Are you religiously disobedient? You know, are you addicted to doing things your way, with no regard for God, the Bible or the Church because it's your way or the highway? Of course, no fool would admit to being so hard headed toward God, but all of us have great room for improvement in our walk with God.

Religious disobedience is a synonym for hypocrisy, because it seeks to look holy on the outside, yet it is actually just heartless ritual and routine. Living this way fails to love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, soul, mind and strength, (Mk 12:30-31).

In 1 Samuel 15, King Saul gives us a great example of religious disobedience. The problem is that Saul was commanded to crush and completely destroy the Amalekites, which he almost did, but when it came to destroying the best stuff, he decided to keep that for himself and his men.

Eventually he is caught in his disobedience, and instead of admitting his sin, he decides to dress it up by lying about his intentions, and avoiding his guilt. His thin fog of religious shenanigans is burned away by Samuel's words as he proclaimed, "To obey is better than sacrifice" (v. 22). Saul was so warped in his thinking that he thought God wanted him to be religious, but what God wants is for you and I to love him completely in a real relationship that results in daily walking with God.

Clovis "Conductor" arrived for Library Program June 16

Phil Williams, owner and operator of the Clovis Depot Model Train Museum, treated 142 children and adults for the "Catch the Reading Express" program for summer readers.
