tenwood. The original site of Cotton wood Springs was along the headwaters of Green Briar Creek, presently known as Tur-key Creek and was some hun-dred yards east of the present site of Cottonwood, where J. area yards east of the present site of Cottonwood, where J. W. Love had erected a store to supply the meager needs of the early settlers. After the Indans of the High Plains were subdued at the Palo Duro Canyon in 1874 by Gen-eral MacKenzie, early settlers began to pour into the Cotton-wood area of Callahan County, where they found abundant game, water and good soil for farming and ranching. Cotton-wood springs was one of the first villages founded in about 1875. It soon became a trading post for the southeastern part of Callahan County, Dr. H. O. Broadnax creeted one of the first store - a small log house, in which he lived and dispensed his meager supply of drugs. With the rapid influx of pop-ulation and the arrival of the Texas & Pacific Railroad, Cot-tonwood Springs grew rapidly. Elias Norton installed a small gin on the banks of the creek a short distance east of pre-sent Cottonwood. Bill Orr ran one of the first blacksmith shops in that part of the coun-ty. they found abundant game, water and good soil for ranch-ing, farming. Cottonwood Springs, at head of Green Briar Creek, was one of first villages founded (in 1875). The town soon became a trading center for Southeastern part of County. It had several stores, two churches, and a school; and although usually peaceful, it experienced many gun battles. The town name was shorten-ed to Cottonwood after first post office was established in 1883.
