Emotions are too expensive

Would you pay $\$ 15$ to sample an assortment of snacks worth less than half that at full retail prices? Of course not. Yet, more than 100,000 Americans have paid this ex-
orbitant price to an enterprising firm in Virginia to have so-called "G.I. Gift Pacs" delivered in their names to ser vicemen and servicewomen in Saudia Arabia.
The emotional appeal being advertised in newspapers across the nation is designed to prey on the sympathy
most everyone has for our troops in the Persian Gulf, A most everyone has for our troops in the Persian Guif. A
headline in the advertisement reads: "Please send a G.I. Gift Pac. Tell a G.I. in Saudi Arabia you care!"
Gift Pacs contain two small bags of potato chips, a bag Gift Pacs contain two small bags of potato chips, a bag
of tortilla chips, nuts, "goldfish" crackers, cookies, of tortilla chips, nuts, "goldfish" crackers, cooks,
raisins, dates, butterscotch and peppermint candies, Cor raisins, dates, butterscotch and peppermind Sweetarts. The cost of the contents, packaging
nnuts and and shipping to an A.P.O. on the East Coast is approximately $\$ 7$.
So where does the other $\$ 8$ go? Like many other questionable charities, the majority of donor funds for G.I.
Gift Pacs are used to pay for advertising and other exGift Pacs are used to pay for advertising and other ex-
penses, including high executive salaries. penses, including high executive salaries agencies are of little help in judging performances. The National Charity Information Bureau states that at least 60 percent of a group's proceeds should go directly into its charitable project. The Better Business Bureau standard is that "at least 50 percent of total income should be spent
on programs and activities directly related to the organization's purpose.
A better measure of a charity's work is the percentage of donor funds that actually reach beneficiaries. The finest charities manage to maintain rates of 90 percent or
more.
GIs in the Persian Gulf deserve no less.

## Volunteers comb streets in annual homeless count

| BOSTON (AP) - Scores of volunteers climbed through fences into vacant lots strewn with broken glass and searched rat-infested alleys early today in Boston's annual count of the homeless - the nation's only tally of its kind. $\qquad$ more than 100 volunteers set out at midnight and combed 35 zones in a count that helps other cities estimate their homeless needs. Another increase in the homeless population was expected this <br> Homeless people encountered by the volunteers were often offered a bed or food. In most cases, the volunteers simply counted the bodies where they found them in subway stations, behind trash bins, on benches and roaming bins, on benches and roaming around. "Hi, how are you? You wanna go to a shelter?" go to a shelter?"' Mayor Ray- mond Flynn asked a women curled up in the doorway of an ice cream store. Her puffed up face lay on a pile of possessions. woman, nemed Suzy, replied gripping her blanket in the relatively mild winter night. Temperatures were in the 30s. <br> I see her there every night," said Flynn. "She's mentally ill. She needs medication. The figures, which will be tabulated this week, are used to lobby for money, determine where to build shelters determine where to build shelters and develop services. <br> "We really make the promise no one will go without a sheiter bed," said Ann Maguire, executive director of Boston's Emergency Shelter Commission, a city office. "This is how we all of them." <br> In 1989, 3,830 homeless people were documented, an 11 percent Currently, $\$ 3$ million is spent on beds and services for the homeless. <br> Homeless advocates and city officials said there probably would be an increase in the number of homeless this year. <br> Maguire said the past four head counts have accurately portrayed the homeless population. Last year, 128 men and 29 | women were found on the street. <br> 'If we don't find too many we feel we're successful at sheltering them," Richarch Weintraub, director of the city's three shelters. three shelters. <br> In a subway station, Flynn and the volunteers found a man in his 30s bundled in a coat and his arms curled around his head asleep at passage. Asked if he wanted to go to a shelter, he said, "Leave me alone. <br> Another man was propped up on a bench sipping coffee, holding a bag from a doughnut shop. Volunteers tried to get him to a shelter, but the man was incoherent. <br> Other people showed signs of drinking. An intoxicated man was persuaded to enter a homeless shelter sheiter <br> Flynn's national Task Force on Hunger and Homeless is due to release a major study Wednes day.
