

# Study: paroles climb in 1990

WASHINGTON (AP) - The number of convicted criminals on parole increased 16.3 percent last year and those placed on probation went up 5.9 percent to new record totals, according to a Justice Department study.

The growth in the number of convicted criminals paroled from prison and those placed on probation parallels the growth in the nation's prison population in the last decade, the department said.

At the end of 1990, 2.6 million adults were on probation and 531,407 were on parole, said the survey released Sunday by the Bureau of Justice Statistics. The overall total of 3.2 million represented a 7.5 percent increase from the previous year, the department said.

"Since 1980, prison and jail populations have grown by 128 percent, while probation and parole counts have increased by 139 percent." said Steven D. Dillingham, the bureau's director.

The survey did not explain the 16.3 percent increase in parolees, but University of Chicago criminologist Norvall Morris said it reflects efforts by states to reduce prison overcrowding.

"More people are being pushed out the other end of crowded prisons," he said. Overcrowding in many states has reduced the amount of time inmates serve in

The increase in people being supervised by parole or probation officers has put a strain on the system's ability to keep track of offenders who are not incarcerated, Morris said.

"Everyone talks about crowded prisons and there are genuine problems but what they fail to see is probation and parole services are equally overcrowded," he said. In some cities, caseloads for each parole officer reaches 200 adults. 'We are making probation and parole mere tokenism.'

# Mao comeback shows unrest among Chinese

BEIHNG (AP) — The young abstract painter flipped back the lapel of his sports jacket to show two small pins. One read "Country music." The other was a thumbnail profile of Mao Tse-tung.

"I think our arts all bear his stamp, so I should wear this," he said, grinning. "It's just for fun."
The last time Chinese wore Mao

pins was during the 1966-76 Cultural Revolution, and it wasn't for fun. Mao's most fervent admirers stuck Mao pins right into their flesh; doubters could lose their jobs and end up making bricks in the countryside.

After Mao died in 1976, the new leadership under Deng Xiaoping declared the Great Helmsman had made many mistakes. Key policies of Mao were reversed, and Mao buttons turned up in scrap heaps or for sale to tourists.

But Mao has made a comeback in recent years, with different people using his name and image for different reasons. The only element in common is dissatisfaction with present-day China.

Beijing students are wearing Mao T-shirts with the words 'Study hard and get ahead day by day" to express cynicism about forced ideological study.

Some workers wear Mao pins to express nostalgia for his era, when workers enjoyed high prestige. They feel left behind as Deng's reforms elevate intellectuals and private businessmen.

'Young workers don't know much about Mao," said a former union worker, "but they see that the sons and daughters of today's leaders have privileges while Mao sent his son off to the Korean War and he was killed." China aided North Korea in the war.

Some taxi drivers have begun pasting Mao pictures on their dashboards. Shopkeepers hang his portrait for good luck.

'They say he's a god and protects them from harm," the artist said following a trip south.

The Communist Party is promoting Mao to re-emphasize past glories and reinforce ideological purity as other countries topple their Communist regimes.

Official propaganda organs have issued movies, television shows and books about Mao, many showing current leaders along with Mao, as if to lend them legitimacy.

"Up to a point Deng's people want Mao demythologized," said Ross Terrill, an expert on Mao at Harvard University.

But he said they also need Mao. 'Mao's the Chinese Lenin and Stalin and in a way he's the Chinese Marx because he changed Marxism so much. The legitimacy of the People's Republic of ( bound up with a positive assessment of Mao.

Official media say the renewed interest in Mao is due to love of communism.

A middle-aged historian agreed there was a Mao revival but dismissed party statements that it's because the youth are enthused about socialism

He and other intellectuals, who more than any group suffered under Mao, note the "fever" emerged after the 1989 democracy movement frightened party leadership and the bloody crackdown embittered ordinary people.

In 1988, during a more liberal climate, some Marxist scholars quietly pushed for a reassessment of Mao. They said the party's decision that Mao was "70 percent right and 30 percent wrong" over his lifetime was too kind to someone whose policies created mass starvation and purged millions of

Any reassessment became impossible after the 1989 events shut down ideological exploration. But recent movies portray a more human Mao. In the movie "Mao Tse-tung and

His Son," Mao is so broken up by his son's death in the Korean War that he cannot break the news to his daughter-in-law for two years.

Mao also is shown working through the night in his book-lined study inside a walled compound that once was part of the imperial palace

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# Couple, officials at odds

HOUSTON (AP) - Lake Jackson city officials contest information two men have given an Angleton couple, who believe it could prove city officials conspired to hide the truth about a malfunctioning traffic light at the intersection where their son was killed.

Stephen Wayne Foster, 16, was a passenger in a friend's car on Feb. 6, 1985. As the two drove through an intersection in Lake Jackson, another car entered the intersection and the vehicles collided. Stephen died an hour later.

His friend, Robert Melvin Cole Jr., also 16, suffered broken bones and chest injuries, but has recovered. The driver of the other car, Ernest Warren Ivie, 23, was not injured.

. After an investigation, Lake Jackson police concluded that Ivie had run a red light. Almost immediately, though, rumors spread through the city that the traffic light was defective.

Stephen's parents, Larry and Pam Foster of Angleton, and Cole's family sued the city, but settled for amounts that were kept secret by court order. Foster said the family settled on the advice of attorneys because they lacked adequate information to prove the light was

# Republicans vow to fight crime bill

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WASHINGTON (AP) - As Congress rushes to adjourn by midweek, Democrats are turning up the political heat by crafting a crime bill that expands the death penalty and regulates handgun sales but weakens key provisions that President Bush wanted.

Senate Republicans vowed to fight the crime bill, threatening a filibuster as several other major measures await final drafting and floor action.

The \$3.1 billion anti-crime package, approved by Democraticled House and Senate negotiators Sunday night, would apply the death penalty to about 50 federal emergency appropriation bill.

# Candidates flirt with Iowan activists

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Six Democratic presidential candidates flirted with politicsstarved Iowa activists, and most just indulging a passing fancy.

Home-state contender Sen. Tom Harkin went out of his way to underscore his edge just in case the others hadn't noticed, while some of his rivals put on a brave face in speeches to Democratic activists.

"We have a lot of people from Iowa living in our state," Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton said Saturday. "They vote for me sometimes.

The weekend swing was a rare campaign appearance for the six in a state which holds leadoff precinct caucuses in 21/2 months. It was also an appearance jumbled by heavy snowfall.

"There are many things I can control," said Iowa Democratic Chairman John Roehrick. "But never the weather.

Speaking to about 1,000 activists, former Massachusetts Sen. Paul Tsongas reminded them he while Virginia Gov. L. Douglas

Wilder said he might do so again. "I think Iowa is perfectly situated for the message I bring, and I don't concede Iowa to tried to make it clear they were anyone," said Wilder. "I don't intend to have just a cameo presence in Iowa.

Wilder, a long shot for the nomination, even said he's picked campaign manager to run his Iowa effort. Nebraska Sen. Bob Kerrey took a different view.

That's a familiarity which has kept some candidates away from the state.

"I don't know what you know had once campaigned in the state, about me," confessed former California Gov. Jerry Brown dur-

# Talks end, Aristide returns to Venezuelan exile

CARTAGENA, Colombia (AP) Haitian lawmakers and their ousted president finished three days of talks without achieving their main goals: restoring Jean-Bertrand Aristide to office and ending an international embargo.

Aristide left the OAS-sponsored talks Sunday visibly disappointed. He had no comment before heading back to Caracas, Venezuela, his home in exile since the violent army coup Sept. 30 that removed him from power.

Augusto Ramirez Ocampo, Colombia's delegate to the Organization of American States, said he did not rule out further talks. "There has been no date or

place set, but I suppose the efforts should continue," he said. He said the OAS may "gradualforce Aristide's reinstatement "as long as negotiations progress" for

Despite failure on the key issues, the parties did agree on the need to separate the army from the police and obtain emergency humanitarian aid from abroad for their poverty-stricken country, Ramirez Ocampo said.

One OAS delegate, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said negotiators had worked overnight drafting a document calling for Aristide's return and the lifting of the embargo on the impoverished Caribbean nation of 6.4 million.

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

# Don't open door for Duke

David Duke is not dead. Like the Hydra, the monster from Greek mythology, one of Duke's heads has been cut off in his resounding defeat at the Louisiana polls, but two more will grow back in its place. Until this country performs the Herculean task of severing the relationship between economic fear and racism, Duke will break out again like an angry boil. Louisiana can celebrate the impressive solidarity of black voters and the good sense of half the white people. A less-than-savory Edwin Edwards, whose sins are the traditional kind, . . . will move into the governor's mansion.

But the Duke stench lingers in the air. Lousy economic conditions in Louisiana made Duke's call of the wild possible, even inevitable. This man who two years ago was distributing Nazi propaganda received roughly half

There are pockets in this country . . . that could be seduced by the message that all of our troubles are caused by those other people. Those blacks, those Jews, those Latinos. It only takes one sanitized spokesman mouthing code phrases like welfare mothers and affirmative action . . . and the fundamental problems with a region's economy can be trampled under a mob's irrational hunger for a scapegoat. From there it's only a step to the hood and the swastika. It's almost certain Duke will enter some presidential primaries, to spread his message. Don't let him in the house.

# Japanese should share risk

Secretary of State James A. Baker III has built up his diplomatic muscles lately from pushing the Israelis to the bargaining table at a Mideast peace conference. So it's apt that the secretary flexed the muscle a little more while speaking to Japanese leaders on a recent trip to

Baker was blunt. He said the Japanese must be more active in protecting democratic governments and economic freedom — active beyond loan guarantees or money. Many Americans, for example, were angry at the outset of the Persian Gulf War when the Japanese government flatly refused to send any troops and instead reluctantly offered financial help. Japan argued that it couldn't send troops because of its post-World War II constitution designed by the United States — that bans military

That was a slender thread on which to hang an excuse, particularly when the call for help came from the very country which helped to shape Japan after the war and laid at least part of the groundwork for its phenomenal economic success.

Baker apparently didn't hesitate to make that point to Japanese leaders. Japan, after all, enjoys all the benefits of foreign oil — on which it is totally dependent — and free trade, which has allowed it to spread its financial wings throughout the world.

So when the United Nations sends a peacekeeping force into a region, all the nations who have an interest in keeping that peace ought to be represented. That certainly includes the Japanese, who do not deserve to reap the rewards of peace without sharing in the risks of its preservation.

# Cuomo could give Bush a real race

CHARLESTON, S.C. — Mario Cuomo, governor of New York, came to town on Saturday the 16th. Before an exceptionally wellheeled audience, he gave a luncheon speech that was Old No. 1. As an example of the forensic art it was spectacular. I've heard the governor many times before. He was at his best.

A brassy lady with orange hair caught up with me outside the ballroom door. She was the wife of one of the Fortune 500 executives who were having a conference here. "Whaddid ya think?" she asked. I said it was a remarkable performance.

"Piffawmance!" She was not impressed. "Shuah, some piffawmance. But tell me - whaddid he say?

As a matter of fact, the governor said a great deal, and a great deal of what he said made great good sense. But the lady with the Sunkist hair was right. A pundit has no business covering Cuomo. This is a job for the drama critic. The gentleman is the best freestyle, ad lib, catch-as-catchcan orator in public life today.

No one in either party is even close. Jesse Jackson is good. Republican Rep. Henry Hyde, when he gets all wound up, is top

chop. If he could just get his voice down an octave, New York's Sen. Patrick Moynihan would be in the first rank. A couple of other senators — Hollings of South Carolina, Bumpers of Arkansas are stem-winders of the old school. But nobody plays the harp like Mario

Cuomo begins with a few jokes. He tells them superbly. One joke recalls the time he was introduced by an Albany mayor who had wearied of introducing him. The mayor looked up "governor" in the dictionary. Then he introduced Cuomo as "a device attached to a machine to see that it does not operate improperly.

He recalls the first time he went to the White House during the Reagan administration. Pat Moynihan brought him forward to introduce him to the president. Reagan needed no introduction. Smiling at Cuomo, Reagan said he would know Lee Iacocca

anywhere. After the laughter dies, with perfect timing Cuomo confesses that he was on the verge of saying, "Well, Mr. President, to some people we all look alike.'

Watching Cuomo in action is like watching an eggbeater whip up meringue. His hands never stop. He snaps his fingers, jabs at the crowd, makes a fist, prays to high heaven. This was a tough bunch. I looked around. Nobody was whispering to anybody. Cuomo spoke for almost an hour, and he held them all the way.

After the jokes he got serious. The stock market had fallen 120 points on Friday. Cuomo mocked the president and Congress for assuring the people that things are getting better. What was the market saying? "We don't believe you!" We are at a turning point, Cuomo believes. Nothing will be accomplished until the critical situation is acknowledged.

At times Cuomo speaks as if he were playing scales at concert speed. Facts, figures, ideas, anecdotes, small jokes — they rise and fall in fountains, in arpeggios, in glissandos of statistics. He talks about people in poverty, about school dropouts, about people who have no health insurance, about a woman who came up to him on a

New York sidewalk, crying in despair. Her husband has cancer. Their savings have been wiped out. Cuomo looked all choked up.

Without getting maudlin, the governor recalls his beginnings. His immigrant father at first was a ditchdigger — a ditchdigger! Neither parent could read or write either English or Italian. But they made it. They ran a grocery store. They made it! They believed in the American dream. They believed that every generation would do better. "We can't take the American dream for granted any longer," says Cuomo

He plunges into his 10-point program: more capital, more investment, a lowered tax on capital gains, greater emphasis on education, a rebuilding of the infrastructure. It will be painful. Some entitlements must be cut. Wealthy families must pay higher taxes. He has said all this before He says it well.

The governor of New York at 59 is slim and trim and getting bald. He's a presence. If he decides to run for the White House, George Bush will have a fight on his hands.

Balboni's letter to the Herald. First of all I don't believe Corso knows the word of God like he should. In Romans Chapter 13 verses 3 and 4 it says this:


3. For rulers are not a cause of fear for good behavior, but for evil. Do you want to have no fear of authority? Do what is good, and you will have praise from the same:

# Survey shows elderly women closer to poverty

BOSTON (AP) — Only 59 percent of the nation's elderly are women, but they make up more than 72 percent of the elderly poor, and the financial future of young women is not that bright, social workers were told at a conference.

Women's poverty results from their being paid only 66 percent of men's wages, interruptions in work to care for families, and outmoded Social Security and pension systems, said Robyn Stone, a research fellow at the National Center for Health Services Research and Health Care Technology.

The near-poor, who do not qualify for Supplemental Security Income, Medicaid or food stamps, barely can buy basic necessities. Ms. Stone criticized advocacy

groups, such as the American Association of Retired Persons, for promoting health insurance packages they sell rather than working for publicly financed universal insurance.

Women lose in all three phases of health insurance - Medicaid, insurance paid by large employers, and a public pool to which small employers contribute, said Lou Glasse, president of the Older Women's League.

"For most women, decades of Social Security contributions will translate into virtually the same retirement benefits as those paid to their mothers, even though their mothers may never have earned wages or paid Social Security taxes," she said.

# Proposals reviewed to overthrow Iraqi President Hussein

Bush administration is reviewing proposals to overthrow Iraqi President Saddam Hussein as a way to stem criticism about the inconclusive end of the Persian Gulf War, according to a report published today. The Washington Post, in today's

editions, quoted unnamed Republican sources as saying President Bush is worried that Democratic lawmakers and presidential candidates will use Saddam's continued hold on power to minimize the gulf victory.

White House spokesman Doug Davidson refused to comment on the report.

An interagency committee under

reviewing proposals that include providing Iraqi rebels with such overt or covert assistance as military training and spare parts or helping to protect a provisional, alternative government, the Post reported

However, the Post said there are differing views among officials and participating departments about whether any plan to oust Saddam is worth the effort. The main problem, the newspaper said, is that the U.S. plan would depend on some degree of U.S. leverage over internal Iraqi politics and some degree of cooperation among Iraqi rebel groups.

Both are virtually nonexistent, said the Post.

Not even Washington could escape on a Sunday full of upsets. The Redskins, trying to become the fourth team in NFL history to

start 12-0, instead lost 24-21 at home to their old nemesis, the Dallas "We'd like to go undefeated, but

these things happen," linebacker Matt Millen said. "It was good while it lasted, but now it's over."

The Redskins are the only team to have clinched a playoff spot, although they failed in a bid to clinch the NFC East. Houston could have won the AFC Central but lost to Pittsburgh 26-14. Buffalo missed a chance to win the AFC East with a 16-13 loss to New England.

'On a day like this, it was hard to get anything going," Houston coach Jack Pardee said. "We weren't able to get done what we wanted to. It's extremely disappointing, because we could have wrapped it up."

In other surprises, Miami beat Chicago 16-13 in overtime and Cleveland beat Kansas City 20-15.

The only NFL team to go undefeated was the 1972 Miami Dolphins, who won 14 games in the regular season and added three more in the playoffs, including the Super Bowl.

"Realistically, these things don't happen very often," Millen said. "I don't want to take anything away from Miami, but they only had 14 games. Maybe if we had had 14 games, we might have approached this one differently.

The Cowboys (7-5) won by shutting down Washington's potent offense. They began the game with the league's 25th-ranked defense, but held the Redskins to one touchdown and 199 yards until the final minute.

Quarterback Troy Aikman, who had a pass intercepted and returned for a 31-yard touchdown by Martin Mayhew in the first quarter, rallied the Cowboys. Aikman's Hail Mary pass to Alvin Harper went for a 34-yard touchdown just before halftime.

Aikman left with a sprained right knee in the third quarter, and Steve Beuerlein threw a 23-yard touchdown pass to Michael Irvin.
