Council had brief agenda

The Friona city council met in regular session Monday November 8 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers at 619 Main St. Mayor pro-tem Jim Atwell presided in the absence of Mayor J.B. Douglas who is recovering from bypass surgery.

Prairie Acres administrator Nikki Brister introduced Emily Siegmund to the council. Mrs. Siegmund is the new manager of Friona Heritage Estates.

Friona Library director Darla Bracken gave a report on recent happenings at the library. They have received a Lone Star state grant for \$5,025 which will be used to update the library's server and computers. The library also has 8 new computers available for public use. Funds from the Friends of the Library endowment fund were used to improve the Redeemer Center which is being used as a language and literacy center. The council also heard and approved resolu-

tions to participate in a PRPC grant program for regional hazard mitigation plan and denying a request by SPS for a summer credit option to interrupt service.

After discussion, the council approved the monthly accounts payable and the financial statements. The meeting was adjourned at 7:06 p.m. The next regular meeting of the city council will be Monday, December 13. All council meetings are open to the public.



Neugebauer says no back seat on jobs

Congressman Randy Neugebauer (R-TX) released the following statement in response to the federal government's disappointing October unemployment report:

Ron,

I just completed my second session with the Texas Agriculture Lifetime Leadership (TALL) program. This session was centered on the High Plains region, especially the Lubbock and Amarillo area. The amount and diversity of agriculture in this area is obvious. I was quite prideful that Parmer County was consistently listed as one of the top agriculture producing counties in the entire state. This session of TALL was broken into crop production, animal agriculture, water issues, and "other" issues.

On crop production I heard presentations from the Plains Cotton Growers Association, the Texas Corn Producers Board, the Texas Peanut Producers Board and both the Texas and National Sorghum Producers Associations. The research and innovations coming our way in drought resistant crops will be very beneficial for our area. I was able to tour several agriculture facilities including the USDA Cropping Systems Lab in Lubbock, Buster's Cotton Gin in Ropesville, and the American Cotton Growers Denim Mill in Littlefield. Under animal agriculture, I toured the Texas Tech Animal Science complex in Lubbock, the 5,000 head Legacy Farms Dairy in Plainview, and the Pacific Cheese Plant in Amarillo. In Hereford, I toured Champion Feed Yard, Caviness Meat Packing, and the White Energy Ethanol plant. I also heard a presentation from the Texas Pork Producers Association covering the large pork operations in the Northern Texas Panhandle counties. We wrapped up animal agriculture with a tour of the Country Barn restaurant in Amarillo and their Bonsamora steaks advertised as the most tender beef in America. All of the facilities and presentations we heard focused on food safety, volatility of the commodity markets, and animal rights extremists as being their top problems. The amount and availability of water, and the issue of water rights and right of capture are major issues in agriculture on the High Plains. I heard presentations from the Texas AgriLife Extension Service, the Texas Alliance for Groundwater Conservation, and the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District. Given the importance of water in this area and all the competing interests and political arenas, it's understood that water is the new "liquid gold" of Texas. In other issues I heard presentations on the challenges and opportunities for economic development, and on the need to maintain strong rural health services. I believe these issues are paramount and have been well addressed in our area. The Southwest Council of Agribusiness gave a presentation on legislative issues affecting agriculture. It was interesting to note that less than 2% of the U.S. population is involved in agriculture today. I also heard a presentation on Childhood Obesity and the effect this is having on our children. This one presentation had the most questions and discussion. When school lunches were brought up, everyone in the room had an opinion. I also took a tour of the wind farm in Oldham County. I stood beneath a huge wind turbine and was amazed at how quiet it was. Hopefully, the wind energy business will soon be in Parmer County. My next session of TALL is in January in Austin. It will focus on state government, legislative processes, taxes and appropriations, and the judicial process. I'll write and let everyone know of my adventures with that session. Bruce Fleming

Our Week 10 winner is Jess Dearing of Lubbock. She was the only contestant to pick 15 of 18 correct. Her only misses were three of the college games.





The 2010 Friona Chieftains found the competition intense in the new 8-team 1-2A Division I district. The Chiefs were pitted against powerhouses Muleshoe, Littlefield, and Bushland, all three of whom made the playoffs. Friona ended the season at 3-7, 2-5.


Dominique Kellum injured a knee and did not play the second half of the RR game.




Regan Anthony (11) goes for a left-handed layup against the Bushland Lady Falcons. More Bushland action at frionaonline.com.
