# Renewal of the Residential Safe Room Rebate Program

The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) announced the start of the renewed Panhandle Residential Safe Room Rebate Program. This program provides Texas Panhandle residents assistance with the installation of safe rooms, or tornado shelters, meeting the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) standards for wind resiliency, in or around their homes. Applicants accepted for this program will receive a rebate of up to 50%, not to exceed

\$3,000.00, for the installation of a FEMA-compliant shelter at their place of residence.

"No doubt, anyone who has spent any amount of time in the Panhandle is well-familiar with tornados," said John Kiehl, PRPC Regional Services Director. "This program was designed for areas of the country like ours. This region is prone to tornados and many homes don't come equipped with basements. When tornados strike, people need a safe place to shelter; one that's built to withstand the type of punch a tornado can carry. That's really what this program is about; it provides folks the opportunity to affordably protect themselves and their families when tornados threaten their community."

The PRPC previously operated the Residential Safe Room Rebate Program between 2006 and 2008. During those two years, the program resulted in the installation of 1,415 tornado shelters in homes across the Panhandle. For this renewed program, the PRPC currently has 350 rebates available.

Residents interested in applying for a rebate can download the application package from the PRPC's website at: www. theprpc.org or they can contact Elizabeth Thomas, PRPC's Regional Services Program Specialist for the package at (806) 372-3381. Applications for this round of rebates will be accepted by the PRPC through February 18, 2011.

"I had the pleasure of working with the region's original shelter

program," said Ms. Thomas, "and I'm looking forward to this next phase of the project. The residents I interacted with felt a great sense of comfort just knowing they had a safe place to go, when their local tornado sirens sounded."

The Panhandle Residential Safe Room Rebate Program is being funded by a grant received by the PRPC from FEMA under the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program. This program is open to residents throughout the 26-county area of the Texas Panhandle.

# the Editor

As you read this, our state representatives are meeting in Austin to balance the state budget for 2012-2013. One of the proposals they are considering is to cut Medicaid reimbursement to nursing homes and rehab centers by 33 percent. They have just passed a 2 percent cut in our reimbursement that goes into effect February 1, which followed a reduction that was effective September 2010. Texas already lags behind most other states in their Medicaid reimbursement levels. Medicaid is the main source of payment for the majority of Texas seniors living in nursing homes.

Cuts of this size will make it difficult for nursing homes to provide quality care to residents, and it will affect the prosperity of our community, as jobs will probably be lost. Please contact your representatives in Austin and tell them how you feel about these proposed cuts.

Governor Rick Perry issued the following statement on U.S. District Judge Roger Vinson's ruling that the individual mandate required by the federal health care reform bill is unconstitutional:

"Today's ruling represents a victory in the ongoing effort to end federal intrusion into the lives of every American through this one-size-fits-all approach to health care reform. I applaud the judge's decision, which affirms that the federal government's attempt to force individuals to buy government-approved health insurance is an egregious violation of our Constitutional rights."

"I commend Attorney General Abbott's efforts to protect Texans from this misguided federal overreach, and look forward to continuing to work with Texas leaders and Congress to find responsible solutions for our state's health care needs."

In this lawsuit, Texas, along with 25 other states, challenged the individual mandate in Obamacare, maintaining that Congress does not have the authority to force individuals to buy health insurance. This administration continues to spend excessively and impose unfunded mandates upon the states, including this federal health care reform bill that will cost Texas taxpayers more than \$27 billion over 10 years for the Medicaid expansion starting in 2014.

#### General sign-up for CRP program


Speaking at the National Pheasant Fest 2011, Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that the next general signup for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) will begin on March 14, 2011, and continue through April 15, 2011. This is the second consecutive year that USDA has offered a general CRP signup.

Through CRP, eligible landowners receive annual rental payments and cost-share assistance to establish long-term, resource conserving covers on eligible farmland. Land can be enrolled for a period of up to 15 years. During the general signup period, farmers and ranchers may offer eligible land at their county Farm Service Agency (FSA) office.

Land currently not enrolled in CRP may be offered in this sign-up provided all eligibility requirements are met. Additionally, current CRP participants with contracts expiring this fall may make new contract offers. Contracts awarded under this sign-up are scheduled to become effective October 1, 2011. The general sign-up for CRP will not affect cropped acres for this growing season. Acres will be enrolled in the program in the fall.

The FSA implements CRP on behalf of Commodity Credit Corporation. FSA will evaluate and rank eligible CRP offers using an Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) that shows the environmental benefits to be gained from enrolling the land in CRP. The EBI consists of five environmental factors (wildlife, water, soil, air, and enduring benefits) and cost. Decisions on the EBI cutoff will be made after the sign-up ends and after analyzing the EBI data of all the offers.



### DPS announces DRP amnesty program details

Texans whose driver licenses have been suspended for failing to pay state-mandated surcharges are urged to take advantage of a one-time payment amnesty from January 17 to April 17, 2011.

The Texas Department of Public Safety will offer lower payments to individuals who have been suspended and are in default on their surcharges. The goal of the amnesty period is to bring drivers into compliance with the surcharge law, and allow them to become licensed and insured drivers. The amnesty reduction does not apply to any other fees that you may owe the Department.

Those eligible for the Amnesty Program are anyone who had a surcharge assessed between September 30, 2004, and December 31, 2008, and were delinquent on those payments. The surcharges meeting the above criteria must be in default before the amnesty period.

Those who qualify for the Amnesty Program will pay 10 percent of the original amount owed for all surcharges combined, for a maximum amount of \$250. Service fees will still apply. Any payments already made will be applied to the reduced amount, and if prior payments are more than the reduced amount due, no payment will be required. Prior payments more than the reduced amount due will not be refunded.

To apply for the Amnesty Program beginning January 17, 2011, see our surcharge website at www.txsurchargeonline. com or call 1-877-207-3170. No requests will be accepted by mail, email or fax.

Once the online or telephone application is approved, the surcharge suspensions will be cleared on the applicant's driving record within three business days. Applicants will be provided the reduced amount to pay, and they can begin making payments after three business days.

Applicants for the Amnesty Program can pay in full or make payments, but the full amount must be paid by April 17, 2011. If payment in full is not received by April 17, 2011, the reduction is voided and the suspensions are put back on the driving record. The Department does not have plans to offer another amnesty period.

#### Feed-grains marketing workshop Feb 16-17 in Amarillo

BY KAY LEDBETTER

One of the most fascinating years grain producers have ever faced lies ahead of them in the wake of tightest carryover stocks in history, expected increases in ethanol production and relatively high competing commodity prices, said a Texas AgriLife Extension Service specialist.

A two-day workshop is scheduled February 16-17 to help producers gain a better understanding of the fundamentals affecting the feedgrains market this year, according to Dr. Steve Amosson, AgriLife Extension economist and coordinator of the program.

The program, which will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day, will be held at the Texas AgriLife Research and Extension Center-Amarillo, 6500 W. Amarillo Blvd. Attendees will look at cost of production, fundamentals of ethanol, feed use and exchange rates on exports, basis, technical analysis, cash and contract seasonality and marketing strategies, he said.

"The ultimate goal of the workshop is for the producers attending to develop a written marketing plan for the 2011 crop," Amosson said. "If producers just pick up one piece of information that helps them improve their marketing a dime, that's equal to \$10,000 on a section of corn production. I don't see how a producer can afford to miss this opportunity."

Amosson and Dr. March Welch, AgriLife Extension grain marketing specialist from College Station, will serve as the primary instructors. A local industry panel will provide additional insights into the 2011 markets.

"Given the tight supplies and expected use, it is almost impossible to predict where commodity markets will end up this year," he said.

"However, it is a given there will be extreme volatility, and where there is volatility, there is opportunity."

Amosson said it is critical for producers to understand what is expected for the upcoming year, and what marketing tools and strategies they have available to them to develop a sound marketing plan.

Pre-registration is required and attendance is limited to 60. The cost of the workshop is \$125 per participant and covers the costs associated with instruction, breaks, meals and materials.


