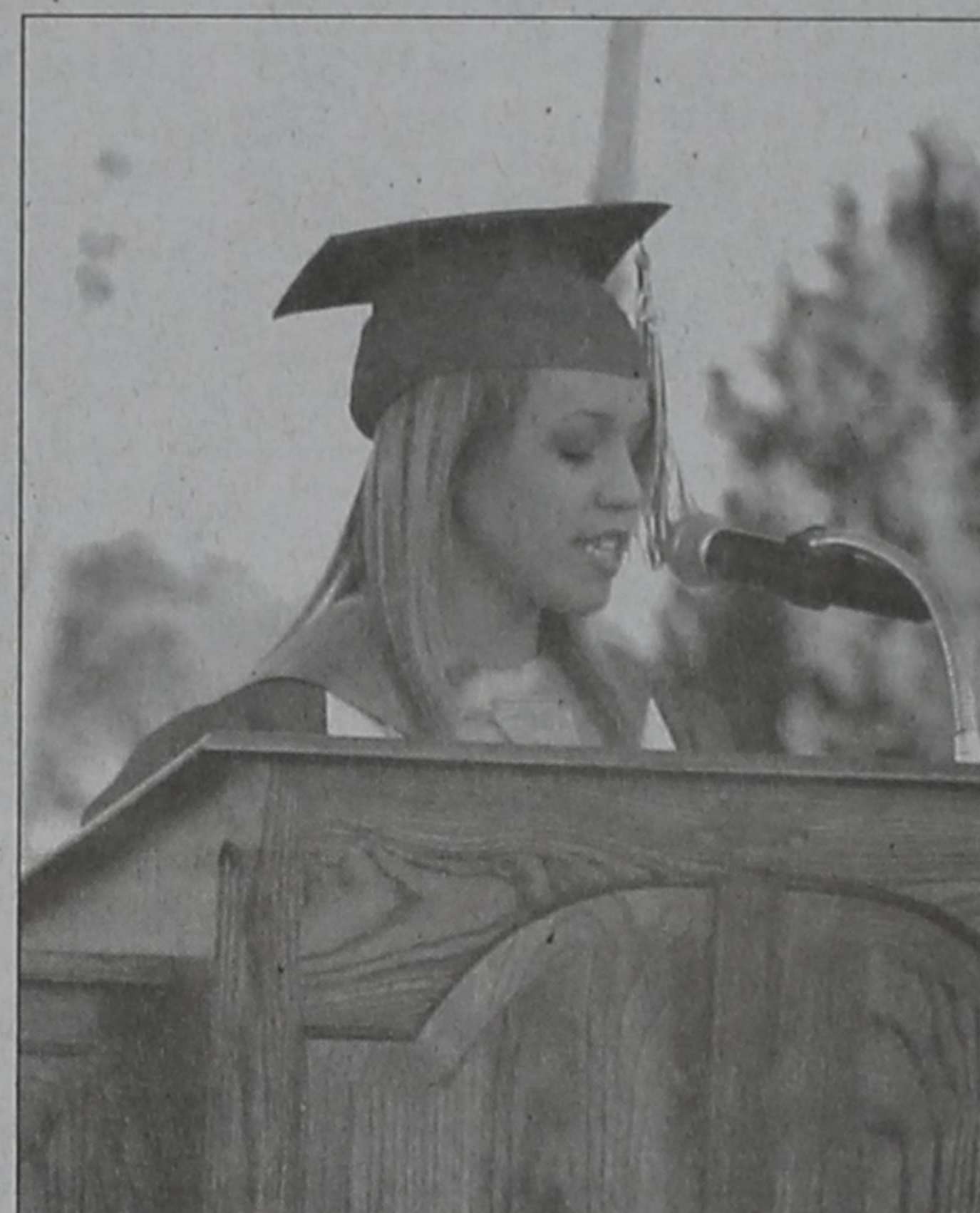

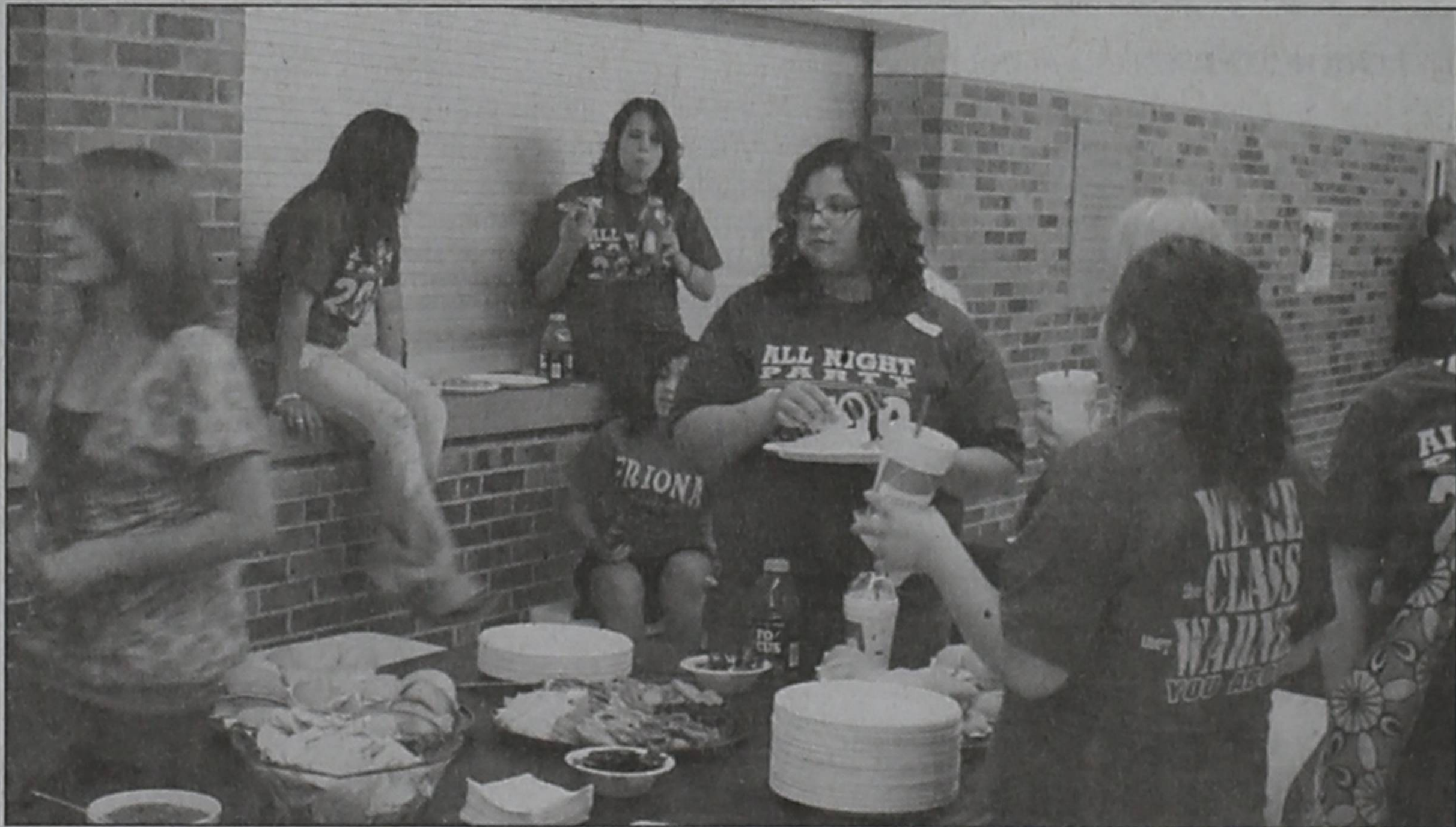

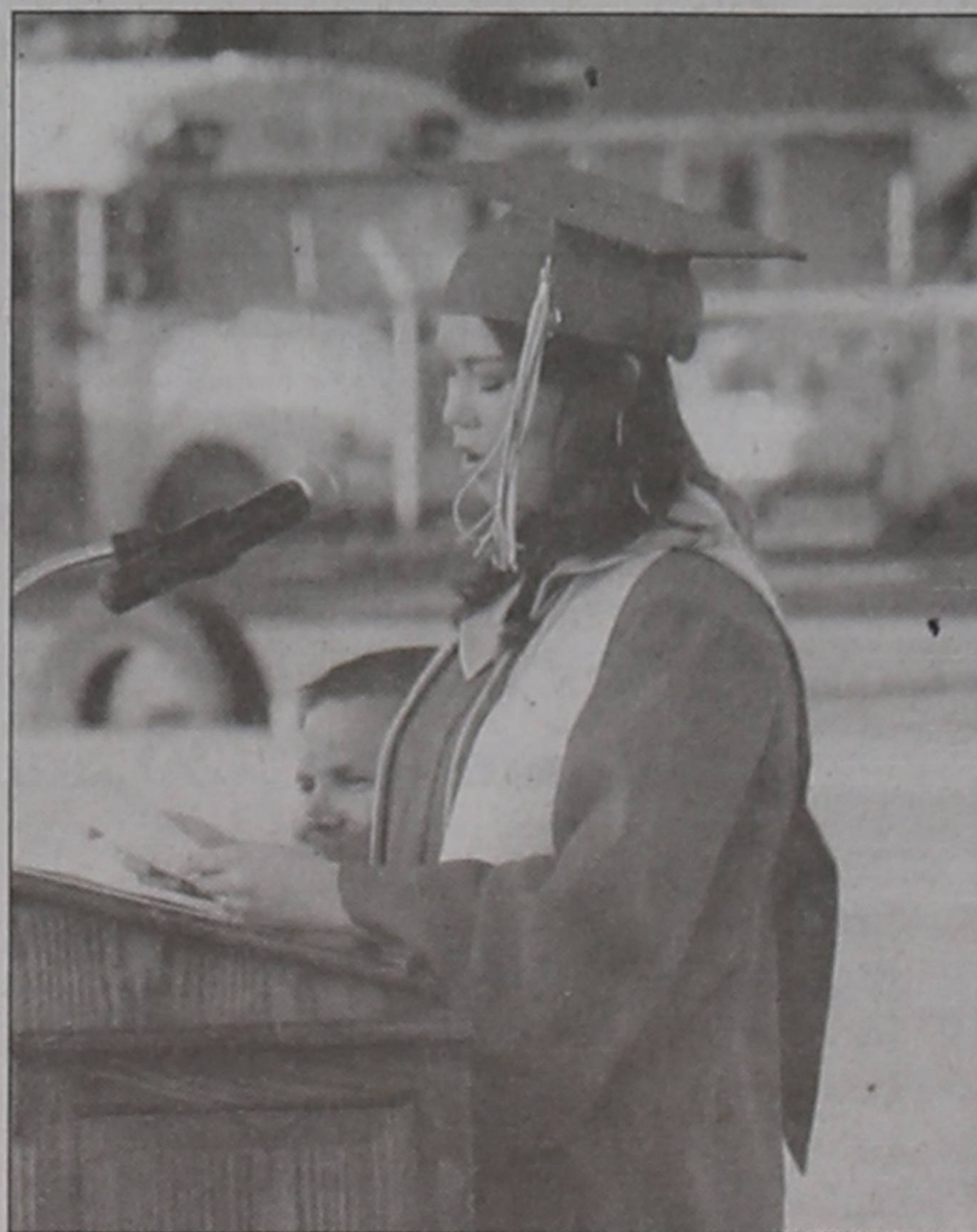

Co-Op Gin holds annual meeting

The Friona Farmer's Co-Op Gin annual meeting was held Tuesday June 2 at the junior high cafeteria. Board president Mitchell Wiseman presided. The meal of brisket, sausage, potato salad, beans, coleslaw and peach cobbler was catered by Mark and Deirdre Osborn.

Jimmy Rogers, CPA, of Rogers, Cross, Hanby, & Co. LLC in Plainview gave the financial report. The firm serves as auditor for the gin. He reported the gin produced 4,819 bales last year, a significant drop over previous years due to producers switching to corn.

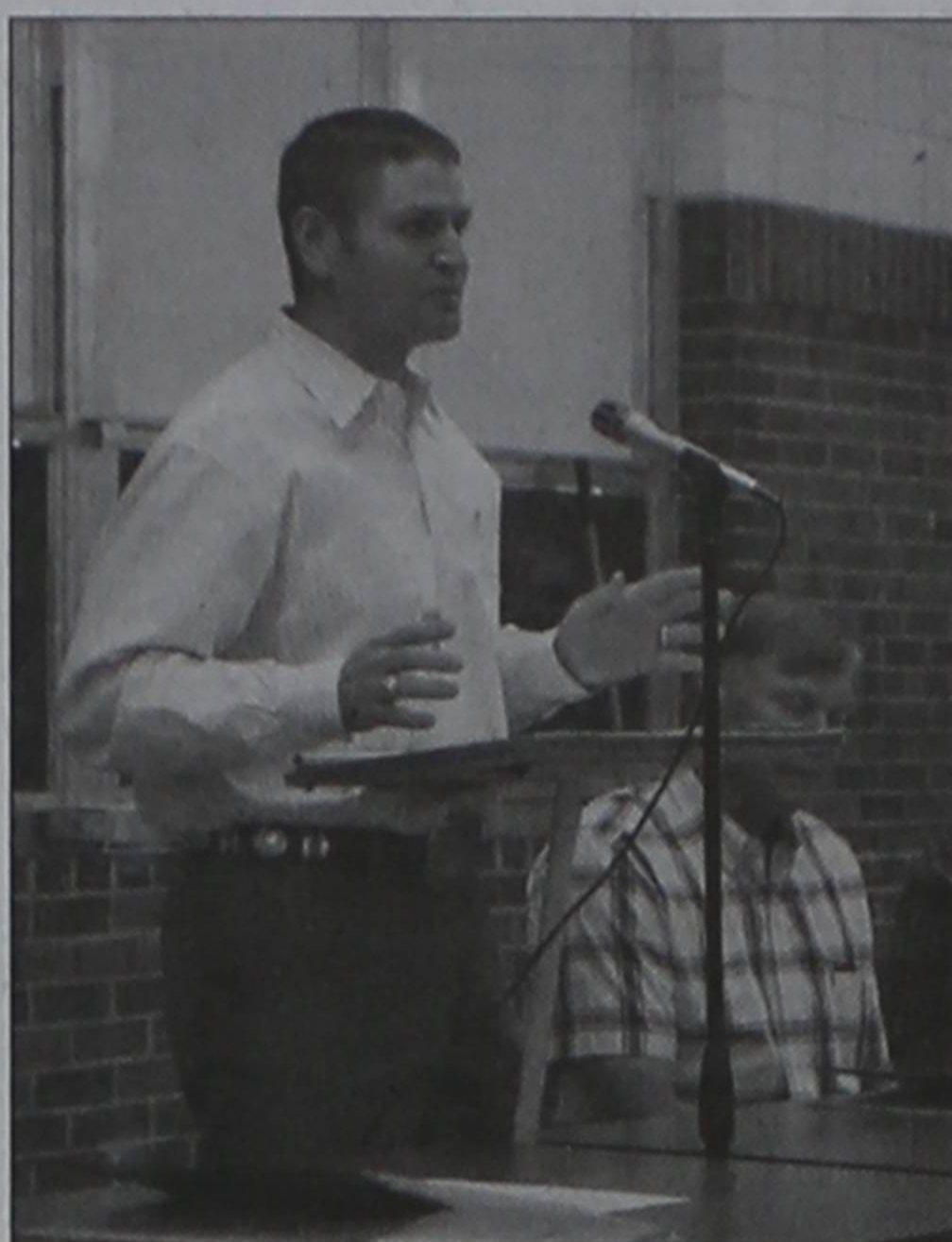
The gin did manage a \$60,000 profit for the March 31 fiscal year-end and Rogers said the gin has in excess of \$1 million in cash, more than any previous years. The board has been diligent, he said, in controlling cost and expense and the gin is in good shape.

An election of directors was held by acclamation to return Gene Welch and Raymond Hamilton to the board. The two were on the ballot unopposed. Gin manager Tony Newton, hired since last year's meeting, thanked the members for the reception and cooperation he and his wife Beth have received since moving to Friona.

At this point gin officials predict about 2,400 acres of cotton to be planted this year in the gin's market area. Newton said the gin should exceed last year's 4,819 bales this season. It was said last year's bale production was the lowest since 1991 when the gin

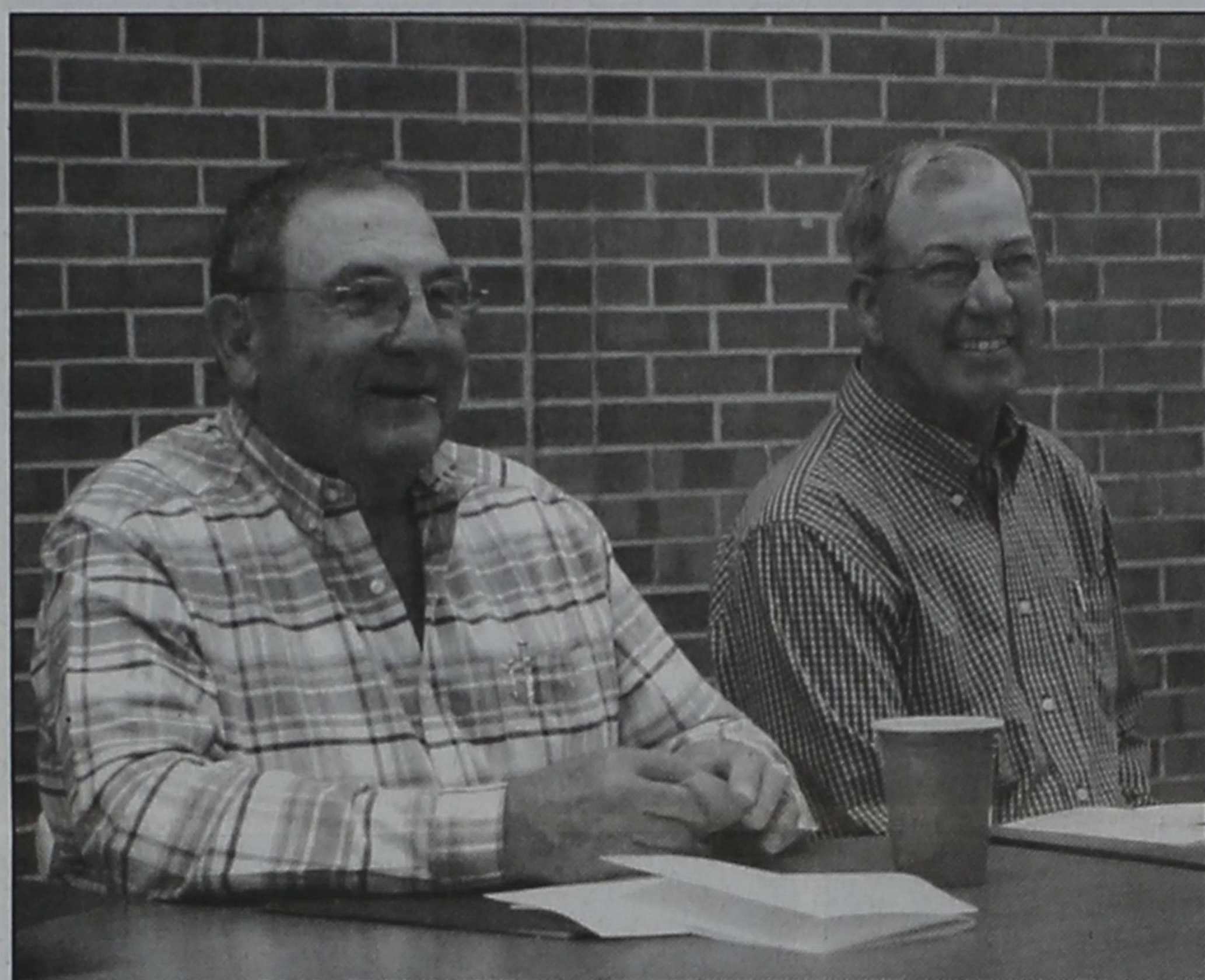
produced about 1,000 bales. Door prize drawings were held to conclude the evening.

Advice on lawn care

As the weather warms and some beneficial moisture has fallen across the county many begin to see annual weeds in their lawns. Weeds can be classified as annual or perennial.

Annual weeds germinate from seed each year; mature in one growing season and die in less than 12 months. Crabgrass and Kochia are examples of annual weeds - both being a summer annual. Pre-emerge herbicides must be applied according to the expected date of emergence for each targeted species.

Perennial weeds live more than one or two years and regrow from dormant stolons, rhizomes or tubers as well as from seed. Control of perennial weeds requires a post-emerge herbicide during its season of active growth.

Effective chemical weed control requires identification of the weed as to its classification. These classifications are whether they are grass, broadleaf, season of growth, or life span of the plant. Effective chemical control also requires accurate timing of applications, proper rate of application and uniformity of application. Always follow label directions for a product and observe all warnings and precautions relative to safety of the application.

Many of our annual grasses do not tolerate different compounds of chemicals. Before applying any chemical be sure to read and follow the label. Many of the products available contain dicamba or 2-4D or a combination of the chemicals. Make sure that these are compatible with the type or species of grass that you have or are going to spray. Following the label and the recommended rate will give you the best possible control from the chemical.

When using chemicals to control weeds also be mindful of shrubs and trees around the area that is being sprayed. Many of the chemicals used in weed control may also be harmful to bedding plants, trees, and shrubs.

Herbicide labels should be carefully reviewed for additional details on specific uses of each product. Product names are not intended as endorsement of the product of a specific manufacturer, nor is there any implication that other formulations containing the same active chemical are not equally as effective. Product names are included solely to aid readers in locating and identifying the herbicides suggested. Degree of control will depend upon herbicide rate, application timing, amount and timing of rainfall, soil type and infestation levels of the various weeds.
