Philippine senators reject base lease

"Today, we have summoned the political will to stand up and end 470

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — In a vote that could spell an end to nearly a century of U.S. military involvement in the Philippines, senators refused today to extend the American lease for the big Subic Bay naval base. President Corazon Aquino pro-

mised to call a referendum and use "people power" to overturn the Senate's decision, rebuffing arguments from senators and former allies that she would undermine democratic institutions she created after Ferdinand Marcos was ousted in 1986.

"I would like to assure the American people that the great majority of the Filipino people would like the Americans to stay on at Subic Bay," Mrs. Aquino told ABC-TV after the vote.

More than 30,000 people sang and danced in front of the Senate after the 12-11 vote against the agreement, which would have extended the lease on Subic for 10 years. Two-thirds approval in the 23-member Senate was required for ratification.

About 5,000 people demonstrated in favor of the base. They included workers who stand to lose their jobs at Subic, about 50 miles west

of the capital. The treaty called for the United States to pay the Philippines \$203 million annually to keep its ships and 7,000 personnel at Subic.

Vega indicted for attempted murder

Rick Vega was indicted for attempted murder by a Howard

County grand jury late last week. A total of 23 people were indicted by the grand jury, which met three Vega, 29, 405 Benton, is accused

of trying to shoot to death Tony Marquez, 36, on July 7 on the 1100 block of E. 15th, according to 118th Judicial District Court and Big Spring Police Department records.

Marquez, who was shot four mes with a small-caliber handgun, said he does not know why he was shot. "He just walked up on me and started shooting.

With wounds in the stomach, back, shoulder and hand, Marquez was taken to a local hospital the night of the shooting and, after minor surgery, was listed in stable condition. "I'm doing pretty good,"

he said today. Police have not arrested a suspect, a police spokesman said Friday. As of early today, the Howard County Sheriff's Office has not received any indictments from last week, a deputy said. No arrests have therefore been made.

As a result, it is unknown when Vega could face a trial, said District Attorney Rick Hamby. 'We cannot predict when he will go to trial until he is arrested.'

A conviction on attempted murder carries a penalty of two to 20 years in prison and up to a \$10,000 fine.

Boy Scouts ordered to surrender files

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) The Boy Scouts of America have been ordered to surrender its confidential national records on sexual abuse cases to the attorney for a boy molested by a northern California scoutmaster.

Sacramento County Superior Court Judge Richard Park on Friday denied a request by the national organization, based in Irving, Texas, to keep its sexual abuse records since 1971 confidential.

The judge ordered that the records be turned over by Oct. 10 to attorney Michael Rothschild for use in his civil lawsuit for a boy known as John Doe against Boy Scouts of America and former Galt, Calif. Scoutmaster Allen Trueman.

Trueman pleaded guilty in 1989 to nine counts of lewd and lascivious acts with children and was sentenced to 10 years in prison.

Astronauts erect giant Tinkertoy

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) Discovery's astronauts erected a kind of giant Tinkertoy aboard the shuttle today but first had to steer clear of a chunk of Soviet rocket zooming their way.

The shuttle and the van-sized piece of space junk ended up passing within 10 miles of each another Sunday night, NASA said.

"I think we scored a space first, the first time we've ever had to maneuver to avoid a conjunction,' Mission Control's Jan Davis told the crew. "So good work on everybody's part.

The crew accomplished its major task late Saturday when it released into orbit a 14,500-pound satellite that will study Earth's damaged ozone layer. Early today, the astronauts began assembling the Tinkertoy-like structure in an experiment that will help in designing the proposed space station.

Sunday evening, the astronauts lowered Discovery's orbit a little more than a mile after ground controllers determined the path of the spent rocket stage would take it uncomfortably close to the shuttle.

Flight director Al Pennington said it's hard to say whether Discovery would have collided with the object.

"We considered it to be a risk, and we don't like risk," he said. "There was by no means any direct input that said this was on a direct collision. This is certainly what you'd call a near miss."

NASA rules dictate that other orbiting objects, including space junk, cannot come within 1.6 miles above or beside a shuttle or 4 miles in front of an orbiter.

Pennington said he was notified of the encounter about five hours before it was due to occur. The astronauts maneuvered out of the way more than two hours in advance, he said.

This morning, crewmen James Buchli and Mark Brown snapped gold-colored, aluminum joints into place to create a 64-inch long, 8-inch square device consisting of white plastic pieces.

In the first test of a structural model for the space station, the device was attached to a machine and shaken to see how it withstands vibration in zero gravity. Buchli said before the mission

that the experiment should not be taken lightly

'While it might look like an Erector Set . . . it's not a trivial experiment. I expect there are two or three folks whose Ph.D.s are riding on it," he said.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The special prosecutor's office said today it will drop its case against Oliver North in the Iran-Contra

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day.

"We will be seeking dismissal of the North case," Mary Belcher, spokeswoman for independent counsel Lawrence Walsh, said in a telephone interview. "That's all I can say at this point," she said.

Both sides were due to appear in the courtroom of U.S. District. Judge Gerhard A. Gesell, who last week opened hearings on whether to reinstate North's felony convictions in the Iran-Contra case.

A federal appeals court set aside the convictions, saying prosecutors had to demonstrate in court that North's 1987 testimony to Congress, given under a grant of immunity, wasn't used against him at his criminal trial.

Former National Security Adviser Robert A. McFarlane stunned prosecutors on the opening day of the hearing last week by saying his testimony at North's criminal trial was influenced by North's nationally televised appearances to Congress.

North was convicted of destroying documents, accepting an illegal gratuity and aiding the obstruction of Congress. The destruction of documents conviction was overturned outright in July 1990 by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit, while the two others were set aside.

Noriega lawyers trading threats

MIAMI (AP) - Manuel Noriega's lawyers are threatening to expose dirty dealings by U.S. intelligence agencies at the former dictator's trial, while prosecutors say they'll show he sold his country to cocaine traffickers.

The first witnesses in Noriega's drug trial were to take the stand today, 20 months after he surrendered to U.S. troops who invaded Panama in an extraordinary effort to bring a foreign leader to justice in the United

Prosecutor Michael Sullivan was scheduled to give his opening statement today. The defense elected to hold its

opening until the prosecution completes its case.

Defense attorneys contend that Noriega secretly cooperated with U.S. authorities on operations, including illegal aid to Nicaragua's Contra rebels, and that any drugrelated activity was tolerated or even encouraged.

Initial witnesses, including drug informant Max Mermelstein, were expected to outline for the federal jury the operations of Colombia's Medellin cartel.

Also taking the stand for the government will be a string of drug pilots, corrupt bankers, cocaine traffickers and former Noriega aides.

New candidate meets unemployed

MANCHESTER, N.H. (AP) -Fresh from announcing his candidacy for the nation's top job, Democratic Sen. Tom Harkin of Iowa is beginning his presidential quest by meeting with people who might settle for any work.

Harkin was spending his first full day of official campaigning today at unemployment offices in Dover and Manchester, before a rally in Manchester. He officially entered the race Sunday in Iowa, then flew to New Hampshire.

The 51-year-old senator began his day by making the rounds of network news shows, promising a feisty campaign focusing on his call for cuts in defense spending to pay for new investments in infrastructure, education, health care and other domestic programs.

I think it's time to start in vesting in America, quit spending so much money abroad, quit wasting our money," he said on ABC's "Good Morning America."

Gates says he knew little of deal

WASHINGTON (AP) - CIA Director nominee Robert Gates maintained anew that he knew little about a possible diversion of funds to the Nicaraguan Contras from the Reagan administration's sale of arms to Iran, according to documents released today for his Senate confirmation hearings.

"I was not aware of any evidence" in late 1986 "of involvement in such a diversion by CIA, NSC or U.S. government officials, nor was any concern expressed to me about a violation of law," Gates said in written answers to the Senate Intelligence Committee.

However, according to the newly released documents, Gates substantially altered his testimony about the diversion in a six-day span in 1986.

The new revelations about Gate's testimony came just minutes after the office of Iran-Contra special prosecutor Lawrence Walsh announced that it would abandon its efforts to reinstate three felony convictions against former National Security Counsel aide Oliver North.

Gates was going before the intelligence panel today for confir-

leading Democrats say President Bush is wrong to tie the issue of the start of a Middle East peace years. conference.

Bush has said he may veto a bill to provide Israel \$10 million in housing loan guarantees unless Congress postpones debate on the loan package for 120 days. Administration officials hope that a Middle East peace conference could begin during that period and believe that a loan postponement would prevent the alienation of Israel's Arab neighbors.

Israel has said it needs the money immediately to deal with a vast influx of Soviet emigres.

And Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., said Sunday that the United States was violating "a fundamental moral principle" by seeking to link the loan issue to the peace talks.

"This is the largest exodus of Jews since the creation of the state of Israel." Bradley said on CBS-TV's "Face the Nation."

"I think we should be there and we should stand at this moment with Israel that is absorbing . . . those who are fleeing oppression," he said.

Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., said the United States should not allow any money to be used for settlements in the occupied territories. But Nunn, speaking on NBC-TV's "Meet the Press," also criticized Bush's tactics in fighting for a delay on the loan guarantees.

"We really should not connect humanitarian aid with the overall peace process," said Nunn. "Right now (Bush) apparently is tying it to the peace process.

'If he ties it to the settlements, then he would certainly come much closer to having my support," Nunn said. "... I don't think

Some Israeli leaders reacted furiously. A far-right minister, Rehavam Zeevi, said after a Cabinet meeting Sunday that Bush came "very close . . . to being an anti-Semite and anti-Israel.'

"We are not going head-to-head either with the president or with the Congress," said Arens. If "the United States decides that it cannot or will not provide these guarantees, then we will simply have to pay the higher interest on these loans that go without having that guarantee.

Yugoslav air force plane shot down

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia (AP) -A Yugoslav air force plane was reported shot down today near the Hungarian border, and shells set fire to a hospital as fighting raged for the third straight day in the besieged Croatian city of

Three Yugoslav jets crossed into Hungarian air space, defense officials in Budapest said, and bombing was reported along the border with Yugoslavia.

The Yugoslav news agency Tanjug quoted sources close to the Yugoslav air force command as saying a jet was shot down by a ground-to-air missile near the Croatian town of Dinji Miholjac on the Hungarian border, 120

miles northwest of Belgrade.

Croatian media and the republic's Defense Ministry said one nurse was killed and parts of Osijek's general hospital were destroyed in overnight artiflery Tanjug said it was not clear attacks by federal troops.

Iraq blocks U.N.'s aerial checks

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) -U.N. monitors have scrapped their mission after Baghdad blocked them from making their own aerial checks for long-range missiles. A Bush administration official is calling Baghdad's action a serious truce violation.

The Iraqi government defended its move Sunday, saying the use of foreign aircraft over its territory violated its sovereignty.

Instead, Iraq offered its military's Soviet-made MiG-17 helicopters and Iraqi pilots, but U.N. inspectors say the helicopters are unsafe and the pilots uncooperative.

Iraq initially did not object to U.N. helicopters, but never pro-

vided final authorization, Tim Brock, an American who was to lead the inspection team, said Sunday.

The Security Council had warned Baghdad on Friday to allow the inspectors to use their own helicopters or risk further

The 17-member team planned to examine long-range missile sites in western Iraq as part of the plan to eliminate Iraq's weapons of mass destruction, as ordered under the U.N. resolutions ending the Persian Gulf War.

Some sites were used to fire Scud missiles in the war, mainly against Saudi Arabia and Israel.

Conservative to be prime minister

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) -Prime Minister Ingvar Carlsson, whose party created Sweden's welfare state, resigned today after a taxpayers' revolt at the polls handed conservatives a parliamentary victory.

Parliament Speaker Thage G. Peterson responded by appointing Carlsson head of a caretaker government until conservative leader Carl Bildt can form an administration.

In elections Sunday, Carlsson's Social Democratic Party suffered its worst defeat in nearly 60 years as voters rejected policies that have resulted in an income tax of 60 percent and made and every third worker a public employee.

The Social Democrats lost 19 seats in the 349-member Riksdag, or parliament, while the opposimajority, according to unofficial final results.

Class teaches officers to communicate

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - Officer Kevin Tempel headed the Police Department's "bad boys list" for most citizen complaints when he was ordered to take a special communications class.

A citizen complaint hasn't been filed against the seven-year veteran since.

Tempel, 31, was among 25 officers Police Chief Steven Bishop ordered to take the class given by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department in April. He and another officer were then tied for largest number of citizen complaints.

Seven complaints were filed last year against Tempel, all of which he believes were unsubstantiated.

"I still believe in old-fashioned aggressive police work, but you've got to adapt," he said. "The old days of whacking somebody over the head with a night stick are

"I personally like the more aggressive style of police work, Tempel said. "But police work has changed dramatically since the Rodney King beating in Los Angeles and our own video beating.'

The March 3 beating of King, a black motorist, by white Los Angeles officers was videotaped by a nearby resident and broadcast nationwide, sparking protests over police brutality and mistreatment of minorities. Four officers were charged with assault.

Since Kansas City began ordering its "bad boy" officers to learn how to better communicate with the public, the department has received only one complaint

against an officer who took the class, department officials said. Citizen complaints departmentwide are down by more than 20 percent for the year.

Kansas City police have been accused of excessive violence several times since Bishop became chief last year. There were two police beatings of black ministers and the beating of a white motorist that was videotaped by a local television station.

A task force Bishop set up found

that 60 percent of the complaints involved 5 percent of the department's officers, said Capt. Dean Kelly, head of internal affairs.

Kelly said many officers placed on what he called an early warning list were among the force's best officers in other respects. The list, which officers dubbed the "bad boys list," identified those with three or more citizen complaints over six months.

Many complaints involved alleged excessive use of force or harassment, Kelly said.

"They would tell someone to put his hands on the wall, and if he was slow they would turn him around and spin him against the wall," he

Bishop has fired 24 officers for

bad conduct in his 14 months as chief. Some on the "bad boys" list also were in danger of losing their jobs, Kelly said. "Some of them had met personally with the chief and been told

it was their last chance," Kelly During the one-day communica-ions skills class officers par-

ticipated in group discussions and role-playing. Officers learned, for instance, that people often feel intimidated

when a policeman making a

routine stop casually rests a hand on his gun, Kelly said. "About 98 percent of what an officer does involves communicating," Kelly said. "Much of that is nonverbal - how an officer dresses and carries himself can defuse a potentially hostile

Emergency care reform

Hospital emergency rooms are so overburdened that patients urgently needing treatment often must wait several hours before even seeing a physician. Many patients are in so much pain that they walk out of emergency rooms in desperation before receiving medical

Those are the findings of new studies published in the Journal of the American Medical Association. They provide further evidence of the failure of the U.S. health system to provide basic medical care.

Authors of the emergency room studies offer a number of remedies to overcrowding and the lengthy waits for

Among other things, they call for universal health care coverage for all Americans, an increase in the sizes of emergency rooms and their nursing staffs, and a national initiative to emphasize preventive care so that emergency treatment is less necessary.

Implementation of these proposals would reduce much of the pressure on the emergency care system. But they also would carry a very expensive price tag and no one has proposed how to pay for them. In the end, the problems hampering emergency rooms are likely to be solved only when President Bush and Congress devise a comprehensive plan to overhaul America's beleaguered health system.

Self-sufficiency is needed

The number of Hispanic children living in poverty is up sharply during the past decade. That reflects not just the influx of immigrants, nor is it the increase in divorce among Hispanics.

Poverty among Hispanic families differs in significant ways from that of non-Hispanic whites and blacks. A Children's Defense Fund study says that a poor Hispanic family is likely to be younger and headed by a working man with the mother at home. The wage earner's hourly pay is less likely to propel the family above the poverty line, and the head of the household is less likely to have a high school diploma

The Children's Defense Fund sees the study on poverty as ammunition for more direct aid to children through tax credits or other public benefits. It notes that the purchasing power of government aid to families and of the minimum wage has declined.

More money in the wallet no doubt would help, but it does not address the long-term needs of these families or of the wider society.

The numbers show that these families have many ingredients for success save one — high school diplomas.

Drawing young adults back to school for diplomas and for better job skills is a mission that must be broadened beyond today's adult-education efforts and promising experiments. More direct economic aid for families indeed is a must for poor children, but so are self-sufficient

The previous owners had been smokers and had tried to get the car squeaky clean, but the lingering traces of smoke residue were still strong enough to give Estil a headache by the time they drove from Midland to Sand Springs in

must tell you about my own Week of Horror on a jury with three devout smokers. I survived pretty well during the trial, because we spent most of the time in the courtroom where "No Smoking" signs were prominently displayed and only the judge, on his distant and elevated throne, was smoking.

I hated myself for not caring about the decision. I shouldn't have been so wimpy and selfindulgent. I should have been brave and strong and totally involved in that important judicial matter. But by then it was all I could do to hold my head up. And I wasn't doing a very good job of

The next time I was called for jury duty, I went forward and explained to the judge that cigarette smoke makes me sick, so I couldn't serve on the jury.

The judge, who was from out-oftown and apparently a nonsmoker, informed me I could serve because there would be no smoking on his case. He sounded so sure of himself I tried to believe him, but I never heard of a judge patrolling a jury room to make sure no one was smoking, so I had my doubts.

It didn't matter; I wasn't chosen. Neither lawyer ever ques tioned me in the process of jury selection, and I drew a low enough number to be a shoo-in. But they must have thought I was a trouble-maker because they passed me over and chose several jurors with higher numbers than

Well, I suppose you smokers

figure the courts are better off without all us uptight, whiny-baby non-smokers out of the picture. But I have to tell you, some of the most admirable people I know don't smoke and would make excellent jury members.

On the other hand, some of the most admirable people I know do smoke. I'm grateful for the privilege and pleasure of knowing each and every one of you. What I can't figure out is why some of you can't understand that not everyone is as enthralled with tobacco as you are. Some people get asthma when they breathe your fumes. And some of us only gag and choke and get headaches, but it's really hard for us to understand why some of you are so determined to torture us.

At times I have thought there's something in cigarette smoke that turns people into somebody else Once I watched someone, who wouldn't throw a scrap of paper on someone's lawn, toss a cigarette butt down onto a lucious, peach-colored carpet. Smokers, who are gracious and sensitive in every other area of their lives, leave ashes and little burn-holes wherever they go, as if they were sharing some treasure with the rest of the world.

News flash! The rest of the world is tired of your smoke and your ashes and your cigarette butts and your little burn holes. And we don't understand why we have to suffer in order to be included in the jury process.

Law section protects the senior consumers

By PATRICK DRISCOLL Staff Writer

An elder law section was created by Texas Attorney General Dan Morales to help protect consumers over 60 years old

The section, comprised of seven prosecutors and seven investigators, will identify and prosecute those who abuse the elderly, increase mediation of disputes with businesses, develop expertise in issues affecting the elderly and provide information and assistance to the public, Morales said.

"The fastest growing segment of our population today is comprised of men and women who are 60 years of age or older," Morales said.

'This phenomenal growth means there is an increasing number of elderly Texans living alone, burdended by one of the nation's highest poverty rates, by out of pocket health expenses that continue to soar and by a rising vulnerability to the schemes of unscrupulous con artists."

The creation of the section is in step with the times, said Rick Hamby of Big Spring, the 118th Judicial District Court attorney.

"Law for the elderly is going to become the coming thing for prosecutors, if anything because of the demographics (population)," he said. "That's going to be like DWI (driving while intoxicated laws) as far as people jumping on the bandwagon.

"Anytime you've got a booming

industry you're going to have people that make a lot of money, some honestly, but also you're going to have a lot of charlatans come along," he said. "These (elderly) people deserve (protection). It's going to be very difficult for the politicians to ignore.

The section, according to Morales, will concentrate legal and educational efforts on:

• Quality treatment in nursing homes and personal care homes in cooperation with the Texas Department of Health.

 Monitoring the advertising and sale of Medigap insurance and retirement-oriented investments. financial planning services, estate planning and legal services. Monitoring the advertising

and sale of home improvements, medical devices and other services and products that target the elderly. The section is being run out of

regional offices in Austin, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, Lubbock, McAllen and San Antonio. It is headed by Assistant Attorney General Clyde Farrell.

Five cases have already been filed. One was against a Dallas man who allegedly conned at least 16 elderly citizens into spending thousands of dollars on medical equipment they did not need.

Three cases were filed in Austin against three separate telemarketers based in Nevada that allegedly did not deliver goods or prizes that were guaranteed.

Abilene widows band together for support

ABILENE, Texas (AP) -Seven long years have passed, but Edie Miller still recalls, and in sharp detail, how she enlisted the first member of what you might very respectfully call a 'widow woman's club.

Edie, who in 1984 had only recently become a widow herself, resolved she was going to get a friend experiencing similar grief out and about — even though her morose friend loudly insisted she wasn't going anywhere.

"Oh yes, you are!" Edie snapped. "I'm coming over and I'm gonna pound on your door till you come out!"

Thus began a merry group of widows who, besides meeting early each Saturday morning at Grandy's, gather somewhere different once a month, either to drive to an out-of-town cafe, picnic at Dorothy Whittington's ranch near Cross Plains (chiggers be danged) or frolic at a "pajama party.

No, there's no membership due and no official name for this spunky group of 40.

Only thing is, you have to be a widow to participate.

"This is for all those widows who had trouble adjusting to the loss of a loved one," Edie said during a special meeting of the group at Grandy's on a recent morning. "It's just grown and grown, and this is the most wonderful bunch of people you'll ever meet.

Juanita Norwood, 73, who lost her husband almost four years

ago, is quick to testify to the group's optimism. In fact, after Edie made a remark about how she wouldn't let anyone in the group collapse into pathos and despair, Juanita chimed:

'Yeah, I'm so happy when I leave here, I can go home and tear the house down.

Certainly, things are livelier when the widows get together. Edie, 69, a cheerful, elegant woman, recalls one occasion when some of the widows got dressed up in baby doll pajamas and spent the night at one widow's home - which was fine till several found themselves in a dark hallway.

"There we were," Edie recall ed, "groping in the dark and patting the wall, and we caught ahold of each other and just about scared ourselves to death.

Another time, the widows decided to throw a surprise party for Juanita, then ailing from cancer. With some help, they tricked the former Timex and Farrington Oil Company employee into dropping by Alma Helton's house where she found not only the widows waiting but members of her own far-flung

"They said I was such an inspiration to them that they wanted to throw a surprise party for me," Juanita recalled. "They made me queen for a day - I mean, they really did. They had a red carpet rolled out, put a crown on my head and gave me roses.

"It was the nicest thing that ever happened to me," she said. Absent members take their missed meetings seriously, such as Jane Hefner. Despite a trip to San Antonio for back surgery and a slow period of recuperation, Jane continued to phone regularly, just to keep up with the widows' activities.

"Widow Women's Club."

At one recent meeting, the women presented Mary Allred, education minister at Calvary Baptist Church, with a camcorder the group won by collecting thousands of dollars worth of Grandy's receipts, green stampstyle. They turned them in for a prize offered by Grandy's.

Manager Terry Brown said the widows accomplished this task pretty much on their own which gives you some idea of how often they go to Grandy's. However, they did have some

For one thing, 84-year-old Britt Smartt, who sometimes sits near the widows with his wife, Mattie, showed no reluctance about asking customers if he could have their receipts. He'd often show up at the widows' tables with pockets full of Grandy's stubs.

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

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Before World War II, lawn mowers were the reel type - a series of cutter blades in a pushtype cutting machine. Local cotton farmers used a stalk cutter that was pulled by a tractor. The stalk cutter simply mashed and cut the previously picked cotton stalks as it was pulled over the field.

A new variety of cotton with a thick stalk resisted cutting by the stalk cutting machines. Something new was needed

munitions area near McGregor during World War II. Ingenious farmers in the area brought the rear-end axles of old cars to Yeager's shop and asked him to weld a blade to the drive shaft so the wheels would turn the shaft and

Yeager then began to manufacture a rotary power mower with a connection to the tractor's power take-off to provide continuous rotation of the blade when engaged. The success of the highly-efficient two-row cutter was then sold to the Perry Company of the Waco that markets the machine today under the trade name Rotocycle.

Gibson Feagins of Feagins Implement Co., Big Spring, confirmed the information about Yeager and iemonstrated how the two-row cut ter has evolved into 14-foot and 20-foot machines, now made in triple sections with the ability to ride terraces and rough ground. These machines are also manufactured by Bush Hog, Service Rhino and

The reel-type yard push mowers also evolved into the current rotary mowers. Jerold Cox, owner of Hall Aircooled Engine Service, Big Spring, says he bought his first rotary mower in the late 1940s. He says engineers had been actually working on the idea since "Depression days", but the mower became popular during the 1950s.



Soviet council to map food strategy

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet porting food by the republics. Union's interim governing body met today to map a strategy to stabilize food production and distribution this winter and debate a new treaty on economic relations among the republics.

The State Council, led by President Mikhail S. Gorbachev and consisting of the leaders of 10 republics, opened with a report by Yuri Luzhkov on how to feed the nation, the independent news agency Interfax said

The agency said participants at the Kremlin session agreed to work out within two or three days a joint statement on a unified food policy. The agreement will call for close cooperation among the republics and with foreign countries, Interfax said. It gave no details on Luzhkov's report.

Russian Federation Prime Minister Ivan Silayev said creation of a "professional foreign trade organization" was proposed to eliminate confusion on im-

Silayev, who heads the committee that is charged with day-today management of the chaotic Soviet economy, last week told Secretary of State James A. Baker III that it was essential to guarantee coordinated requests for Western aid.

The council also was scheduled to discuss a draft treaty on economic relations among the republics as the Soviet Union moves from central control to a loose federation of republics.

Interfax said the economic treaty covers banking systems, taxation, prices, labor markets, customs, currency regulations and foreign economic activities.

Some of its provisions are certain to anger the Soviet Union's increasingly powerful republican leaders. The draft, written by economist Grigory Yavlinsky and presented last week, foresees a central bank and maintenance of a single currency.

'Unqualified teaching the uninterested'

or science class in America's public schools often adds up to the unqualified teaching the uninterested, says a panel of scientists and educators that wants the federal government to step in.

"When 47 percent of our nation's 17-year-olds cannot convert nine parts out of 100 to a percentage, we know that math education is not working," said a report issued Sunday by the Carnegie Commission on Science, Technology and Government

'When 63 percent of American adults think that lasers work by focusing sound waves (instead of light waves), we know that science education in this country is not working," it said.

More than two-thirds of elementary science teachers lack adequate preparation in science, and more than 80 percent are deficient in mathematics, the report said, quoting professional associations of math and science teachers. Only 7 percent of high school seniors are prepared for college science "Everybody can learn what they

need to know about math and cusing the kids who are a little slow no need for an additional body. with lacking talent," said Lewis That in my opinion would be in government policymaking

WASHINGTON (AP) — A math Branscomb, a professor at Harvard University and chairman of the commission's panel on science and math education.

Education is mostly a state and local responsibility. But the panel said the federal government should be involved in recruiting teachers, setting curriculum goals, coordinating research into teaching methods and developing textbooks and other educational materials. Under the commission's plan,

the National Science Foundation and the Education Department would split responsibility for improving technical education. They would coordinate their work through a new joint office. The department would en

courage reform of the nation's elementary and secondary schools. The foundation would concentrate on the universities, where math and science teachers are trained. Luther Williams, assistant director for education and human

resources at the National Science Foundation, said he agreed with the goal of more collaboration between the foundation and the Education Department. "The details are another mat-

Education Secretary Lamar Alexander had no comment on the report. However, he was a member of the Carnegie panel before moving into the government post.

Olympic Stadium being probed

MONTREAL (AP) -Quebec's government will call for an independent study to determine why a 55-ton concrete beam fell from the Olympic Stadium, according to Andre Vallerand, minister in charge of the Olympic Installations Board

Vallerand said Sunday that the study will be in addition to an inquiry by three engineering firms. The three companies will try to discover how 16 reinforcing rods in the concrete beam managed to break and they will assess the risks of similar accidents occurring with other beams. Their report is expected Friday

Vallerand also wants to obtain a separate opinion of experts "less associated" with the construction of the stadium

"I personally asked the installations board on Friday to engage an independent firm, he said. "But the problem is to find a firm that did not closely take part in construction of the stadium.'

Vallerand said he has asked the board to supply a list of the companies involved with construction and placement of the fallen beam. Depending on the information he receives, he will decide whether to allow the stadium to reopen. In the meantime, events have been canceled and the Montreal Expos have switched four games


