Budget, tax rate, FEDC loan on council agenda

The Friona city council at 6:30 p.m. Monday September 12, 2011 in the council chambers at 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

Monday's meeting includes 17 items on the tentative agenda. The final agenda is posted at city hall 72 hours

prior to each meeting. Three items are included under Public Hearings. The council will hear comments from the public regarding the Fiscal Year 2011-2012 budget and the proposed tax rate of \$0.79 per \$100 valuation. Also open for public comment is a proposed forgivable loan from the Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) to Michael Bautista for a down payment toward the purchase of Robertson's Electric.

The council will consider and take action on the FEDC loan to Bautista and budgets for Prairie Acres and the FEDC. Appointments to the FEDC board is also on the agenda. The council will also consider and take action on approval of the city budget for fiscal year beginning October 1, 2011, and adopt the \$0.79 tax rate, which will raise \$18,299 more revenue than property taxes raised in 2010.

Looking Back

It was a Tuesday morning. I remember that much. Many newspapers are asking Facebook friends to say what they were doing on 9-11 so they can print it in their papers in observance of the 9-11 anniversary Sunday. We didn't do that here.

Like millions of others I was watching the first tower on fire. Thought at the time it was an accident. My normal routine is to have Fox News on while I'm stumbling around getting ready for work. I heard something about a plane hitting a building and walked into my living room to see what was up.

I saw the second plane hit the tower. I also saw Jack Ruby shoot Lee Harvey Oswald and the Challenger spaceship explode. All are memorable events.

I guess the 9-11 attacks hit home more with me since I had visited the Twin Towers several times during my travel

agent days. I remember having lunch at the Windows on the World Restaurant on the 110th floor and wishing I could hurry and get back down to the street. Still cannot imagine what it must have been like to be at that restaurant when the plane hit and it started to collapse.

The big buzz this week across the media is the 10th anniversary of the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. Many people being interviewed, many documentaries being shown, family members of victims still sad and angry. Some TV stations are promising never before seen video. I'm still confused about whether any lives were saved after the towers collapsed.

Some are criticizing the NFL for playing the first game of the season on the 9-11 anniversary. The ceremony at ground zero is excluding pastors and other religious leaders. It seems for a so-called

celebration things are really complicated.

The government is warning about possible terrorist attacks Sunday. They are warning people to be cautious if they travel abroad. Security in New York City will be tight.

Since 9-11, the few times the video has been shown of the collapsing towers, I haven't been able to watch it. I found myself turning away. Too much trauma to relive again and again. I won't be watching any of the specials and documentaries about 9-11. I don't really know why except it bothers me in a negative way.

I'm not sure how I feel about "celebrating" the anniversary this Sunday. Perhaps if I had a family member or friend die in the chaos I would feel differently. Obviously we will never forget that day, I just don't want to relive it and hear about again. It is too painful. Can't exactly explain why.

Time will dim memories as it always does. Sure we will remember. Students too young to remember will learn about it in history classes I hope because it was a significant day in America's history. It was a monumental tragedy that defies reason to this day and always will. America changed that day.

To those who want to celebrate and observe the occasion I say it is your right to do so. There is still grieving to be done, especially by New York citizens. I saw one brief report that more than 10,000 New York people filed for disability after 9-11 because they were too traumatized to work again.

Maybe confronting and remembering will help with the grief. I don't want to relive the past but I don't want to forget either. Sorry, I'm not sure what to think. I'll be watching NFL football.

orisms of jodok By Uncle John White • 1868 - 1965

Reprinted from the February 22, 1935 Friona Star. Column written by Uncle John White with concern about local folks and government handouts. Unemployment is not a new phenomenon. Imagine Friona in 1935. Another in a series scouring Friona history. Uncle John tended to write long, flowery sentences and paragraphs, typical of the language of the day. We have left capitals and emphasis and punctuation the way it was.

I have stood on the street and watched many good, deserving, industrious citizens go to the relief office here each Monday for the meager pittance that is being handed out to them by the public in an effort to keep body and soul together until something either "better or worse" is planned and put into execution by our big lights at the head of the government. And these same men say in my hearing that they are in worse condition than when this "relief machinery" was put into operation two years ago.

They say "Give us a job at living wages and see how quickly we will bump this thing." And, they say there is nothing PERMANENT in sight in the way of RELIEF, even now, unless it is the DOLE itself. And most of them hope this may never be permanent. Of course, as I have said before, "There are exceptions."

I have never been able to understand how the plans of the "Braintrusters" can be made to work successfully, but there are lots of things I cannot understand, so I have tried not to be too critical of the same plans. I do not even understand why two apple trees standing in the same climatic condition will reproduce, one a sweet apple and the other a sour apple, or why the fruit on one of the trees should be red and the other yellow, then why should I be expected to understand the plans of the "braintrusters?"

But, be that as it may, I have yet to hear of one man who is returning thanks to the men at the head of the government for the money he received for plowing up his cotton, or for the wheat he did not plant, or for the hogs he did not raise. True, they seemed glad to get the money, but they invariably condemn the plan by which it was given.

So far as I know, I have never been accused of being too prone to criticise, and hope to be able to give the other fellow the right to his views that I claim for my own, and I am not now too ready to criticise since it is not my business to devise the plans for the government, and an intellect so weak as to not be able to fathom so simple a thing as the apple trees mentioned above should not be expected to compare with the gigantic intellects at the head of our government.

However, when one considers the vast amounts of money that have been expended in the last two or three years by the government in this so-called "relief" work and then stands as I do at the tail of the machine and observes the very comparatively small amount that is allowed to filter out through this complicated and intricate administrative machinery to the people who really need the relief. We know there is a "fly in the ointment" somewhere. (Whatever that means.)

And it does not take any "giant" intellect to see that this is a fact, either. And neither does it require any gigantic intellect to understand that if these funds had been placed in communities throughout the country direct from the government and thus have eliminated the long and hungry trail of political "relief" administrators, and making each local bank responsible for the amounts they paid out to the people, even under the same requirement that have been enforced, and every man doing an honest day's work each day for the wages are received, there would have been ten times as much relief afforded and at least ten times as much worthwhile work done as has been accomplished. Get the money to the people who need it and do it quickly.

Mrs. Walker still poorly In an interview with Mr. J.R. Walker he stated that Mrs. Walker is still in serious condition resulting from being knocked over by an automobile at Clovis a few weeks ago.

Today, the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) announced new guidance to support enforcement of rules that protect hospital patients' right to choose their own visitors during a hospital stay, including a visitor who is a same-sex domestic partner. These rules, finalized by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) in November, apply to all hospitals that participate in Medicare and Medicaid. The guidance also supports enforcement of the right of patients to designate the person of their choice, including a same-sex partner, to make medical decisions on their behalf should they become incapacitated.

"Couples take a vow to be with each other in sickness and in health and it is unacceptable that, in the past, some same-sex partners were denied the right to visit their loved ones in times of need," said HHS Secretary Kathleen Sebelius. "We are releasing guidance for enforcing new rules that give all patients, including those with same-sex partners, the right to choose who can visit them in the hospital as well as enhancing existing guidance regarding the right to choose who will help make medical decisions on their behalf."


The rules updated the Conditions of Participation (CoPs), which are the health and safety standards all Medicare- and Medicaidparticipating hospitals and critical access hospitals must meet, and apply to all patients of those hospitals even if they are not on Medicare or Medicaid. Among other things, the CoPs require hospitals to explain to all patients their right to choose who may visit them during their inpatient stay, regardless of whether the visitor is a family member, a spouse, a domestic partner (includ- improve the health of lesbian, ing a same-sex domestic gay, bisexual and transgender partner), or another type of (LGBT) populations.

Our most prized possession...

In this time of commemorating the tenth anniversary of September 11th we are called to remember one of our most valued possessions-our freedom. So that night, as the legend goes, she goes up on the mountain, casts her precious doll made for her by her mother, into the fire and scatters its ashes to the four winds of the earth. The next morning the hills are covered with the beautiful blue flowers we know as the bluebonnet. Would we know and would we be willing to give our most prized possession for the good of others? We, who are blessed with so many possessions, might we even struggle with the decision as to just what we valued the most and, basically, we would probably not be asked to sacrifice, just maybe to share what we have. Would we have the courage and strength to make the neces-
