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

It's time for you to go "back to school"

After reading your comments about the" rant" from TSTA, I feel some corrections are in order. First of all, last time I checked, public educators can't be represented by unions in Texas, which always has been, and I hope, always will be a right-to-work state. NEA may be classified as a "union" in many states, but not in Texas. TSTA is a professional organization, which has had a strong tradition of representing educators in the state of Texas for several generations. Handicapped by its NEA affiliation and increasing dues, TSTA has seen membership decline in past years. I was a proud member of TSTA every one of the 34 years I was an educator.

If I had a dollar for every time someone has said, "You can't pay teachers enough for what they do", I would be on a beach on my own island right now. It seems that the public just makes these statements and shrugs their shoulders. Unfortunately, because educators have always been willing to sit back and wait for the decision-makers to do the right thing, many of the statistics quoted in the article were correct.

I firmly believe we can either do our best to educate our children for a few years or feed them the rest of their lives. There are many issues such as immigration and welfare, which complicate the issue, but children don't seem to have much of a lobbying presence in Austin. TSTA may be too liberal for most Texans, but when it advocates for things like smaller class size or (heaven forbid) pay raises, don't call it a union and write it off.

Although I don't agree with the writer that the blame lies solely with the legislature, I do think there are too many people who are too many degrees (literally and figuratively) removed from the classroom making rules about how we educate our children. No one listens to the classroom teacher anymore, and that's what TSTA has always tried to get lawmakers and the public to do. (My apologies to the memory of a classroom teacher of the top echelon, Mrs. Truitt, if I didn't proofread carefully enough!)



Pesticide training Apr 13 in Hereford

Training for private applicators of pesticides is scheduled in Hereford on Wednesday, April 13, at the Nita Lea building, 903 14th St., according to Rick Auckerman, County Extension Agent for Agriculture and Natural Resources.

The class will be offered for agricultural producers and interested individuals who want to obtain a private applicator pesticide license. Those applicants who pass the test will be eligible for licensing through the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Registration will cost \$10 per person. There is an additional fee for training manuals, but purchase is optional. Training will begin at 9:00 a.m. and will end about 1:00 p.m. The test will be administered to Amarillo on Thursday, April 14, at the District AgriLife Extension Office, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West.

Today people keep pictures of friends on Face book, but in the late 1700s and early 1800s, friends were captured on portrait miniatures painted on pocket-sized pieces of ivory, wood or paper.

For the first time in over 25 years, a significant portion of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum's portrait miniature collection will be exhibited in Eastern American and European Art from the Permanent Collection opening April 9 in the Foran Gallery. Both British and American artists painted most of these portrait miniatures between 1780 and 1850.

Along with the miniatures, the Hudson River School, Impressionism, Tonalism and the Ash Can School are all movements in art history represented in the Eastern American and European art found at PPHM. Although the museum's name would suggest the permanent collection consists of works from the area, the collection reflects the taste of those who lived on the Panhandle Plains.

The art will reveal the types of Eastern American and European art that have interested area residents since the 1890s. Typically, individuals obtained these objects after they had settled in the area, although some were family heirlooms. European works in the exhibition provide a cross-section of art completed from the 16th century through the early 20th century from Great Britain, The Netherlands, France, Italy, Spain, Russia and Germany. The museum's largest holdings are with the 19th-century British school and the 17th-century Dutch school.

Other important artists represented in the PPHM's European collection include Italian Renaissance painter Marco Bello; Spanish Impressionist Martin Rico y Ortega; Thomas Creswick, a popular British Victorian painter; Peter Eduard Stroehling, a German painter who painted portraits for the British Royal Family; and Dutch painter Johannes H.L. de Haas.

Prominent among the Eastern American artists are Hudson River School painter Jasper Francis Cropsey; American Barbizon painter George Inness, proponent of the American Barbizon movement; Ralph A. Blakelock, a Hudson River School artist turned visionary; Bruce Crane, an American Tonalist; and genre painter Louis Charles Moeller.

About 75 works of art in oil, watercolor, charcoal and ink, as well as sculpture in bronze and ceramic will be included in the exhibition which will run through September 5, 2011.
