Craig N. Coon, Ph.D. inducted as Distinguished Graduate

In ceremonies Sunday May 15 during the Senior Academic Reception at Friona High School, Class of 1962 graduate Craig N. Coon, Ph.D. was inducted into the FHS Hall of

He was nominated in 1973 by the Biochemistry and Biophysics Department as the Outstanding Graduate Student from Texas A&M.

He has served as a faculty member at the University of Maryland, Washington State University, University of Minnesota, and the University of Arkansas. Dr. Coon's research interests are nutrient utilization, environmental interactions with nutrition, feedstuff evaluation, and amino acid metabolism. He has been awarded approximately \$5 million in extramural research grants from the allied feed industry and from U.S. and international livestock and poultry companies during his 40-year career. Dr. Coon has been responsible for teaching Principles of Nutrition for undergraduates and Biochemical Nutrition and Amino Acid and Protein Nutrition and Metabolism for graduate degrees. His students currently hold significant academic and industry positions and are highly sought after for new positions in the industry. He has published over 250 refereed papers and 9 book chapters. His main focus has been poultry nutrition but he has also published nutrition research in the field of rat, dairy, swine, and horse nutrition. Dr. Coon is often invited to many international and national locations to speak on poultry nutrition. He has given more than 300 presentations on nutrition in 43 different countries.

Craig Coon was born in Big Spring, Texas on May 17, 1944 to Clarence Nelson and Valrie Holcomb-Coon. His dad was stationed in the Air Force in Big Spring working on B-17 and B-29 bomber sights during WWII.


After WWII his parents farmed near Lamesa and later bought a small farm 10 miles east of Friona. Craig went to school in Friona from midterm in the 5th grade through graduation in 1962. During his years at FHS he was active in 4-H and FFA, livestock judging, and enjoyed showing pigs and steers at various livestock shows.

He has two sons, Steven Russell Coon, an attorney in Minneapolis, Minnesota, and Michael Clay Coon, a business logistic manager for Sears in Dallas.

Dr. Craig Coon received his B.S. degree in Animal Science from Texas A&M University in 1966. After serving the country in Viet Nam in 1967-68 he returned to A&M and received his Master's Degree in Plant Physiology and Biochemistry in 1970 and his Ph.D. in Biochemistry and Biophysics in 1973.

Total votes were Bunker 158, Schueler 104, Ben Osborn 74, Antonio Rocha 71, Greg O'Brian 56, and Fredie Merino 22. A total of 244 citizens voted, 137 in early voting and 107 on May 14. The Friona ISD shows 2,047 registered voters in the district. The school board election had a 12% turnout.

I just completed my fourth session with the Texas Agriculture Lifetime Leadership (TALL) program. This session was in Washington D.C., Maryland, Pennsylvania, and New York. The list of speakers and agriculture tours was very lengthy, so I'll just hit the highlights.

I met with Tom Vilsack the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture and with Congressman Frank Lucus, chairman of the Agriculture Sub-Committee charged with writing the 2012 Farm Bill. The general consensus is that ethanol subsidies will remain, all other commodity subsidies are gone, and the farm bill won't be released until late 2012.

We also met with several Congressmen who spoke on the effects of EPA regulations and Immigration reform on agriculture. With all the budget concerns in Washington, the key phrases are "improving efficiencies" and "streamlining operations". I also had a White House briefing the day after Osama Bin Laden was shot. The security was overwhelming. We learned of the President's agenda on Rural Affairs, Energy, and Immigration. We also had a briefing on the "Get Fit" initiative of the First Lady.

In New York City we heard how the Farm Credit System raises capital and about the new lending environment for agriculture. We also heard about the state of the economy from an F.D.I.C. economist. In case you hadn't heard, the recession is over. They showed a chart, which tracked Wall Street bonuses. Although less than a third of the amount given pre-recession, bonuses are now approaching \$140 thousand. Apparently, that signals the recession is over and the economy is rebounding.

Just a short bus ride from Wall Street, we toured the West Harlem Food Pantry and ate lunch at the community soup kitchen. They prepared a special meal for their Texas guests. We had fried chicken, baked macaroni and cheese, green beans, and sweet potato pie. Apparently, some of the residents of West Harlem were also unaware that the recession was over.

In Maryland, Pennsylvania, and upper state New York, we toured a variety of agriculture sites and heard from several agriculture leaders. Although the type and size of agriculture in this area is vastly different from that in the Texas Panhandle, they still have many of the same problems and concerns that we do. However, there are also some major differences.

We toured a turf farm in Orange County New York which depends on drainage ditches to remove excess water from the fields of lush green grass. We have problems getting water on the fields, and they have problems getting water off the fields. Some farmers were delaying planting because the fields were too wet.

My next session of TALL is in July in Houston. It will focus on Gulf Coast farming, Port of Houston, Prison System food distribution, NASA, and Marine Biology. I'll write and let everyone know of my adventures with that session.

Fixing our broken immigration system fish you et . . . Some would

Most Americans don't recognize it, but farmers and the food they put on our tables play an important role in the high quality of life we enjoy.

Because our food is very affordable compared to most other countries, American families can spend more of their income on a home, their retirement, a vacation, or college education for their children.


Many people are surprised to learn that immigrant labor plays an important role in making this possible. Every time you take a bite of American food, somebody picked it, processed it, shipped it, stored it, trucked it and shelved it. Many of these folks are immigrants. But today, our broken immigration system threatens these benefits. Traveling the country, I have met farmers and ranchers who are concerned they won't have enough help for their next harvest - or are having trouble documenting that all their workers are here legally. The truth is that even when farmers make their best efforts to recruit only workers who are here legally, too few citizens express interest, and even fewer show up to spend long hours laboring in the hot sun.

It is simply not feasible to deport everyone here illegally. And over the last two years, President Obama has dedicated

unprecedented resources to secure our borders and begin to put our broken immigration system right. But this smarter enforcement must be combined with smart immigration reform to help make America more competitive in the global economy and honor our national values.

Farmers need a legal way to hire the workers they rely on. If American agriculture lost access to adequate farm labor, it could cost the industry as much as \$9 billion each year. And farm workers who pay their taxes, pay a fine, and learn English ought to have a path to earning legal status.

The President has asked all of us to help elevate the debate, so that we can responsibly move forward to end illegal immigration and provide a stable workforce to farmers, ranchers, and small business owners throughout the country. One way you can do it is by visiting www.whitehouse.gov/immigrationaction. Today, our broken immigration system offers little hope for producers trying to do right and make a living. As we move forward on this important debate about how best to fix America's broken immigration system, we need to keep in mind America's working farmers, ranchers, and farmworkers and the food they reliably put on our kitchen tables.


Hospital names scholarship recipients

THE CHIEF'S CORNER by TINO P. SALINAZ Friona Police Department/Jefe de Policia

I have noticed that each week we have been getting reports of property being shot out by what appears to be a BB gun. Parents, before you allow your child to go out to shoot their BB guns, or before you buy them a BB gun, be aware of the consequences involved if your child goes out and destroys other people's property. If damage is done to someone's property the offense could run anywhere from a Class C Misdemeanor up to a Felony charge. Class C Misdemeanor: For criminal mischief under \$50.00, the fine could run up to \$500.00 plus restitution of the damaged property, court costs, etc.

Class B Misdemeanor: If the damage is over \$50.00, but under \$500.00, the punishment could run from a fine not to exceed \$2,000.00 or confinement in jail, not to exceed 180 days, or both.

Class A Misdemeanor: For damage over \$500.00, but under \$1,500.00, the punishment could run from a fine of \$4,000.00, or confinement in jail, not to exceed 1 year, or both. State Jail Felony: If the damage is over \$1,500.00, but under \$20,000.00, the punishment could run from a fine not to exceed \$10,000.00, or confinement in state jail of not more than 2 years, or less than 180 days.

Please keep this in mind; a BB gun is NOT A TOY. The use of one inside the city could bring serious consequences and you could be facing a criminal offense. If your child destroys someone else's property, charges will be filed and the BB gun will be confiscated.

It is also a violation of the City of Friona Ordinance Code Sec. 8.501 to discharge a BB gun across any public square, street, or alley, within 100 hundred yards of any business or house. Violation of this ordinance also brings a fine not to exceed \$500.00.

Please accept this warning and be aware of what your child is doing. Remember, as a parent you will be held responsible for your child's actions.



District water board takes no action on rule amendments

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District Board of Directors took no action regarding proposed rules amendments to achieve a "50/50" management goal at their May 17 regular meeting. In fact, the board meeting agenda contained no mention of rules amendments at all.

"There was an unfounded rumor circulating earlier in the week that the High Plains Water District's Board of Directors planned to adopt rules amendments at the May 17 meeting. This was completely false," said General Manager Jim Conkwright.

Originally, it was hoped that a second set of proposed rules amendments would be released for public review following the Board of Directors meeting. However, revisions to the initiallyprepared draft rules amendments are still in progress, based upon comments received at the five public meetings held March 23-25 and written comments received at the district office.


"In addition, staff members are closely watching progress of water-related legislation during the remaining days of the regular session of the 82nd Texas Legislature to see if there are any

time in June. Once finalized, the revised rules amendments will be posted to the district's web site at www.hpwd.com for public review and downloading. In addition, notification of the rules availability will be sent to news media within the district.

In accordance with the Texas Water Code, amendments to groundwater conservation district rules cannot be adopted without first having a public hearing. A 20-day notice must precede the public hearing.

"Our Board of Directors felt this was too important an issue to just have one public hearing. Therefore, they decided to have a series of five public meetings in March to gather comments and then two public hearings will be held for additional comments before the rules amendments are considered for adoption by the Board," Conkwright said.

No date has yet been announced for the public hearings to be held in the northern and southern portions of the district, respectively. "We encourage people to watch the district's web site and their local media for additional information about



Kendrick Oil Company began in 1951 when H.K. (Pudge) and Deke Kendrick bought the local jobber from Paul Fortenberry. Prior to Fortenberry the jobber was operated for 25 years by H.T. (Tiny) Magness. Kendrick Oil moved the business operation into the old adobe building southeast of the Santa Fe grain elevator and began work with Pudge driving the delivery truck and Deke managing the books.

By 1971 Kendrick Oil had expanded to seven employees and was in the fertilizer business briefly. Charles Scales was manager in 1971. During an interview with the Friona Star he said the biggest change was "farmers don't come around like they used to. They would come in and visit for an hour or two but today they just call on the telephone." Also in the early 70s Kendrick Oil opened its first Fast Stop location in the building of the old Conoco Station operated by now retired delivery driver Randol Allen.

In 1976 Danny Kendrick joined the family business as a delivery driver. By the late 80s Danny had taken over the majority of duties as President of Kendrick Oil. The offices were moved to their current location on Main St. in the former Ruthie's Dress Shop.

The current Farm Store moved into the old Friona Consumers building on Main St. In 2001 Kendrick Oil was honored by Phillips Petroleum for 50 years of service as a jobber and had expanded its jobber business to Fina, Shamrock, and Phillips.

Over the past 60 years Kendrick Oil has expanded from a two-person operation delivering fuel to area farmers to a regional wholesale fuel distributor with customers ranging from Albuquerque to Houston to Oklahoma City and employing over 20 people.

In 2008 Kendrick Oil established a sister corporation, Hub City Convenience Stores based in Lubbock to manage the growing Fast Stop Convenience Store business. Matthew Kendrick, Danny's youngest son, is the vice-president of Hub City and helps manage the 23 locations including two Chisum Travel Centers in Lubbock and Roswell, New Mexico. Throughout the growth of the business Kendrick Oil Company still remains the major fuel provider for local agribusiness and would like to thank the Friona Chamber of Commerce for the honor of being its Business of the Month for May 2011.
