# Pineda walks, charging discrimination

Big Spring school trustee Billy Pineda shocked his fellow board members by boycotting the Thursday meeting in protest of the board officer election process

Pineda's action came immediately after Ford Farris was elected president of the board in a 6-1 vote, with Pineda dissenting.

In a letter he distributed to board members and the news media before his walkout, he charged the group with reluctance in sharing power with minority groups.

"I know your proclamation about how minorities are: 'Always hollering discrimination,' but I also know you do it as a defense." the letter stated. "The reason there is so much hollering is because of your inability to share leadership with anyone.

'You are afraid of losing con-fears and realize that all we want is trol," the letter continued. "You to share in the decisions that affect

# **Abnormal** chemistry may trigger teen suicide

**PITTSBURGH** — The discovery of chemical abnormalities in depressed teen-agers intent on killing themselves could provide a better understanding of suicide and help identify those likely to selfdestruct, researchers say.

"The things we learn on this may well help future tests to identify the highest risk for suicides, and that can make a difference in the treat-

"It's not purely a mind phenomenon," Dr. Neal Ryan said. "There's something that goes on with the brain, and there are environmental phenomena that impinge on that."

ment," said Dr. Neal D. Ryan, assistant professor of psychiatry at the University of Pittsburgh.

The brains of suicidal adolescents secrete smaller amounts of a growth hormone than those of healthy teen-agers, according to research by Ryan and Dr. Joaquin Puig-Antich, professor of psychiatry at Pitt.

The study, reported Thursday at the American Psychiatric Association's annual meeting in Montreal, is believed to be the first to demonstrate neurochemical abnormalities in suicidal adolescents.

"It's not purely a mind phenomenon," Ryan said. "There's something that goes on with the brain, and there are environmental phenomena that impinge on that.

Earlier studies have found similar abnormalities in the brains of suicidal adults, although experts are divided as to what conclusions

can be drawn. "Nothing has worked out as a diagnostic tool," said Irma Lann, a science administrator in child and adolescent disorders research for the National Institute of Mental

Health. Ms. Lann called the researchers' work interesting but preliminary, and said further study is needed.

"We've made a big step toward understanding, identifying, the risk for suicide. But we're not there vet." said Dr. David Brent, a University of Pittsburgh psychiatrist who specializes in

adolescent suicide. Youths 19 and under accounted for 2,127 of the 29,453 suicides committed in the United States in 1985, the last year for which figures are available, according to the National Center for Health Statistics. About 80 percent of them were

Boys and girls are afflicted about equally by depression, one of the main forces behind suicide. More girls attempt suicide, but more boys succeed at it, Ryan said.

DAYTON, Ore. (AP) — A pregnant 17-yearold senior was crowned May Day queen of her high school, but she and 45 other students were suspended from classes today for protesting limits placed on her royal duties. "I know there are people out there tonight who feel strongly against me being up here,

and I never thought such a big issue would be raised about it," AnnaMaria DeVries said at her coronation Thursday night. "Some people are saying that I have no

morals, but those people don't realize I could have taken an easier way out," she added. The Dayton Junior-Senior High School's student body elected DeVries queen last month.

There were no protests at the ceremony in the school gymnasium in this farming town of

DeVries, who is single and nearly six months

pregnant, says she plans to marry and keep

"Everything went very well," principal Tom Gallagher said. "She gave a very classy

Earlier Thursday, school officials suspended 45 students who protested limits placed on

# AIDS philanthropist faces four years in federal prison

DALLAS (AP) — A former Savings and Loan executive accused of embezzling more than \$410,000 from a Dallas thrift and donating some of it to gay charities after learning he had AIDS-related complex has been sentenced to four years in federal prison.

U.S. District Judge Barefoot Sanders Thursday sentenced Patrick Wayne Debenport, 27. Debenport, formerly employed by the Oak Cliff branch of First Texas Savings and Loan, was charged in March with 15 counts of misapplication of funds after a two-month FBI investigation found more than \$1 million missing from the thrift. Debenport said he felt he was treatedly

fairly by the judge. 'You can try to prepare yourself, but it's a shock," Debenport said of Sanders' decision to sentence him to prison. "I made an awful mistake, and now I'm trying to live with it.'

Debenport, who says his health is "up and down," is scheduled to report to a federal facility June 9.

Asked if he worries about dying in prison, Debenport said, "I haven't tried to think about that.'

In an interview last December, Debenport told the Times Herald he used the thrift's computer system to transfer 15

bogus loans to his Mesquite bank account. A plea-bargain agreement allowed Debenport to plead guilty to three counts and the rest were dropped. He faced maximum punishment of 15 years in prison and \$750,000 in fines.

Defense lawyer Steven Cooper asked Sanders to consider that his client had diagnosed as having the acquired immune deficiency syndrome complex and

grant him probation without sending him to prison.

Sanders chose instead to sentence Debenport to two concurrent four-year terms and five years probation upon his release. No fine was levied.

Officials of the thrift say most of the funds have been recovered except for donations totaling \$175,000 that Debenport began making to the Persons with AIDS Coalition of Dallas last April.

Coalition directors said they did not know the money was stolen when they spent it to renovate the city's only home for AIDS patients.

The thrift has sued the coalition, seeking repayment of the money.



# **Imprisoned** youth eight; Older than believed

HOUSTON (AP) — A boy police say was kept locked in bathrooms by his parents is 8 years old, a year older than was originally believed.

Vannoy Jimenez was born Dec. 26, 1979, in Washington, according to records from that state, Houston juvenile Sgt. Bill Staney said Thursday.

Police originally said that although the boy appeared younger because he was so emaciated, he was 7 years old. The boy, who weighed about 25 pounds when found May 4, had told police he believed he was

The boy, police said, was imprisoned in bathrooms of his family's apartments, beaten and fed only one meal a day, perhaps for years.

His parents, Alexander Lizcano Jimenez, 38, and Charlotte Anne Bishop, 42, have been charged with injury to a child by omission and remain in the Harris County Jail in lieu of \$40,000 bond each.

Vannoy Jimenez remains in a foster home and is rapidly gaining weight, police said.

Wise is an American Indian. "I'm just as much a minority as Billy is," he said.

Trustee Bill Brooks declined comment on Pineda's specific charges, but said the board didn't discriminate against minorities.

Big Spring School Superintendent Bill McQueary today said the district is doing everything it can to hire qualified minorities.

McQueary conceded the district doesn't have "many" minorities employed by the district - its 1986-87 performance report stated that 20 of the district's 332 professional personnel were either black or Hispanic (6 percent) — but noted it is difficult to recruit qualified minorities.

The former officer was injured in an automobile accident near the tiny Panhandle town of Leflors. He was charged with driving while intoxicated in connection with the incident.

He faces a preliminary charge of involuntary manslaughter in the April 12 shooting death of Caryle, 25. Justice of the Peace Willie Grant ruled cause of death as a single gunshot wound to the chest.

Dunn was dismissed from the Big Spring Police Department effective April 26. Reason for his dismissal was failure to satisfy terms of his probationary period.

# Capitol pork getting leaner

When President Reagan dropped 43 pounds of budget documents on the lectern at his State of the Union address, he revived the pork-barreling charge that has been laid against Congress ever since the first assemblage of lawmakers in 1789 ordered a lighthouse to be built on Chesapeake Bay

The charge is true; Congress does lard spending bills with projects whose worth is measured more by where they will be built than by their contribution to the greater public interest.

But what the president's renewed complaint ignored was his own success: Pork is on the decline, in part because of his own efforts, mostly because of the budget squeeze. Old ideas haven't caught up with new facts.

Classifying federal projects as pork barreling is a subjective enterprise; one man's pork is another's beef. But by the count of the president's own Office of Management and Budget, there was only \$970 million of directly appropriated "pork" in last December's budget package, hardly negligible but almost invisible in a budget of nearly \$1 trillion: \$6.4 million for a tourist gondola in Idaho; \$100,000 for the police force of Harper's Ferry, W.Va.; \$4 million for soil conservation projects; and so on.

Despite the president's rhetoric, he has not formally asked for "recision" of this spending, as he promised, and for good reason. It's a talking point, not a fighting issue.

In part, pork is scarcer because the portion of the federal budget devoted to discretionary spending — water projects, pollution control, agricultural research, economic development and other areas where pork has traditionally abounded has shrunk in the 1980s as government has switched priorities to the Pentagon, Social Security and Medicare.

In part, the shrinkage is a result of reforms pushed by Reagan and approved by Congress, such as the 1986 water legislation requiring local matching funds for federal dam and harbor improvements — a reform that has dampened enthusiasm for overbuilt projects.

But mostly, it has been those enormous budget deficits that have forced Congress into an uncomfortable discipline. Lawmakers will never stop looking for projects for their districts, but when the federal trough is so empty, even the pork gets leaner.

# Investigation discovers security problems at VA

**By JACK ANDERSON** and JOSEPH SPEAR

WASHINGTON — The whistleblower who was fired after telling graphic tales of brutality at a Veterans Administration hospital won't get his job back. But a federal investigation into the case shows that there is plenty of room for reform in the VA

Among the revelations in the investigators' report is this story from an emergency room technician at the Cincinnati Veterans Hospital: The technician saw the hospital's police chief take a former patient into a

The patient had been discharged, but returned to the hospital and refused to leave. As the technician turned away, he heard "a loud crack" and looked back to see blood on the office door. Then he heard the former patient tell the chief, "Ow! You didn't have to

bang my head against the door.' The police chief was Daniel Wilson, who was transferred to a VA hospital in Chicago last year as

the investigation was winding down. The story told by the emergency room technician was just one of many revealed in a federal investigation into allegation made by the whistleblower, John Berter.

The probe began in 1986 when Berter, a VA security officer, and other VA security officers told the FBI stories of Wilson gouging a disabled vet in the eyes over a parking violation, choking a patient who was in restraints, and kicking a panhandler in the groin, according to the report and repeated testimony before Congress.

Berter was fired after blowing the whistle. He appealed the dismissal to a federal personnel board, calling it retaliation for his candor. A scrappy group of whistleblower advocates known as the Government Accountability Project investigated and made comment on the report.

Berter's case a national issue.

Details of the report and other problems with the VA security service will be reviewed May 19 at a hearing before the Veterans Affairs Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations

Last year we reported on Berter's claims. Now our associate Stewart Harris has obtained the report of the Office of Special Counsel's investigation of Berter's charges. The OSC has the job of investigating reprisals against government whistleblowers.

The report zeroes in on discrepancies in various accounts of alleged brutality. Even if the investigation had confirmed the allegations, a legal analysis prepared by the OSC said the firing was still legitimate because Berter had been AWOL from work.

But the report also gives disturbing details about Wilson's background, including evidence that he had a history of making violent arrests and lied about his professional background. Wilson quit the VA after his ransfer to Chicago.

In sworn testimony, Wilson said he had worked for two and a half years in the Chicago Police Department. Under questioning by OSC investigators, Wilson admitted he never worked for Chicago P.D.

A training officer at another police department told the OSC that Wilson overreacted and was a hothead. The mayor of a town where Wilson worked said he could not make an arrest without aggravating someone and that Wilson blamed others for his troubles. police chief who once commanded Wilson said Wilson's badge may have gone to his head.

On the other hand, officials at the VA hospital where Wilson worked before going to Cincinnati gave the OSC no complaints about his work



#### Killer wants to die

OZARK, Ark. (AP) — Convicted murderer R. Gene Simmons, who has asked to be swiftly executed, had hoped for the death penalty from the outset and mounted a defense only because it was his best chance to get it, his at-

"We got what he wanted," defense attorney John C. Harris said. Simmons, 47, was convicted of capital murder on Thursday and sentenced to die for gunning down two people in Russellville on Dec. 28. He still faces charges of killing 14 members of his family during the Christmas holidays.

After the jury recommended lethal injection, Simmons shocked Judge John S. Patterson by publicly forsaking his right to appeal.

"His mind was made up from the outset. For weeks and months we have had this bottled up inside of us," Simmons' lawyer said Thursday night.

In a brief statement read to the court, Simmons asked that his execution "be carried out expeditiously. I want no action that will delay, deny, defer or denounce this very correct and proper death sentence.'

HOUSTON (AP) — A 450-pound Siberian tiger that smashed through a reinforced window at the Houston Zoo and killed a zookeeper poses no threat to visitors and won't be destroyed, officials say.

"We can contain that cat," zoo director John Werler said Thursday following zookeeper Ricardo Tovar's death, the first of its kind at the zoo.

The big cat apparently broke through a 21/2-foot-square, quarter-inch-thick glass-andwire mesh window in a door, then dragged Tovar, 59, into its natural habitat area and mauled him to death, Werler said.

#### **MOVE recalls bombing**

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Angry friends and relatives gathered to remember the 11 people who died three years ago today after a police helicopter bombed the house of the radical group MOVE, sparking a fire that engulfed a city block.

'What we have seen is the worst that we can see in mankind," said Andino Ward, the father of one of two survivors from the house, Michael Moses Ward, 16.

Ward was among 100 people Thursday at the Tindley Temple United Methodist Church, where the mood was tinged with sorrow but marked more by anger and resentment over what some see as inaction in addressing the conduct of city officials during the May 13, 1985, confrontation.

Events scheduled to mark the anniversary include a candlelight ceremony today at 5:27 p.m., the exact time of the bombing, panel discussions and a public forum on Saturday.

# Aldermen confiscate artwork

CHICAGO (AP) — One picture may be worth a thousand words, but a student painting of the late Mayor Harold Washington wearing women's lingerie already has generated several times that — and the furor appears far from

One day after a group of black aldermen stormed into the prestigious School of the Art Institute and had police confiscate the picture, the American Civil Liberties Union said it will file a federal lawsuit charging the police with violating the civil rights of the painter, student David Nelson.

'The policemen violated his rights by arresting the painting when their duty was to protect it," Jay Miller of the **ACLU** said Thursday night

The painting was returned to Nelson late Thursday, he said.

The student is not interested in a court battle to return the work to the school's private exhibition, Miller said. "But that doesn't mean he doesn't

want to be vindicated. The painting, titled "Mirth and Girth," depicts a heavy-set Washington clad in a frilly white bra, panties and stockings, standing with pencil in hand

and gazing out at viewers. It had been displayed in a hallway with dozens of others in a student competition at the school, whose sister institution is Chicago's famed Art


"I don't think it's the most tasteful portrait, but I don't think that matters,' Nelson said in an interview on Chicago radio station WLUP

"Nobody said when I went to the Art Institute that I had to produce tasteful artwork. In fact ... that goes against everything the institution is about," he said. "It's like saying you have to produce artwork in a certain way.

Alderman Bobby Rush countered, "If Mayor Washington had been alive, he would have said, 'Hey, it's a portrait. I've been painted in worse terms than this. Forget it.

"But Harold Washington is dead now.... and it's important that his memory is not denigrated. By anyone,' said Rush, among the contingent of black aldermen who went to the school Wednesday.

After meeting Thursday with city officials, Art Institute officials agreed to take out full-page advertisements Saturday in Chicago newspapers apologizing to the black community, said Alderman

#### 12 die in collapse

AGUASCALIENTES, MEXICO (AP) -Rescue teams tunnelled through tons of concrete today searching for missing victims after four floors of a downtown building collapsed, killing at least 12 people and injuring

The rubble buried the basement offices of a furniture factory. Authorities said it was not immediately known what caused the collapse of the building, which was under construction.

Juan Manuel Hinojo, a reporter for the Aguascalientes daily El Heraldo, told The Associated Press that officials at the site said they had recovered 12 bodies and rescued 45 people. All the survivors were injured, he

He said at least five more people were believed missing, based on survivors' knowledge of who was in building when it collapsed at about 6 p.m. CDT on Thursday.

Esperanza Cardenas, a spokeswoman for the Mexican Red Cross in Aguascalientes, said early today that nine people had been confirmed dead but that it was not immediately known how many had been in the building when it collapsed.

"Exactly how many there are or how many more are inside the building isn't known," she

#### One dead in outbreak

LONDON (AP) — A cleaning supervisor has become the first fatality among 34 known cases of Legionnaires' disease in an outbreak at British Broadcasting Corp. headquarters,

Forty-four other cases are suspected in the outbreak in and around the BBC, and six of the remaining 33 confirmed victims are seriously ill, the borough of Westminster said.

#### Rose suspects arrested

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) - George Rose's adopted 18-year-old son and the youth's natural father were among four people charged with murdering the Tony award-winning actor, police said.

The natural father said Rose had sexually abused his son, Domingo Antonio Ralfe Vazquez, as well as other youths.

Police and doctors also said cocaine was found on the 68-year-old Rose and that laboratory tests performed in Miami showed traces of a cocaine derivative in his body at the time of his death.

In a sworn statement police gave reporters on Thursday, Juan Antonio Vazquez Padilla, the natural father of Ralfe Vazquez, said the British-born performer was held for eight hours on May 4 before being clubbed to death.

Vazquez said the killers tried to make the death look like the result of a single-car accident, on which initial police reports blamed it.

# Dukakis criticizes handling of Noriega

PORTLÄND, Ore. (AP) — Democratic presidential front-runner Michael Dukakis is criticizing the administration's reported deal to dismiss charges against Panama's military leader, saying "I don't believe you drop indictments against suspected drug runners and murderers.

Dukakis was beginning his first full day of West Coast campaigning today with events across California after stopping briefly in Portland Thursday night. Tuesday's contest in Oregon is a prelude to his final round of primaries against Jesse Jackson on June 7 in California and New Jersey.

Holding a long lead in delegates going into the final few primaries, Dukakis continued to focus on the Reagan administration as he reacted to reports the administration had offered to drop federal drugtrafficking charges against Panama's Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega if he would step down as the country's leader.

"I think before we start talking about dropping indictments and making deals, the American people deserve a full explanation of what kind of relationship this administration has had with Noriega,' Dukakis said.

"I don't believe you drop indictments against suspected drug runners and murderers." Dukakis said earlier before arriving in Oregon.

Dukakis continued the criticism during his brief stop in Portland. He also jabbed at Reagan over recent disclosures that the president's schedule has been guided through the use of astrology by his wife,

"Eight months from now, the Reagan era will be over," Dukakis said at a mock political convention by Oregon high school students. "America will have a new president. We'll be putting away our horoscopes

As he increasingly turns his criticism on the Republicans and their expected nominee, Vice President George Bush, Dukakis has made a common theme of challenging the administration for dealing quietly with the Panamanian strongman.

Bush, Democrats contend, should have had knowledge of Noriega going back to the vice president's days as head of the CIA, and more recently as head of an administration task force to stop illegal drug smuggling.



# Bush takes on Dukakis on trail

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Republican George Bush is painting Democratic front-runner Michael Dukakis as "an extremely liberal Democrat'' who is far to the left on military matters — a portrait the vice president hopes will help him win the West in November.

At a high-tech defense plant in New Mexico and in militaryminded San Diego, Bush hit the Massachusetts governor on defense, saying Dukakis would cause "a radical swing" in the nation's military policies.

Bush, the apparent Republican nominee, also tried to draw attention away from a minor flap over President Reagan's endorsement of his bid. Reagan's formal expression of support, delivered Wednesday night, was judged lukewarm by some.

'This is what I call a piranha circling in the water over what they think is a drop of blood. They're going to starve to death because there is nothing there, nothing there," the vice president said in Albuquerque, N.M. "It's totally absurd.

By the end of the day, Bush was downplaying the endorsement from the man he has loyally served for seven years.

"People thought all along the president was for me. So I don't think the specific endorsment means something," Bush said. "But I think the Reagan record, or the Reagan-Bush record if you will,



is well-regarded."

On a seven-day Western swing to states where he needs strong support to win the general election, Bush talked as if the fall campaign had already begun. Over and over again, he referred to Dukakis and his remaining Democratic opponent Jesse Jackson as extreme on defense.

"We are going to have a traditional campaign...of one extremely liberal Democrat...against me, Bush told reporters in San Diego.

He planned another high-tech plant visit and a San Diego air show appearence today

Later Bush described Dukakis as "over there somewhere — and I'm not just making charges - between McGovern and Mondale, somewhere there on defense.'

George McGovern, the party's 1972 nominee, called for dramatic cuts in defense spending, while Walter Mondale, the 1984 Democrtic standard-bearer, opposed some Reagan military programs.

In speeches in New Mexico and California, Bush aimed at Democratic defense policies.

"We cannot afford a radical swing. We cannot afford president who opposes every step we are taking to keep our defense at the technological edge, who opposes the MX, who opposes the Midgetman, who opposes testing of nuclear weapons, who opposes flight testing of ballistic missiles, who opposes testing of antisatellite weapons, who opposes the building of a strategic defense, and who flirts with the withdrawal of our troops from South Korea," he told the Albuquerque Rotary Club after a defense-plant tour.

At one point, Bush joked about the endorsement flap.

"You may have seen that the president endorsed me last night. That was a relief," he said as the Rotary Club audience laughed. "It's been tough for me trying to keep my charisma in check for seven years."

Talking to reporters, Bush said Reagan's endorsement was "just great ... I couldn't have been more pleased.

The White House, responding to reports describing the endorsement as lukewarm, put out a follow-up statement on Thursday.

On another topic, Bush refused to answer questions about a reports of a U.S. offer to Panamanian strongman Manuel Antonio

Noreiga that would involve dropping American drug trafficking charges in exchange for Noriega's stepping down from power.







# Britain's most damaging double agent dies in Moscow

**Associated Press Writer** 

LONDON (AP) - Upper-crust Englishman Harold "Kim" Philby, who for nearly three decades spied for the Soviets from the heights of British intelligence, died a decorated KGB officer in Moscow Wednesday. He was 76.

The Foreign Office said it learned from the Soviet Embassy in London that Philby had died Wednesday. The embassy gave no cause of death. Four months ago, Philby said he was suffering from arrhythmia, a heart irregularity.

The most damaging double agent in modern British history, the suave, handsome Philby sent many Western agents to their deaths.

With three now-deceased colleagues he met at Cambridge University in the 1930s — Donald Maclean, Guy Burgess and Anthony Blunt - Philby turned Britain's most precious secrets over to the Kremlin

By extension, he betrayed the United States, too, since he was privy to top-secret information exchanged by the two allies.

Tass, the official Soviet news agency, today eulogized Philby as an "outstanding" master spy who helped defend the Soviet Union from Western intelligence. It did not say how or where he died.

Tass said Philby waged "a direct the British intelligence agency. battle against the special services

of capitalist countries, whose activity was directed against the Soviet Union, against the movement for peace and progress."

Philby was on his way to becoming head of British intelligence when he came under suspicion in 1951, when Maclean and Burgess who had been posted at the British Embassy in Washington — fled to

Philby was forced to resign from the service the following year, but he continued to free-lance for MI6,

By the time he was unmasked as

Burgess and Maclean in time for them to escape British punishment, Philby was settling into Moscow as a senior KGB officer.

The Maclean-Burgess-Philby spy scandals damaged the exchange of intelligence information between Britain and the United States for years. But of perhaps even more profound impact in Britain was that the establishment's own could be traitors. In 1979. Blunt's treachery was

exposed publicly. In exchange for information, he had been allowed

the "Third Man" who tipped off to escape disgrace, to receive a knighthood and to serve as the queen's art adviser for years.

Philby's death was front-page news in Britain today. The Times and other papers referred to him as Traitor Philby.

There was no immediate comment from Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's government But legislator Ted Leadbitter of the socialist opposition Labor Party said Philby's death "brings an end, I hope, to the unhappiest period of betrayal of this century.

Philby told Phillip Knightley of

The Times of London in January, in his first and only press interview with a Western reporter, that he had no regrets, except for personal friends he lost Asked "Would you do it all

again?'' Philby replied: Absolutely.

He said he had found peace, that he was happy in his fourth marriage, to a Russian woman, and felt

Moscow to be his home. Harold Adrian Russell Philby was born on New Year's Day 1912 in India, where his father was a colonial official, and was nicknamed Kim after the boy spy hero of a Rudyard Kipling story

His father was Harry St. John Bridger Philby, an eccentric explorer of Arabia who converted to Islam and settled in Beirut, the Lebanese capital.

Later Philby would write that he never felt patriotism toward any country

At Cambridge, he fell under communism's spell. In those days of depression and early fascism, it was not unusual for idealistic young Englishmen to look to Moscow

'The Western democracies in the 1930s were too weak and corrupt to fight Nazi Germany," Philby wrote in his autobiography, "My Silent War," published after he defected.

Knightley said a secret Philby

guarded to the last was who first recruited him as a spy for the Soviets in 1934 not long after he returned from Vienna, where he had been helping communists escape from the Austrian

authorities In 1940, Philby joined British intelligence and rose to become head of its anti-Soviet section. In 1949, he went to Washington as Britain's liaison officer with the CIA and

A decade after Burgess and Maclean fled to Moscow, evidence of Philby's involvement in espionage with them continued to

mount On Jan. 23, 1963, while working as a journalist in Beirut, Philby failed to pick up his third wife for a party. Six months later, the Soviet newspaper Izvestia announced he was in Moscow

Later, Philby claimed MI6 deliberately engineered his defection, fearing embarrassment if he stood trial in England.

After an initial hero's welcome in Moscow, Philby sank into obscurity and confessed to Knightley that he went through depression and began heavy drinking when he believed the KGB no longer had any use for him.

Philby had several children. One, a son John, lives in London. John's wife said the family had no comment on Philby's death.

# Chemical warfare

# Study finds safety low in research

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon has "serious deficiencies" in the way it manages the safety of its research programs into chemical and biological warfare, a Senate subcommittee's staff report maintains.

The review found "inadequate regulations, lax safety enforcement and documented safety lapses," said the report by the majority staff of the Senate Governmental Affairs oversight subcommittee.

The study, released Wednesday, noted that it did not examine "the current safety practices of particular facilities conducting ... research. Nor does it reach final conclusions as to whether ... research is being conducted in a safe manner "

Air Force Maj. Randy Morger, a Pentagon spokesman, said today that Defense Department officials hadn't seen the report. "We need to look at it carefully, but we're greatly concerned when there are questions from any corner about possible safety issues in programs overseen by the Department of Defense.

The United States recently began building new chemical weapons, after halting the program in 1969. The nation produces no germ weapons and has unilaterally renounced the use of biological weapons, but does conduct research into chemical weapons that might be used against American troops

Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich., chairman of the subcommittee, said he plans to hold hearings later this year to discuss the Pentagon's safety practices in the two research fields

The study noted that U.S. spending on the programs has increased sharply during President Reagan's two terms, from about \$63 million in 1980 to \$348 million in 1986.

The number of laboratories involved in research has also increased, the study found. There are about 150 labs doing Pentagonsponsored research in chemical and germ

The subcommittee staff said it was "unable to locate a comprehensive safety program ..., that is, a readily identifiable set of safety regulations and an office with overall safety

In the biological weapons area, the review found that "there is no comprehensive set of safety regulations for research" with biological warfare agents and toxins, "no emphasis on safety in the contractor program and no office that monitors contractor safety.

For chemical weapons, the approach is better, although it also "appears to have major shortcomings," the study said.



# **Child-safety** restraint usage rising

AUSTIN (AP) — Use of childsafety restraints in motor vehicles has increased slightly from last year, but 1988 figures are below those of the peak reached two years ago, the state highway department reported Thursday.

According to a survey conducted in March, the rate of compliance with Texas' 1984 child safety-seat law stood at 50.6 percent, compared with 49.9 percent in 1987. The peak in 1986 was nearly 60 percent.

Austin had the highest compliance rate -67.5 percent - in the March survey, while Brownsville had the lowest at 14.7 percent.

The statistics are based on an annual survey by the Texas Transportation Institute in which 15,000 observations were made of how, and whether, newborn to 4-year-old children were protected in vehicles

The observations were made around shopping centers and daycare facilities.







# Midland parish dreams of building a shrine

Midland church has a dream establishing the first shrine to the Virgin Mary in West Texas.

The pastor and members of Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church in Midland envision a grotto, a domed worship amphitheater

"It's meant to augment faith," says the Rev. Domingo Estrada, pastor of the 1,500-family Roman Catholic church made up of mostly Hispanics. "We are really drawing from what is already there — a deep faith of the people in the mercy of God through Jesus Christ.

"In West Texas, we don't have a shrine to Mary like the Lourdes (in France) or the (Our Lady of) Fatima (in Portugal)," Estrada

"Our contention has always been that people without vision will perish, and people without a dream will founder," he said. "The devotional faith of the people is augmented (by the


The church's response to the vision of the domed grotto, held by Estrada and the late Rev. Jim Norman, has been "so affirmative," Estrada said.

"It's like everything you do," he said. "You've got to take one step at a time, and you've got to go slow.

Building of the grotto would be expensive, Estrada said, "but it can be done." The grotto would include tiered seating for 900, a 40-foot berm, and a 20-foot statue of Our Lady of Guadalupe, who. according to church history, appeared in Mexico in 1531 as the Virgin Mary with Jewish features and the complexion of an Aztec

"She was greater than the sun god," Estrada said. "She was greater than the moon god. Yet, she wasn't greater than that which she was adorning - God through Jesus Christ."

Our Lady of Guadalupe brought the Indians who were oppressed by Europeans "great dignity and freedom," Estrada said. She ap-

The envisioned shrine, in addition to being a devotional place for the faithful, would also serve "to lead others to the Lord," the

priest says Today, members of the 28-year old church are proving they have the wherewithal to build the shrine by their efforts on smaller projects, their pastor says.

Parishioners are donating their design skills, craftsmanship and labors in building a Sacristy for the Holy Chalice and other sacred vessels and vestments, an upper room for storage, and a Eucharistic Adoration Room adjacent to the church building an A-frame edifice that Estrada describes as "majestic."

"If you can do the smaller one (project), then it's possible to do the larger one — to show that it can be done," Estrada said.



structures be demolished upon compliance with the prerequisites set out below and in accordance with the detailed requirements hereinafter specified.

The Building Official shall cause a copy of this decision to be mailed by certified mail, return receipt requested, and by ordinary mail to the owners and all persons, including lien holders, determined from official public records to have a legal interest in the property and to be published in a paper of general circulation within the County and after ten (10) days has elapsed from the publication date, or the date the returned receipt

shall commence as follows: The Director of Public Works shall direct the Street and Utilities Departments to effect the demolition of the structure to include water and wastewater tap facilities. The lot shall be finished to a grade that will allow a hand-held push mower to be used in the maintenance of the property thereafter. An accurate record of all time, equip-ment and other charges associated with the abatement of the substandard structures shall be presented to the City Secretary, who shall fill an appropriate lien against the property for the

charges incurred. The effective date of this decision shall be the date which is ten (10) days after the said publication date or the date the returned receipt is returned The Building Official is hereby ordered to file with this Board a copy of this decision as published along with the complete publishers affidavit and said return receipt


