## Drivers needed for cancer patients

The American Cancer Society Road to Recovery program is currently seeking volunteer drivers to drive patients to treatment centers and home again.

The local Relay for Life

committee will host a training session Wednesday November 11 from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce office. Lunch will be provided.

Interested volunteers can contact the Chamber office at 250-3491 to sign up. An RSVP by Monday November 9 will be appreciated. Relay for Life chairman Greg Lewellen says they need at least five volunteers to have the training session.

"Once we have trained drivers we will have a sign-up list available at the Chamber for those cancer patients needing transpor-

tation to and from treatments and appointments," Lewellen said.

All volunteers must have a valid driver license and current insurance. One cancer patient requiring radiation therapy could need anywhere from 20 to 30 trips to treatment in six weeks. A patient receiving chemo might report for treatment weekly for up to a year. In many cases a patient is driven to hospitals or clinics by relatives or friends but even these patients must occasionally seek alternative transportation. That is where Road to Recovery drivers can help.

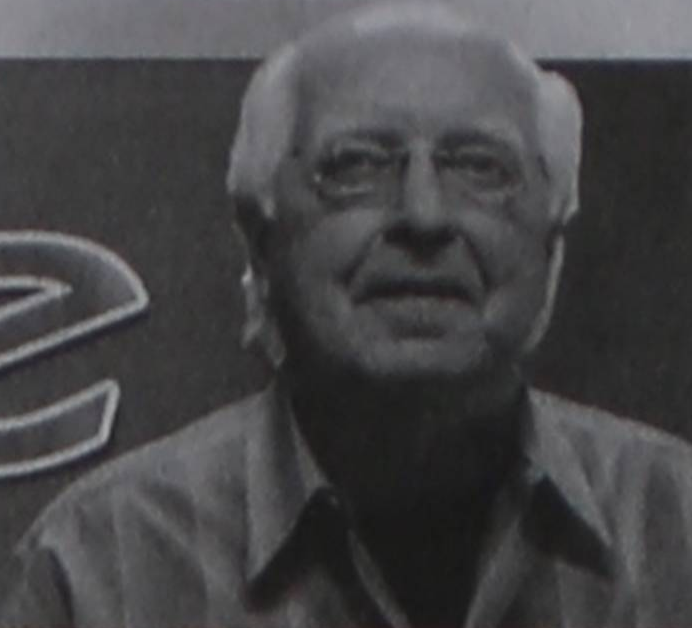

## Most divisive President in history?

He was overwhelmingly embraced and broadly admired. Even his detractors found him charismatic, attractive, and likeable. His most adamant political opponents wished him well. And Americans from all walks of life looked upon him as a breath of fresh air, a dynamic young leader who could, if he wished, lead the nation into a modern-day "Era of Good Feelings."

Unfortunately, Barack Obama didn't wish. And we didn't know.

Instead, this son of fortune, this man who was born at exactly the right time and nurtured under precisely the right conditions to become America's first black President, chose to be the what many now see as most divisive President in American history. And so, the latest Gallop Poll informs us, Barack Obama's popularity has collapsed faster than any other President since the polling process began more than 50 years ago.

There is a Bible verse that best explains this unprecedented fall from favor. It is repeated so often one would think that even the most casual Christian would know it and commit it to heart: "Those who live by the sword die by the sword". Barack Obama has wielded his "terrible swift sword" in a ruthless, reckless effort to eviscerate all who dare question his every directive.

And the double-edged blade is severing his ties to the American people. And, far worse, their ties to each other.

Now, just 10 months into Barack Obama's presidency, the American people see him as a disturbingly troubled soul whose vengeful bitterness seems to dictate his every move. A scowling succubus whose anger seems to know no surcease. A ticking, frenetic time bomb whose fits of pique seem increasingly excessive and dangerously out of control.

And his White House Enemies List grows exponentially by the day.

When confronted with broad-based, grassroots opposition to his government takeover of the health care system, he ordered up a White House website urging everyday Americans to spy on each other and report back to him any and all criticism "even in casual conversation".

When criticized by talk show host Rush Limbaugh with the same verve (and many of the same terms) he has used to take on Bill Clinton, George Bush, and scores of other officeholders and candidates, the thin-skinned Obama personally attacked the veteran broadcaster and ordered his grizzly communications staff to maintain the assault.

When taken to task by Fox News' Glenn Beck for appointing an unprecedented plethora of White House "czars" - unapproved by Congress, answerable only to Obama, himself - he flew into a fit of rage, denouncing the anchor and, again, ordering his staff to mount an assault.

And when Fox News president Roger Ailes refused a White House "request" to reign in its reporters and end their string of exposés, Obama unleashed the most vicious and sustained attack on a TV network in broadcast

history. He even went so far as to order Fox barred from news conferences - until the other networks rose up in protest.

The pattern is all too clear. And far too foreboding. Barack Obama is clearly a man who cannot abide criticism and will not tolerate dissent. Those who dare depart from his narcissistic orthodoxy soon find themselves first shunned, then scorned, and finally attacked as enemies of the state.

So, it is no wonder that in just 10 short months, Obama has seen his popularity fall faster than any President in modern history. He has intentionally pitted the young against the old, the poor against the rich, workers against management, black against white, women against men - and all who live and breathe against those around them who dare occupy the same space.

In so doing, Barack Obama has cleaved the once-cohesive spirit of the American people. And this man who too late the American people have come to know clearly has no intention of ever beating his sword of vengeance into a ploughshare of national unity. Such is the price we pay for sewing the wind - and reaping his whirlwind.

## Soup for the season

The season for soup is upon us. Cold cloudy days mean warm soup. Soup is comfort food and a nice solution for those nights you just don't feel like cooking.

Found this recipe in one of those inspirational booklets at Bi-Wize. After you bring your Halloween pumpkin indoors you can scrape out the seeds, then roast the pumpkin seeds for garnish. (Misty Frye says to bake them with butter, garlic salt, and Worcestershire.)

### Pumpkin Black Bean Soup

Serves 5

- 2 cans black beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 can (14.5 oz) diced tomatoes
- 1 can (16 oz) pumpkin puree
- 1/2 cup red onions chopped
- 2 garlic cloves minced
- 4 tbsp olive oil
- 4 cups vegetable broth
- 1 tsp ground cumin
- 1 tsp each kosher salt, cinnamon, allspice
- 1/2 tsp ground pepper
- 3 tbsp balsamic vinegar
- Baked pumpkin seeds for garnish

1. Place oil, red onion, garlic, and seasonings into a large pot.
2. Cook on low-medium heat until red onion and garlic brown.
3. Puree the beans and tomatoes with half of the vegetable broth. Add pureed ingredients, pumpkin, and rest of broth to your pot.
4. Simmer uncovered until thick, about 40-45 minutes. Before serving, stir in balsamic vinegar. Garnish with baked pumpkin seeds.

### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Hank Gilbert (D-Whitehouse), a candidate for Texas Governor, issued the following statement regarding the announcement by Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid that the Senate would go forward with healthcare reform legislation which includes a public option:

"Contrary to the rightwing noise-boxes that manage to get themselves on television and radio in Texas, Texans overwhelmingly favor legislation which would include a public option.

The Senate's bill contains provisions which will allow states to "opt out" of the public option. What this means for Texas largely depends upon who the governor is and the make up of the Texas Legislature after the plan passes. If we have Rick Perry, Kay Bailey Hutchison, or any of my other opponents, it will be nothing more than remaining at the status quo for us.

I favor the public option. Due to monopolies in many states and other non-competitive practices, there is no other realistic way to force the insurance companies to actually increase efficiency. There is no other way to make sure that everyone has access to affordable coverage which must be a key in any plan to unburden local and state governments from having to pay for indigent care."

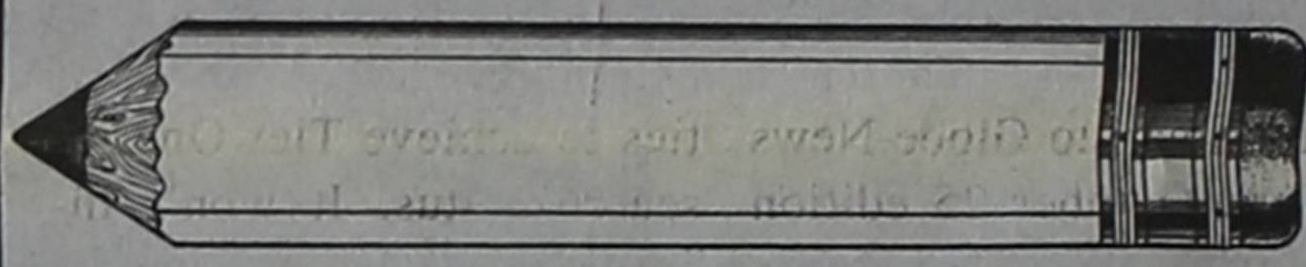

## Amendments election Tuesday Nov 3

Texans will be voting for 11 more amendments to the state constitution in a Tuesday, November 3 election. The polling place for Friona voters will be at the Calvary Baptist Church. Voters should bring voter registration card and photo identification.

The Amarillo Globe-News Sunday, October 25 edition recommended that voters should endorse all 11 amendments. The following is reprinted from the Globe News editorial concerning the amendments.

**Proposition 1** would authorize the financing, including through tax increment financing, the acquisition by cities and counties of buffer zones or open spaces to a military installation.

This amendment would prevent the encroachment by development onto property set aside for valuable military missions.

**Proposition 2** would authorize the Legislature to provide for ad valorem taxes of a residence homestead on the basis of its value.

This proposed amendment reduces the cap on how much property values can increase.

**Proposition 3** provides for uniform standards and procedures for the appraisal of property for tax purposes.

Critics say this measure

establishes a state property tax. It doesn't. It establishes uniform appraisal standards across the state.

**Proposition 4** establishes a university research fund for emerging universities.

This is a big one for Texas Tech University, which is vying with other universities to achieve Tier One research status. It won't increase taxes, but will enable universities to dip into a \$500 million dormant fund to reward universities for seeking to upgrade research programs.

**Proposition 5** would authorize the Legislature to set up a single board of equalization for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that seek to provide for consolidated equalizations.

This amendment helps rural counties, such as those in the Panhandle, to combine appraisal districts to save money and increase efficiency.

**Proposition 6** would allow the state to increase its debt to give the Veterans Land Board greater flexibility in approving loans for veterans.

**Proposition 7** would allow members of the Texas State Guard or other military reserve units to hold civilian office.

The current prohibition deprives dedicated Texans

of the right to serve their community while serving their state and nation.

**Proposition 8** authorizes the state to contribute money, property and other resources for the operation of veterans hospitals in the state.

This amendment is aimed at setting up a veteran's hospital in the Rio Grande Valley.

**Proposition 9** guarantees public access to Texas beaches.

This proposed amendment strengthens the Open Beaches Act, which already allows public access to the Gulf of Mexico beaches. It's a right Texans should continue to enjoy.

**Proposition 10** extends to four years the length of terms for emergency services commissioners.

Two-year terms aren't long enough for these commissioners to learn their jobs adequately.

**Proposition 11** strengthens restrictions on the taking of private land for public use.

This amendment speaks directly to the Texas ethic of protecting private property owners' rights against overzealous government seizure through "eminent domain". Any land seized must be set aside for use by the public at-large.

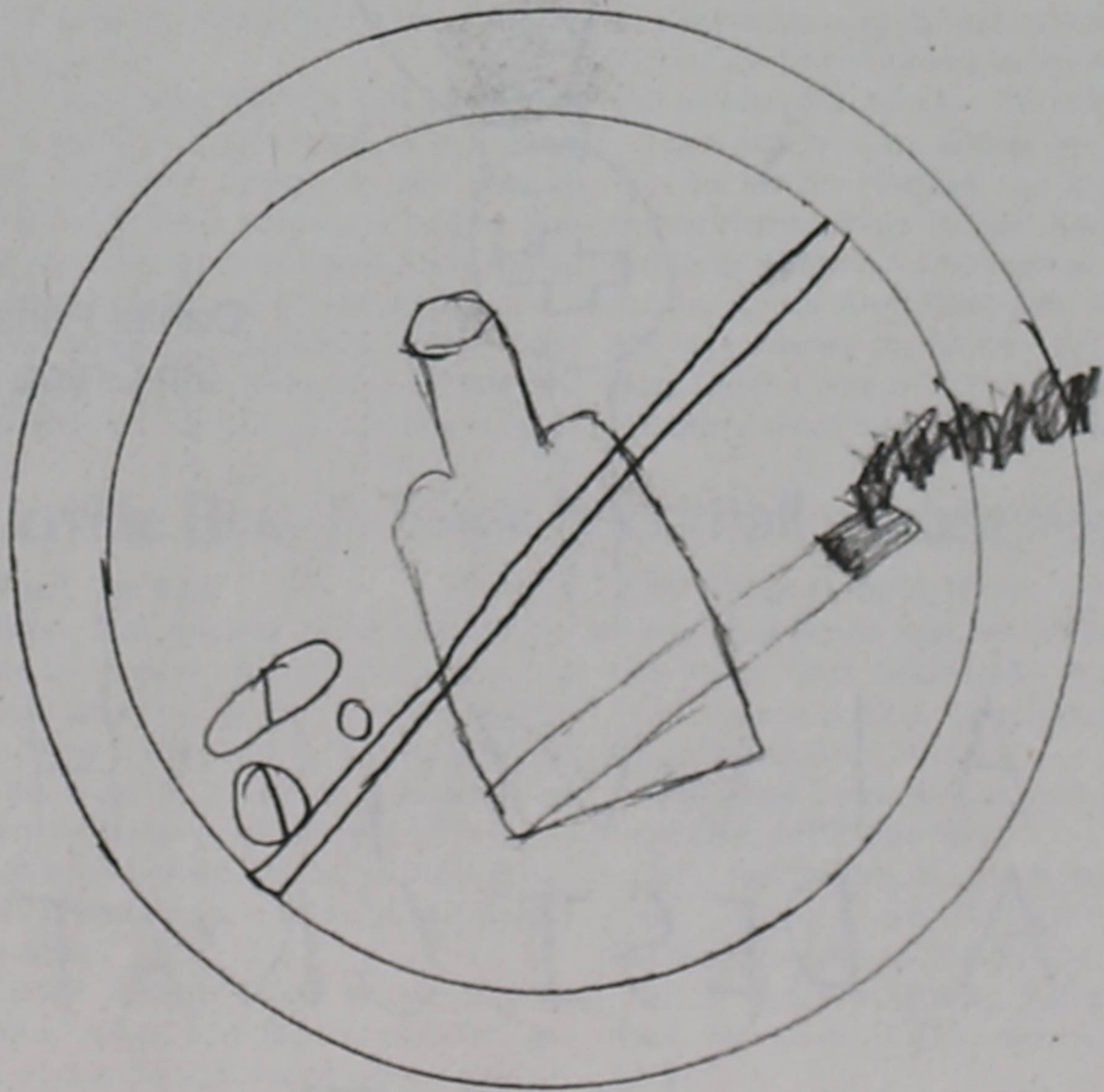

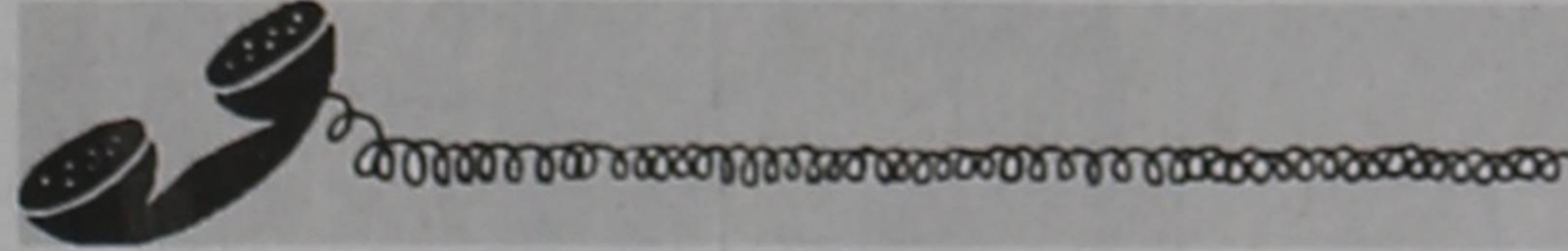
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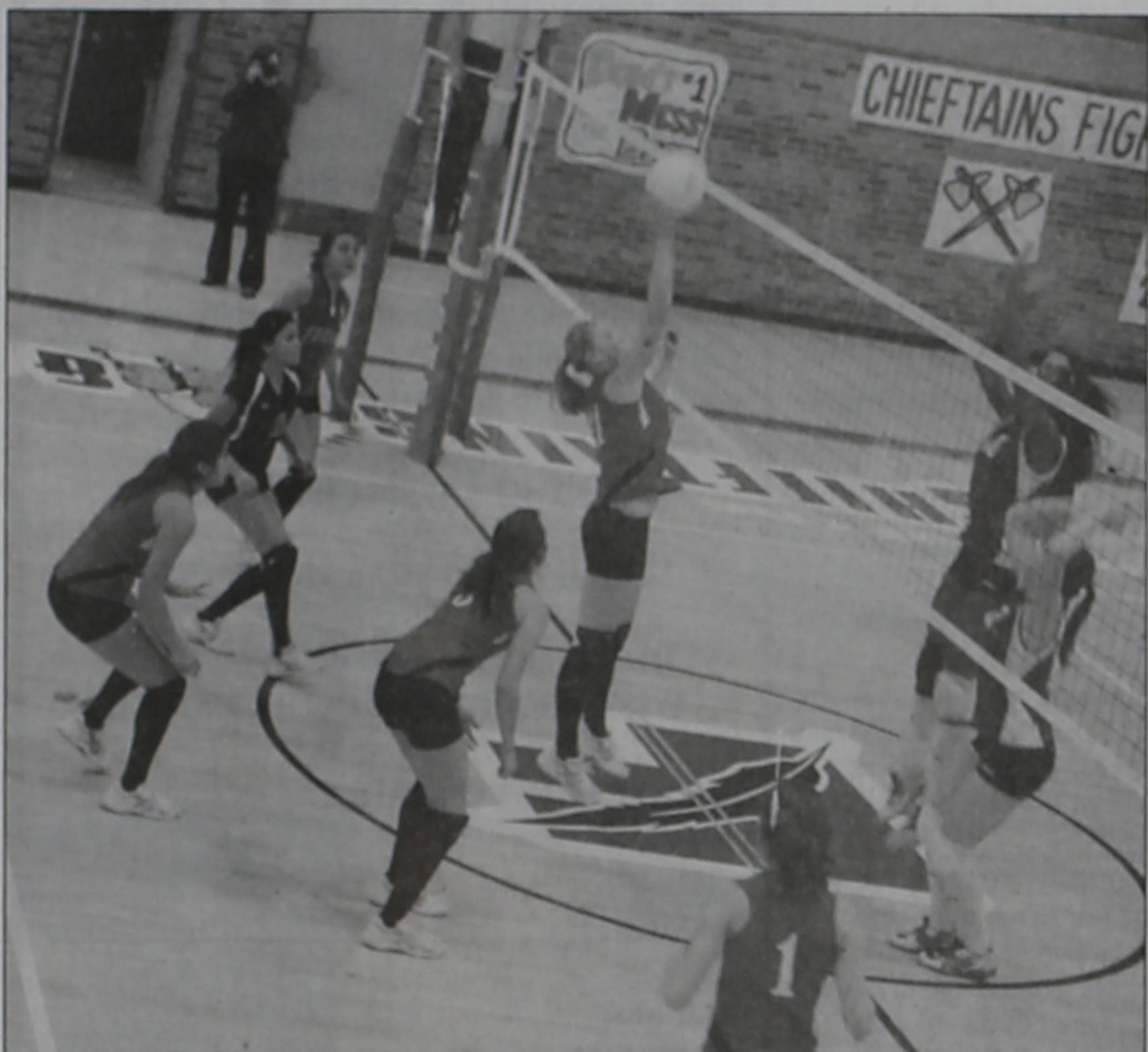

## Farmers will be harmed by cap and trade

There's something the Democratic lawmakers who are pushing cap and trade legislation don't want the public to know. The controversial climate change legislation winding its way through Congress will impose a massive new national gas tax, raising the cost of gasoline and diesel and jet fuels. An analysis of the Waxman-Markey cap and trade bill revealed this gas tax hike will reach \$3.6 trillion and it will impact every American and important segments of our economy.

The goal of this climate change legislation is to actually increase the price of traditional forms of carbon-based energy, such as coal, gas, and oil, so that consumers will respond by using less of it. Some lawmakers call this "setting the price on carbon". Economists refer to this

kind of policy as a price signal. But the bottom line is that the price of energy will go up. Ultimately, all Americans will directly or indirectly pay for the higher fuel prices the cap and trade legislation will precipitate.

Americans travel over 200 million vehicle miles each month, and annually we spend nearly \$1.2 trillion on gasoline and oil. The average household spends five percent of its annual budget on fuel. For many, gasoline is a mandatory expense. And this legislation disproportionately hits middle and lower income households that tend to have longer daily commutes and must drive in order to work. These families will be hit especially hard by the projected \$1 per gallon increase for the additional gas tax the cap and trade legislation will bring.

Further, Americans will be double-hit by the gas tax when it results in higher prices for goods and services, such as groceries or utilities, that they must continue to purchase. Energy costs are among businesses' top operational expenses already. While companies face a variety of energy expenses, ranging from heating and cooling their workspace to powering equipment and lighting, operating their vehicles is the most costly. Every company from the small town local florist to a package delivery service with nationwide operations will be hard hit. In order for these businesses to withstand the heavier tax burden and to remain profitable, they will be forced to pass these energy cost increases along to consumers through higher

prices.

Several industries will be more severely penalized by the gas tax than others. Our nation's farmers and ranchers, who are tasked with producing high quality goods for much of the world, will be harmed by Waxman-Markey's \$2 trillion tax on gasoline and \$1.3 trillion tax on diesel fuel. Gas and diesel-fuel powered equipment, ranging from tractors to combines to fertilizing systems, are the operational foundation of American farms and ranches. Under the climate change legislation, they will face \$550 million in higher fuel costs in 2020 and \$1.65 billion in 2050.

The American trucking industry will be another target of the cap and trade gas tax. In 2007, 1.7 million drivers of tractor-trailers logged 145 billion vehicle miles, consuming 28.5 billion gallons of fuel. That equates to \$34,560 in annual fuel costs. That number will skyrocket under Waxman-Markey. And when you consider that the average self-employed truck driver earns \$43,545 in net revenue, the gas tax is essentially a new tax on the middle class. Of course, truckers will not suffer these higher gas taxes alone. Their costs are shared by all consumers. At some point, nearly everything bought or sold must be shipped from a manufacturer to a retailer. Thus, the sweeping effects of the gas tax will actually harm our entire economy.

Despite all this pain for families, farmers, truckers, and businesses, there is no gain for our environment. Even the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Administrator, Lisa Jackson, admits unless China and India impose similar draconian taxes and regulations there will be no effect on world temperatures. So what is the purpose of the increase in costs to every American, and the consequent loss of jobs, if they will not have an effect on the global environment?

Under the majority Congressional leadership, trillion dollar figures have been discussed so nonchalantly in Washington recently that, unfortunately, they're starting to lose their shock value. Americans must know that the \$3.6 trillion gas tax is a very real number with consequences for all of us. That is why I will fight the Waxman-Markey and Kerry-Boxer bills. We can improve the environment and economy through American ingenuity and technology advancement, not with taxes and mandates that increase costs and burden American families and businesses.

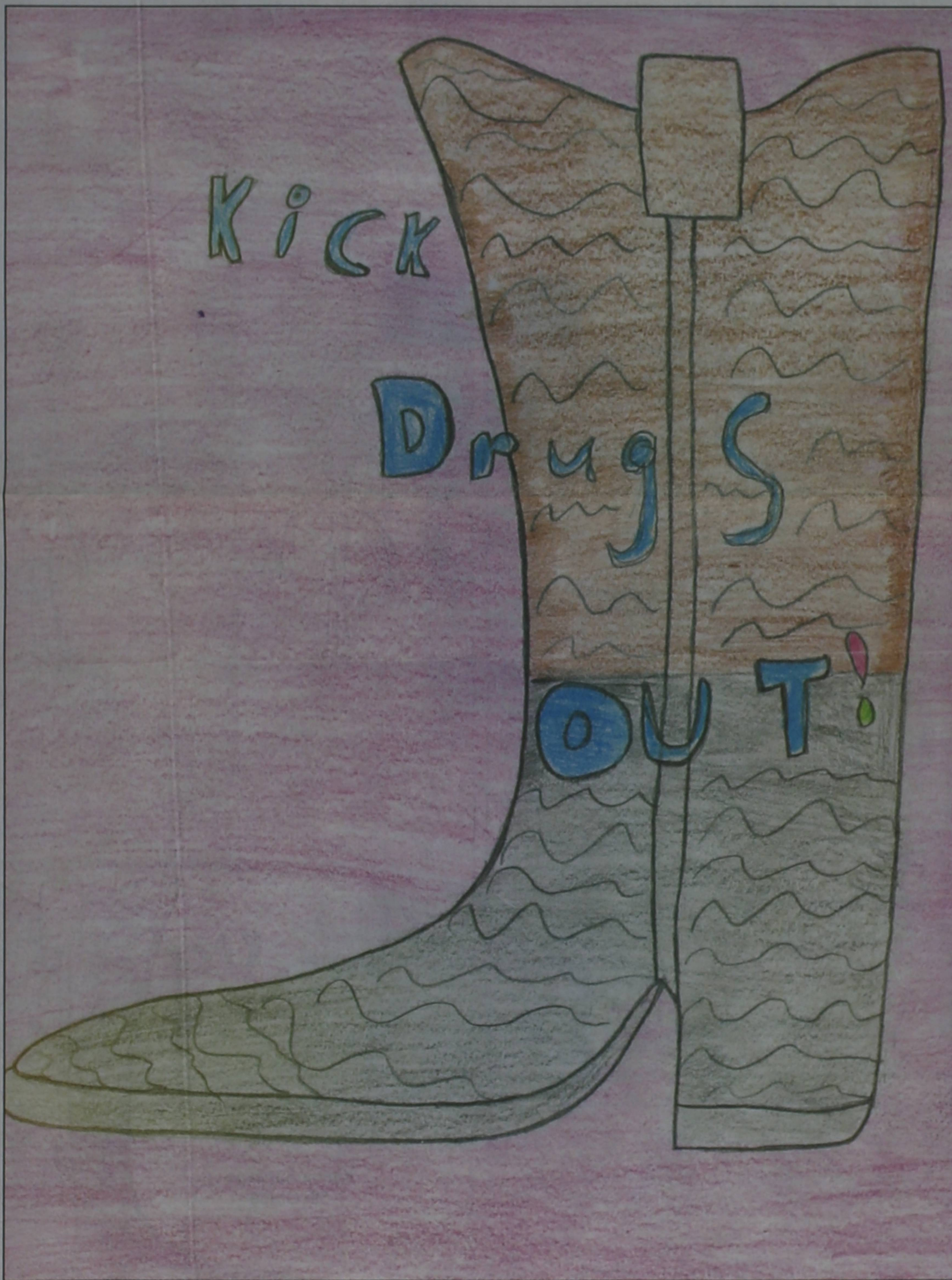

asked to express their thoughts about Red Ribbon Week through drawings.

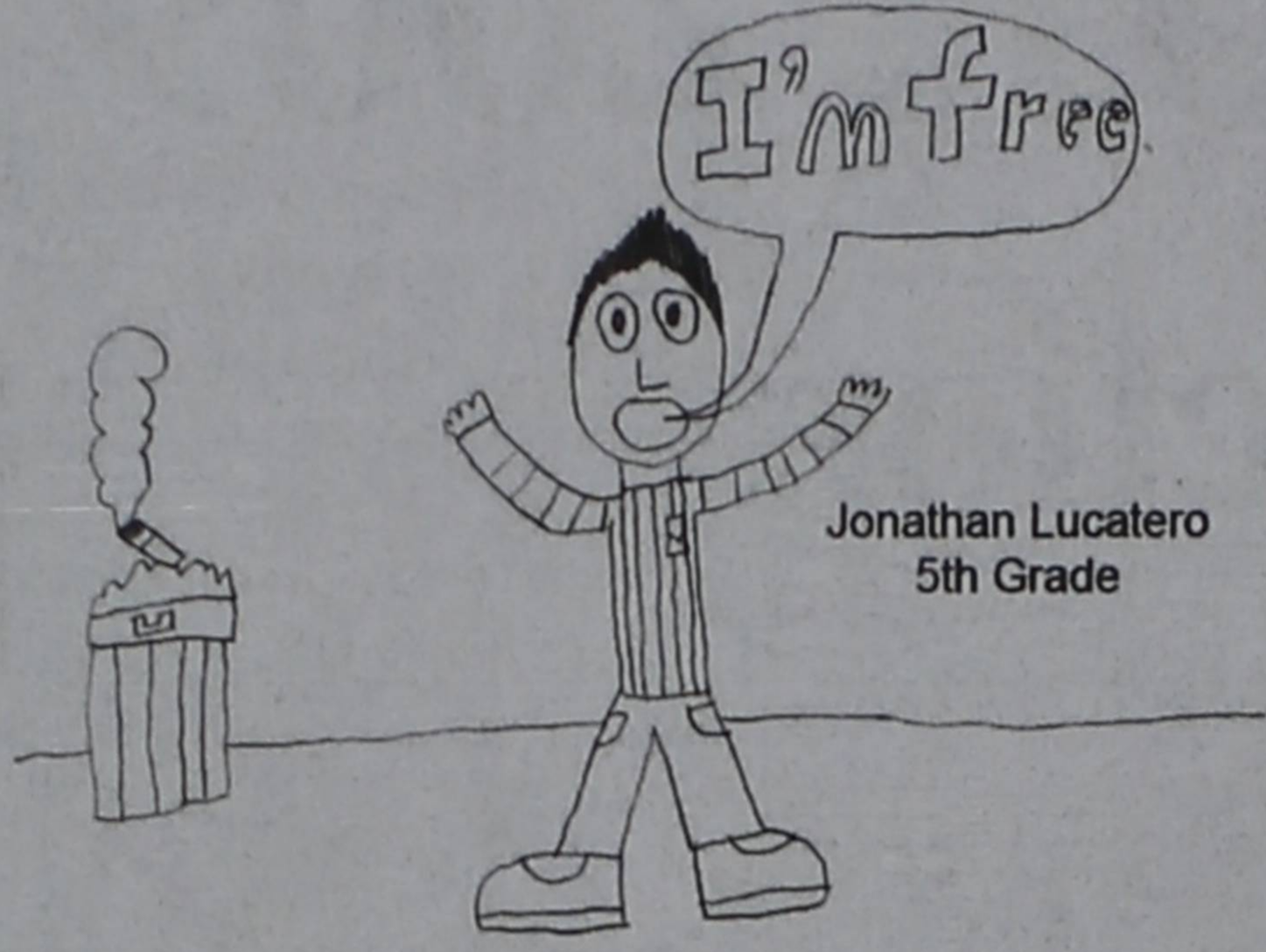
In this special section are about 55 drawings submitted by the youngsters depicting a variety of drug awareness messages.
