## Soviets seeking

 answer to crisisMikhail Gorbachev has demanded, and obtained, more authority than any Soviet leader since Stalin. A lopsided policy by decree over the next 18 months. The question now is how quickly and boldly Gorbachev will use his ex panded authority to take steps to reverse the Soviet
economy's rapid decline and the country's increasing ocial and political instability weeks, yet his apparent dithering for indecision in rece ealistic appraisal of the awful choices he faces. If he adopts a proposal to transform the centrally planned that may be impossible - he may win the support a task hat may be impossible - he may win the support of Rusof a fast-track approach; but he could further weaken an aready shaky central government and imperil the survival of the Soviet Union itself. If, on the other hand, he chooses the gradualist approach favored by conseratives, events may overtake policy with he same
results: an acceleration of go-it-alone tactics in the republics and a weakening of central authority In these circumstances, the risks to Gorbachev's hold on power may be about equal in either course. Once the reform process gets under way, it could take on a life of its own that neither Gorbachev nor anyone else can coninitial endorsement of the more radical plan, developed by one of his own economists, and now proposes a referendum on whether to legalize private ownership of land, thus strengthening his hand against opponents of privatization is a key element of the delay, since privatization is a key element of the fast-track plan.
This is a matter of concern beyond the Soviet Union The prospect of greater instability there conjures up all sorts of scenarios, including a military coup, a civil war
or both in a country with the world's largest arsenal of or both in a country with the world's largest arsenal of
nuclear weapons. None of that may happen; armed with new powers, Gorbachev may now move boldly, enlisting of months ago
Earlier this year, some Americansurged the Bush ad-
ministration to offer major economic aid to Moscow. The White House resisted, out of lingering concerns about Soviet intentions in the world. Today, those intentions seem benign, yet in retrospect it's just as well that no ma-
jor aid program was put in place. Now, as then, the best course is to continue improving relations, to provide lechnical assistance, better terms of trade and, if needed, emergency food. Beyond that, one can only hope for the
best possible resolution of a crisis that grows deeper best possi

## Wolves' victory shows determination

COLORADO CITY - It may not go into the history books as the most historic win for the Colorado City Wolves, but it certainly will be remembered as one of the gutsiest. The Wolves, going into their game with Abilene Wylie minus five starters, lost two more to injuries in the first half, their quarterback played the last hal with a concussion and they only had 15 players suited up at the end, but managed to rally in the fourth quarter for an 18-16 upset victory here Friday night
C-City, 14 -point underdogs going tailback/defensive back Robbie Smith and quarterback George Ramsey.
Smith rushed 12 times for 97 yards - including a 58 -yarder late in the game that set up the goahead touchdown - scored twice intercepted a pass in the end zone to prevent a Wylie score and recovered a blocked punt to set up a C-City TD.
Ramsey, meanwhile, overcame the concussion and a fearsome Wylie pass rush and completed nine of 15 passes for 116 yards.
"We have suffered a lot of in juries... It was just a valiant effort by a bunch of determined young men," Wolves' Head Coach

but they wouldn't accept that.
"Ronnie played an excellent game," Ramsey added. "He made a heck of a run when we needed it ... He punts for us, kicks field goals; we get our money's worth from him every game.

## What odds do you figure for the Oakland A's?

They are quivering in Toronto quaking in Boston and making merry in Pittsburgh and Cincinnati. To the rest of North America, this is known as delay ing the inevitable.
Unless of course, the rest of North America is wrong and the Oakland A's actually can be beaten.
"Yes," Jean Lemaire said without hesitation. "Of course they can.'
Lemaire knows baseball - even if he is a Frenchman and a Phillies fan who didn't see his first game until 10 years ago and didn't become a regular observer until seven years after that Lemaire knows baseball because Lemaire knows probability theory. And no other sport provides such bountiful and revealing statstics for the gleaning every day. Thus, with a little bit of calculating, what seems inexrest of us - the stumbling Pirates tearing off seven straight wins to

wrap up the NL East on Sunday, for example - is easily explained by Lemaire,
Given their up-and-down performance in the closing weeks of the season, the Pirates' streak may have looked improbable at first glance. But look at it again and probability shows that any team with a winning percentage of . 550 - which Pittsburgh was until they broke clear of the Mets the last days or so - has a 68 percent chance of winning seven straight games at least once in a season. in June; as much as anything else in June; as much as anything else then, the Pirates sim

The most probable outcome of the National League series is Pittsburgh in six games ( 16 percent) the least likely a sweep by the Reds ( 5.6 percent). Curiously, at 15.6 percent if the series went to seven games. If Pittsburgh ha the home field for the opener the the home field for the opener, the
improvement would have been in significant, climbing from 52.3 percent to 53.1 .
Without enough time or data to project the World Series, Lemaire was asked to play a hunch. 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## Golden Knights brighten sky

One of the highlights of the Vietnam Memorial Air Show today and Sunday will surely be the U.S. Army Parachute Team, the Golden Knights.
The team of 84 men and women are divided into sections that perform demonstrations and compete in all 50 states and 42 foreign countries.
A team of 10 or 12 jumpers will par ticipate in an average demonstration jump, said Staff Sgt. Jason Davis. together to discuss what kind of show ogether to discuss what kind of show
they're going to do beforehand," he said Known as "dirt diving," the practice sesKnown as dirt diving, the practice sesing the actual manuever, one jumper wears a video camera and a still camera attached to his helmet.
Most show jumps are performed at a minimum of 2,000 feet in the air, though not higher than 12,000 feet, Davis said. Before anyone jumps, crepe paper streamers are released from a side door of the plane to mark the landing spot. The roll of paper, about 20 feet long, is weighted to fall at the same speed as a human, and helps Knights judge wind speed and direction.
Davis said the Knights use square parachutes which travel at about 21 miles per hour in the air. Jumpers free fall for about 1 minute at an average speed of 120 mph before releasing the chute, he said.
While in the air, jumpers alter their body position by moving their arms and legs, Davis said. Linking wrist to wrist, formations and demonstrate safety formations
Staff Sgt. Randy Kiddy the show coordinator and a jumper with the team, is in his first year with the group. He has already made about 420 jumps. He said fear is a part of every one of them.
'A person who isn't scared is dangerous," Kiddy said. "You just have to control it. You have faith in your equipment and confidence in yourself.

Most injuries are students who think they know what they're doing," he said. "There's a lot of sa ty involved in it."

To become a Knight, a soldier must underge extensive training Davis said.

Every jump is used as a practice, he said. "We learn something every time We're on the road basically every weekend from the beginning of March to the end of November. That's a lot of umps.
During the winter months, the team goes to Arizona to work intensively, and they continue to train on days off throughout the year, he said.
Kiddy, after 16 years in the Army, said despite the danger, constant travel and intense training, he's sure jumping out of planes is the right career for him.
"It's fun," he said

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## Beginning football early

The Bears, Packers, Cowboys and other football teams will thunder across various Howard County gridirons today - in a slightly shortened fashion.
They won't be players from Chicago, Green Bay or Dallas showing their stuff on the local football fields; rather, their elementary age counterparts in the Crossroads Little Football League, which is now entering its fifth year of play in Big Spring, Coahoma and Forsan.
The league, open to boys and girls in grades 3-6, is an offshoot of two junior leagues that went out of existence in the early '80s, League President Earl Sherrill said.
"This started out as the Big Spring Youth Football League, which was open to boys in the fifth and sixth grades," Sherrill said. "Around 1978, a bunch of people affiliated with Little League baseball got
together and formed the PeeWee Footbal League, which was in existence until 1983 League, which was in existence until
"About five years ago, some of us wanted to see it started again, so we put out some feelers . . . and we advertised . . . and about seven people showed up for our first meeting."
The league has shown steady growth; from four teams and 89 players the first year, to 11 teams and 221 players on the current rosters.
"And that's not counting our
cheerleaders," Sherrill said. The league also has 141 young cheerleaders divided among the teams.

Sherrill pointed out that girls are allow ed to play alongside the boys. "If they want to play, we'll play them. We've even had a couple of boys as cheerleaders. Their brothers were playing but they didn't want to, so they became

## cheerleaders.'

Registration for the league is $\$ 15$ dollars - $\$ 20$ if the league has to provide equipment. Play began Sept. 15 and concludes Nov. 10 with the "Super Day of Super Bowls," which features two consolation games and a championship game in each of the league's two divisions.
The games are played according to University Interscholastic League and Na tional Collegiate Athletic Association rules with a few exceptions, Sherrill said.
One is that the field is 80 yards long, rather than the standard 100 . Another is that the clock continues running after incompletions and out-of-bounds plays, quickening the games.
Perhaps the biggest exception to the standard rules, however, has been instituted for player safety: a weight limit for running backs. Sherrill said that players over 95 pounds in Division I and 115 pounds in Division II must play on the line.
"If those players recover a fumble or intercept a pass or field a punt, the play is whistled dead at that spot," he said. Exceptions aside, however, Sherrill said the level of play can be quite advanced,
considering the players' ages.
'In Division II, we have a lot of coaches that are so good, that by the end of the season, their teams have about 75 plays in the playbook," Sherrill said. "We have one team in Division I that plays the run-andshoot offense . . . It's amazing what those kids can absorb
They'll get one to three trick plays in "Th playbooks and run them," he added The kids think it's great. They see all those plays anis the same thing dow they're.'
Safety is stressed throughout the league, he said. All coaches are required to provide first-aid kits and have plenty of water available and, if one of the players should be hurt in the game, he or she immediately goes to the sideline.
League officials are at every game and observe random practices to make sure coaches are not abusing their players, and rules such as a five-yard penalty for not wearing a mouthpiece are enforced at games, Sherrill said
"We've had your normal bumps and bruises and scrapes," Sherrill said. "As far as major injuries go, we've had two broken arms and a broken finger (since the league started). We've never had any major knee problems.
A large amount of credit for the league's
success, Sherrill said, goes to the coaches
"One of our best assets is the coaches," Sherrill said. "The only pay they get is
watching the kids they coached in the third and fourth grades perform at the high school level.
Most of them are dads,- he added, "but we have about a dozen coaches who don't have any kids in the league. They're out there just for the enjoyment; it can be a lot of fun."
Sherrill concedes, however, that the job does have its down side.
"The biggest problem we have is trying to make parents realize that we're out here working with the kids, trying to make them realize that we're not here necessari ly to win and that winning isn't everything," he said. "The parents take it harder than the kids do.
"We're out here for everybody," he add d. "We're trying to get the word out that we 'Il help underprid doed kids to
play . . . If the kid doesn't have enough money, that's OK. We'll take care of the money - that's what we have sponsors
for.
"We're keeping them off the street and out of trouble," Sherrill added. "We may not make a big difference, but we feel tha we help.

He also said that his job is very
enjoyable.

The president refused to sign or veto 11 th hour legislation passed by Congress restoring the government's power to spend money, choosing instead to let the shutdown
commence.
"The president simply feels we ought to quit fooling around," presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said. "Surely the reality of a government shutdown will convince everyone a solution should be The
The budget dispute has ing any appropriations bills for the fiscal year that began Monday ef fectively leaving the governmen with no money.
Only those services needed to "protect life and property" were to continue in the absence of a budget, White House budget director Richard Darman wrote in a memo to agency chiefs.
With the long holiday weekend about to start, it seemed likely that the full brunt of the shutdown would not be felt until Tuesday. But

examination of the university's accounting system prior to its merger with A\&M, was released Thursday in Austin.
According to the audit, the athletic fund is losing $\$ 1.2$ million a year. Auxiliary enterprises such as the bookstore, housing system and food service were being used to cover the losses, the report said.
In 1988, those auxiliary funds, dragged down by the moneylosing athletic program, came up $\$ 501,583$ short. In 1989 , they were $\$ 1.2$ million in the red.
To accommodate the negative cash flow, "it appears that education and general funds, as well a federal funds, have been used,"
