Pheasant season opens December 4

Opening day of the 2010 pheasant hunting season is December 4, continuing 30 days through January 2, 2011. Bag limit will be three roosters per day with six in possession.

Texas Wildlife officials are saying that his year should be as good or maybe a little better than last year. Bird counts are up in many areas.

Outdoors writer Jim Steiert says best prospects locally for hunting should be in areas where grain fields join weedy edge and escape cover or where grain is adjacent to good playa cover. "Rank CRP fields will hold some birds but it is always tough going in the tall stuff," Steiert said.

DPS says safety first this weekend

"Texans should focus on arriving safely at their destinations and make sure this Thanksgiving is about making memories-not dealing with tragedy," said David Baker, assistant director in charge of Highway Patrol. "Impaired and reckless drivers are a given and motorists should take this into account and drive defensively."

To help target drunk drivers, speeders and seat belt violators, DPS and many other law enforcement agencies will be out in force in an attempt to save lives and keep the roads and highways safer.

During the long Thanksgiving holiday weekend last year, DPS troopers arrested 449 drunk drivers and wrote more than 10,000

speeding tickets. In addition, 820 seat belt and child restraint citations were issued.

DPS offers these tips for a happy holiday on the roadways: Don't drive drowsy; pull over or switch drivers if you need to; Slow down-especially in bad weather, construction areas and heavy traffic; Don't drink and drive-get a designated driver; Buckle up everyone in the vehicle; Keep cell phone chatter to a minimum, and don't text while driving; Make sure your vehicle is properly maintained; Don't give into road rage; Drive with courtesy-it's contagious.

DPS also is a participant in Operation CARE-Combined Accident Reduction Effort-a nationwide effort by police agencies to reduce fatalities during holidays.

Three way tie in football contest

Couldn't have worked out much better actually since they all three competed well every week and it seems fitting they should all three tie and share in the grand prize. We said in case of a tie we would split the \$150 but we are going to give each a check for \$75 as a share of the grand prize. Mrs. Stowers will receive a check for \$100 since she also won the Week 12 contest.

It was a great competition and we appreciate everyone who loyally filled out the contest forms each week. Note that the winners averaged 12.33 correct picks per week out of 18 games per week.

Government creating obstacles for beef industry

Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TCFA) Chairman Mike Engler opened the Association's Annual Convention by applauding the industry's current good fortunes and soberly noting that wounds incurred in the all too recent past haven't fully healed. The Convention attracted approximately 400 cattle feeders to Oklahoma City.

"This is the first time in a long time that the chairman

of TCFA has been able to address our Annual Convention while cattle feeders are profitable," Engler said. "But for the life of me, I can't get too excited because I am all too aware that the prolonged bad spell we experienced over the past several years caused an uncommon degree of suffering. This time around, there were real casualties in our ranks and war chests have been depleted. And today, uncertainty and

volatility remain as high as ever. I know that as breakevens jump higher and markets drift lower we'll be underwater again and possibly soon."

Searching for the causes of the industry's struggles in the past several years, Engler said he saw "two culprits"—the international economic collapse and the bad policies of our own government, especially federal ethanol subsidies that drove feedgrain prices to unmanageable heights. While conceding that the global economy is like "the forces of nature" and cannot be controlled, he maintained TCFA's longstanding criticism of ethanol supports.

"I'm afraid we're seeing a case where the past is indeed prologue. We got a reminder of the government's misguided idea to decrease dependence on foreign oil by subsidizing corn-based

ethanol when the EPA approved a 15% blend rate for newer automobiles. High priced grains and volatility in those markets are once again making efforts to project costs of gain and breakevens hazardous to your economic health. Using food for fuel while cereal crops worldwide are proving disappointing can only lead to shortages and food inflation."

"Mounting federal debt that is certain to lead to tax increases, environmental regulations that are not based on sound science and the government's failure to address beef trade are other obstacles the government has imposed on the cattle industry's efforts to become healthy again," Engler said.

Engler also took aim at the regulatory changes for livestock ownership and marketing proposed by the

Grain Inspection, Packers and Stockyards Administration (GIPSA). Engler said the GIPSA Rule will undermine competition and rob cattlemen of their "right to keep their business contracts private". He said the rule also threatens to create such a fear of lawsuits that the incentive to produce high quality beef will be lost.

"Packers faced with increased liability will likely back away from value-based marketing. Pricing based on premiums and discounts will be discouraged."

Despite the many challenges, Engler encouraged cattle feeders to maintain the optimistic spirit that has served the industry well for generations. "As we go forward, despite the obstacles others may put in our path, there is inspiration in our heritage," he said.

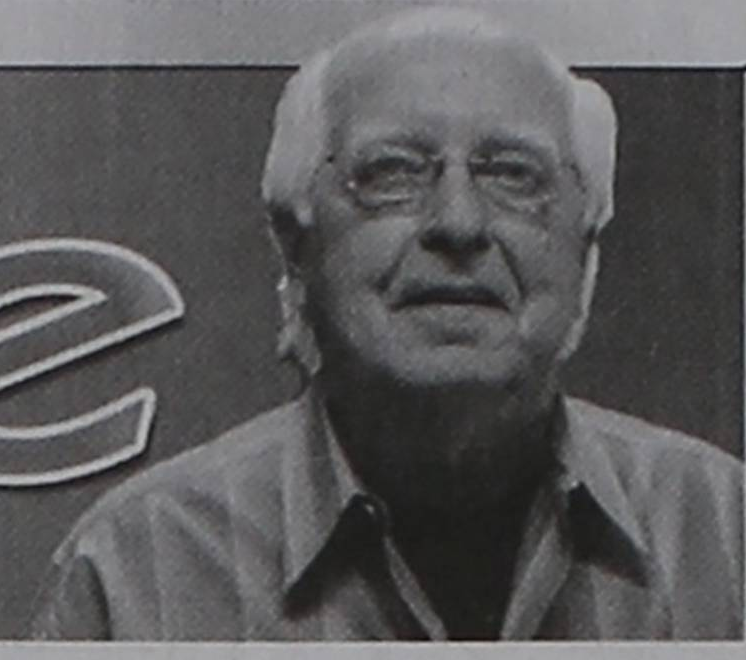

welcome to the airport, take off your clothes

I don't do airports anymore.

After 25+ years in the travel industry, flying millions of miles worldwide, air travel has lost its appeal. The last time I was on an airplane must have been in early 1995. I don't miss it. Been most places I ever wanted to go and have no desire to ever fly again.

I've been through strict airport security in places like Moscow, Athens, Madrid, Panama, and Rio. Went into East Berlin before they tore down the wall. Having done that, I can now enjoy with amusement the current flap about the groping and gouging going on at our airports.

I worked for Braniff (remember them?) in Dallas from 1959 to 1968. At Love Field during that period there was no airport security. Park your car, go to the gate. That was the system.

Back then hunters bound for some pheasant or elk hunting with expensive rifles were often invited to put their fancy guns in the plane's cockpit for safekeeping. Pilots would open the cockpit doors and mingle with the passengers, even inviting kids and old folks to come up and sit in the jump seat during a flight.

Then some morons started hijacking planes to Cuba with guns. The original security checkpoints were mainly looking for guns or bombs. The signs said, "Jokes about guns and bombs are taken seriously." I remember a few cases in Dallas when passengers did joke about having a bomb and were carted off to places unknown.

In the 70s, hijackers had a brief period when they brought flammable liquids in a bottle on board and threatened to set the plane on fire. So bottles of liquid went on the banned list for a time.

Fast forward through

the September 11, 2001, tragedy when a group of young Muslims used simple box cutters to destroy four airplanes, several buildings, and kill 3,000 Americans. Since then we have had attempts by a shoe bomber and underwear bomber so now they check your shoes and your underwear. What's next, a young Muslim bra bomber?

Airport security is a serious matter but not as serious as the current Transportation Security Administration (TSA) makes it out to be.

There has not been one case reported that I know of where airport security has actually caught a bomber trying to get on an airplane. If a bomber got as far as the airport security checkpoint with an actual bomb, why not set it off right there. It would kill a lot of people, halt air traffic across the country, and send America into total security frenzy.

Flying is no longer fun and I'm glad I

don't have to do it anymore.

Airports today are fortified prisons. I wouldn't go near one. The list of things you cannot do outnumber the things you can do. Stay in line, don't make dumb comments, no visitors beyond this point, be prepared to remove your clothing, don't talk back, don't be friendly to the security people, they have a job to do and don't want to chat.

Just because you look like the Cleaver family doesn't mean you get any special treatment. There, we are finished. You can get dressed. Nice bra. Where did you get it?

This recipe was contributed to the new Scrubs and Grub Cookbook, published by Parmer Medical Center, by Becky Dickson. It is on page 50. You can get one of the cookbooks at the hospital for \$10. They make good stocking stuffers.

Mrs. Dickson should know something about cooking. She and Dr. Jeff have a large family so I'm sure she has served this to her kids and their friends at breakfast. Would be a good one for your family when they visit during the holidays.

Beware that this is an overnight recipe so get an early start.

Baked French Toast

- 1 lb loaf French bread cut diagonally in 1-inch slices.
- 8 eggs
- 2 cups milk
- 1 1/2 cups half & half cream
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- 3/4 cup butter
- 1 1/3 cup brown sugar
- 3 tbsp light corn syrup

Butter a 9 x 13 inch baking dish. Arrange slices of bread in the bottom. In a large bowl, beat together eggs, milk, cream, vanilla, and cinnamon.

Pour over bread slices, cover and refrigerate overnight. The next morning preheat oven to 350. In a small saucepan combine butter, brown sugar, and corn syrup; heat until bubbly. Pour over bread and egg mixture. Bake uncovered for 40 minutes.

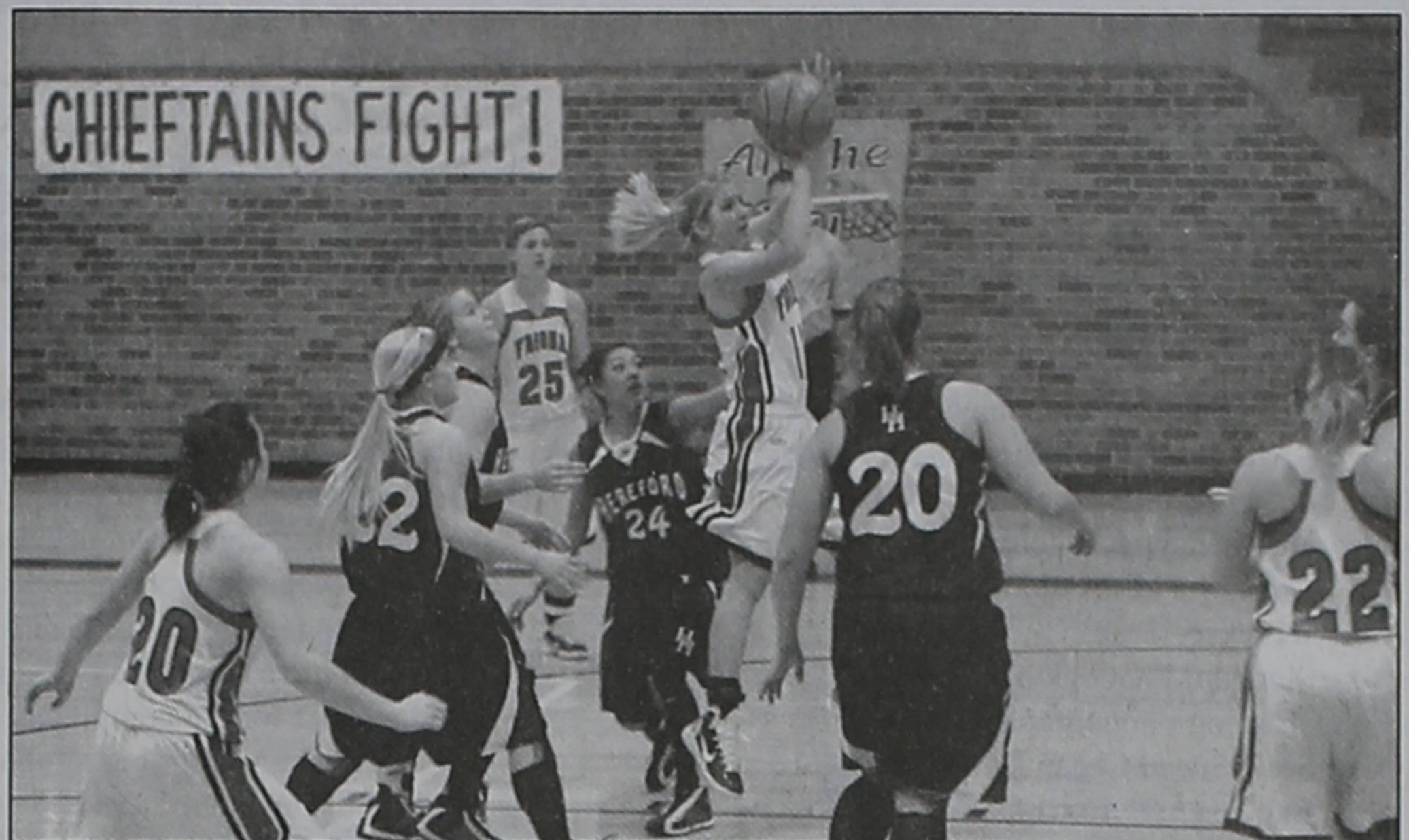

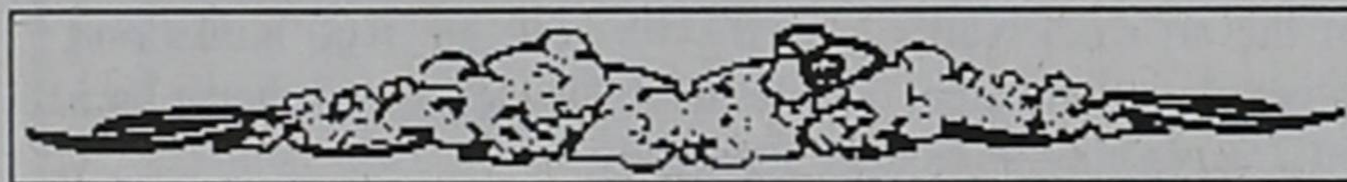
Leonard Leon Grissom

Farm and Ranch Management Symposium Dec. 1

The Texas AgriLife Extension Service will host the 25th annual Panhandle Farm and Ranch Management Symposium in conjunction with the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show held November 30-December 2 at the Amarillo Civic Center.

The symposium will be on December 1 in the Grand Plaza immediately following the 10th annual Texas Commodity Symposium and Amarillo Chamber of Commerce Ag Appreciation Luncheon. Registration will be from 1:00-1:15 p.m. with presentations to follow, said Brandon Boughen, AgriLife Extension agriculture and natural resources agent for Potter County.

Program topics and speakers will be: Laws and Regulations, Lavon Harmon, Texas Department of Agriculture inspector; Managing Herbicide Resistance and New Weed Control Options, Dr. Brent Bean, AgriLife Extension agronomist; Corn and Cotton Insect Management and Biotechnology, Dr. Ed Bynum, AgriLife Extension entomologist; and Emerg-

ing Research, Control and Management of Viral Wheat Diseases, Jacob Price, Texas AgriLife Research associate.

The program will offer four continuing education units for pesticide applicator participants: one in laws and regulations, one in pesticide factors, and two in integrated pest management.

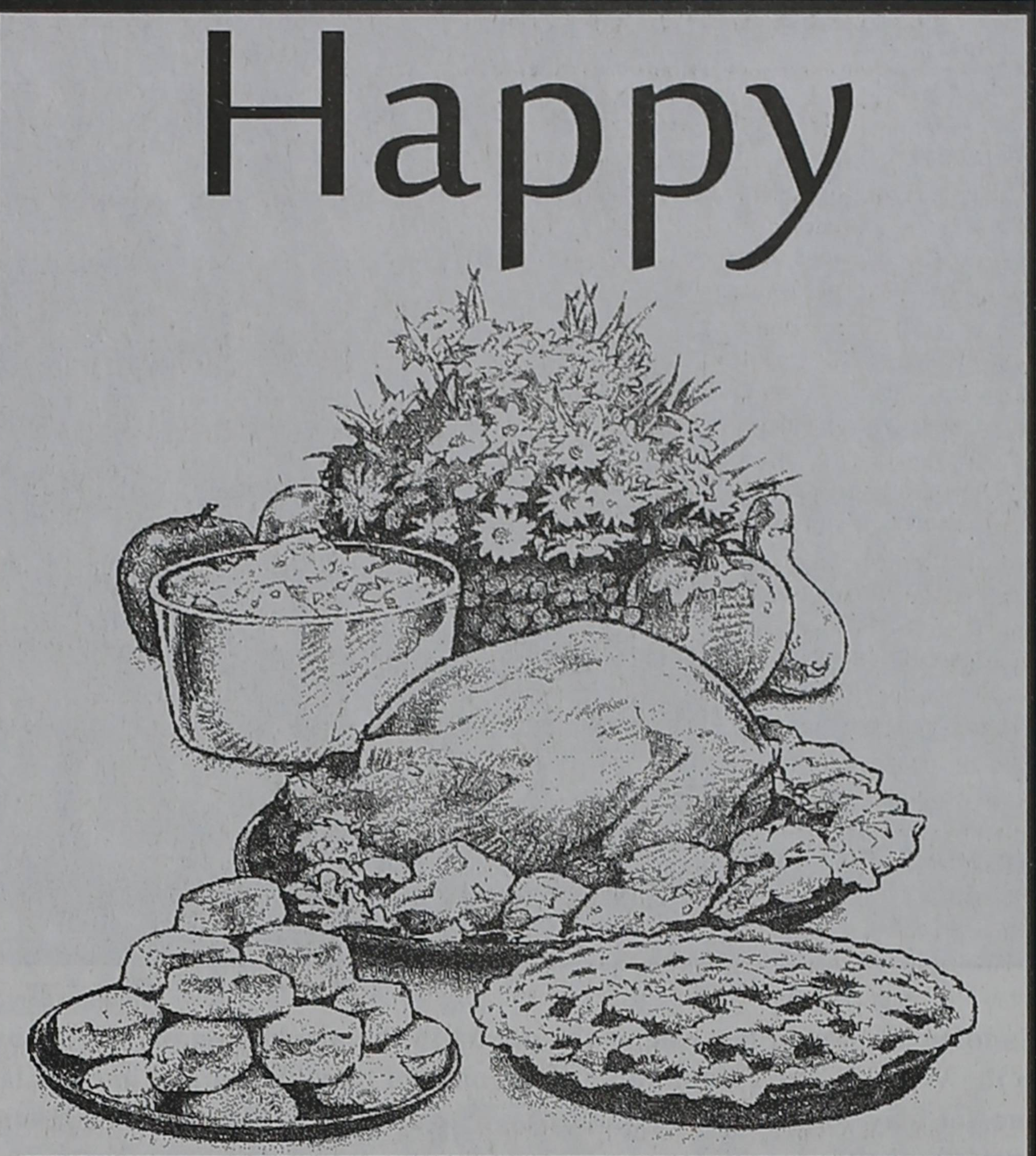

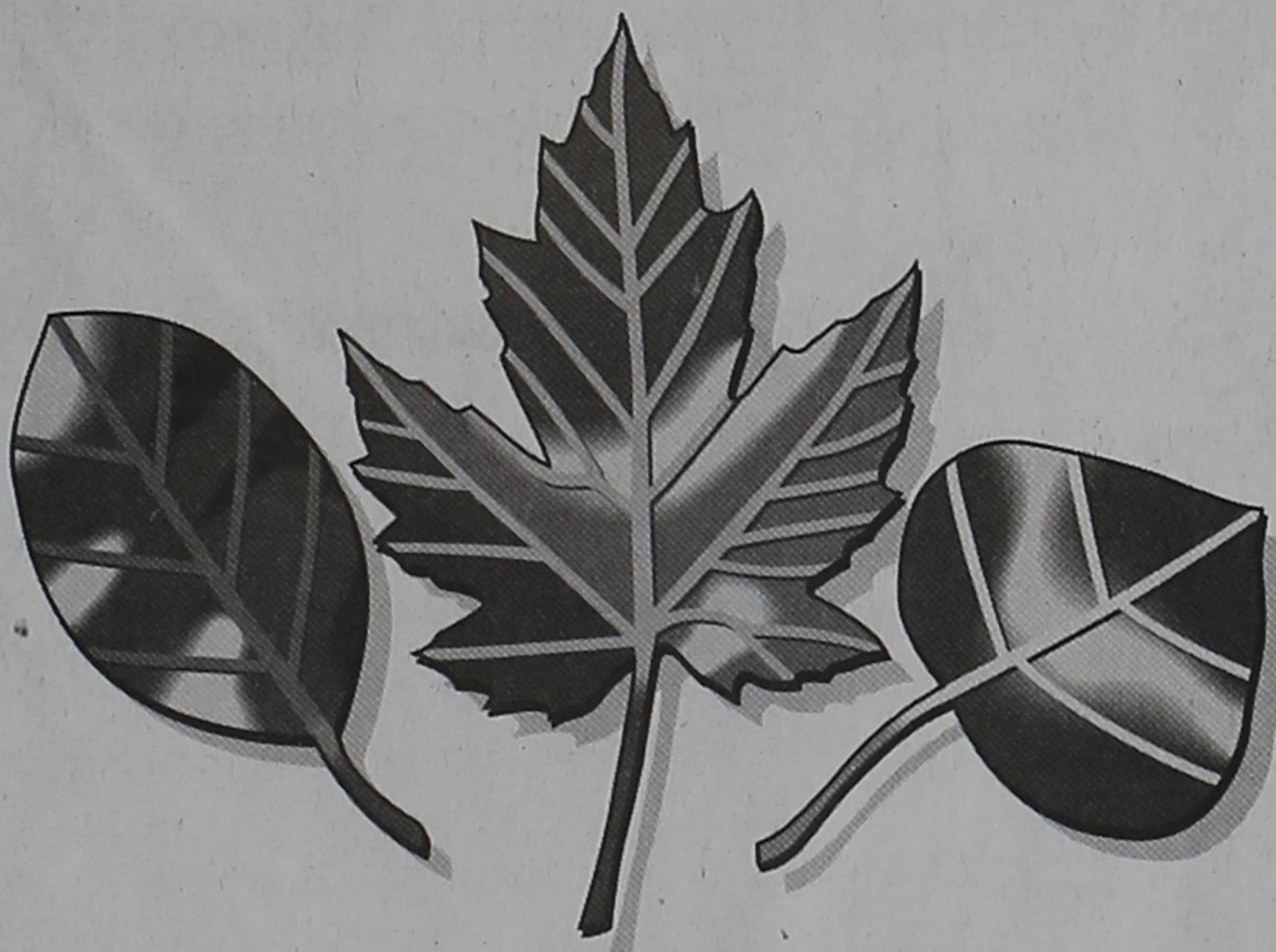

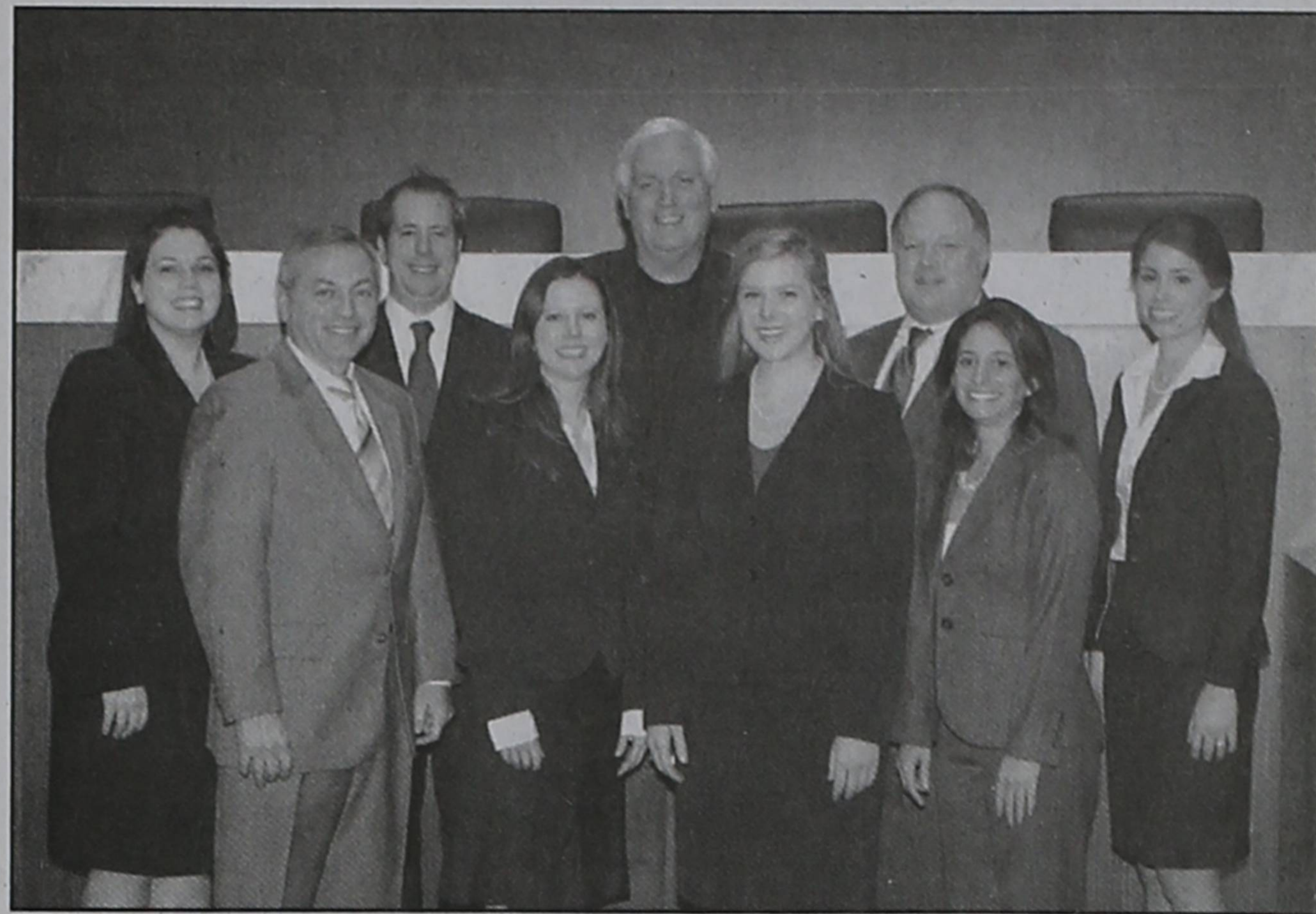

Gustin wins national legal advocacy award

Charlie Gustin, a Farwell graduate with Friona ties won a national championship in legal advocacy at the National Health Law Moot Court competition held at Southern Illinois University November 5-6.

Sponsored by the American College of Legal Medicine, the competition invites the best advocates from law schools all over the nation to simulate a legal appeal. Teams write lengthy legal briefs on a controversial issue dealing with healthcare

and the law. This year's case explored whether a state removing cornea tissue from a body of a deceased child violated a parent's property or religious rights.

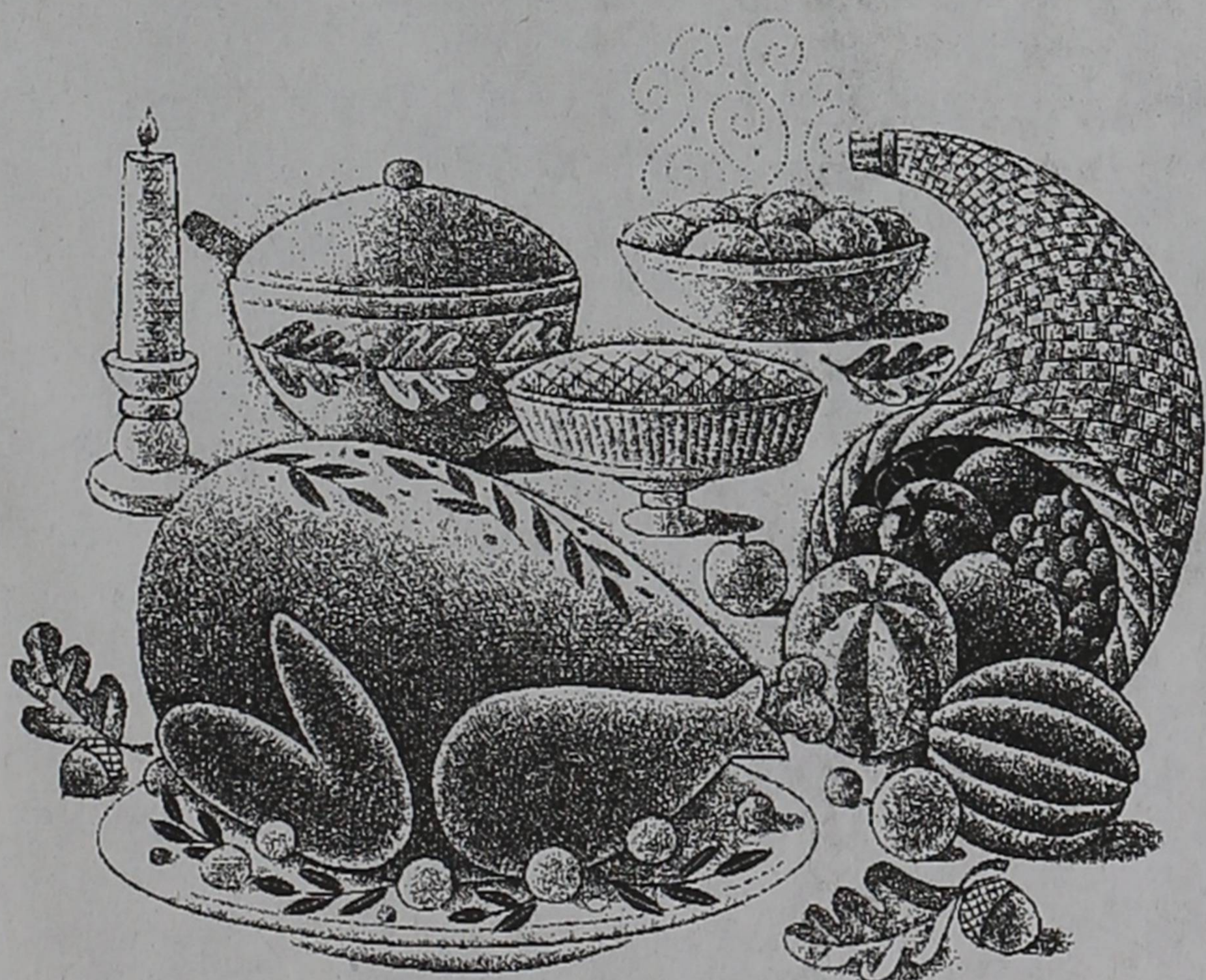
Advocates must be ready to argue both sides of the issue, as chosen by a coin flip each round. Gustin's team bested over 30 other law schools for the national title, including teams from New York Law School and Boston University. Gustin argued every round in the competition, including a final panel including

a 6th Circuit Justice, a federal District Judge, and the President of the American College of Legal Medicine.

Gustin is in his final year of law school at South Texas College of Law in downtown Houston. He graduated from the University of Texas at Austin.

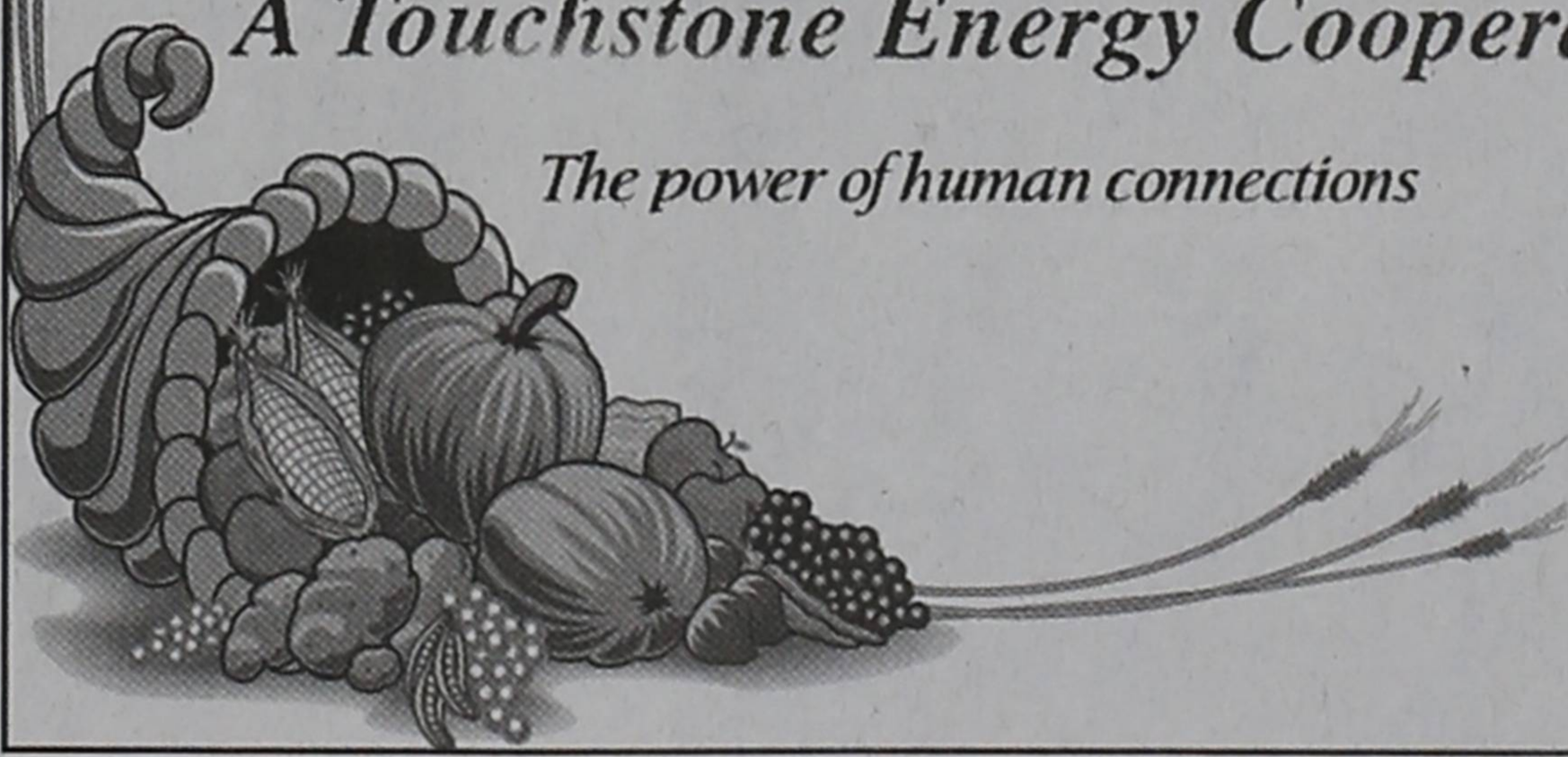
