Commissioners set budget hearing date

County commissioners approved the 2011 tax rate at Monday's meeting. The rate will be 2-cents lower than the 2010 rate. A complete notice of the county property tax rate is elsewhere in this issue of the Friona Star.

As a part of the budget process commissioners approved a 3% cost-ofliving increase for county employees. A notice of proposed county official's compensation is also in this issue of the paper.

Commissioners have scheduled a public hearing on the proposed 2011 county budget for 9:30 a.m. Monday August 22 at the county courtroom in Farwell, prior to the regular commissioners meeting.

Council approves tax rate, garbage collection increase

The Friona city council met Monday August 8 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers. All council members were present. Mayor J.B. Douglas presided. Also present were Anthony Ramirez of Atmos Energy and Parmer County Tax Appraiser Curby Brantley.

The main items of importance on the agenda were setting the 2011 property tax rate and considering a garbage collection fee increase. Mr. Brantley gave council members a detailed tax rate notice pertaining to the 2011

value for city property on the issue of the Friona Star.

The city will hold two public hearings on a proposal to increase total tax revenues. The first hearing is Tuesday August 23 at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers at 619 Main St. See the full public hearing notice in this newspaper. A second hearing will be September 12 at 6:30 p.m.

The city's waste disposal company, Allied Waste, had requested a rate increase which was approved by the council. The monthly rate a residential or commercial customer pays depends on how many times per week the company picks up at a particular dumpster. After a brief discussion council members voted to increase all garbage pickup fees by 3% effective September 1,

The council voted to deny a rate increase requested by Atmos Energy. Mr. Ramirez of Atmos Energy made a brief statement to the council suggesting Friona join the other cities across Texas that have formed a coalition to jointly protest the rate increase. By joining the coalition, cities like Friona avoid excessive legal fees.

After approving monthly accounts payables and July financial statements, the council approved the reappointment of Kim Kimbrough and Susan Teague to the Friona Public Library board of directors. Variances requested by Ronnie Stevick and Mark Neill were also approved.

The council will hold a budget workshop meeting on August 30 in preparation for the city's next fiscal year which begins October 1, 2011.

The next regular meeting of the city council will be Monday, September 12, 2011, at 6:30 p.m. at 619 Main St. All city council meetings are open to the public.

guest columnist barack obama

I am pleased to have the President of the United States as a guest columnist this week. Here are his remarks from Monday, August 8, 2011, from the State Dining Room. Soon he will be taking a bus tour creating jobs. Keep in mind the problems America faces today are everybody's fault but his. The President of the United States:

Good afternoon, everybody. On Friday, we learned that the United States received a downgrade by one of the credit rating agencies -- not so much because they doubt our ability to pay our debt if we make good decisions, but because after witnessing a month of wrangling over raising the debt ceiling, they doubted our political system's ability to act. The markets, on the other hand, continue to believe our credit status is AAA. In fact, Warren Buffett, who knows a thing or two about good investments, said, "If there were a quadruple-A rating, I'd give the United States that." I, and most of the world's investors, agree.

That doesn't mean we don't have a problem. The fact is, we didn't need a rating agency to tell us that we need a balanced, long-term approach to deficit reduction. That was true last week. That was true last year. That was true the day I took office. And we didn't need a rating agency to tell us that the gridlock in Washington over the last several months has not been constructive, to say the least. We knew from the outset that a prolonged debate over the debt ceiling -- a debate where the threat of default was used as a bargaining chip -- could do enormous damage to our economy and the world's. That threat, coming after a string of economic disruptions in Europe, Japan and the Middle East, has now roiled the markets and dampened consumer confidence and slowed the pace of recovery.

So all of this is a legitimate source of concern. But here's the good news: Our problems are eminently solvable.* And we know what we have to do to solve them. With respect to debt, our problem is not confidence in our credit - the markets continue to reaffirm our credit as among the world's safest. Our challenge is the need to tackle our deficits over the long term.

Last week, we reached an agreement that will make historic cuts to defense and domestic spending. But there's not much further we can cut in either of those categories. What we need to do now is combine those spending cuts with two additional steps: tax reform that will ask those who can afford it to pay their fair share and modest adjustments to health care programs like Medicare.

Making these reforms doesn't require any radical steps. What it does require is common sense and compromise. There are plenty of good ideas about how to achieve long-term deficit reduction that doesn't hamper economic growth right now. Republicans and Democrats on the bipartisan fiscal commission that I set up put forth good proposals. Republicans and Democrats in the Senate's Gang of Six came up with some good proposals. John Boehner and I came up with some good proposals when we came close to agreeing on a grand bargain.

· So it's not a lack of plans or policies that's the problem here. It's a lack of political will in Washington. It's the insistence on drawing lines in the sand, a refusal to put what's best for the country ahead of self-interest or party or ideology. And that's what we need to change.

I realize that after what we just went through, there's some skepticism that Republicans and Democrats on the so-called super committee, this joint committee that's been set up, will be able to reach a compromise,

but my hope is that Friday's news will give us a renewed sense of urgency. I intend to present my own recommendations over the coming weeks on how we should proceed. And that committee will have this administration's full cooperation. And I assure you, we will stay on it until we get the job done.

Of course, as worrisome as the issues of debt and deficits may be, the most immediate concern of most Americans, and of concern to the marketplace as well, is the issue of jobs and the slow pace of recovery coming out of the worst recession in our lifetimes.

And the good news here is that by coming together to deal with the long-term debt challenge, we would have more room to implement key proposals that can get the economy to grow faster. Specifically, we should extend the payroll tax cut as soon as possible, so that workers have more money in their paychecks next year and businesses have more customers next year.

We should continue to make sure that if you're one of the millions of Americans who's out there looking for a job, you can get the unemployment insurance that your tax dollars contributed to. That will also put money in people's pockets and more customers in stores.

In fact, if Congress fails to extend the payroll tax cut and the unemployment insurance benefits that I've called for, it could mean 1 million fewer jobs and half a percent less growth. This is something we can do immediately, something we can do as soon as Congress gets back.

We should also help companies that want to repair our roads and bridges and airports, so that thousands of construction workers who've been without a job for the last few years can get a paycheck again. That will also help to spur economic growth.

These aren't Democratic proposals. These aren't big government proposals. These are all ideas that traditionally Republicans have agreed to, have agreed to countless times in the past. There's no reason we shouldn't act on them now. None.

I know we're going through a tough time right now. We've been going through a tough time for the last two and a half years. And I know a lot of people are worried about the future. But here's what I also know: There will always be economic factors that we can't control - earthquakes, spikes in oil prices, slowdowns in other parts of the world. But how we respond to those tests -- that's entirely up to us.

Markets will rise and fall, but this is the United States of America. No matter what some agency may say, we've always been and always will be a AAA country. For all of the challenges we face, we continue to have the best universities, some of the most productive workers, the most innovative companies, the most adventurous entrepreneurs on Earth. What sets us apart is that we've always not just had the capacity, but also the will to act -- the determination to shape our future; the willingness in our democracy to work out our differences in a sensible way and to move forward, not just for this generation but for the next generation.

And we're going to need to summon that spirit today. The American people have been through so much over the last few years, dealing with the worst recession, the biggest financial crisis since the 1930s, and they've done it with grace. And they're working so hard to raise their families, and all they ask is that we work just as hard, here in this town, to make their lives a little easier. That's not too much to ask. And ultimately, the reason I am so hopeful about our future -- the reason I have faith in these United States of America -- is because of the American people. It's because of their perseverance, and their courage, and their willingness to shoulder the burdens we face - together, as one nation.

U.S. Senator John Cornyn (R-Texas) a member of the Senate Budget and Finance Committees issued this statement following the President's speech today addressing Standard & Poor's downgrade of the U.S. credit rating:

"Standard & Poor's warned us in April, and again in July, that absent serious fiscal reforms, our credit rating would suffer. The President responded by failing to produce a plan, while Senate Democrats responded by blocking the one proposal that may have averted a downgrade.

"The Administration continues to play the blame game, and now offers only the promise of a plan. Rather than condemning S&P officials or demagoguing House Republicans, the American people want to see this Administration, for the first time, pull its collective head out of the sand and take this crisis seriously.

"The recent downgrade and the President's track record of failed economic policies only reaffirm my belief that Washington requires a straitjacket on federal spending, in the form of a balanced budget amendment."

Ron,

I just completed my fifth session with the Texas Agriculture Lifetime Leadership (TALL) program. The session was concentrated in the Gulf Shore region of Texas.

I was exposed to several types of agriculture that are nonexistent in the Panhandle. I learned about rice farming. It was interesting to hear how they flood the fields after the rice is up in order to retard weed growth and the high-tech way they are now leveling their fields to conserve water.

Water is a hot topic in the Gulf Shores area but differs from our water problems. Most irrigation water there is from surface water and recreational and urban users constantly battle agriculture for the use of water.

I also went to a catfish farm and watched them harvest the fish. It was a feedlot for fish. They had over 200 acres in lagoons holding catfish. This particular day they were harvesting 7 lb catfish. They use nets with different size openings to target a particular size fish.

Once they had the proper size fish corralled in a small area they used a crane with a net basket to life about 2,500 pounds at a time to load a trailer. The fish are transported live in specially designed semi-trailers to a processor as far away as east Texas.

I was able to tour the Port of Houston and witness them load and unload the huge container ships. Everything is massive, massive cranes, massive ships, and massive stacks of containers. They track every container with video, X-ray every container arriving and leaving, and perform a series of other inspections the government is very tight-lipped about.

The amount of coordination and efficiency they maintain is amazing. I also went to a Cargill grain export elevator. Again the size of the facilities and ships is amazing and the automation is overwhelming. They use robots to unload grain from rail cars and a single computer operator controls every function from grain unloading, storing, and loading ships.

I heard from several interesting, influential speakers including Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples and Texas Senator Glenn Hegar. Both are strong agriculture supporters. As those of us in agriculture shrink to less than 2% of the population it's important we maintain a strong voice in the political arena.

I had the opportunity to tour Minute Maid Ballpark in Houston. We had a meeting with Turf Industry executives and representatives from Scott's Miracle-Gro. The Director of Field Operations for the Astros gave us a tour of the ballpark. We learned the grass is mowed to 3/4 of an inch, the amount of sunlight received each day on the grass is controlled by opening and closing the stadium roof, and after every game the sunflower seeds spit out by the players are picked up by hand.

My next TALL session is in October in the agriculture rich area of Northern California. I've heard this area referred to many times as the fruit and vegetable basket of the nation. I'm sure it will be interesting and I will share my experience after the session.

More CRP changes to assist producers

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that the Farm Service Agency (FSA) is modifying its Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) policies to help those affected by sustained drought conditions. Throughout this year of extreme weather, USDA has supported and delivered assistance to farmers, ranchers, and rural communities across the country.

"We continue to do all we can to help thousands of farmers and ranchers in the southwestern United States who are struggling from drought," said Vilsack. "Many ranchers have been or will be forced to sell livestock due to drought and

USDA will do what we can to help our farmers and ranchers during these challenging

The policy changes influence FSA rules governing emergency grazing. The period normally allowed for emergency grazing lasts through September 30, 2011. FSA is permitting farmers and ranchers in drought stricken states who have been approved for emergency grazing, including those in Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas, to extend the emergency grazing period to October 31, 2011, without an additional payment reduction.

signed to help livestock producers, FSA will allow producers nationwide to utilize harvested hay from expiring CRP acres when those acres are being prepared for fall seeded crops. Prior to this modification, all mechanically harvested hay was required to be destroyed.

This change enables livestock producers to feed the hay that is mechanically harvested to their own livestock or to sell or donate hay. Consistent with existing policy for managed or emergency haying and grazing

"We are eager to do all we can in the face of this drought crisis across the southern plains," said FSA Administrator Bruce Nelson. "This has been one of the worst dry and hot spells since the Dust Bowl era of the '30s."




Brown ties in Junior Fed Beef Challenge


Richard Ray Bonham
