Baked Bean Rarebit :--2 cups scalded milk, 1 medium can Oven Baked Beans (Boston Style), 1/2 cup American Cheese, 2 tablespoons flour, ¼ cup water, salt. pepper, Worcestershire salt. pepper. Worcestershire Sauce. To scalded milk add beans which have been mashed finely. Add the cheese chopped fine, and stir constantly over a slow fire until the cheese is melt-ed. Then if desired, add flour blended with water to slightly thicken. Cook for several min-utes. Season with salt, pepper, Worcestershire Sauce. Serve cn slices of buttered toast. ter Russell W.
