

I just completed my third TALL (Texas Agriculture Lifetime Leadership) session. This session was in Austin and I had the opportunity to meet and listen to numerous politicians and agency directors.

The list of speakers included David Dewhurst the Lieutenant Governor, Todd Staples the Texas Ag Commissioner, Joe Straus the Speaker of the House of Representatives, plus we met with numerous Representatives and Senators including Warren Chisum and Kel Seliger representing our area.

The one issue that everyone focused on was the current budget shortfall and the possibility of using the Texas \$9 billion dollar rainy day fund. Everyone reiterated that there would be no more taxes. Senator Ogden, the Senate Finance Chairman was very honest in stating that any proposed budget which did not use most of the rainy day fund would not have the votes to pass. Therefore, it's almost a given that the rainy day fund will be used. It is obvious that there will be numerous and significant budget cuts coming out of Austin. There will also be an increase in the number of "fee based" services.

I also met with Judge Priscilla Owens from the U.S. Court of Appeals Fifth Circuit, and she discussed all the challenges the court system is currently dealing with. In addition, the Assistant Attorney General discussed the ongoing legal battle between the State of Texas and the U.S. government over national mandated health care and EPA regulations. Dr. Bryan Shaw, the Chairman of the TCEQ (Texas Commission on environmental Quality) the lead environmental agency for the State of Texas, also stated that the federal EPA seems to have a political agenda instead of merely implementing and enforcing its own regulations.

I attended a "Tribute to Texas Leadership" honoring former U.S. Representative Larry Combest who represented our area from 1985 to 2003. During the evening, the TALL members were asked to stand up and introduce ourselves. I went a step further and invited everyone in attendance to the Friona Cheeseburger Festival. After the program, Larry tracked me down from the 200 plus people in attendance and inquired further about the Cheeseburger Festival. He even went so far as to write the date, July 16 down in his planner. He says he is a big fan of Cheeseburgers!

I also ran into Shayne Woodard, a Friona native who now lives and works in Austin. He keeps up with the happenings in Friona through the on-line Friona Star. It's always great to run into someone you know. My next TALL session is in Washington D.C. in April. I'll be sure and write about my adventures in the nation's capital.

Winter-kill of wheat

Record cold temperatures during the first week of February, coupled with drought conditions in the area, could lead to winter-kill of wheat in some fields, according to Texas AgriLife Extension Service specialists.

"Winter-kill is not the same thing as freeze damage that we occasionally experience in March and April after wheat has broken dormancy and has entered the reproduction stage of development (jointing)," said Dr. Brent Bean, AgriLife Extension agronomist.

Winter-kill occurs when the crown of dormant wheat is damaged by freezing conditions, Bean said, and it is very unusual for the Texas Panhandle to have true winter-kill in wheat. Typically, he said, wheat becomes vulnerable to winter-kill when temperatures get into the single digits for a significant period of time.

Wheat that will be most susceptible to winter-kill will be wheat with little tillering and with poor root systems and planted dryland, he said. Typically, this will be later-planted wheat. The dry soil conditions will increase the risk. Soil moisture tends to provide a buffer against cold temperatures around the crown region of the plant.

Wheat planted under clean tillage conditions will also be at more risk since there will be little crop residue to help insulate the soil, Bean said.

"The lack of snow cover, along with the dry soil conditions, is what is potentially putting the wheat crop at risk as a result of these record-low temperatures," he said. "Even an inch of snow will have some insulation benefits to wheat." Assessing winter-kill damage will not be easy in the short term, Bean said.

"Initially we are likely to see desiccated leaves. This will cause the wheat to look very bad, but does not necessarily mean the crown is damaged. If the crown is not damaged, the wheat will grow back," he said. "We will likely need at least a week of warm temperatures before the wheat crowns can be examined for damage, and it could very well take several weeks to know the true extent of any damage."

"As always, never give up too quickly on wheat," he said. "We really do not know if, or how much, wheat winter-kill has occurred or will occur in the Texas Panhandle. Wheat varieties we grow here are typically very winter-hardy.

"Probably the more critical problem we are having is the ongoing drought," he said. "If we can get precipitation fairly soon, and spring weather is favorable, the Panhandle as a whole could still have a decent wheat crop."


