Rape Crisis grant

BIG SPRING - The Big Spr ing Rape Crisis/Victim Services Center was awarded a federal grant recently, allowing the center to continue its expanded operations.

Lisa Brooks, center director, said the program received grant monies totaling \$37,508 for a nine-month period. The money was made available through the federal Victim's Crime Act and is administered by the criminal justice division of the Texas governor's office.

Brooks said the money, which makes up the bulk of the center's \$70,000 annual budget, will allow the center to keep two full-time and two part-time employees, and to provide ser vices to victims of rape as well as other violent crimes

"This is a big chunk," she said. "The grant basically pays for everything except our rape crisis program and it pays for a great deal of that too.

This is the third year the center has received the grant, Brooks said. When it was first awarded, it allowed the center to expand from services for just rape victims to services for victims of violent crimes.

"It's something you have to reapply for every year, but we consider it a boost of confidence that we got total funding for what we requested," she said.

The center's victim services programs include guidance through the criminal justice process and assistance in applying for aid monies to cover items such as medical bills or lost wages.

500 inmates promised to private prison

 ${\bf BIG\ SPRING\ -\ A\ proposed}$ Howard County private prison has commitments to house 500 low-risk inmates a private prison official said today.

Commitments between the local proposed facility, Private Prisons of America Limited (PPAL), and another private prison already in existance is the "most positive aspect" in recent developments with the private prison proposal, said Frank Powell, chief executive officer of PPAL. Powell declined to give the name of the other private prison, saying he was not sure the owner wanted the publicity.

Powell said he is unsure whether the inmates PPAL has a commitment to house are state or federal prisoners, but said that they are low-risk inmates

an underwriter to finance the proposed Howard County private prison, estimated to cost about \$30 million. PPAL has hired a group to search for the best financing and might reach a decision concerning a financial underwriter in about two weeks, he said.

Powell said the next step for the private prison business will be to locate

Howard County Judge John Coffee said today he considers news of prisoner commitments as a good sign. "I would think so, I would think that would be a prerequisite to them getting financing," he said.

Coffee said the county's role in the project may include attempting to find a site for the proposed facility after PPAL has arranged financing.

Powell said he believes it will not be difficult for PPAL to secure 500 low-risk inmates for Howard Coun-

ty and for the private prison's similiar proposed facility in Hale

"I wouldn't think so, all you have to do is look at the statistics," he

Powell said the PPAL will be able to fill both 525-bed facilities to 95 percent capacity. A second section of the facilities, able to house another 500 inmates, will come later, he said

PPAL — which does not yet have a facility built in Howard County -

could begin receiving inmates as early as May, Powell said. "That's just a projection," he said.


Powell noted a commitment to hold inmates is not the same thing as a contract. A prison facility needs the approval of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards before it can make contracts with prison agencies such as the Texas Department of Corrections, he

"I don't know if it's illegal, but it's sure not kosher," he said

Powell said the next step for the private prison business will be to locate an underwriter to finance the proposed Howard County private prison, estimated to cost about \$30 million. PPAL has hired a group to search for the best financing and might reach a decision concerning a financial underwriter in about two weeks, he said.


After financing for the facilities has been arranged, the plan must be submitted to the Texas Attorney General's Office for approval. The state attorney general office's approval is required because the acility will be a "public offering."

Public offering means people will have an opportunity to purchase the certificates of participation from the financial underwriter, which puts up the money for the facility.

Area home values drop in Crossroads Country

Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of articles on the real estate market.

Herald Editor Single-resident home values are dropping everywhere except in Forsan, according to area ap-

praisal and tax assessor-collector offices The 105 homes in that city have an average value of \$16,839, a \$226 or a 1.4 percent increase from 1985.

That year, 106 homes had an

average value of \$16,163. Forsan also has the lowest average home value in comparison to five cities in Howard, Martin and Mitchell counties. Stanton has the

highest value at \$25,292. The city experiencing the largest drop in home values since 1985 is Colorado City. The 1,872 homes in that city are currently valued at an average of \$21,461.

That is a \$962 or 4.3 percent drop from the average value of \$22,423 for the 1,863 homes that were appraised four years ago, according to information supplied by the tax assessor-collector office in Colorado City.

That makes homes in Colorado City the fourth most expensive in the five area cities. Four years ago they were third and Coahoma, now third, was fourth. That was the only change in the stratification of the

cities according to average home values The next largest drop in average

values has occurred in Coahoma and Stanton. They both have experienced a two percent drop in the past four years. The drop in Big Spring was slightly less at 1.9 percent.

Information from the appraisal district in Howard County show that the 389 homes in Coahoma are valued at an average of \$22,544. That is an average price drop of \$447 from 1985 when 386 homes were valued at an average of \$22,097 each.

According to the appraisal office in Martin County, Stanton's 643 homes are currently valued at an average of \$25,292. Four years ago, 643 homes were valued at an average \$25,816. The average drop in price was \$524.

The 8,208 homes in Big Spring are valued at an average \$25,286, just \$6 less than Stanton's Homes. That difference was \$36 four years ago when the 8,315 homes in Big Spring were averaged at \$27,780. The drop in price was \$494.

Home values have plummeted even more in rural areas.

According to the figures provided by the appraisal district in Howard County, the average value of the 10,862 single resident homes in the cities and rural areas of MARKET page 2-A

Justice Department announced today it had filed suit against the cities of San Antonio, Beaumont, El Paso and Nacogdoches, alleging they failed to control toxic industrial discharges into their public sewage treatment systems.

Justice and the Environmental Protection Agency said San Antonio and Nacogdoches, however. had settled their cases with a consent agreement and would pay fines of \$225,000 and \$60,000 respectively, for past violations

In addition, the EPA said it has fined or was proposing penalties against six other Texas cities -Amarillo, Brownsville, Galveston, McAllen, Mineral Wells and Waxahachie - for alleged violations of the Clean Water Act.



Nurses stage sick-out

ANDREWS (AP) — Officials of Permian General Hospital and Andrews County commissioners will meet with a group of nurses today after an estimated 60 nurses called in sick in apparent protest over wages and benefits.

Falwell blasts Bakker

DALLAS (AP) — The Rev. Jerry Falwell said that evangelist Jim Bakker shouldn't blame him for the collapse of Bakker's PTL ministry, a Dallas newspaper reported.

Falwell told The Dallas Morning News that the damage to PTL occurred before he assumed control

Falwell made the comments in response to charges by Bakker this week during Bakker's fraud trial in Charlotte, N.C. Bakker wrapped up his testimony by saying Falwell had cheated PTL followers.

"The real conspiracy to defraud came from that group of people who took over the (PTL) ministry for their own selfish gains," Bakker testified. Bakker had invited Falwell to take over PTL when Bakker resigned in 1987 amid a money and sex scandal

Bakker said that if he had been allowed to continue raising money, he would have met all the ministry's financial needs.

Two dead, nine missing in gulf

Coast Guard spokesman Steve Guy at New Orleans said early today that initial reports had indicated that three were killed and three were injured and seven were missing. But he said later information revealed that only two had

Bentsen seeks oil, gas tax for Wetlands fund

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Lloyd Bentsen wants to tax oil and gas drilled on the outer continental shelf and use the revenues to protect coastal wetlands, but industry officials say the levy unfairly asks producers to remedy an erosion problem with many causes.

"The loss of wetlands is an onshore problem and is not confined to coastal areas or areas with oil and gas activity," says Joseph-Lastelic, a spokesman for the American Petroleum Institute.'

Lastelic blames urban develop ment, natural causes, the Mississippi River levy system, canals and agricultural for the decline of coastal wetlands, but environmentalists say off-shore drilling also has done a share of the damage and favor the concept of the proposed Coastal Wetlands Trust Fund.

Says Lastelic: "Since most of the causes of wetlands losses were unintended consequences of activities that provided public benefits, an equitable solution would be to fund wetlands conservation programs out of general revenues. It is unfair to tax a single industry to address a broad land use problem.





Inch by inch arms control

President Bush's resolve to move toward a world without chemical weapons is noble in vision, and his offer, in his U.N. speech, to cut U.S. poison gas stockpiles, if the Soviet Union follows suit, is a useful first move in that direction. But on chemical weapons, as on strategic arms, public relations grandeur has yet to be matched by presidential decisiveness and commitment to take more than hesitant steps

The U.S. offer to destroy 80 percent of its stock of chemical weapons is not as impressive as it sounds. Bush is proposing only to do what, for its own military reasons, the United States has already decided to do: destroy by 1997 thousands of tons of outmoded chemical weapons, which are deteriorating in storage, and replace them with safer and more effective binary chemical weapons.

The Bush offer, should it be implemented by the superpowers, may provide some impetus for smaller nations to join in negotiations for a global ban on production and possession of poison gas, often dubbed "the poor man's atom bomb." But it is equally possible that these countries may take their cues from elsewhere in Bush's proposal: his insistence that the United States produce a new generation of chemical weapons and retain some of its arsenal until every other nation joins a global ban.

If the United States, with its nuclear might, must retain a residual poison gas arsenal as a deterrent against a single holdout such as Iraq, why should Iran, Syria or Israel behave differently?

Bush's proposal does advance the general arms control dialogue. The U.S.-Soviet discussions in Wyoming concluded with a number of agreements to build mutual confidence in the arms control process. Secretary of State James Baker and his Soviet counterpart, Eduard Shevardnadze, agreed to expand exchanges of data on chemical weapons and try out verification inspections.

They decided, in principle, on new verification techniques for two unratified treaties on nuclear testing. They also reached agreement in principle to experiment with verification procedures for a Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty even before that treaty is concluded.

But those agreements, modestly useful as they seem to be, are also a sign of hesitancy. The administration, which inherited from Ronald Reagan the nearly finished framework of a START agreement, seems almost noncommittal about pushing that work to completion.

Just as the president's proposal on chemical arms. shows evidence that Bush had failed to resolve conflicts within the national security bureaucracy over the wisdom of a global poison gas ban, so does the lack of START progress reflect a lack of strong presidential commitment and leadership.

President Bush now says there is a "good likelihood" of a START treaty in time for the superpower summit next year. That will be true only if the president gets involved and begins pushing to exploit this historic moment of Soviet flexibility.

Earning big bucks in black market

LENINGRAD, U.S.S.R. -Dmitri yearns to be an American. In any other society, his family would have been well-to-do. His father is a respected doctor and his mother a hard-working functionary for the Communist Party. He went to the university where he earned two degrees, one of them in engineering. He worked as an engineer for two years before abandoning that job because he was barely inching ahead.

That's before he changed careers. Today, Dmitri is a key lieutenant in the Soviet mob. This is the story of a refusenik-turnedracketeer.

He's unusual because he is willing to talk to us about his criminal activities, the organization and the godfather he serves. Dmitri is saving up to come to the United States. He is 28 years old and doesn't believe mainstream Soviet life has anything to offer a person with his educational credentials. His mother and father together earn the official exchange rate equivalent of about \$700 a month. As a racketeer, Dmitri boasts, he pulls in at least 10,000 rubles a month - \$16,000 at the official rate and has been able to amass more than 100,000 rubles (\$160,000 at the official rate) in savings. A good



foreign bank accounts, after the money was secretly converted and "washed" to foreign currency through a network run by Russian Jewish emigres in Israel.

Dmitri's territory includes three top hotels for foreign tourists, for whom he proudly claims he can fulfill any wish. Once he was able to obtain high-quality, handcrafted, black lacquer boxes from top masters of the Palekh village school through a close friendship with one of the masters. It started when the frustrated artisan complained his wife couldn't get pregnant. Dmitri used his "network, as he termed it, to get a fertility drug from West Germany

Dmitri is very careful. His family doesn't suspect how he is really making his money. He has a chauffeur for his cars, which are never parked near his apartment, so the neighbors won't get suspicious.

He outlines a typical underground transaction. Underlings play a key role — they handle chunk of this, he confided, is in the money. During four separate

transactions involving more than \$1,000 in American money, Dmitri would take it, count it and quickly give the "hot" cash to a "runner," who then stashed it elsewhere. Dmitri does this so he will never be caught with illegal foreign currency

Dmitri is unique in other ways. He has three apartments — one for living, one for storage of goods and one for business transactions. In the storage flat were dozens of lacquer boxes, more than a 100 military watches, military uniforms, stereo and video equipment and boxes of name-brand computers.

He explained that the Soviet mob could not exist without the collusion of many corrupt Soviet officials, from Communist Party bosses to KGB agents, who get cut in on the take. One top police official has estimated that two-thirds of the gross income of the Soviet underworld is paid out in bribes to officials.

Although he personally profits from the black market, Dmitri lamented: "I can get you all the sugar and soap you want, but it will be at higher prices because the party bosses get higher prices from the black market.

Sugar and soap are the two hot items on the black market because they are scarce in state stores. Huge lots of sugar from Cuba have

been siphoned off by the Soviet mob for illegal liquor manufacture. Other hot items include namebrand clothing, antique religious icons, Western rock albums (particularly John Lennon and Paul McCartney), videotapes of Western movies (especially "Rambo" films which sell for \$400 apiece) and gilt-edged Korans.

Then there's caviar. Dmitri and other racketeers do a brisk business in siphoning off the best caviar and selling the tins in large lots to West Europeans and Americans for precious hard currency. Top officials of the Soviet Ministry of Fisheries were caught in the 1970s sending out black caviar in cans marked "smoked herring." Their share of the profits was deposited in Swiss bank accounts

Even the Soviet people must use the mobsters and black marketeers, if they want any quality goods. It's called "na levo," or living "on the left." Soviets know all too well that the party bosses sell the best food and goods to racketeers before it even gets to the state stores. It's an underground economy that may account for up to 15 percent of the country's gross national product.

One enterprising teacher started his own correspondence course, sold black market diplomas and became a millionaire.

'Bigger is better' still appeals to Congress

WASHINGTON - "Bigger is better" seems a quaintly oldfashioned idea in these days of budget deficits and reduced expectations, but it still retains its appeal for some lawmakers

No clearer demonstration of that can be found than in a bill introduced by a Southern congressman who wants a commission to study whether the Mississippi River all 2,500 miles of it — ought to be declared a "heritage corridor" with a government agency helping to guide historic preservation and economic development efforts.

The idea underlying the bill by Rep. Mike Espy, D-Miss., is a much larger version of a concept that many lawmakers have supported for rivers and canals in their own districts. Three such corridors have been approved by Congress, the most recent being along the Delaware and Lehigh river canals in eastern Pennsylvania.

The process works like this: Congress designates a stream or canal as a "heritage corridor" with substantial historic, recreational or scenic value. A governing board named by the Interior Secretary in conjunction with state and local officials is appointed and given a Guest column

Bakker jury begins deliberations

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) - A courthouse. jury began deliberating today whether Jim Bakker is a "worldclass" liar who used the nation's TV airwaves to cheat his PTL followers out of millions or a devout minister worthy of his

"It's up to you," U.S. District Judge Robert Potter said when he sent the jurors to begin work.

Arms extended, Bakker gave a half bow to the mob of reporters and photographers who greeted him when he arrived at the

Bakker, 49, is charged with 15 counts of wire fraud, eight of mail fraud and one of conspiracy.

He is accused of diverting more than \$3.7 million in PTL money to live in high style, buying Rolls-Royces, lavish homes, raw diamonds, an air-conditioned doghouse and furnishings ranging from mirrored walls and goldplated swan bathroom fixtures to motorized bedroom drapes and gigantic walk-in closets.

\$50 billion bailout not enough

WASHINGTON (AP) — The \$50 billion Congress earmarked two months ago to rescue failed savings institutions may not be enough, Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. Chairman L. William Seidman said today.

"It is possible that \$50 billion will prove to be an insufficient amount to deal with potential failures," Seidman said in testimony prepared for the Senate Banking Committee.

"But it is really much too early to make a reliable new prediction of loss," he added. Today's hearing was the first on the savings and loan bailout since Congress

passed the legislation Aug. 9. Also scheduled to testify were

Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan, Housing Secretary Jack Kemp and members of the Resolution Trust Corp., created to close and sell failed thrifts.

Seidman, whose agency operates the RTC, said the government has taken control of 283 failed S&Ls with \$112 billion in assets. Of the 283, it has closed 24 small institutions and expects to sell five large institutions by next

Through August 1992, thrift regulators may turn over another 300 S&Ls to the RTC.

WITTENBERG, Wis. (AP) -Pretty and smart, Lori Esker was president of her high school and the Future Farmers of America chapter, and was involved in many other activities. But friends say she was devastated when her romance with a handsome young farmer

broke up. Now, she's in jail, accused of strangling the woman he planned to marry.

The charge shocked acquaintances in central Wisconsin's quiet farm country. "I have never seen her with a temper," said Lisa Steebs, a friend with whom Ms. Esker lived briefly earlier this year. "She never swore. She never got mad at anything.

Ms. Esker, 20, was charged with first-degree murder Monday in the Sept. 20 strangulation of 21-yearold Lisa Cihaski. Her body was found in her car at the motel where she worked near Wausau.

Ms. Esker admitted killing Ms. Cihaski after an argument over Bill Buss, but claimed it was in self-defense, according to court records. A bail hearing is scheduled Thursday in Wausau.

Broad-shouldered, over 6 feet tall and dark-haired, Buss worked Tuesday on his family's farm near Eland, about a miles east of Waysau, but said he did not want to friends.

Court approves extraditions

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — The Supreme Court has upheld President Virgilio Barco's decree allowing extradition of accused drug bosses to the United States but overturned his order to seize their ranches, mansions and other property.

The decisions Tuesday preserve Barco's main weapon in his government's unprecedented crackdown on cocaine traffickers, who have used murder, bribery and intimidation to thwart Colombian efforts to bring them to justice.

The 24-member court's ruling means the government may have to return more than 1.000 confiscated homes, ranches, mansions, office buildings and other property said to belong to cocaine

Colombian television said the high court would support the government's right to confiscate the property of drug traffickers, but such action would first need the approval of a lower court.

Jewish leader ambushed, killed

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — A gunman ambushed and killed the leader of Belgium's Jewish community, and authorities today were investigating whether the attack was anti-Semitic.

Israel's ambassador to Belgium speculated that neo-Nazis were behind the shooting of Dr. Joseph Wybran Tuesday evening.

"This was a terrorist attack There is no doubt about that,' said a police official on condition of anonymity. He did not

Wybran, 49, was shot in the head as he got into his car outside Brussels University Hospital, where he headed the immunology department, police said. A hospital spokesman said he died early today.

No one has claimed responsibility for the slaying.

"It is impossible to determine the precise motive," for the shooting, Michael Peytier, a spokesman for the Brussels prosecutor's office, told reporters.

Prime Minister Wilfried Martens, in a statement, called the act "revolting and wretched" and expressed his "indignation at violence and intolerance.'

Germans crowd U.S. embassy

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) - About 10,000 East German refugees who fled their homeland waited in Prague for trains to take them to the West today. Thousands of others reportedly lined the rail route to try to join the historic exodus.

On Tuesday, for the second time in a week, East Germany's Communist leaders agreed to safe passage to the West for thousands of its citizens who had thronged at West Germany's Embassy in this capital.

Later in the day, the leaders banned unrestricted travel into Czechoslovakia in a desperate bid to stop the embarrassing exodus.

Trains to pick up the refugees in Prague were delayed, and one report suggested it was because other would-be emigres were jamming train stations along the route, hoping to take part in the mass transfer

The Prague refugees waited through the night in near freezing



Autistic boy masters math; finds social skills difficult

By JIM CONLEY **El Paso Times**

EL PASO (AP) - Stephen Hinkle, 11, knows no dishonesty, no shame, no competition.

Most of his days are filled with unbridled, child-like curiosity and an endearing innocence that may never go away. Stephen is autistic.

He has Asperger's syndrome, a rare kind of autism not unlike the type that afflicted Dustin Hoffman's character in "Rain Man," an Oscar-winning film that evoked widespread public interest in the disability and some victims' astounding capabilities in areas such as mathematics

Stephen is drawn to many of the same things Hoffman's character liked in the film, among them,

"On TV, I like 'Finders Keepers," where kids trash things out," he

says. "And I like 'Wheel of Fortune,' 'Jeopardy,' 'Family Feud.' I like quiz shows. I like them all.

"And I was in the chess club in Arizona. It's fun. Stephen doesn't care for cartoons

or most literature. "I like electronics better than all these fictional characters. They're not real," Stephen says, showing off a table full of electronic gear he put together himself.

His face radiates delight as he lets visitors push buttons and switches, while he explains the gadgetry he created from concepts in the manuals he devours.

Autism is a complex disturbance of the central nervous system that leaves its victims with a wide range of impairment — at worst, no contact with reality, no ability to communicate.

"Our world must be very confus-

"Our world must be very confusing to him. It isn't logical. He has no hate, no malice. He's always honest and doesn't know shame or embarrassment." Elizabeth Hinkle, Stephen's mother.

ing to him," Stephen's mother, Elizabeth Hinkle, says. "It isn't logical. He has no hate, no malice. He's always honest and doesn't know shame or embarrassment."

Stephen is among higherfunctioning autistic people who have trouble with social skills but can speak, interact with others and learn. His social skills may improve enough to let him function in a job and live on his own, his mother says.

He was born in Dallas and has lived in El Paso for only a few

Stephen runs to strangers like a trusting toddler, spewing a barrage of questions that can leave them breathless, perplexed and sometimes irritated, until they learn he can't help himself.

But, like a toddler, Stephen's attention may wane quickly. He turns away just as abruptly as he The next minute he's immersed

in electronics manuals and math books, driven to build complicated circuitry involving dozens of wires, switches, bulbs and batteries.

His mother said Stephen has per-

formed well on standardized tests in some areas of mathematics, scoring as well as would be expected of a high school senior.

She was watching Stephen play chess at a recreation center near the family's West Side apartment. Stephen is enjoying one of his more peaceful moments during the chess game, his mind focused on

the board. His social skills are not always so good, Mrs. Hinkle says of her son.

"Stephen gets right up in people's faces. And he will stay on the same topic, even for days sometimes, until he's satisfied with resolving his questions.

"He doesn't read facial expressions or understand body language," she said. "He's very normal in expressive language (what he says) but in receptive language (the way he processes what others say and do) he may rate as a 7-year-old," she said.

Stephen's condition is shared by only a few people per 10,000. The syndrome begins early and

Chemical engineers receive top salaries

WASHINGTON — If you're not discussing pentachlorophenal with your school-age children, it may be time to start because chemical engineers — the people who create such compounds - received the highest starting salaries among new college graduates this year.

Just what does a chemical engineer do? They get paid an average of \$32,949 a year right out of college, according to the College Placement Council in Bethlehem,

"The chemical industry is growing so fast that there simply aren't enough engineering students to fill the new jobs," said Dawn Oberman, a spokesman for the council. 'That means chemical engineering students are getting to pick and choose the best job offers. Starting salaries in that field are up 6 percent over last year.

That's great news for those students who understand ethyls, methyls, oxides and chlorides, but what about other disciplines?

"Engineering students, regardless of the field, are always the most sought-after graduates,' Oberman said. "This year the chem engineers are getting top dollar, but in previous years, the computer industry was hunting for engineers.

According to the center's 1989 salary review, petroleum engineers were the second highest paid graduates, averaging \$32,789. Mechanical engineers were right behind at \$30,490, while brand new civil engineers received \$27,046.

The center has been surveying first-year salaries since 1960. Oberman said that while engineers have always been in demand, other fields have fluctuated more in terms of starting pay. For example, the lack of trained nurses across the nation has driven up the starting pay in that field to \$24,915 up 5 percent from 1988.

"All medical care services are reporting a shortage of people and that's the reason we saw the average starting pay increase by 8 percent this year," Oberman said.

In the world of finance, the investment banking industry offered the highest starting pay to business students with degrees in specific areas, such as economics. Banking offered an average starting salary of \$28,711. New accountants, those students

who patiently studied all that mathematics, started their first job this year at an average wage of General business students also reported a sizable jump in starting



"Absent proof of a mutual agreement to be married, an agreement o marry cannot be inferred from he fact that the parties were living ogether," the judge said. "The contrary is true.

If the judge had determined the wo were married under common law, Ms. Jennings could have pursued up to half Hurt's earnings. The decision did not deal with support for the couple's 6-year-old son,

Alexander Devon Hurt. Jennings' lawyer, A. Richard Golub, called the ruling a "joke" and said he would appeal. The judge is "so madly in love with this defendant, Bill Hurt, that we never could have gotten a fair shake," he

"If we had won, I would have been shocked," Golub said.

Jennings, a former dancer, sued Hurt for equitable distribution of his assets, estimated by Golub at \$5 million to \$7 million, after Hurt refused to increase financial support to her and their son. Under an

NEW YORK (AP) - No agreement between Hurt and Jennings, he was paying them \$60,000 to \$65,000 a year.

Noriega retains control after Panamanian coup is crushed

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega's grip remained firm after his forces crushed a coup attempt, and an opposition leader said there would be no civil uprising because Panama-

nians "are highly intimidated." Troops enforced a nighttime curfew in Panama City early today on streets where forces loyal to Noriega on Tuesday quashed the second attempt in 18 months by dissidents in the military to oust the Defense Forces chief.

Noriega was quick to blame the revolt on the United States, which has been trying to oust the Defense Forces commander for more than

112 years.
"The proof is that American troops closed access routes to the barracks, just as they closed the Pan-American Highway," Noriega said on nationwide television several hours after the failed coup by what appeared to be a small

group of soldiers.

President Bush denied any role in the rebellion, but reiterated that the United States would still like to see Noriega ousted.

"I want to see democracy in Panama succeed," he said in Washington Tuesday night. White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the Bush administration had some advance word that a coup attempt might be afoot.

Noriega was indicted on drug trafficking charges in the United States in February 1988, but maintains those charges are part of a U.S. plot to keep possession of the Panama Canal, which reverts to Panama at the end of the century. He also annulled May elections

"Absolutely all" other Defense orces officers remained loyal to Noriega, according Lopez.

That loyalty was visible in the swift reaction by the elite Battalion 2000 and Macho de Monte units. which moved into Panama City to put down the uprising from bases

But within half an hour Noriega loyalists replied that the rebels were bluffing, and the good cheer faded.

Opposition leaders were invisible throughout the day. The offices of the opposition coalition were empty, and former presidential candidate Guillermo Endara, who entered the 15th day of a hunger strike today, was moved to an undisclosed location.

Opposition spokesmen refused to be identified and refused to make any comment on the military uprising except to say they were not involved.

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) The first sign of the uprising comes at 7 a.m., when gunshots sound through the poor, crowded Panama City neighborhood of El

The Urraca battalion, entrusted with the security of Panamanian Defense Forces headquarters, is in revolt.

The sounds are heard at the headquarters of the U.S. Southern Command, less than a mile away.

Hundreds of people living near the embattled headquarters leave or are forced from their homes, some fleeing with pets and all the household belongings they can

Police, armored personnel carriers and water cannon block the streets, keeping journalists and the curious away. Shops pull down their shutters

At 7:20 a.m., the Southern Com-

EDITOR'S NOTE — Elements of mand puts its troops and civilians on the highest alert. President Bush, in Washington, is informed.

Gunfire crackles through the morning. Stray bullets hit buildings in the neighborhood, but no civilian injuries are reported. The Red Cross says doctors have been called to the compound.

U.S. troops in combat gear take up positions 600 yards from the Defense Forces headquarters, between the gunfire and U.S. bases. However, they take no part in the fighting.

U.S. helicopter gunships and Blackhawk troop carriers fly over the installations. U.S. troops and armored personnel carriers close the Bridge of the Americas, which crosses the Panama Canal west of Panama City

As the morning wears on, National Security adviser Brent Scowcroft briefs Bush and visiting President Carlos Salinas de Gortari of Mexico.

At 11:30 a.m., as sporadic gunfire continues, the rebels issue their first and only communique in the name of Maj. Moises Giraldi Vega, commander of the Urraca battalion.

In a radio broadcast, the rebels say Noriega and six of his top colonels have been ousted. The rebels call on other Defense Forces units to join them and say they will call elections soon.

Opposition supporters hit the streets to celebrate, waving flags and blowing whistles, but half an hour later officers loyal to Noriega call a television station and say they are fighting back "ready to give their lives.

Troops loyal to Noriega have climbed to the rooftops outside the compound to bombard rebel soldiers with mortars, grenades and gunfire. The Urraca unit returns the fire.

Every year, some injury seems to get in the way as teams head into the baseball playoffs. San Diego lost Kevin

McReynolds in 1984, a tarpaulin ate Vince Coleman in 1985, Tom Seaver missed the postseason for Boston in 1986 and Jack Clark was out with St. Louis in 1987.

Then again, Kirk Gibson got only one swing in last year's World Series and that was enough to swing it for the Dodgers

This time, San Francisco is fragile while the Chicago Cubs are fine going into tonight's opening game of the National League playoffs.

The Giants, who lost postseason ace Dave Dravecky to a broken arm in August, are still hurting. Pitchers Don Robinson and Craig Lefferts are tender and starting catcher Terry Kennedy is only so-

"We're not as strong pitchingwise because of the injuries, Manager Roger Craig said Tuesday during a workout at Wrigley

Lefferts, who has pitched 12 scoreless innings in postseason play, has a sore shoulder. "I probably won't be able to use him as much as I'd like," Craig

Robinson, who Craig wants to be in the starting rotation, has stretched ligaments in his right knee, but was deemed OK after

pitching batting practice. Kennedy injured his arm last Sunday. He is a left-handed hitter and will start Game 1 against right-hander Greg Maddux, but Craig said Kennedy may not be able to play every day against the Cubs' all-righty rotation.

"That could be a problem," Craig admitted.

The teams had until midnight to determine their rosters. The Giants waited until after Tuesday afternoon's practice, while the Cubs were set a week ago.

"We're healthy, and that helps," second baseman Ryne Sandberg said. "You can use the guys you want and don't have to worry about who can't play.

Each team chose a nine-man pitching staff. The Giants kept Atlee Hammaker, who was 6-6 with a 3.76 earned-run average in 76 2-3 innings, and dropped Bob Knepper, who went 3-2 with a 3.46 ERA for San Francisco after being released by Houston.

The Giants left two other veterans off their roster. Injury plagued infielder Chris Speier and little-used catcher Bob Brenly were replaced by reserve catcher Bill Bathe and infielder Greg Litton.

Whatever little nagging injuries that have accumulated during the season won't be helped by the weather. Tonight's forecast calls for wind, of course, with temperatures in the middle 40s.

Stanton outside linebacker Brian Cain played a big role in Stanton's 27-14 upset win over Garden City, the No. 10 ranked Class A team in the state.



Fighting Irish stay number 1 in AP poll

While Notre Dame coach Lou Holtz continues to insist that his Fighting Irish are not a perfect football team, they remained the near-unanimous choice at the top of the rankings on Monday

The Irish, who supplanted Michigan as the No. 1 team after a season-opening victory over Virginia and have remained there since, received 57 firstplace votes from a nationwide panel of 60 sports writers and broadcasters. The Irish, who improved to 4-0 Saturday with a 40-7 victory over Purdue, got 1,497 of a possible 1,500 points in voting which awards the top team 25 points down to one point for a 25th-place vote.

Miami, Fla. (4-0), which received the other three firstplace votes and remained second in the poll with 1,426 points, beat Michigan State 26-20 on Saturday.

Moving from fifth to third, its highest ranking since 1977, was Colorado. The Buffaloes (4-0) received 1,344 points after a 45-28 trouncing of Washington. The loss, Washington's worst at home in 60 years, dropped the Huskies, who had been 21st, from the poll.

The strength of Colorado's victory convinced voters to move it ahead of fellow Big Eight member Nebraska. The Cornhuskers (4-0) fell from third to fourth with 1,344 points despite a 35-7 victory over Oregon State.

Michigan (2-1) moved from sixth to fifth following a 41-21 victory over Maryland. The Wolverines, first in the preseason poll, accumulated 1,234 points.

Tennessee (4-0) moved from 12th to sixth — the biggest gain in the poll - by upsetting previously fourth-ranked Auburn 21-14 and dropping the Tigers to 11th. The Volunteers got 1,193 points.

Arkansas (3-0) improved a spot to seventh with 1,118 points after beating Texas-El Paso 39-7. Eighth with 961 points was Pittsbugh (3-0-1), which moved up two spots by playing a 31-31 tie with West Virginia.

Prussic acid threat danger to livestock

County Extension Agent

Heavy frosts hit the area in an uncommonly cold front that moved through the county last weekend and this damaged many sorghumtype forages in the area, including Johnson grass

These frost damaged forages set the ball in motion for prussic acid poisoning of livestock. This poison occurs in almost all forage type grasses, but in most dangerous in common Johnson grass.

If Johnson grass is present in areas subject to livestock grazing or if stock is on hybrid sorghumtype forage pastures be on guard for prussic acid poisoning. Check these forages for any signs of wilt caused by frost. If wilt has occurred, pull out all stock until the wilt has completely dried. This usually takes about three days, but if heavy dews have occurred this could take longer.

The next step would be to turn in two or three of your least valuable



animals and watch them closely. If prussic acid is occurring, animals will become affected within a very short time - usually only an hour or so. If, after a period of a few hours, the animals have not been affected, it can be usually assumed the danger of prussic acid poison-. ing is over.

horse named Pat. In 1939 the U.S. Army became mechanized. At that time, all horses over a certain age were to life. be destroyed. Those younger were to be auctioned off. A number of old Army sergeants drinking beer in the PX one night at Fort Sam decided that Pat, a legendary artillery horse, deserved better than that. "That can't happen to Pat," they said. Everyone who worked with Pat said the horse was

The sergeants wrote a letter to the war department in Washington and pleaded with those in charge not to kill old Pat. They not only asked that Pat be spared but they demanded that Pat retire in comfort at Fort Sam Houston. They wanted a full-time veterinarian and a full meadow for Pat. They asked for three enlisted men to be assigned to Pat full-time to exercise the horse so he would stay healthy. And as things happen in the

military, the request was granted. Pat got the meadow, the vet and three enlisted men. The three men, however, lasted only a short time and were sent back to their units.

inis nappened mainly because wanted to exercise the horse they had to get on a waiting list. Sometimes it would be two weeks before they got their turn. They were not allowed to place their names back on the list until they

Pat lived very comfortably in his meadow, no doubt recalling the days when he had been assigned to the artillery and pulled a caisson in France during WWI. Pat died in April of 1953 at the age of 45. That compares to 200 years in human

had actually exercised the horse.

Howard Bose of Dumas was stationed at Fort Sam Houston when Pat finally passed on. "There was a full military funeral for Pat," he said. "A chaplain spoke, there was a 21-gun salute and several thousand people were in attendance. If any of us wanted to leave our jobs that day to attend the funeral, we could. It was a different type of funeral. The chaplain mentioned that Pat seemed to be an unusual animal that could win the devotiion of so many people.

When the story of Pat's passing and the funeral made the Army Times newspaper, contributions began coming in from men who had known the horse. The money was used to erect a granite monument at Pat's grave. It is not unusual to see flowers there. A pecan grove and a stream are nearby

Of all the Army horses that were destroyed, Pat was the only one the men said could not be killed. "You can't have Pat," the soldiers insisted.



"It's like a proposal that is just beginning," said Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Whayne Moore. One of the two manufacturers

'Blue Bell has announced their decision to locate a distribution center in the Big Spring city limits. The proposed site is on the north access service road of I-20 at the Johnny Stone Softball Complex. The land is owned by the Business Industrial Foundation," said Boyd.

The plan calls for the construction of two modern buildings, one that will be used for administrative offices and a warehouse, with the other serving as the freezer facility. There will also be a parking lot for the employees.

"This will be a distribution center for an area covering from Abilene to the east; Midland-Odessa to Hobbs, NM, on the west; Lubbock on the north; and San Angelo on the south," said

The schedule is set for the start of construction probably prior to the first of the year, with a tentative completion date around the start of April 1990," he said.


