Veterans Day-November 11, 2011 Remembering a WWII veteran

I am Kenneth W. Neill. I Mather Field as our point of had completed 1 1/2 yrs. of college when we learned of the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, as we were leaving a movie theater in Weatherford, Texas. After a few hours, reality began to set in for this 19-year-old college student. Maybe there was going to be more to life than football, basketball, college, and girls.

I volunteered to serve in the Army Air Corps. I was placed on inactive Reserve, subject to call at any time, but I was encouraged to stay in college. After two more semesters, I was activated, sworn in, and started training in aviation cadets in January 1943. Training complete, in December 1944, we went to embarking for overseas.

On December 21, 1944, we landed on Tinian-North

Field in the South Pacific. In February 1945, we flew our first mission to Iwo Jima. For the next 180 days, we flew

37 missions to Japan. Ben Kuroki, our tail gunner, was the only Japanese American to fly in the Pacific for the United States.

Some missions stuck in our minds, including a ditching on April 13, 1945. Sitting in a crowded life raft for 73 hours is forever etched in my brain.

My contemporaries and I gave this country 3-5 years of our youth. We hope our grandchildren and greatgrandchildren will be willing to give a little also. We are still the greatest nation in the world. God Bless America.

From the front page of the Friday, May 22, 1936 Friona Star. On the left side of the page was a story about a dust storm that began, "Last Sunday evening between five and six o'clock the people of Friona were treated to another genuine dust storm of gigantic magnitude when a dense cloud of dust rolled in from the west."

On the right side of the same page it is reported the area received five inches of rain the next day as eloquently written by Uncle John White. A dust storm one day and rain the next 75 years ago. Guess not much has changed out here over the years. Imagine Friona in 1936.

One of the heaviest rain falls ever experienced at Friona and perhaps the greatest volume of water to fall here at any one time for nearly four years, fell here late Monday afternoon, when an estimated amount of five inches fell within a comparatively short time.

Shortly after the rain began falling bar-pits along the roads were filled to overflowing and became rapid flowing rivers of water and lakes were soon filled to a depth greater than has shown for the past few years.

The extent of the heavy downpour

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seems to have been only local and did not extend far in any direction. Four miles north of town, H. Clay Davis reported only enough to lay the dust, and W. J. Talbot reported only a nice shower at his home five miles northwest of town, and while it was falling he said he looked over toward his neighbor to the north of him and saw a dust storm raging.

F. P. Brookfield reported a quarter of an inch at his farm seven miles west and F. N. Welch reported that his government gauge registered 60 one hundredths at his farm seven miles northeast. To the south the heavy rain extended only about a mile, which gradually decreased to a mere shower at Homeland seven miles south.

In town, however the fall was so great and so rapid that in several of the business places the water swept through the buildings like a river and rapidly oozed in at both ends of other places. These places including B.T. Galloway's hardware store, Fallwell's garage, Mary Spring's ladies furnishings store, and Roy Johnson's grocery store.


Cars and trucks were stuck out on highways in all directions and many tourists were stranded here far into the night or for the entire night.

The water fell so rapidly on the slope south of town that it rushed down onto the flat and made it necessary for neighbors to wade waist deep to help some of the dwellers in that part of town out to higher ground god W and the aktow

John Guyer, Glenn Reeve, and Charley Thompson were in Glenn's barn doing the evening milking when the rain came and before they could finish the water flowed all through the barn and when they were through there was no other way to get to the separator house but to wade water knee deep or better.

Guyer carried a five-gallon can of milk and when he set it down to open the door, the water came up to the neck of the can.

Clyde Goodwine had been out to his pasture looking after his cattle and coming down the highway just west of Glenn Reeve's home he lost his bearings and instead of navigating the middle of the stream he got too far to one side and his car slid into the bar-pit. Realizing is was useless to try to escape, Clyde removed his shoes, abandoned his car and rolled up his trousers, and taking down the middle of the stream, which spread from one side of the highway to the other, he strolled on into town.

Don't you hate it when you dash to the phone, but still miss the call? With call return, it's easy to automatically call them back!





The wedding is set for December 27, 2011, at the Bovina First Baptist Church. The reception will follow at Victory Family Worship Center in Friona.





God's requirement of repentance

I'm jealous of Jonah, and so is every other preacher. In Romero. Jonah 3, an entire city believes in God, repents of evil and wickedness, and is spared by God. This is the greatest mass conversion in the Bible and possibly in all of history, and God used rebellious, resentful, and racist Jonah.

In reality, Jonah was only God's megaphone carrying the message; the greatest miracle is the wide scale repentance of Nineveh. God requires repentance from sin. He always has and always will.

Do you shy away from a gospel of repentance? Don't, Jesus didn't. In fact, Jesus' first words in the book of Mark are, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel," (1:15). Peter's sermon in Acts 2 demanded people "repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins," (2:38). God requires repentance from sin for all who would be saved.

If you have never turned and repented from your sin, then you are not a Christian. God requires repentance from sin, and total trust in Him. Repentance begins with intellectual knowledge that your actions are wrong before God. Seeing the putrid, defiling nature of sin before God's perfect purity, beauty and glory, produces shame and guilt, which should lead to a new direction of turning from sin and following Christ.

Repentance is an intellectual, emotional and volitional turning away from sin and toward Jesus Christ, but repentance does not begin with sin, but with God's beauty, holiness and glory, and seeing your sin in the light of His purity.

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



Fleming reports on leadership program

I just completed my sixth session with the Texas Agriculture Lifetime Leadership (TALL) program. This session was concentrated in the San Joaquin Valley from Sacramento to Fresno California. There are over 210 different agriculture crops grown in this area. I saw harvesters dressed in hospital type white garments from head to toe harvesting artichokes and disinfecting their harvest tools at the end of each field row. Following the outbreaks of food borne illnesses associated with fresh fruit and vegetables, food safety is now a top priority.

Almond harvest was in full swing and I

and processed almonds. California produces 80% of the world's almonds. I learned that in 2007 it became federal law that all raw almonds sold in the U.S. have to be pasteurized. This is another food safety effort. Of course I saw plenty of grapes in California to support the wine industry. There are 53 different wine grape varieties grown in California. In addition to wine grapes they also grow table grapes and raisin grapes.

Agriculture in the area is experiencing a switch from traditional vegetable production to more nuts, fruits, and other long term orchard type crops. This allows the producer to spread his investment and risk over a longer time frame. This means the American consumer will see more and more imported vegetables as California agriculture transitions.

There was very little animal agriculture in this "vegetable patch" area of California. Dairies are still fairly common, but increasing land values eventually entice the dairies to sell and relocate to other areas. I saw only one cattle feed yard and it was enclosed with chain link fence topped with razor wire. I assume the razor wire was to keep the California "nuts" out and not the cattle in. Everyone we visited with, in all facets of California agriculture, had the same set of major problems. These problems are water, governmental regulations, and environmental radicals.

Our water problems in Texas involve the allocation of water between agriculture and urban users. California is faced with agriculture, urban, and environmental water allocation. They face increasing pressure to release more water for environmental

purposes such as filling streams, restoring marsh lands and increasing habitats for endangered species. Water allocation issues are a major hot spot in California politics.

I saw several solar farms with 120 acre plots devoted entirely to solar panels. Since the San Joaquin Valley has abundant sunshine and no hail, it's ideal for solar farms. The big debate over these solar farms is that they take some of the most fertile land in the United States out of agriculture production. There is plenty of land not fit for agriculture production that would work great for solar farms, but there are governmental incentives to remove agriculturally productive land. I'm not politically savvy enough to explain how we gain anything by offsetting lower energy costs with higher food costs.

It's been said that the problems facing California agriculture today are problems Texas agriculture will face in the next decade. If this is true, then we certainly have some tough hurdles ahead of us. My next TALL session is in January and will be centered in East Texas. I'll write and share my experiences after the session.

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
