Ever since we enjoyed our first holiday picnic on the river when we were a kid in the first grade, we have liked holidays. The very thought of a holiday makes us want to dig worms and gather up our hook and line and head for the nearest fishing hole. But this idea of celebrating Armistice Day has us puzzled. As we read in the daily papers where "Chinese Reds are joining the fight in Korea," and "Soviets Ordered Red Chinese to Invade Korea," we try to find some reason for the same newspaper to carry headlines on its front page like, "Nation to Celebrate Armistice Day November 11." The soil must be in a good condition and have the capacity to hold moisture and yet provide good drainage. This kind of soil can be made by mixing three parts of loam soil; one part of decomposed organic matter such as peat moss, composted material or leaf mold; and one part of sand. Into this mixture add 1 tablespoonful of complete plant food for each gallon of soil. Gravel or small pebbles and a little sand should be placed in the bottom 1 to 2 inches of the window box or pot before the soil is added. This is a very important requirement and should not be omitted, since the lack of proper drainage is one of the most common reasons for

failure with indoor plants. While providing for proper light conditions and the best physical condition of the soil medium, regular care in the matter of watering, cleansing and insect control are also important for success of indoor gardening. Equally important is the pro-vision of an ample supply of plant food nutrients. A friable soil can be unfertile. In the case of house plants, where the ratio of soil volume to the plant vol-ume is very low, frequent feed-ing is essential. Allow one level tablespoonful of complete plant food for each square foot of soil area and feed everey four to six weeks. The plant food should be worked into the soil near the edge of the box or pot and watered in thoroughly.

New Rat Poisoning-Warfarin Now Available

A lot of publicity has been in the papers and on the air lately concerning the new rat control compound. This is known as Compound 42 or the coined name Warfarin.

Warfarin reduces or prevents clotting of the blood when consumed in very small quantities over a period of several days. In most cases the chemical produces painless death to animals cal by causing internal bleeding.

Warfarin will not give effective control when applied in a single dose. It must be ingested several times, usually 5 or more, on successive days. These feedings need not be on consecutive days, but should occur within a 10 day interval with no period longer than 48 hours between feeding. Thus, it is important that ample quantities of bait be available at all times during the baiting program. Since baits may not be accepted when first pound packages in sacks. Just this drug. It takes consecutive feeding over a period of three to five days to kill the rats and the bait must be replenished if it is all consumed the first feeding. The bait could also be put out in open trays or cups, but the first method is the best way yet found.

Don't forget that this poison is now available at the County Agents office in Baird.


