Dee King to take over country club

Former Friona resident Dee King, owner of Dee King Trucking, is near finalizing an agreement with the Friona Country Club board of directors and the Friona Economic Development Corporation to lease and assume the operation of the country club and golf course.

King met with the FEDC board last Thursday to seek approval of the transfer of an agreement between the club and the FEDC into his name. The Friona city council approved the measure Monday night paving the way for King to proceed with the takeover. The FEDC had given the country club board a \$30,000 loan in 2009. Terms required that the club be kept open to the public and onethird of the loan would be forgiven each year for three years. Although the official paperwork is not yet final, King said he took over operation of the club on Monday March 14. He expects all contracts to be formalized in the next couple of weeks. He has brought in a former club employee, Bobby Sansom, as manager.

Six sign-ups for school board, no election for the city council

The sign-up period for election to the Friona city council and the FISD board of trustees ended Monday March 14 at 5 p.m.

Three seats on the city council were up for election. The only candidates signing up were incumbents Jim Atwell, Mark Osborn, and Charlie Pope. With three candidates and three vacancies the May 14 city election will be canceled.

A total of six candidates have signed-up for the two available school board seats. The terms of Danny Hand and Tracy Bunker are expiring. Hand declined to run for another term. The six candidates are incumbent Tracy Bunker, Ben Osborn, Freddy Moreno, Greg O'Brian, Wade Schueler, and Antonio Rocha.

The school board election will be May 14 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in the city council chambers, 619 Main St. Early voting will be May 2-10 by personal appearance at the FISD administration office, 909 E. 11th.



The current board has been in a financial struggle for several years to keep the country club operational. Green fee and cart rental revenue had diminished. Not as many members were regular golfers. Membership dues were not enough to support the operation.

The board is basically turning over the club operation to King. He will have a lease agreement but no money will exchange hands in the deal. King will assume the club debt and expenses and be challenged to increase club revenues and attract more golfers, hence more revenue. Exact details of the final agreement are not known at this time for publication. King said he planned a grand opening promotion in the near future. Mayor J.B. Douglas, also an FEDC board member, told the city council Monday that the board was impressed with Mr. King and his plans for revitalizing the country club. They feel he will be a positive benefit for the community.

Runny eggs on creamy grits Serves 4

5 1/2 cups water

1/2 tsp salt

1 1/2 cups quick grits

2 tbsp unsalted butter, plus more for frying eggs 1/3 cup finely grated Parmigiano Reggiano cheese 1/4 cup finely chopped green onions, white and green parts 4 slices crisp cooked bacon crumbled Fresh ground black pepper 8 eggs

1. Combine water and salt in a medium saucepan. Bring to a boil. Gradually whisk in grits. Reduce heat to low, cover and cook, whisking often until thick and creamy. Stir in two tablespoons butter, cheese, green onions, bacon, and pepper. Cook 5 more minutes.

2. Melt additional butter in a large nonstick skillet over medium-high heat. Fry eggs until whites are set and yolks are still runny. Or poach eggs in boiling water three minutes.

3. Spoon grits into bowls. Top with eggs.



Closing state budget gap with Rainy Day Fund

Joe Straus, and Comptroller Susan Combs announced the decision to close out the Fiscal Year 2011 budget our revenue fell during the gap by implementing \$800 million in cuts, using \$300 million from increased sales tax collections over the last few months, and using a one-time draw not to exceed \$3.2 billion from the state's Economic Stabilization Fund, also known as the Rainy Day Fund.

"We have worked closely with state leaders and lawmakers to balance the current budget, which includes using a one-time amount from the Economic Stabilization Fund to help our budget deal with the impact of the national recession," Gov. Perry said. "As we craft the next two-year budget, Texas leaders will continue to focus on a more efficient, fiscally responsible government, essential state services, and private sector job creation. I remain steadfastly committed to protecting the remaining balance of the Rainy Day Fund, and will not sign a 2012-2013 state budget that uses the Rainy Day Fund."

Hands off the rainy day fund

"We are disappointed to learn that Texas will likely resort to using its rainy day fund this early in the legislative session. Legislators in both the House and Senate should heed Speaker Straus' commitment to continue looking for budget savings that will reduce any draw on the rainy day fund.

"Having partially depleted the rainy day fund for the current biennium's deficit, it is imperative that the Legislature not use any more of it to help fill the next biennium's shortfall. The Governor reiterated his pledge to not sign a 2012-13 budget that includes rainy day funds-and Texans will expect him to keep that pledge.

"Those who seek to empty the fund because it is raining today have not checked the longrange weather forecast. Our recent report, Final Notice: Medicaid Crisis, projected that Texas' Medicaid program would require between \$10 billion and \$15.6 billion in additional state funds in the 2014-2015 budget cycle, the low estimate representing the cost if ObamaCare is repealed. Thus, we can reasonably predict that economic pressures on the Texas state budget will be even more severe in the next legislative session.

"It is the duty of those elected to government to govern-and it is the duty of those who elected them to hold them accountable. Now, more than ever, Texans must demand that their Legislature craft a responsible, conservative state budget with no further use of the rainy day fund."

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More time needed to get water rules right

New water use regulations for a 16 county region of the High Plains are of such monumental importance to the region's economy that they should not be rushed to a hasty adoption, David Gibson, executive vice president of the Corn Producers Association of Texas, said Friday.

"Water use determines the productivity of agriculture, which is the number one driver of the economy of Lubbock and the surrounding region," Gibson said. "The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District is not under a specific deadline to adopt new regulations, so it's vital that they take the time to do it right."

Draft regulations to place new restrictions on water use, written for implementation in May, were made available to the public for the first time on February 25 with a deadline for public comments of April 1. "After meeting with more than 400 agricultural producers in four town hall meetings this week, it's clear there is a tremendous amount of concern over provisions in the draft that are vague and confusing, as well as uncertainty about the impact this will have on the economy," Gibson said. "There are many, many questions that need answers."

The proposed water restrictions would dramatically affect income, land values, loan repayments, business expenditures and local tax revenues in ways that could reverberate through the entire economy of the South Plains, he said.

"In each one of our meetings this week, people wanted to know if any economic studies had been done on the impact of the draft," Gibson said. "We know the district has had economic impact studies done by economists at Texas Tech University and that information should be released to the news media and the public before the district holds its public meetings beginning on March 23." "The main thing that came out of our meetings with produc-

ers this week was a desire to work with the members of the district's board to find ways to meet future water conservation goals without stifling the region's economic growth." .

The district has scheduled public meetings on the draft regulations on March 23 in Hereford and Littlefield, March 24 in Dimmitt and Lubbock, and March 25 in Plainview.


County sales tax received

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs the state's sales tax revenue in February was \$1.75 billion, an increase of 9.7 percent compared to February 2010.

"This is the 11th straight month that sales tax revenue has increased," said Combs. "Much like in recent months, there were increases across all major sectors including oil and gas activity, manufacturing and retail trade. We will continue to monitor current economic conditions and gauge the effects on consumer and business spending."

State sales tax revenue for February and March payments made to local governments represent sales that occurred in January. Parmer County's March 2011 payment totaled \$39,447.99 broken down as Bovina \$7,304.85; Farwell \$7,047.12; and Friona \$25,096.02. In March 2010 the tax payment total was \$33,340.30.

Comparing tax receipts from the same period last year, payments were up 18.31%, broken down as Bovina 43.54%; Farwell -5.50%; and Friona 20.68%. For the year, Parmer County cities have received a total of \$140,393.55 as compared to \$114,984.64 for the same period last year, a 22.09% change. The Comptroller's April sales tax allocation will be made on Friday, April 8, 2011.

Seliger files bill to reduce unnecessary testing

State Senator Kel Seliger (R-Amarillo) filed Senate Bill 1403 to reward those students who consistently perform well on the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) by exempting them from testing in certain years. "There are some students whose progress is evident and testing provides little additional information. We should not test just for exercise," said Seliger.

Current testing data has consistently shown that student performance is over 95% predictable for high achieving students from one year to the next. A student who performs at a certain level on TAKS one year will almost certainly pass the following year. Senate Bill 1403 will exempt those students who score at the top levels in third and fifth grades from taking the tests in fourth, sixth, and seventh grades respectively. All students will still be required to test in math and reading in grades 3, 5 and 8.

In addition to reducing costs to local school districts for test preparation, administration and grading, Senate Bill 1403 will allow teachers more time to focus on those students who are most academically at-risk, and utilize innovative methods to help those children learn.

While he is the newest member of the Senate Education Committee, Senator Seliger has long advocated for a more effective and accurate measure of student performance. During the 80th Legislature, Senator Seliger was a co-author of Senate Bill 1031 by Senator Florence Shapiro, a bill that replaced the TAKS test with end-of-course exams at the high school level.

"We want to make sure that our emphasis is on learning, not high stakes testing. Senate Bill 1403 gets us closer to that goal. I appreciate the input from educators in Senate District 31, who help shape all of my education related legislation," Seliger stated.

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

In addition, there will be presentations on assessing the forage base in playas and understanding how playa plants respond to grazing, with an overall focus on how grazing, properly applied, can help create healthy playa habitats.

At 11:50 a.m., a home-cooked meal will be served by "My Happy Place Restaurant". During lunch, remarks on playa wildlife opportunities will be given by Ken Cearly, a Texas AgriLife Extensionist from Canyon, and playa enthusiast and outdoorsman, Jim Steiert of Hereford.

The event will close with a special presentation on Ogallala Aquifer saturated thickness and depletion rates by Dr. Kevin Mulligan, Department of Geosciences at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.
