Council to consider waste service rate increase

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Tuesday, October 13, at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers, 619 Main St. This meeting is being held on Tuesday due to the Columbus Day holiday on Monday October 12

Among the items on the agenda will be consideration of a rate increase effective November 1, 2009, charged by Allied Waste Services.

Other items to be considered will be approving the Friona Star as the city's official newspaper. This action is taken each year to designate the Friona Star for official public and legal notices.



An ordinance concerning junked vehicles to be declared a public nuisance will be considered for action. Certain changes to the city's personnel policies will be discussed. A proclamation declaring November 2-6, 2009, as Municipal Court Week will be approved.

Also on the agenda will be consideration of a carport variance at 1211 Washington requested by Ricardo Estrada and a water meter request by Jayson Grimsley for a meter to be located outside the city limits. Approval of the accounts payable and financial statements will be considered.

Council meetings are opened with roll call, invocation, and the pledge of allegiance, followed by time on the agenda for public comments. The council cannot take action on comments or requests made during the public comments portion of the agenda. All city council meetings are open to the public.

I can't pronounce it but it's Meatballs with Roasted Garlic, Olives, and Tomato. Serve these meatballs with crusty bread to soak up the sauce. Cook the meatballs and the sauce in the same pan-the flour that coats the meatballs helps to thicken the sauce.

To roast garlic, cut off the top quarter of the garlic head. Wrap in foil and roast at 375 about one hour or until soft. Unwrap and cool 15 minutes. Squeeze garlic pulp into a bowl and mash.

Before you get the idea I became a chef overnight, this long complicated recipe with lots of weird ingredients came from the October issue of Relish Magazine. Seems like a lot of trouble for meatballs but if you are a cook that likes a food challenge this one's for you. Look it over, make a list, and go grocery shopping.




1/2 cup tsakistes or bestquality olives pitted and halved 1/2 cup kalamata olives, pitted and halved Fresh parsley, dill, and mint chopped (optional) 2 tsp dried oregano

- 1. To prepare meatballs, combine pork and the next ten ingredients (pork thru mustard) in a large bowl. In a separate bowl, soak bread in milk until saturated. Remove bread from milk, squeezing to drain off extra milk. Add bread and excess milk to meat mixture; mix well. Shape mixture into 24 golf ball size meatballs. Dredge in flour.
- 2. Heat oil in a Dutch oven. Add meatballs; cook until brown on all sides. Remove and drain on paper towels.
- 3. Add oil, sliced garlic and onions to pan; sauté until golden brown, about 5 minutes. Add wine; stir to loosen brown bits. Cook until most of the liquid is absorbed, 10 to 15 minutes. Add broths and tomatoes. Stir, breaking up tomatoes a bit. Add bay leaf. Simmer 30 minutes. Add meatballs to sauce. Cook one hour.
- 4. Just before serving, add olives, fresh herbs (if desired), and oregano. Stir to combine. Serve.

Alamo exhibit at PPH Museum


Immediately after the battle took place, the Alamo was regarded with an almost religious fervor; however, during the past century and a half, the story of the Alamo has evolved into a symbol with much less respect.

In Remembering the Alamo, 1836-2009, opening October 10 in the Mary E. Bivins Gallery, an eclectic assortment of Alamo kitsch, photographs, art and music will reflect the transformation of the Alamo as a sublime Texas symbol to a souvenir and branding symbol.

During the 50 years after 1836, travelers often took chunks of stone from the Alamo church as souvenirs but, in an effort to discourage the practice, German-made porcelain Alamo items and souvenir spoons became available in the late 1880s and remained popular until World War I. During the 1920s, most souvenirs were produced in the United States and Japan, and when the depression hit, the cheaper, domestically-produced plaster and thinly-plated metal items became popular.

Until the 1950s, most Alamo souvenirs and other items related to remembering the Alamo were relatively serious, some almost religious in nature. The popularity of Walt Disney's Davy Crockett movies and television programs increased interest in the Alamo and resulted in the production of many different items made "to remember the Alamo", including the first toys relating to the battle.

Since that time, the Alamo battle has been regarded increasing less seriously than it was prior to World War II, as reflected in Alamo souvenirs, movies, product labeling and other popular culture. The exhibit continues through March 12, 2010.

Jeremiah, the prophet, was called at an early age and he had a ministry of over 40 years in which he followed God and was a spokesman to the people. Sounds easy, but it wasn't. First, Jeremiah became rejected, ignored and even persecuted by his own people. Notice in Jeremiah 18:11-12, 18, he tells the people that God requires them to repent of their sin and follow God. Their response was one of rejection, sarcasm and slander. In fact, when Jeremiah spoke to the leaders in Chapter 19 about the sin in the land and God's coming judgment, he ended up being physically attacked and confined to the stocks (20:2).

In fact, looking at Jeremiah's life, he had few converts, was mistreated and ignored by the people in spite of living for God. In fact, God demands that those who would come to Him, through Jesus Christ, 'deny themselves, take up their cross and follow him'. Remember, the high cost of Jehovahcare is worth it, but true fellowship and unity with God is found only when you repent of sin (deny yourself) and trust in the Lord to forgive your sins and make you right with Him.
