August weather

What can be said for August weather?

Official weather guy John Gurley brought the August report. Last year in August Friona received 4.40" of rain. This year it was 0.30". At this time in 2010 we had received 18.19". So far in 2011 we have recorded 2.14".

No need to go into detail about temperatures. During the day it has been hot and the nights in the 60s and 70s. Perhaps September will show more positive totals.

After this report was written Tuesday morning the clouds and rain came Tuesday afternoon. Gurley said he recorded 0.11" officially with 0.55" reported in the Rhea area. This brings the total for August to 0.41".

New speed limits effective Sept 1

Texas motorists may notice some changes to speed limit signs in the next several months, as new laws regulating speed limits on the roadways of the state highway system begin to take effect.

The 82nd Texas Legislature passed and the Governor signed House Bill 1353, which takes effect on September 1, 2011. This legislation allows the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to create a 75-mile per hour speed limit on any state highway found to be reasonable and safe through a speed study. TxDOT will be reviewing existing 70-mile per hour speed limits to determine where a 75-mile per hour speed limit may be safely posted.

HB 1353 also eliminates the 65-mile per hour nighttime speed limit and all truck speed limits. On September 1, the existing nighttime and truck speed limits are repealed and no longer enforceable.

TxDOT awarded maintenance contracts in August to remove the nighttime and truck speed limit signs and is also in the process of hiring consultants to perform the required speed studies needed to implement the higher speed limits.

"We will be removing the existing nighttime speed limit signs, truck speed limit signs, and evaluating approximately 50,000 miles of state highway with a current 70-mile per hour speed limit," said Carol Rawson, TxDOT Director

of Traffic Operations. "With these contracts in place, we are moving steadily ahead to implement these new laws. However, it is important to remember that any increases to speed limits are not effective until the new speed limit signs are actually installed."

Speed limits in Texas are set by the 85th percentile method, which represents the speed the majority of drivers are traveling at or below. This is a sound engineering principle used to set speed limits on highways nationwide for the past 60 years.

The existing 65-mile per hour night and truck speed limit signs should be removed by the end of this year. The complete evaluation of the state highway system and posting of all new 75-mile per hour speed limits should be complete by early 2013.

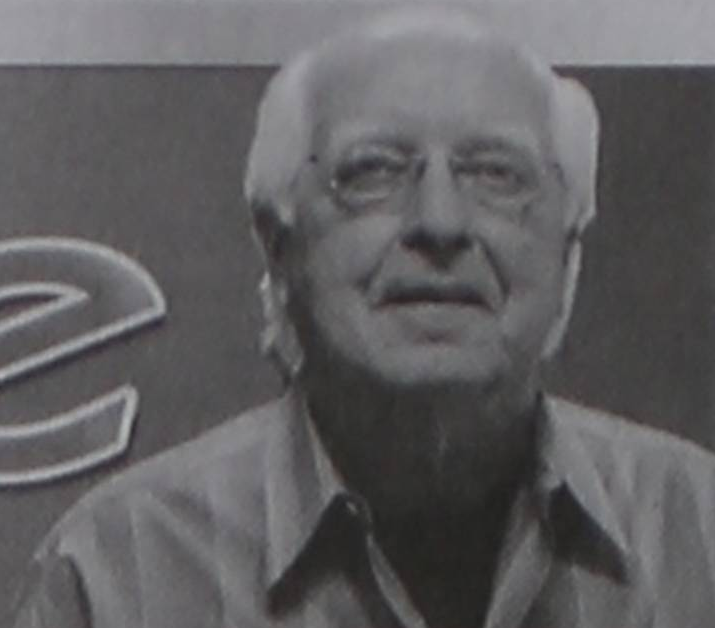

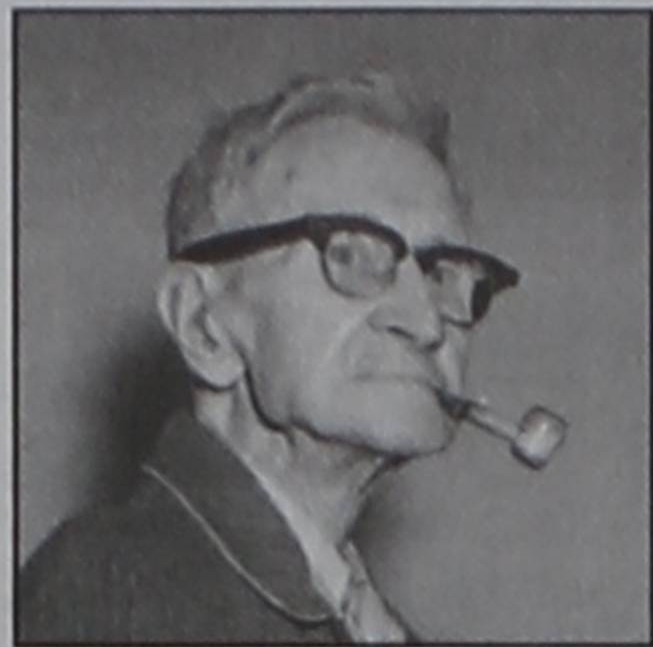
cogitations and aphorisms of jodok

I am having a big time searching through the early editions of the Friona Star.

Uncle John White, who wrote a weekly column with the above title, was quite the prolific and colorful writer. It is interesting to try and visualize what Friona was like in the 20s and 30s.

Probably not very many houses in town. Probably dirt streets. A few businesses along Main St. and, according to Uncle John, men without jobs loitering along the street.

In January 1935 county commissioners approved building a paved road across the county, what is now US Hwy 60. The Friona Star reported that many unemployed men would be put to work on the project at a wage of 30-cents an hour for an 8-hour day. As Uncle John said about the highway project: "It just occurs to me that such news as this should sound mighty good to us old boys who have been compelled to spend the greater part of our time shivering in the sunny side of some building here in town for the past few years. It sure sounds good to me, although a man eighty-three



years old could hardly be expected to be much use on such a public project so I may as well content myself to remain on the dole." Since jackrabbits were evidently taking over the county, commissioners also authorized paying a bounty to area hunters for every rabbit killed. The bounty was 2-cents a rabbit and hunters were warned they would only get paid for Parmer County jackrabbits. (No cheating).

It seems residents often criticized Uncle John and the Friona Star for its content. Here is his column from the January 11, 1935 Friona Star:

"Well it is really astonishing sometimes just what one may hear said while loitering along the street corners here.

One may hear both praise and criticism of the same object, person, concern or condition.

For example, I have even heard some criticism of the Friona Star, not so much as to what it has in it, as it is to what it does not have in it.

I have heard remarks like this: I do not believe it is the editor's fault for I have handed in news items and know of others that have done so and have stood by and watched him type it and send it to the printer but never a word of it got into the paper.

Another says, "I guess that fellow that prints the Star thinks people of Friona are more in need of religious instructions than they are in need of the local news, since he has taken to placing the Sunday school lesson and comments on the front page leaving out enough news items to make room for it."

To this his friend replied, "Well if that is what he thinks he had just as well call it off, for when it comes to teaching the Bible there is not a pastor in Friona that does not know as much or more Bible than the guy who writes that Sun-

day school stuff that they put in the Star. What we want is the local news. No matter if it don't sound interesting to a fellow away off in some other town—it is interesting to us here in Friona and that is what we want. We can get plenty of religious instructions right here at home if we will only go to church."

I may not have gotten the exact words in the above quotations but I know I got the sentiment they express. And now Mr. Editor or Mr. Printer, or whoever may be the 'guilty chap', I have let the cat out of the bag for your benefit, and you can put in your pipe and smoke it if you prefer to do so."

In those days Uncle John White typed stories and provided copy for the few ads but he did not layout the newspaper here in Friona. That was done in Hereford and apparently he did not have the final decision as to what went on the front page. Most of the Friona Stars in the early years were only four pages and a subscription in 1935 was 50-cents for a year. It was noted that "Ed Boggess and T. Manderscheid, farmers living southeast of town, added their names to the Star's subscription list."

People were put to work in 1935 building roads and bridges and we are still building and repairing them today. Chances are President Obama silently gave thanks for Hurricane Irene last week. Now he can legitimately say we need to put people to work repairing our roads and bridges, at least along the East Coast. No doubt the hurricane damage will be a political issue by both sides, especially the free-spending liberal progressives. Sad but true. I need a bracelet that says WWUJS.

Hortons to attend final MacArthur Honor Guard meeting Sept 25-28

Hollis and Lunell Horton will pay tribute to one of America's most distinguished generals when they meet with fellow members of General Douglas MacArthur's Honor Guard in San Diego, California September 25-28.

This year marks the 60th anniversary of the end of MacArthur's military service. It will be acclaimed by about 40 members of his personal security unit, plus more than 120 family members and friends. The reunion will be held at the Bahia Resort Hotel.

The former soldiers, now in their 80s and 90s, have held reunions for over 25 years across the country, in Japan, and at sea. In May 2001, the Hortons, with a large group of Honor Guards and their wives, visited Tokyo to celebrate the half-century anniversary of General MacArthur's departure when he was recalled by President Harry Truman. As the Supreme Commander of Allied Powers, Gen. MacArthur was the effective ruler of 83 million Japanese for nearly 6 years.

The Honor Guard Company, MacArthur's personal security unit, was originally formed during World War II in Manila, Philippines. Experienced combat veterans from the South Pacific of exceptional character and physical qualities were selected from many different Army divisions. They had to have high IQ, excellent service records, and be about six feet tall.

The General anticipated the Occupation of Japan and did not want to turn the cities into armed camps with blatant

displays of weapons. When he first landed there he met the Japanese unarmed with a minimum of troops. Once in Tokyo, his Honor Guard Company would provide for the security of the General and his family and staff. MacArthur knew these men would impress the Japanese people with the qualities of their American occupiers.

The Hortons will be attending this final hurrah meeting of the Honor Guard group. This will be the last gathering for these Honor Guard veterans.

To use Repeat Dialing:

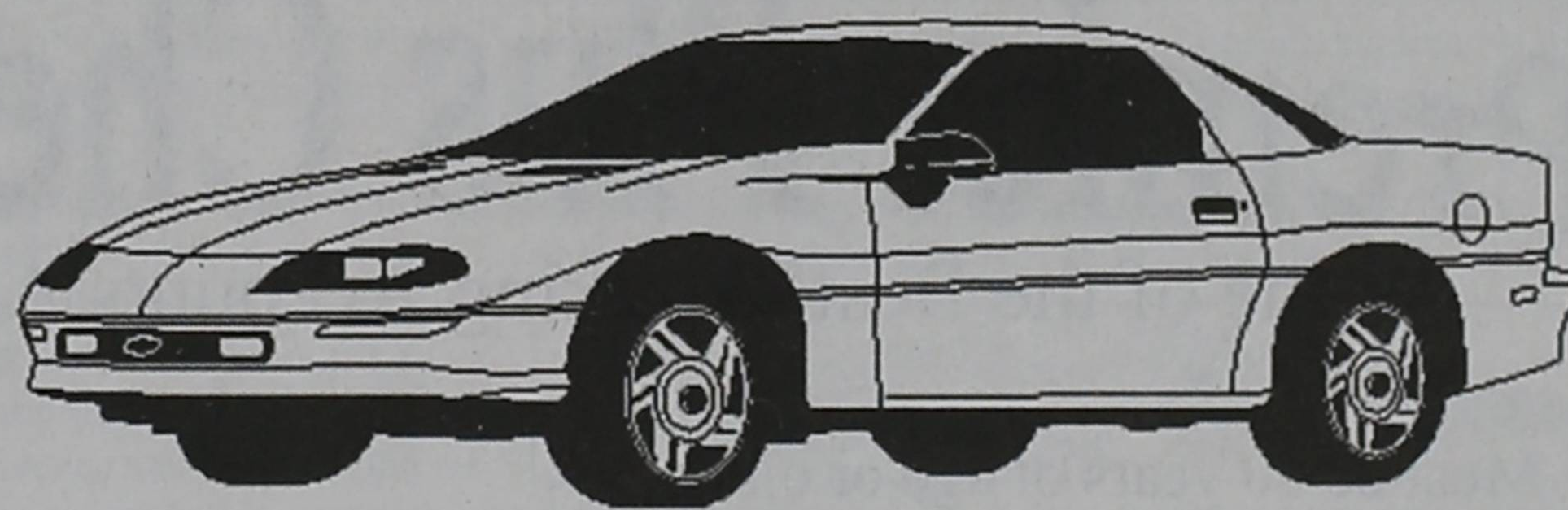

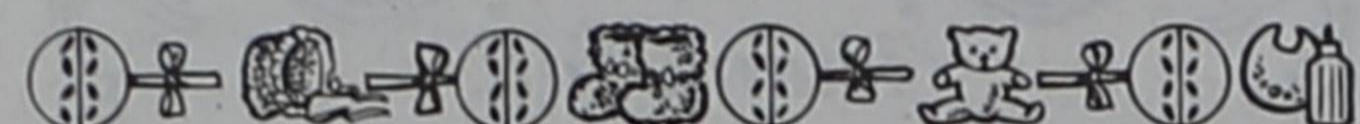
Kamryn, Matthew, & Colton Riethmayer

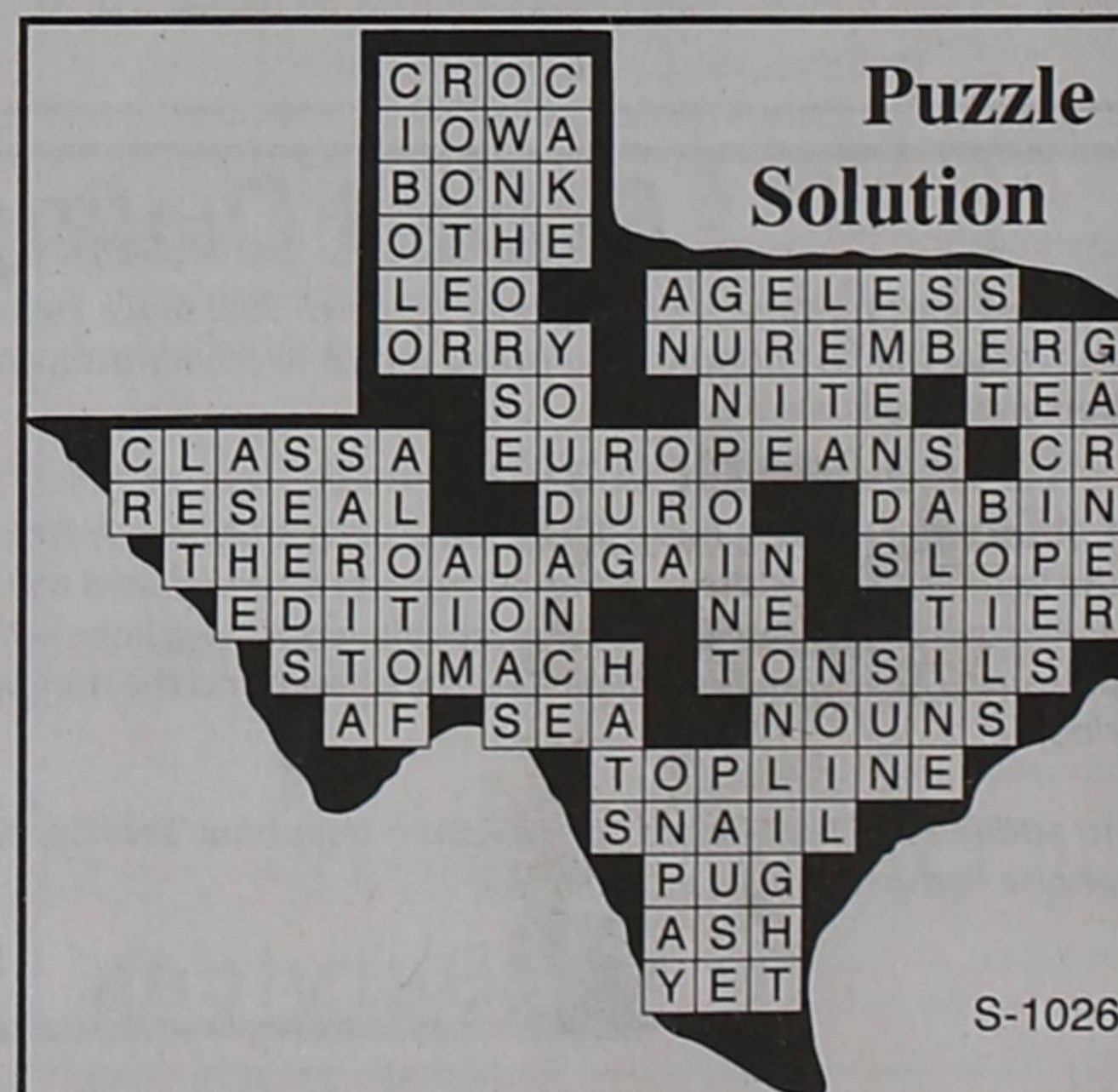

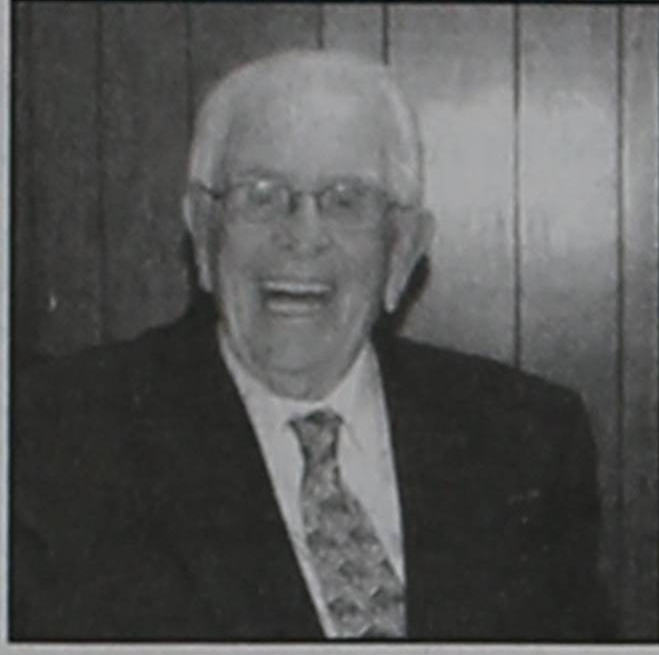

Jack Patterson

Jack Patterson was born March 16, 1921, in Blue Ridge, Georgia. He was the eleventh child in a family of 19 children. He grew up in the mountains of northern Georgia where he learned at an early age to "navigate" through those mountains in search of game to help feed his family. This skill served him well in WWII when he served as the point man in the reconnaissance troop of the 94th infantry division of the third army. As the NCO in charge of a patrol squad, Jack led patrols into enemy territory to secure information as to the enemy's strength and position.

His reconnaissance troop was always at the front of the fighting, and at Thorn, Germany, Jack was awarded the Bronze Star for bravery. He fought in four major battles - Northern France, Rhineland, Central Europe and Ardennes (The Battle of the Bulge). His honors in the military included the Bronze Star, the Good Conduct Medal, and Sharp Shooter in rifle, machine gun, and carbine.



After the war, Jack moved with his wife, Ona, and two small daughters to the Panhandle of Texas where he became engaged in farming in the Rhea community in Parmer County. He lived there on the family farm until shortly before his death. Jack was an avid sportsman and received many awards for his involvement in wildlife conservation. These include The District Soil and Water Conservation Award for Wildlife Conservation and Management, President of the Parmer Country Wildlife Association, and the Bovina Chamber of Commerce Heritage Award.

Jack was also active in many other community projects. He was a member of First Baptist Church in Bovina where he taught Sunday school. He was a Parmer County Road Commissioner from 1978-1982, served on the Panhandle Plains Regional Planning Commission and was a founding member of the Parmer County Crime Stoppers Organization. He received the award for Number One Crime Stopper in Parmer County in 2003. One honorary title which he was most proud of was that of "Mayor" of the Rhea Community. Jack was also quite the storyteller and loved sharing his experiences in WWII with school children in the area.

Jack was a much loved father, grandfather, great-grandfather, brother, uncle, cousin and friend. He was preceded in death by his beloved wife, Ona, who welcomed him home on Tuesday, August 30, 2011.

Survivors include his daughters, Cynthia Sands of Indio, California, and Sandra Blacksten of Amarillo; his sisters, Polly Dunn of Chatsworth Georgia, and Edna Childers of Cleveland, Tennessee. He is also survived by five grandchildren, 14 great-grandchildren, and numerous nieces, nephews and cousins.

Services will be at 11:00 a.m. on Friday, September 2, 2011. Since Jack felt that everyone in Parmer County and Eastern New Mexico was his friend, the services will be held at First Baptist Church in Friona, which will accommodate a larger crowd than his home church in Bovina. Chiefs lose wild Abernathy opener 32-29

With only six seniors on the roster, several players sidelined with injuries, and a group of enthusiastic but inexperienced juniors and sophomores, the Chieftains season opener with the Abernathy Antelopes provided fans an evening of exciting football.

The opening night crowd was treated to free hamburgers, chips, and drinks by Cargill Friona employees. It has become a tradition for Cargill to provide free burgers for all fans, home and visitors, at the first home game of the season.

Diego Licerio has kickoff and extra point duties this season. Licerio's kickoff to start the game was returned 93 yards for an Antelope touchdown. Score was 7-0 with 15 seconds gone off the clock. On the Chieftain possession senior quarterback Caleb Monroe gained 16 yards and on the second Chieftain play of the game, kept the ball on an option around the right side then scampered 65 yards for a TD. With less than one minute gone in the game the score was tied 7-7.

Abernathy put together a sustained drive and scored with 6:21 left in the 1st quarter to move the score to 14-7. That lead would not last long. On Friona's first play after the kickoff, Monroe ran a keeper to the left side and ripped the Lopes for a 72-yard TD. Score tied again at 14-14 with 6:04 still left to play in the 1st quarter.

The only scoring the rest of the half was an Abernathy field goal in the 2nd quarter to give the Lopes a 17-14 halftime lead. At one point the Chiefs fumbled and Abernathy recovered at Friona's 20-yard line. Chieftain defensive back Gabriel Avalos intercepted an Abernathy pass on the next play to give the Chiefs the ball back.

Another long run by Monroe moved the Chiefs to the Abernathy 40 but the drive stalled and Friona punted from the 50. Three more punts, an Abernathy interception, and a missed 37-yard field goal capped the 2nd quarter action.

Friona received to start the 2nd half. Backup quarterback Paco Martinez had a nice run to the Abernathy 25-yard line but hurt his ankle on the play and did not return to the game. Sophomore quarterback Brad Stowers would alternate with Monroe the rest of the game. The Chiefs scored a few plays later to give them their first lead of the game 21-17 with 7:10 left in the 3rd quarter.

After an Abernathy punt, Friona began a drive at their own 15. Stowers had a 35-yard run during a Chieftain drive into Lopes territory. Facing 4th and six, Stowers connected with Monroe for a first down.

On the first play of the 4th quarter Friona fumbled and Abernathy recovered to stop a drive at the 10-yard line. The Chiefs returned the favor, recovering an Antelope fumble at the Abernathy 40. An Abernathy personal foul penalty tacked 15 yards onto the play. Monroe on a quarterback keeper to the right tiptoed into the end zone. A low snap on the point after was scooped up by Monroe and tossed to a heads-up Jose Rivera at the goal line for a two-point conversion to give the Chiefs a comfortable 29-17 lead. Or so it seemed.

For the second time in the game Abernathy ran back the following kickoff for a touchdown to quickly move the score to 29-24. On their possession the Chiefs fumbled and Abernathy recovered, then scored again on the first play after the fumble. The Antelopes went for a successful two-points on the conversion. The score was 32-29 but 8:50 still remained in the 4th quarter.

Friona put together a nice drive and marched to the Abernathy 15 before stalling. Licerio missed a field goal attempt to tie the score. The Chiefs had one final opportunity when Abernathy was forced to punt with 3 minutes remaining in the game. But the Chiefs fumbled back to Abernathy with a minute left and the Lopes ran out the clock.

Total rushing yards for the Chiefs was 344 and 60 passing for a 404 total. Abernathy stats showed 138 rushing and 69 passing for a 207 total. (The two kickoff returns for touchdowns are not included in the rushing total).

Monroe was the leading rusher with 194 yards on 16 carries and 3 touchdowns. Others in the rushing column and yards gained are Stephen Dominguez 5-38, Francisco Martinez 3-50, Brad Stowers 3-26, Diego Licerio 6-19, Eduardo Rojas 6-14, and Sawyer Osborn 4-3. Rojas also scored a touchdown.

The Chiefs will host Stratford Friday September 2 at 7:30 p.m. at Chieftain Field. The Elks lost to Bushland in their opening game last week.

Cesar Huerta caught the TD pass of 15 yards. Other receptions were Jose Rocha (2), and one each by Eddy Garcia, Omar Ramos, Esdras Rodriguez, and Antonio Adame.

Rushing stats: Omar Ramos 9 for 38 yards, Joel Garcia 8-20, John Haile 4-8, Juan Salcido 3-14, Eddy Garcia 2-5, Loflin 1-7, Jose Rocha 1-4. Garcia scored a rushing touchdown.

Coach David Towner's comments: "We started out a little tentative in the first half. Part of being tentative is due to having a JV team made up of mostly freshmen who had never played a high school game. In the second half everyone picked up their level of play. It was like a completely different team. I was very proud of the guys for fighting back in the second half and giving ourselves a chance to take the lead early in the 4th quarter."
