it's a diet cola for seniors this year

No COLA for you.

Not the drinking kind of Cola, although the government doesn't want you to have those sugary drinks either. This COLA is the Cost of Living Adjustment which governs annual increases in monthly Social Security checks. For seniors, 2011 will be a "Diet COLA" year.

The Social Security Administration sent out a fourpage press release last week explaining why Social Security recipients will not get a raise for the second consecutive year. Here is a small excerpt from their press release. It should clear up their reasoning and make you feel better:

"The Social Security Act provides for an automatic increase in Social Security and SSI benefits if there is an increase in the Consumer. Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) from the third quarter of the last year a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) was determined to the third quarter of the current year. As determined by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, there is no increase in the CPI-W from the third quarter of 2008, the last year

a COLA was determined, to the third quarter of 2010, therefore, under existing law, there can be no COLA in 2011."

Those on fixed Social Security income will not get a raise in January 2011. However, there is a possibility your Medicare premiums might increase. They say 70 percent of current Social Security recipients will be "protected" if Medicare Part B premiums increase. I hope that means you.

If your monthly check does not go up and your Medicare premium does go up, that is a decrease in earnings isn't it?

For those of you still working, Social Security deductions of 7.65% will be withheld on the first \$106,800 of your earnings. That comes out of your check. Your employer also pays 7.65% for your Social Security and Medicare account.

So if you make \$106,800 in 2011, you will pay \$8,170.20 in Social Security deductions and your employer will pay the same amount, over and above your income.

Chances are their utilities, prescriptions, rent, food, and gasoline expenses have indeed increased but the government doesn't think so.

a cost-of-living increase to shrink the income of those who depend on Social Security.

There are said to be 58 million Americans that receive Social Security benefits. Even a small percentage increase for that many people is a huge increase for the government. Yet the COLA formula became law in 1975 and increases have been given every year since then, except for 2010 and 2011.

There is a certain segment of the Congress that wants to change the qualifications for receiving Social Security. They propose to make people prove they need Social Security before they can receive it. In other words if you retire

Meat loaf fit for a taco

More tasty food from the Church Supper Cookbook magazine. The recipe says it makes two loaves to serve 12 people.

Susan Garoutte of Georgetown, Texas, submitted it to the magazine. She says, "We live in Texas and love our region's style of cooking. This recipe spices up plain meat loaf so it tastes like a filling for tacos."

I'm not a big kidney bean fan but mixed with all the other ingredients this sounds tasty for a church supper or a weekend party at home.

Taco Meat Loaves

Two loaves, serves 6 each

3 eggs lightly beaten

2 cups picante sauce, divided

1 can (16 oz) kidney beans, rinsed and drained 1 can (11 oz) Mexicorn, drained

1 med onion chopped

2 cans (2 1/4 oz ea) sliced ripe olives drained

3/4 cup dry bread crumbs

1 envelope taco seasoning 1 tsp ground cumin

1 tsp chili powder

2 lbs ground beef

2 cups (8 oz) shredded cheddar Additional picante sauce optional

1. In a large bowl combine the eggs, ½ cup picante sauce, beans, corn, onion, bread crumbs, taco seasoning, cumin, and chili powder.Crumble beef over mixture and mix well.

2. Pat into two ungreased 9 in. X 5 in. loaf pans. Bake uncovered at 350 for 50-55 minutes or until no pink remains and a meat thermometer reads 160.

3. Spoon remaining picante sauce over each meat loaf. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake 15-20 minutes longer or until cheese is melted. Let stand for 10 minutes before slicing. Serve with additional picante sauce if desired.


