No July 4 activities planned for Friona

Chamber of Commerce executive vice-president Chris Alexander said the Chamber board decided against any planned activities for July 4.

Since July 4 falls on Saturday and many businesses will close July 3, the board felt the long weekend would diminish attendance at any planned activities.

The decision on a fireworks display has not been made, she said. Whether there are fireworks depends on a safety decision by Fire Chief Jim Taylor and whether donations to purchase the necessary fireworks can be collected. At this press hour no fireworks are planned.

County commissioner Kirk Frye advised that the commissioners officially lifted the burn ban in the county at their Monday May 25 meeting. As of now there is not a burn ban in Parmer County.

County tax office closed on Friday

The Parmer County Tax office will be closed from 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Friday June 12, 2009. The Texas Department of Transportation will be working on a computer update. Auto tag renewals can be done at Bovina City Hall or the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

Incoming freshmen for the 2009-10 school year who plan to take biology will need to take a science placement test. The science placement test has been scheduled for Monday June 22 at 9 a.m. at the high school. For more information call the high school office at 250-3951.

Chamber dinner theater canceled

The Chamber of Commerce dinner theater scheduled for Friday June 12 at the community center has been canceled because of lack of participation and interest. If you purchased a ticket for the dinner theater you can go by the Chamber office for a refund.

Board member Greg Lewellen said the board hopes to reschedule a dinner theater production at a later date utilizing local acting talent.

City to receive free dirty water money

The Friona city council met in regular session Monday, June 8 at council chambers.

A public hearing for comments on the drinking water quality report was on the agenda but no members of the public appeared to comment.

The final reading of an ordinance regarding the city's franchise agreement with Atmos Energy was approved. The 5-year contract calls for an increase from 3% to 5% paid the city by Atmos based in usage. The increase could mean an additional \$8,000 in revenue.

An ordinance adopting code provisions for wind towers within the city limits

was approved. The ordinance restricts wind towers within the city to a height of 8-feet unless certain conditions are met. The actual code restrictions are strict and require a minimum of two acres for towers from 8-feet to 30-feet. Towers from 30-feet to 70-feet must be built on a land tract of at least 7 acres in size. No towers above 70-feet are allowed. A copy of the ordinance, 2009.06.08, with more detail is available at city hall.

In other business, changes to the personnel policy for city employees concerning sick leave, holidays, and personal leave,

was discussed but Councilman Atwell moved to table the item until the next meeting.

Friona resident Donna Baker addressed the council about an ongoing loud music complaint involving the Church of Adoration across the street from her property. Miss Baker handed out a copy of the city's noise ordinance and itemized her concerns in writing to council members. Mayor Taylor said he and the council would talk with the police chief and investigate the nature of the complaint and get back to Miss Baker on further action in an attempt to resolve the dispute.

Rich Oller of Oller Engineering in Lubbock addressed the council regarding the contract to build a new 250,000 gallon water storage tank at 7th and

Pierce. The council gave final approval and the contract was signed with Oller to build the tank, provide improved booster pumps and a variable frequency drive monitoring system which should improve water pressure in the east section of the city.

The council also approved electrical upgrades to the east water plant which will monitor pressure demand and provide energy savings, Oller said. Max Jones of Robertson Electric will contract to convert electricity to the building to a higher voltage and replace existing electrical panels.

Oller then advised the council that the city of Friona has been approved to receive stimulus money he described as "dirty water money". Oller said the amount of the stimulus payment was yet to be deter-

mined but it would be free money. City manager Patricia Phipps questioned Oller about "how free is free money from the government?" Oller said the money is free meaning that it carries no interest and does not have to be paid back.

The stipulation is that the free money must be used for 'dirty water' improvements, meaning to improve such areas as lift stations, sewer lines, and the wastewater treatment plant. It cannot be used for improvements to the city's drinking water systems. The council thanked Oller for the efforts his company put forth to secure the stimulus money.

The next meeting of the city council will be Monday, July 13, at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers at 619 Main St. Council meetings are always open to the public.

Sunday is Flag Day

In the United States, Flag Day is observed on June 14. It commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States by a resolution of the Second Continental Congress on June 14, 1777.

In 1916 President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation that officially established June 14 as Flag Day. In August 1949, National Flag Day was established by an Act of Congress.

On June 14, 1908, Theodore Roosevelt was dining outside of Philadel-

phia when he noticed a man wiping his nose with what he thought was the American flag. In outrage, Roosevelt picked up a small wooden rod and began to whip the man for "defacing the symbol of America". After about five or six strong whacks he noticed that the man was not wiping his nose with a flag but with a blue handkerchief with white stars. Upon realization of this he apologized to the man but hit him once more for making him "riled up with national pride".

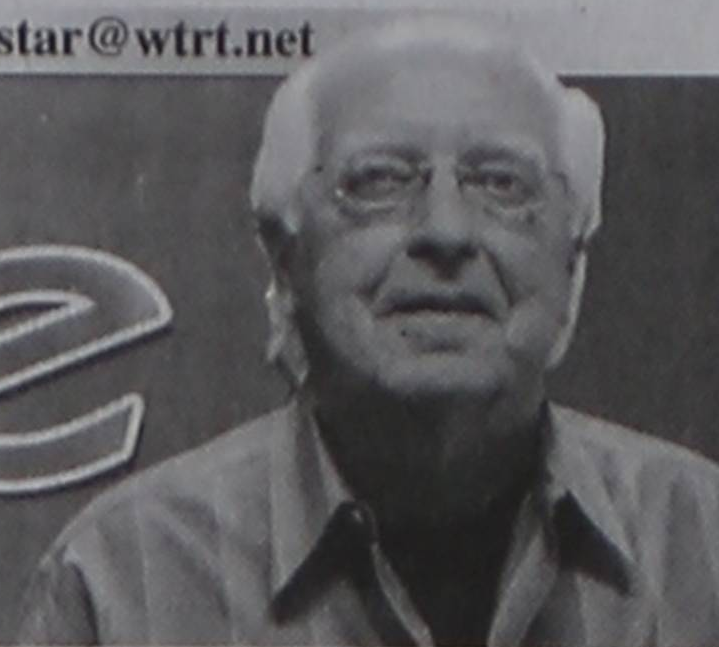

They make bad cars. That is what a Fox News TV person uttered last week during a discussion about GM's bankruptcy. She (yes, sorry, it was a she) said 'they make bad cars'. Generalized statements made by people who don't know squat drive me nuts.

She didn't explain what, in her opinion, is a bad car? In my youth a bad car was one that rumbled from twin pipes, laid rubber for half a block, and had custom fender skirts.

I'd like to go on record as saying General Motors makes great cars and pickups. So does Ford. If you want a little bitty car or a big gas-guzzling hog of a truck, General Motors has one. So does Ford. So do most of the others.

The green, tree-hugging, oxygen sniffing, whining environmental hypocrites that think they are doing God's work saving the planet, have no right to tell you and me what kind of car to drive. Big cars aren't bad cars any more than little cars are good cars.

General Motors is in trouble not because they make bad cars. They are bankrupt because management made bad decisions. They are in trouble because their big-wigs considered the company invincible and because of poor prior planning.

I drive a 2004 Chevrolet Tahoe. Bought it brand new in December of '03. It is loaded with stuff I don't use much: moon roof, DVD player, 4-wheel drive, and 3rd row seats. It is the best and most enjoyable vehicle I have ever owned and I have owned a few. Had a Studebaker long ago and a 1965 Mustang. Had a Lincoln and a Cadillac and a Mercedes Benz 450SL.

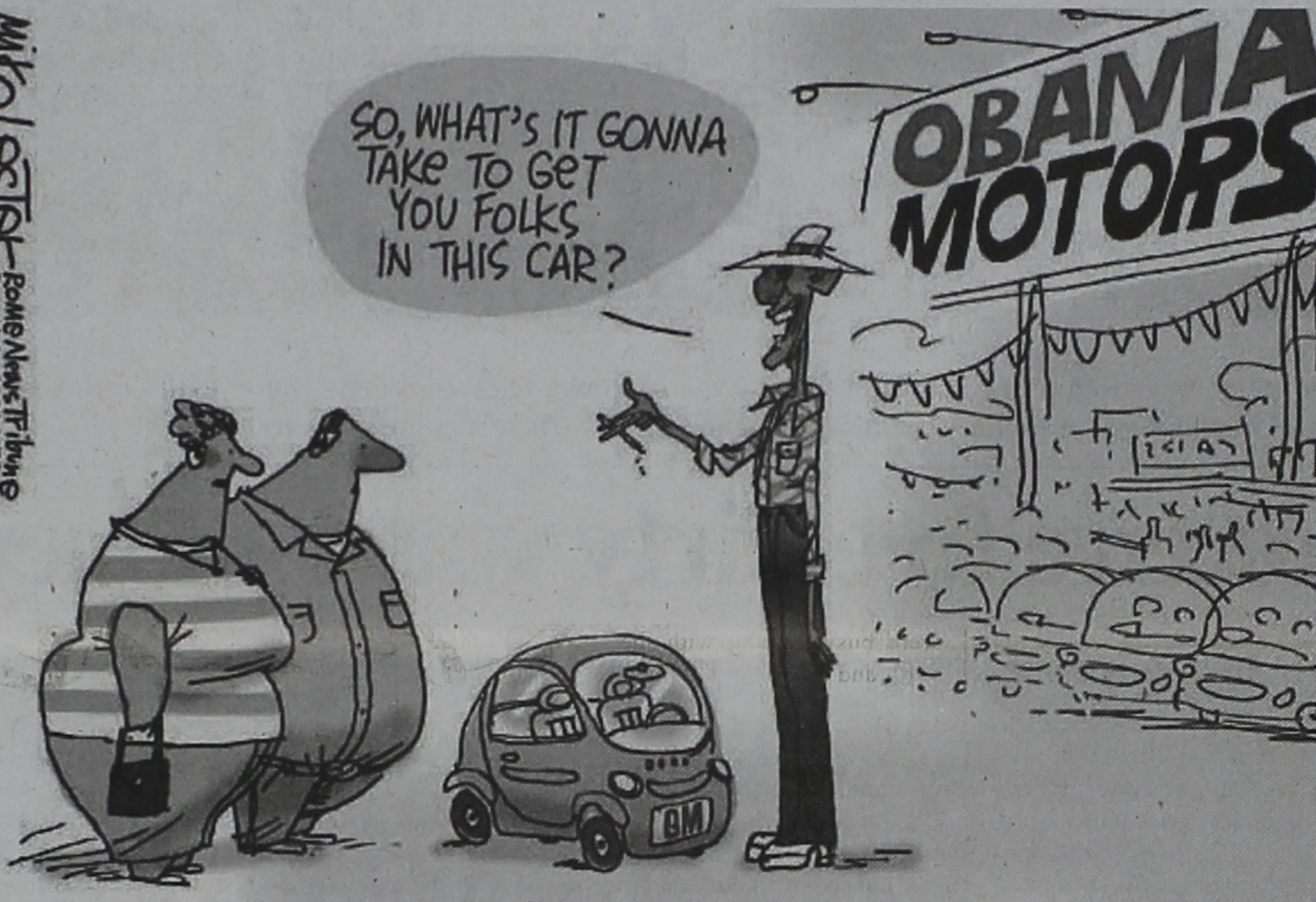
At the risk of jinxing myself, I have had no trouble with the Tahoe. Replaced the fuel pump once and a new set of tires. That's it. It's hauled my media buddies and me to five years worth of out-of-town football games. It is the most comfortable vehicle I've ever driven. I like it. Maybe you can tell.

It cost more than a regular car and it gets about 17 mpg but I knew that going in. I had the choice of buying a small 4-door, 4-cylinder, car that zips along at 30+ mpg. Could have bought a mid-size family car too. General Motors offered a lot of choices to fit different budgets. So does Ford.

At last Thursday's Senior Citizens' lunch, Rhonda Wilkins gave a talk about the hospital. Whether you are still calling it PCCH or the new designation of Parmer Medical Center, either way, the hospital is now designated as a "Critical Access Hospital".

This means if you need to be in an out-of-town hospital (Amarillo or Lubbock) for more than two nights, you can request to be sent back to our hospital here in Friona. We all know that we've always received more personal care in our local hospital through the years. Your ongoing skilled nursing needs can now be obtained here at home, including: swing bed, physical therapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy, IV therapy, parenteral nutrition, post-cardiac arrest, post-cardiac surgery, and stroke.

Rhonda said sometimes the bigger hospitals insist you must stay there, but you should take it upon yourself to be in charge of your own care and insist on being sent back to Friona. The only medications that cannot be administered here are chemotherapy needs. Rhonda invites you to call her and discuss your medical situation at 806-250-2754.

Avocados are versatile. Slice them on sandwiches, toss them in salad. And then of course there is guacamole. Love it or leave it. Most folks love it I think. Now comes Roquamole. I call it guacamole all dressed up in a fancy suit.

Found this recipe in a recent Relish Magazine. Who would think of avocado and blue cheese? Fear not, it still has jalapenos and green onions. Give it a try. Sounds great to me but then I like blue cheese. Not everyone does.

Roquamole

Serves 8

- 1 cup (8 oz) crumbled Roquefort or St. Agur blue cheese

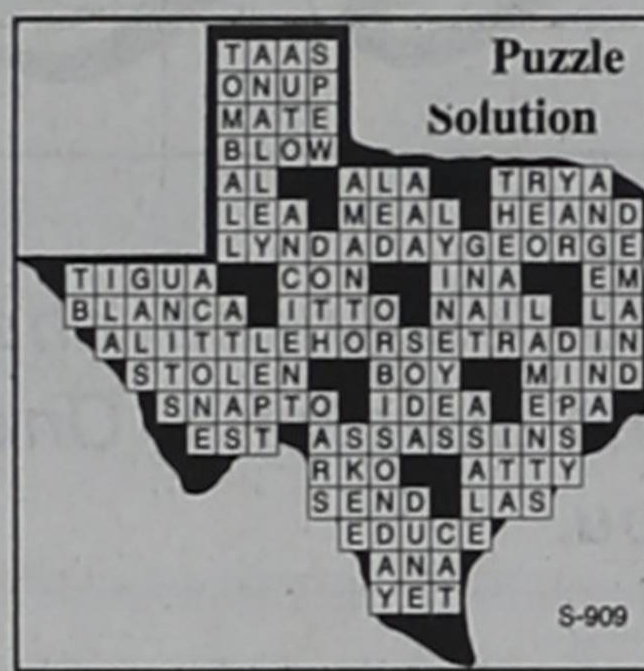

He moved to a Montana ranch in 1927, continuing to write, paint and draw. The pressures of his success proved too much, and he became an alcoholic and died at age 50 in 1942.

On Saturday, August 1 at 10 a.m., Amarillo native and Will James historian Steve Zimmer talks about "The Cowboy View of Will James". West Texas A&M University professor Bonney MacDonald, Ph.D., presents "Cowboy in the Making: Will James and the Popular West" on Tuesday, September 8 at 5:30 p.m. The Will James events conclude Saturday, September 19, when visitors can watch the movie inspired by the Will James novel "Smokey" at 1:30 p.m. All events will be held in Hazlewood Lecture Hall.

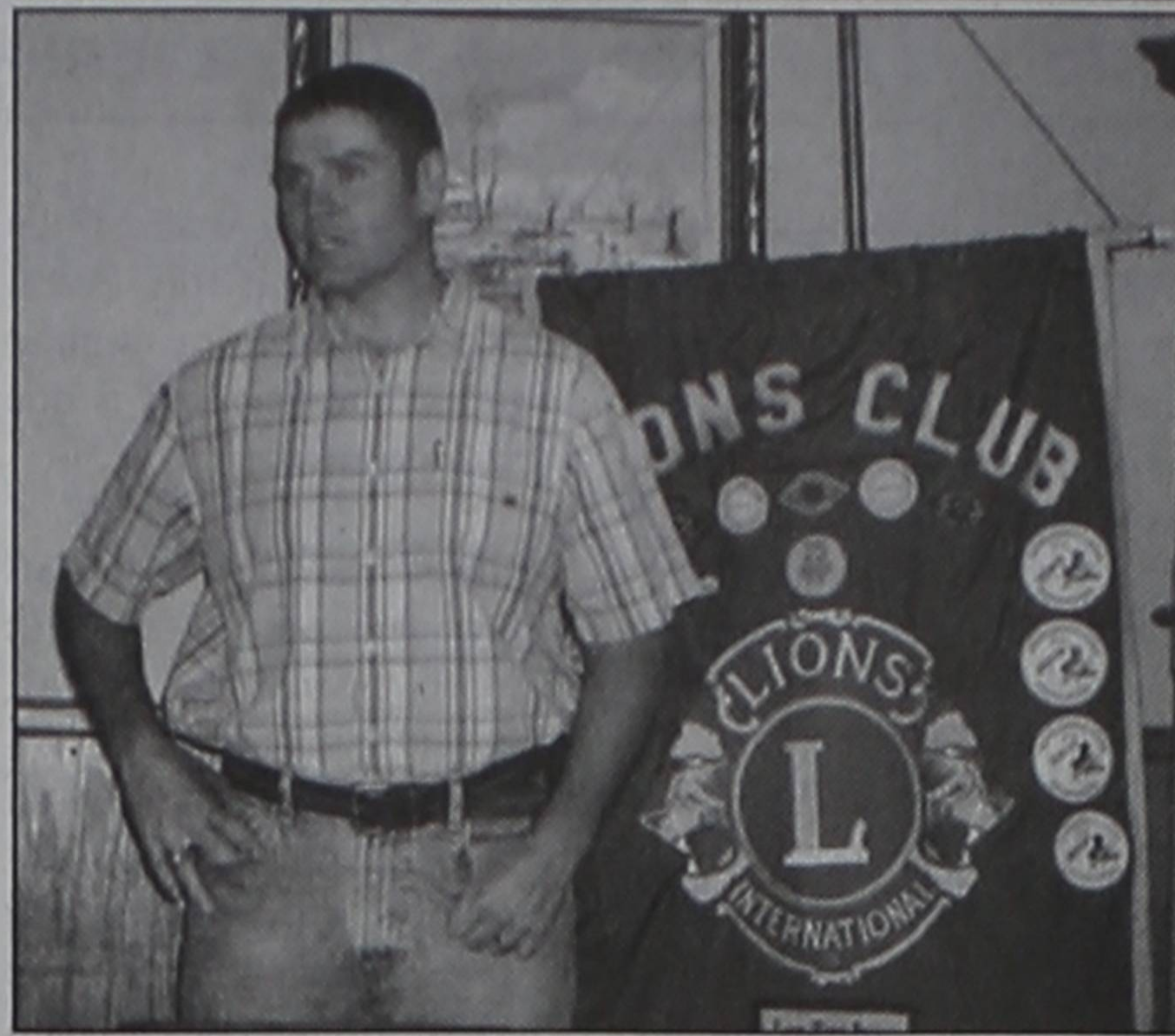

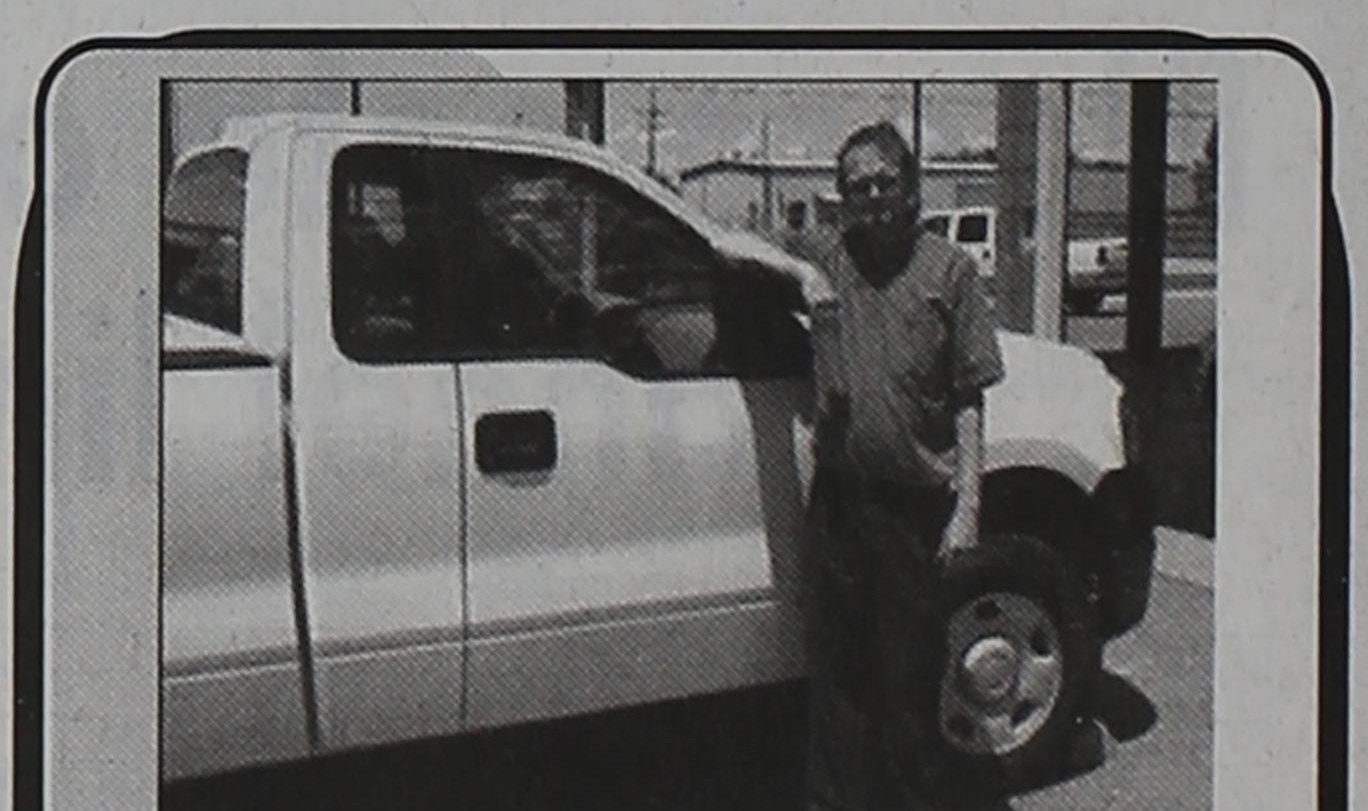

Irrigated crops off to good start

News from County Agent Monti Vandiver's Pest Management Newsletter:

Most area irrigated crops are off to a very good start while much of the dryland has not had sufficient moisture to establish a crop. Maybe recent rains will provide "planting moisture" and will buy some time until a good soaking rain occurs.

Adult thrips are abundant and have begun migrating into cotton. Preventative soil applied and seed treatment insecticide effectiveness have for the most part held their own.

Cotton should be monitored closely to prevent excessive damage. Thrips will hide in leaf folds, along leaf veins, and within curled leaves.

Black root rot has slowed development and in some cases thinned stands in numer-

ous area fields. An additional side effect of this disease may result in the plant's inability to efficiently utilize soil applied and/or seed treatment insecticides for thrips suppression and may be at higher risk to thrips damage.

Spider mites have been observed in area corn. Most colonies are very small at this point. Thrips have been observed feeding within some mite colonies. In this situation the thrips which are a pest in cotton are beneficial in corn. Now would be a good time to begin considering spider mite management strategies in corn including preventative and/or remedial tactics.

Cotton in better position this year

Judging the 2009 High Plains cotton crop to be significantly better today than it was at the same time in 2008 may be a bit of a stretch at first glance, especially when looking at dryland cotton acres.

Look a little deeper though, and the differences begin to tilt the table in favor of the current season despite the struggles that both irrigated and dryland crops have experienced thus far.

Planting season is winding to a close and June 5 marks the Federal Crop Insurance program final planting date for most central High Plains cotton counties. So far the weather has largely cooperated in terms of allowing growers to get fields planted. Unfortunately it hasn't provided all the planting moisture many would like to see. Southern High Plains counties with a June 10 final insurance planting date still have a few days to get their initial planting activity completed.

If dry conditions in these areas persist, some cotton could end up being abandoned and the acreage put to another use. If this occurs, it is important to note that crop insurance rules dictate that the drought affected acreage will not be eligible for adjustment, due to non-emergence of seed affected by drought conditions, until 15 days after the applicable final planting date for the county in which the crop is planted.

Abandonment could still be the fate for some dryland acreage. Most dryland producers need 1.5-2 inches to get a cotton crop started. On an optimistic note, some dryland growers are at least getting a little rain and still have a chance to get something going in 2009.

For dryland crops the first big difference from 2008 is the fact that so far 2009 has reminded many producers that rainfall events do frequent the area during planting season.

That reminder has sometimes been served with a frustrating mixture of hope and trepidation to growers who can often see, and sometimes smell, the moisture they need falling just over the horizon.

The second big difference for dryland growers is the fact that there is actually some moisture underneath a fair amount of the region's dryland acres that could help sustain a young dryland crop. As always the key will be getting help from above to provide the moisture needed to germinate and establish a crop in areas that are still dry.

While both 2009 and 2008 have started out dry from a planting perspective the 2008 dryland crop started in a bigger hole with both a dry seedbed and virtually no underground moisture. The end result in 2008 was ultimately the abandonment of some one million dryland cotton acres.

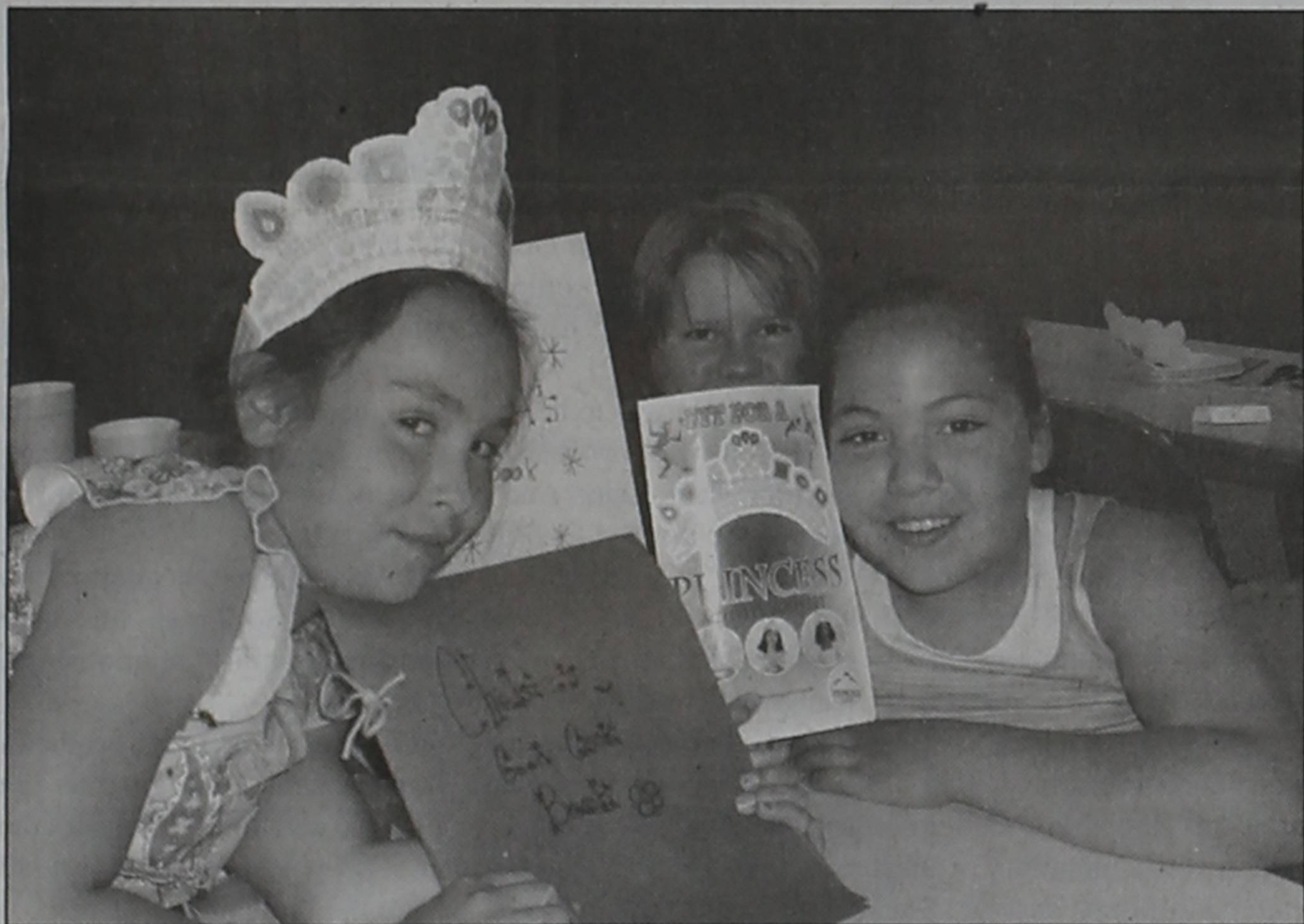
All things considered it seems the region's dryland acreage has to be considered a little better off, simply because a fair number of acres still have a chance to contribute to the region's 2009 production total.

Irrigated cotton acres appear to be progressing pretty well, although many irrigated growers have been disappointed that their crops haven't "grown off" the way they would prefer.

A big contributor to the irrigated crop's sluggish performance has been the relatively mild weather conditions that prevailed this far. Despite daytime temperatures have been pretty well in line with seasonal norms, nighttime temperatures continue to dip into the low to middle 50s at night.

According to Dr. Randy Boman, Texas AgriLife Extension Cotton Agronomist, the sometimes cool morning temperatures of May and early June have the irrigated crop lagging a little bit even though overall heat unit accumulations are tracking close to normal.

The 2009 growing season is starting in typical High Plains fashion with more questions than answers at this early stage. With hopes for establishing more dryland acres this year, favorable weather could set the stage for the area to put together another respectable cotton crop this year.

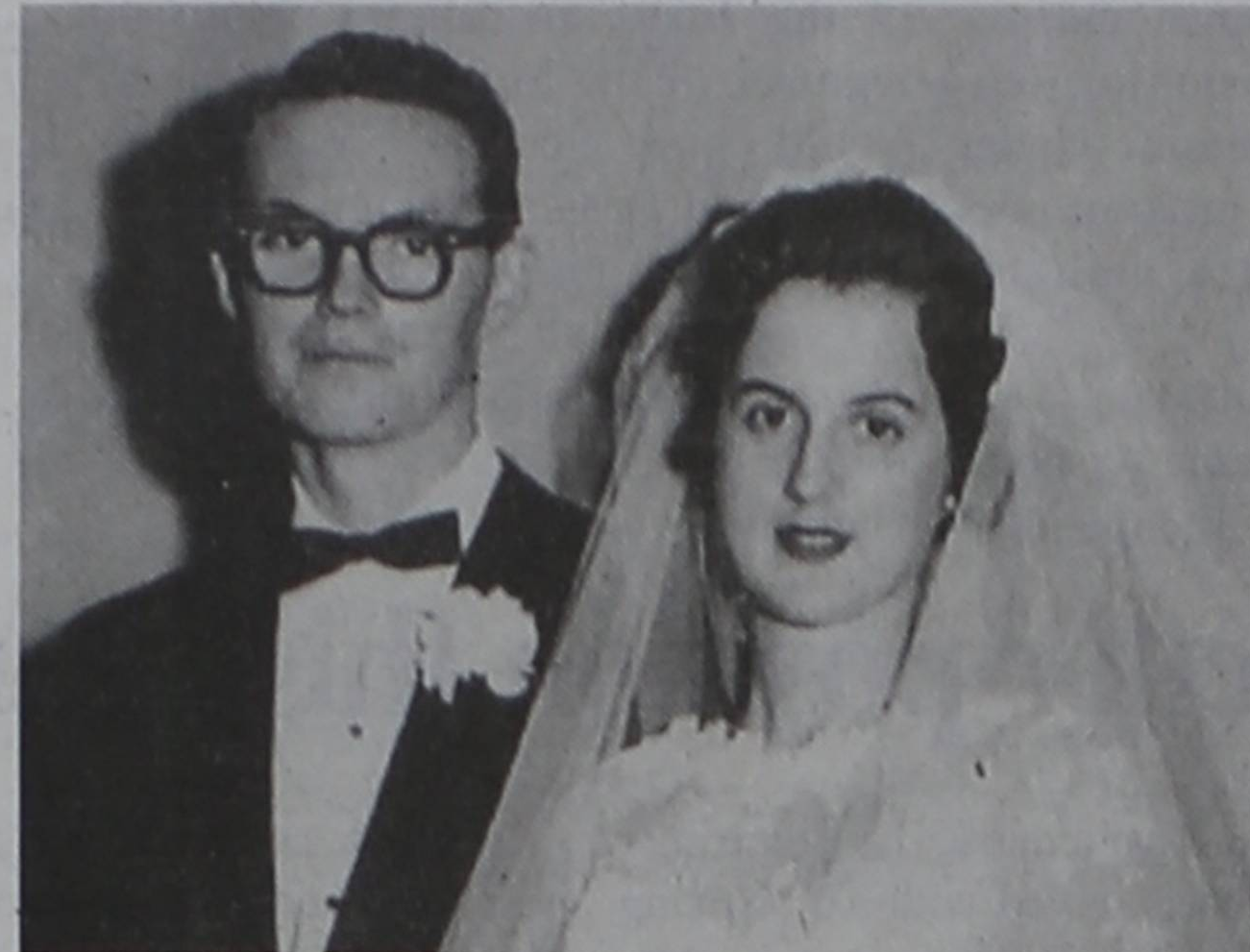
Ellises to celebrate 50th anniversary

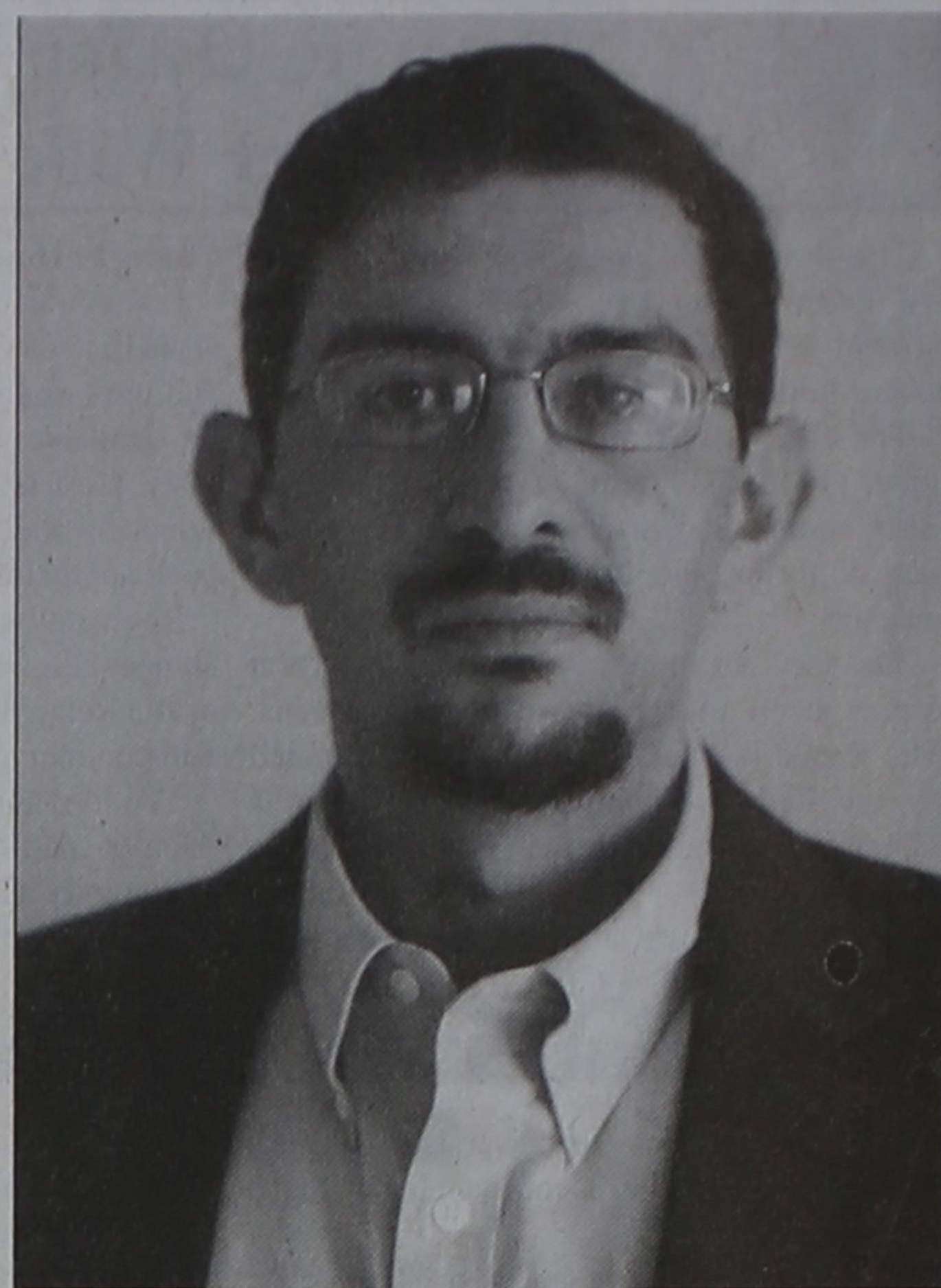

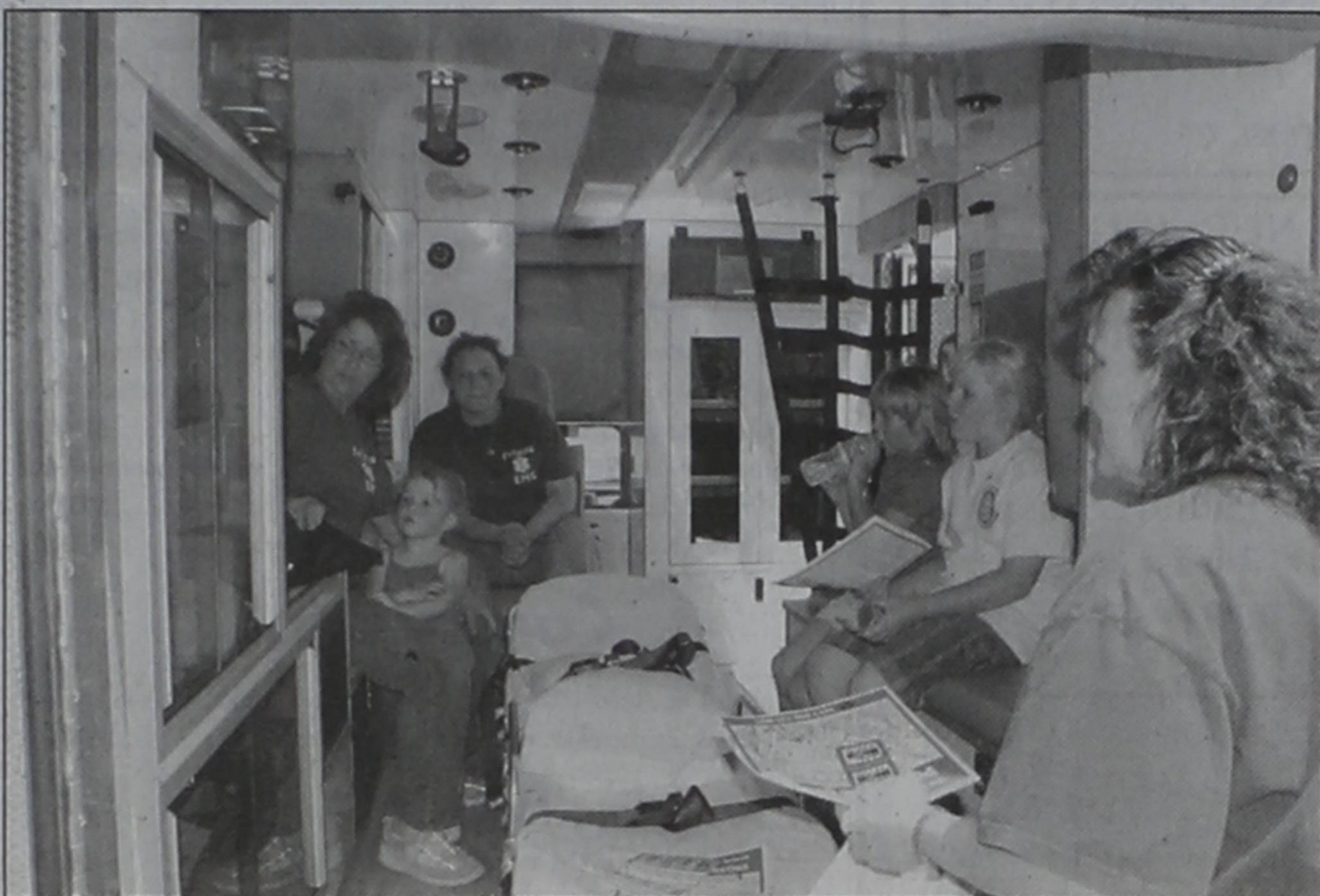

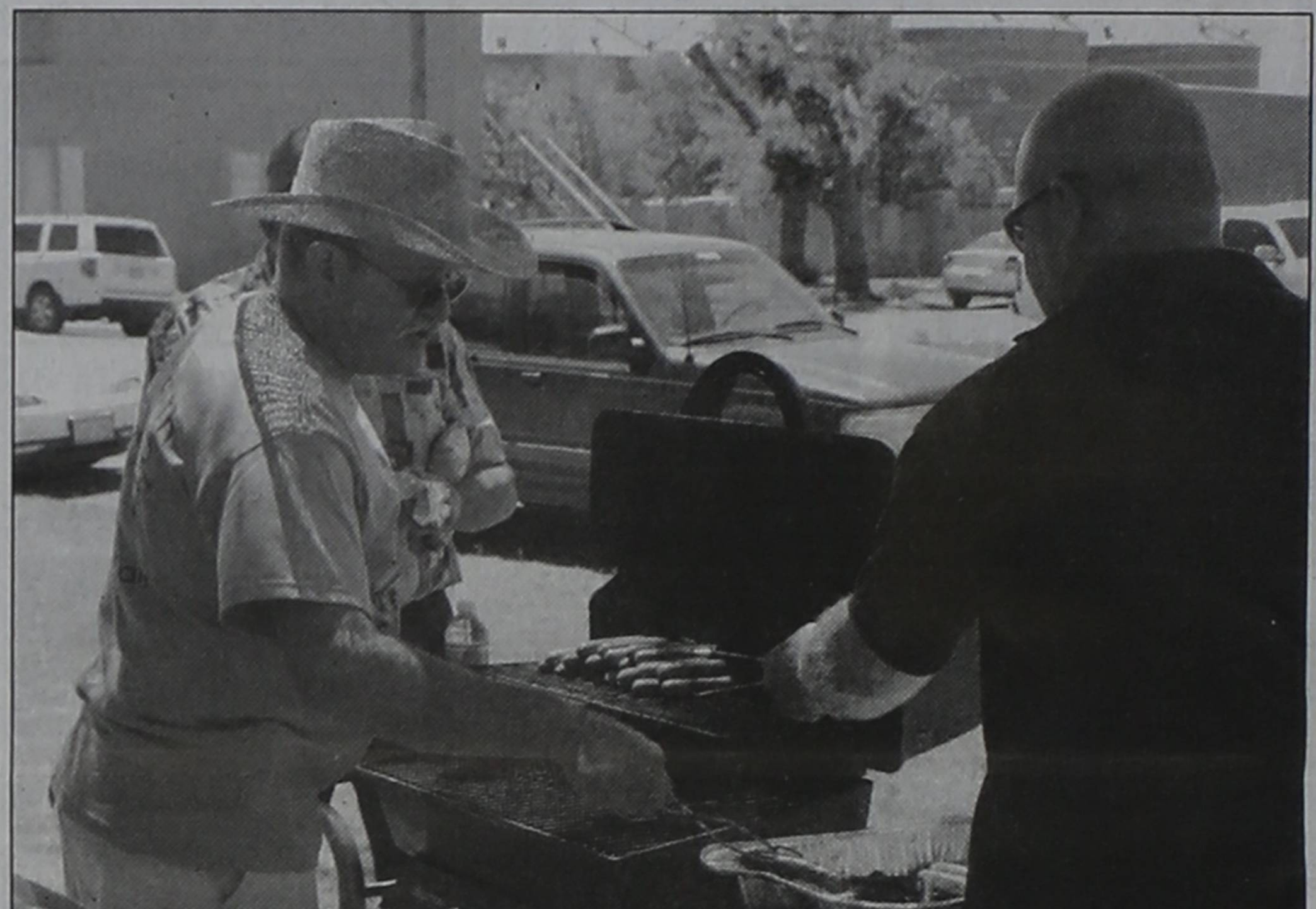
