I have a photo ID.

It is a driver license. Had passports for many years but my latest one has long since expired. Apparently many people, especially the poor, do not have any form of photo identification.

In Texas, as in many other states, a photo ID is required to vote. Opponents of the photo ID requirement say that many people, especially the poor, cannot vote because they do not have a photo ID and cannot get one.

It is a fact I think that in any given election onehalf or less of eligible voters do not even bother to vote. I do not know who the people are that do not bother to vote. I suspect they are all kinds, rich and poor. Voting is not a requirement.

The photo ID requirement is said to help prevent voter fraud. There have been cases of dead people voting. I don't recall ever reading how

that is possible and what happened to the guilty election officials. There have been incidents of homeless people bused to the polls and paid to vote. (Has anyone other than Lyndon B. Johnson ever been elected by stuffing the ballot box? I should look it up.)

When a voter shows up with just a voter registration card it is not always possible for the election officials to know if that person is who they say they are. I think in most cases if you do not have a photo ID you can fill out a ballot and it is put aside and not counted until your identification can be verified.

Leonard Pitts, Jr. a syndicated columnist who often appears in the Amarillo Globe-News and Clovis News-Journal, recently wrote a column with the headline, "Poor people also have right to vote." Here is how he described poor people who

can't vote: "You have no driver's license because you have nothing to drive. You have no passport because you've never been out of the country. You have no other photo ID because you have no bank account. You work and get paid under the table, a wad of cash sliding from hand to hand."

Mr. Pitts, a well known African-American columnist, says of the Republicans behind the photo ID requirement: "It is difficult not to feel their true intent is to suppress the black vote."

Mr. Pitts and other liberal columnists, along with Attorney General Eric Holder, believe the photo ID requirement is a racist law designed to suppress blacks. Mr. Pitts not only blames Republicans, the Democrats get a barb too:

"Democrats depend upon the votes of black and/or poor people, but do little to earn them—no

Monthly sales tax received

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced that the state sales tax revenue in December was \$1.98 billion, up 9.5 percent compared to December 2010.

"Sales tax revenue continues to grow in almost all major economic categories and revenue has now increased for 21 consecutive months," Combs said. "Sales taxes from retail trade and restaurant activity continue to improve, with tax revenue from the oil and natural gas sector also providing a lift to overall collections."

The sales tax figures represent sales that occurred in November.

Parmer County's January 2012 payment totaled \$46,265.41 broken down as Bovina \$6,366.76; Farwell \$6,961.50; and Friona \$32,937.15. In January 2011 the tax payment total was \$43,830.92.

Comparing tax receipts from t he same period last year, payments were 5.5%, broken down as Bovina -17.88%; Farwell -10.43%; and Friona 16.36%. For the year, Parmer County cities have received a total of \$46,265.14 as compared to \$43,830.92 for the same period last year, a 5.55% change.
