Board discusses major school renovation

The Friona ISD Board of Trustees met in regular session September 19, 2011, at 7 p.m. in the boardroom of the administration build-

County Judge Trey Ellis reported to the board on the availability of Parmer County Permanent School funds to be used in construction and renovation projects within the district. These funds can be used by Friona ISD and district representatives will meet with the County Commissioners Court to discuss the matter.

The board amended the order calling for a Special Bond Election to include voters in Deaf Smith County who fall within the school district borders. The Special Bond Election for construction of an activity center at the high school and other district projects will be held November 8, 2011.

Another major project is an upgrade at FHS. Preliminary plans are to roof the main classroom section, install individual room heaters and air conditioners, replace windows, lighting, and ceiling tiles. The completion of this project would be a considerable long term energy savings for the district, according to Superintendent Kenny Austin.

The primary campus would like to see the street between the primary and elementary permanently closed. Closing the street, Euclid, would take approval of the city, police department, and fire department. Primary teachers are working to redesign the primary school playground.

The first areas considered for landscaping projects will be around the junior high gym and the elementary cafeteria. Discussions were held on installing sprinkler systems or zero-scaping. The board will be holding more discussions on all of these projects over the next few weeks.

In a final item the board passed an ordinance to keep the tax rate the same at 0.92 cents for maintenance and operation. The district will receive more local tax money this year but considerably less state and federal money.

Maize Days photography show

The Parmer County Extension office along with Friona 4-H will host a photography show for Maize Days. The show is open to everyone.

There will be four age levels: junior for children up to 10 years, intermediate for children 11 to 13, senior for children 14-18, and everyone 18 and older will be judged as adult.

Photos may be entered in color or black and white in the following categories: people, animals, landscape, still life, architectural elements, plant/flora, special effects or theme. The theme for the show will be "Heroes of Parmer County." There is no limit on the number of photos that can be entered but each photo must be entered only once. There is a \$2 entry fee per photo.

Photos can be brought to the Parmer County Extension office in Farwell on the third floor of the courthouse until noon on September 27. They can also be dropped off for one day only at the following locations: Friona Chamber of Commerce on September 23 until noon, Bovina tax office September 23 until noon, or in Lazbuddie to Ann Rainey until September 23.

Ribbons will be awarded for the top three in each category per age group. An award for Judges Choice and Peoples Choice will also be given. All photos will be displayed in the Depot in the Friona city park on October 1 until 1:30 p.m. Contact the Parmer County Extension office at 481-3619 for an official entry form or to answer any ques-

horisms of jodok By Uncle John White • 1868 - 1965

Printed from the October 25, 1935 Friona Star. Uncle John saunters about town visiting friends and talking about "the most interesting town there is." Imagine Friona in 1935. As Maize Days approaches it is interesting to consider what folks thought about Friona 76 years ago.

Some people think there is nothing worthwhile to be seen or thought about in their home town, but I have always found it quite different. In fact, I think my home town is about the most interesting town there is.

This may be perhaps because I am more interested in the people of my home town than I am in those of other towns, because I know them better and have a deeper interest in their welfare or ill-fare as the case may be.

When some of my neighbors with whom I am associated with daily, have accomplished some worthy feat it means more to me than if it had been done by someone whom I do not know, And I always feel more ready to commend the things done by my neighbors rather than things done by strangers.

As I sauntered down Main St. one day last week I chanced to pass the B.T. Galloway hardware store and my attention was attracted by the display in one of the show windows, which was very artistically arranged by some artist in that line.

The display was one evidently intended to especially catch the notice of sportsmen or hunters, since it held a collection

of some nice work in taxidermy in the mounting of several specimens of water fowl and animals usually sought as game by hunters.

In addition to the taxidermy display there was a display of many kinds and sizes of firearms, including pistols, rifles, and shot guns, some of them rather early date and now could be considered 'back numbers' but valuable as curios and keepsakes, and some of them were apparently "hand-made" just as most of our firearms were made. And in connection with these guns of many sorts there was a fine display of the various types of ammunition in shell prepared for rifles, shot guns, and pistols. Also hunting knives and hair lariat ropes and spurs.

Now, to my mind this was an interesting collection and window display, and it was the more interesting to me because it had been arranged by one of my neighbors and in the show of one of my neighbors' store; but judging from remarks that I have heard many people make, they would not be interesting to them, mostly because they were here in our home town.

And before I forget it, I want to remark that one of those old long barreled muzzle-loading rifles in that window reminded me of a gun that "Uncle Bill Harmon", who used to live a way back in another of my "old home towns" used to tell about. That was a hand made rifle, made by one of Uncle Bill's neighbors, and had a unusually long range-so long in fact, that Uncle Bill said that in shooting deer he could kill them so far away that he always had to salt the bullets when loading the gun, as he said, "to keep the meat from spoiling before he could walk to it."

And then there was this 1935 front page news article:

Man Injured in Turnover

Two men, one about 50 years old and the other about 25 or 30, both strangers here, drove into town last Saturday morning seeking the services of a physician.

They were directed to the office of Dr. Stover where it was found that the elder man had suffered a fractured clavicle and received the necessary treatment. The younger man was very little, if any, injured and they were soon again on their way.

The cause of the injury was that their car turned over near the highway crossing at Homeland.

And this brief look at unemployment: Farm Work Affords Employment

Farmers who have row crops to harvest and cotton to pick are supplying temporary employment to many of the men of Friona who have no steady work.

It was reported that one farmer came to town recently asking for 12 or 14 men to assist him in taking care of his row crops and others have been in wanting all the way from two to a half dozen men. This demand for help will likely continue until all row crops are harvested.

SJR 4 would amend the constitution to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue additional general obligation bonds on a continuing basis for one or more accounts of the Texas Water Development Fund II, with the restriction that the total amount of bonds outstanding at any time does not exceed \$6 billion.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$6 billion at any time outstanding."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 50)

SJR 50 would amend the constitution to authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successors to issue and sell general obligation bonds on a continuing basis for the purpose of financing educational loans for

students, subject to certain constitutional restrictions, including a restriction as to the maximum principal amount of bonds outstanding at any one time.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas to finance educational loans to students."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 63)

homestead of the surviving HJR 63 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to permit a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area within the county, and to pledge increases in ad valorem tax revenues imposed on property in the area by the county for repayment of such bonds or notes. The amendment does not provide independent authority for increasing ad valorem tax rates.

> The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area and to pledge for repayment of the bonds or notes increases in ad valorem taxes imposed by the county on property in the area. The amendment does not provide authority for increasing ad valorem tax rates."

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 26)

SJR 26 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow cities and counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities and counties without having to assess an ad valorem tax and set aside a specified amount of funds for the payment of costs under the interlocal contract.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment

authorizing the legislature to allow cities or counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities or counties without the imposition of a tax or the provision of a sinking fund.'

Proposition Number 6 (HJR 109)

HJR 109 would amend the constitution to increase the amount of principal that is available for withdrawal from the permanent school fund each year and would also clarify certain references to that fund in the constitution. Increased access to the principal of the state public education trust fund would be based upon HJR 109 granting the authority to consider alternative market calculations when determining the amount of principal that is available for distribution to the available school fund. HJR 109 would also provide authority to distribute to the available school fund annual revenue from school fund land or other properties up to \$300 million per year.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment clarifying references to the permanent school fund, allowing the General Land Office to distribute revenue from permanent school fund land or other properties to the available school fund to provide additional funding for public education, and providing for an increase in the market value of the permanent school fund for the purpose of allowing increased distributions from the available school fund."

Proposition Number 7 (SJR 28)

SJR 28 would amend the constitution by adding El Paso County to the list of counties authorized to create conservation and reclamation districts to develop parks and recreational facilities financed by taxes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit conservation and reclamation districts in El Paso County to issue bonds supported by ad valorem taxes to fund the development and maintenance of parks and recreational facilities.'

Proposition Number 8 (SJR 16)

SJR 16 would amend the constitution by requiring the legislature to provide for taxation of open space land devoted to water stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment providing for the appraisal for ad valorem tax purposes of openspace land devoted to water-stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity."

Proposition Number 9 (SJR 9)

SJR 9 would amend the constitution to authorize the governor, on the written recommendation and advice of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, to grant a pardon, reprieve, or commutation of punishment to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervi-

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the governor to grant a pardon to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervi-

Proposition Number 10 (SJR 37)

SJR 37 would amend the constitution by extending the length of the unexpired term that causes the automatic resignation of certain local elected officeholders if they announce candidacy or become candidates for another office from one year to one year and 30 days.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the length of the unexpired term that causes the automatic resignation of certain elected county or district officeholders if they become candidates for another office."
