1 1/2 cups sugar 1 cup butter, softened 1 egg 1 tsp vanilla extract 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour 1/3 cup cocoa powder 1/2 tsp baking soda 1/2 tsp salt 3 cups uncooked quick oats 6 ozs semisweet chocolate chips

1. Preheat-oven to 350. Lightly grease a cookie sheet. 2. Combine sugar and butter in a large bowl. Beat with a mixer at medium speed until fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla.

3. Sift together flour, cocoa, baking soda, and salt. Stir into creamed mixture. Add oats and chocolate chips. Dough will be very stiff. Add up to 1/4 cup water if needed. Form tablespoon-size balls and place on prepared cookie sheet. Flatten slightly. Bake 10-12 minutes.

Tip: This batter can be refrigerated for an hour to firm it up before baking. An additional cup of chocolate chips and 1/2 cup of chopped walnuts are also good in this soft and chewy cookie. About 100 calories per cookie. Enjoy.

Amy is the granddaughter of Sam and Donna Mears of Friona.





### **TxDOT** to conduct data collections

Throughout the month of June, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will conduct a data collection operation at 2,026 locations across the Lubbock District's 17county service area, including Parmer County.

"The operation will collect traffic counts for various "onsystem" roadways-roadways maintained by the state-during a 24-hour period," said Stacey Young, TxDOT pavement engineer. Statewide, traffic count operations are conducted yearly for a variety of purposes other than determining average daily traffic on a roadway, Young added.

# **Co-Op Gin holds annual meeting**


