Combined operation stretched from coast to border By GARY SHANKS

Four men from Big Spring and one from Colorado City were arrested Tuesday in a combined law enforcement operation reaching from Lubbock in the South Plains to Mission on the Rio Grande and Corpus Christi on the coast

In Big Spring, Tony Marquez was arrested and charged with conspiracy to possess and intent to distribute a controlled substance and maintaining aplace for the purpose of distributing a controlled substance. Roberto Moreno Marquez was arrested and charged with conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute a controlled substance and two counts of possession of marijuana with intent to distribute.

Big Spring businessman Harold Gaida "Guy" Talbot was arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance. Terry Lynn James, also of Big Spring, was arrested and charged with one count of possession of marijuana with intent to distribute and the use of a communication facility (telephone) to further the commission of a felony.

In Colorado City, Manuel Marquez was arrested and charged with conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute a controlled substance, use of a communication facility (telephone) to further the commission of a felony and possession of cocaine with intent to distribute.

The Marquez's are thought to have been working with the Duran family of San Angelo in a major drug trafficking operation with connections reaching into Mexico and South America, said Finley Soule, public affairs specialist for the U.S. Customs Service said.

Most of the drugs are thought to have been brought into the state via an overland route through Mission, rather than through Corpus Christi, Soule said.

Customs spearheaded the sting, called Operation "Los Hermanos," teaming up with the Texas Department of Safety. A total of 14 federal, state and local law enforcement agencies - including the Big Spring Police Department - took part in Los Hermanos, which means "The Brothers" in Spanish

An estimated 140 law enforcement officers participated in the roundup and confiscated various amounts of cocaine, heroin and marijuana, according to Leonard Lindheim, special agent in charge of the operation.

The year-long investigation was culminated as warrants were served at 18 residences, four businesses and on 35 people across the state, Lindheim



Aimed at interrupting a major drug smuggling operation, Operation Los Hermanos personnel were headguartered at the Customs Service office at Mathis Field in San Angelo, according to Soule. The hub of the operation was in San Angelo where 23 arrest warrants were to be served.

A total of 28 persons had been arrested around the state by 7:30 p.m. Tuesday with authorities still sear-



Municipal judge offered contract

Big Spring City Council unanimously decided Tuesday to put the municipal judge on a salary that will be higher than current regular pay but lower than regular and overtime combined.

Municipal Judge Arnold Marshall declined comment but indicated he was satisfied with a contract offer for a \$19,500 annual salary, regardless of how many hours he works.

"I think it's a situation of the job needing to get done," said Mayor Tim Blackshear when asked about how many hours Marshall should work under salary.

Council members recently complained that Marshall was consistently working overtime. They met in closed executive session for 11/2 hours.

Hired in June 1991 to work 20 hours a week at \$12.50 an hour, Marshall was paid double-pay for each hour over 20 hours a week. In the first six months of this year, he accumulated 241 overtime hours, called callout hours, and 520 regular hours, city records show. Overtime pay of \$6,025 nearly matches regular pay of \$6,500.

- At that rate, Marshall would have made more than \$25,000 this year. The contract is about a fourth lower but one-third higher than regular pay. The last three months of this fiscal year will be prorated under the new contract.

Also, the council agreed to pare down a list of 114 applicants for city manager in wake of the resignation of Hal Boyd, effective July 31, who wants to go into private business

Concerning selection of a new city manager, council members agreed to that each will rate the top 15 applicants in order of preference by next Tuesday's meeting. A pared list of applicants may be culled at that meeting. The pared list will be available to the public.

"So we can find the top five or six or how many we decide to look at," Blackshear suggested.

Council members also agreed to change budget workshop dates scheduled for next week.

Dates now are Monday, Tuesday and Thursday. A Friday date was cancelled. Workshops begin at 6 p.m. Monday and Thursday. Tuesday's meeting is during a regular council meeting and begins at 5:30 p.m.

Don Walkden pleaded guilty today in 118th District Court and was sentenced to 70 years in the Texas Department of Corrections by Judge Bob Moore for the June murder of his wife, Betty Ann Walkden.

Walkden confessed to the crime on July 2 and then directed authorities to an area of the Big Spring landfill where a woman's body was excavated from a mountain of dirt and garbage.

The body was later positively identified as Betty Ann Walkden using dental records mailed from County Sheriff A.N. Standard. Walkden pleaded guilty to the

sentence of life according to Howell said. District Attorney Rick Hamby. The crime was not classifiable as capital murder, according to Sheriff Deputy Woodie Howell.

Walkden was accused of shooting his sleeping wife once in the head with a .22 caliber rifle.

Hamby said this plea "short circuits" any attempts to appeal for a lesser sentence, and averts the uncertainty and expense of a jury trial. Moore gave Walkden several days to consider the consequences before accepting the guilty plea.

'This is a good plea. The family was worried about some kind of insanity defense," Hamby said. "There is no appeal. Justice was El Paso, according to Howard served - as far as justice can be served in any murder.

Betty Ann's body is to be cremated and the remains delivered to her parents in San Angelo, according to officials at Myers and Smith Funeral Home.

After reading an article in the Big Spring Herald asking citizens to respond with information about the then-reported missing woman, Walkden reportedly drove to Hobbs, N.M. and mailed a postcard to himself after signing his wife's name.

The postcard is reported to have said Betty Ann was leaving forever with another man, according to information at the hearing.

Teen arrested for murder Posed for photographs after shooting

AUSTIN - A 16-year-old youth posed for photographs with his gun and the money he took from a slain cab driver only hours after the robbery slaying, witnesses have told investigators.

An acquaintance of the youth said he was in the cab when Alvin Bronson III, 25, was shot to death at Pflugerville early Saturday, according to Pfulgerville municipal court records.

Bronson, a University of Texas student, had been driving the cab for about three weeks. He was found dead behind Pflugerville High School in his cab about 7 a.m. Saturday.

Court records say that when the acquaintance asked the youth why he had shot the cab driver, the suspect replied, "Things happen."

"I didn't believe it," the youth said. "I never saw anybody shot in cold blood in front of my face. I was so scared I just ran all the way home.

A woman identifying herself as the suspect's mother, told the newspaper, "I could never believe my son could do something like that. If I did, I would be less than a mother. I'm devastated.

Statements contained in the Pflugerville court records say the suspect, returned to the Ramada Inn after the shooting and boasted he "just got paid."

"I didn't want to shoot the cab driver because he was cooler than a --- ---. I put the gun to his neck and just shot him. ... I should have shook his hand, because he didn't fall," the court records quote the suspect as saying.

Witnesses are quoted in the court records as saying the suspect posed for photos with his acquaintances at the hotel with a .45-caliber pistol and about \$130 soon after Bronson was slain.

The 16-year-old youth also has been charged in three Austin armed robberies, and police are arranging lineups with victims of five other recent robberies to see if he

DALLAS — The first probable case of St. Louis encephalitis in Dallas County in five years has been diagnosed, prompting officials to take steps to prevent an epidemic of the mosquito-borne disease.

Officials said Tuesday that a sixyear-old boy from suburban Lancaster, Texas, was treated at Children's Medical Center late last month. He has since gone home

McCown also refused Tuesday to appoint a court master, as requested by poor school districts, to draw up an alternative funding plan in case lawmakers fail to meet the deadline.

He cited one argument that the existence of a court plan might take pressure off some lawmakers to act. The poor school districts had said they wanted the master's plan as protection, in case the Legislature failed to come up with a constitutional plan.

"At this juncture, why not just shut the schools down? At this point, who cares any more?" asked the evidently frustrated judge.

"We've given people tremendous amount of notice. They know basically two years in advance,' McCown said. "My thought is, you get all those parents at home with their children full-time; and there'll be tremendous pressure on the Legislature to create a school plan.



SPACE CENTER, Houston Rain near the landing site delayed space shuttle Columbia's return by at least 11/2 hours today, postponing the crew's homecoming after 13 days in space - NASA's longest shuttle mission.

The shuttle had been scheduled to land at Edwards Air Force Base in California at 9:08 a.m. EDT. But after rain was spotted in the area, flight controllers decided to delay the landing by one orbit. The second landing attempt, the only other one possible today, was scheduled for 10:45 a.m. EDT

"Just sit back and watch the world go by now that you've done the hard work," Mission Control told the group.

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

Sporadic violence continues New York mayor calls for peace

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NEW YORK - Protests and sporadic violence - including the shooting of a police officer erupted overnight in part of northern Manhattan filled with unrest since the fatal shooting of a resident by police.

By late Tuesday, much of the heavily Dominican neighborhood of Washington Heights seemed to be heeding the mayor's call for peace. But early today, a police officer was shot in the leg outside a restaurant in the Inwood section just north of Washington Heights, said Sgt. Ed Burns, a police spokesman.

The wounded officer, William Feliciano, 31, was listed in stable condition at Columbia-Presbyterian Hospital.

Three men, including the restaurant owner, were arrested and charges were pending, Burns said.

Feliciano and other officers were driving by when they heard shots, Burns said. They stopped and went in to investigate. "It's not exactly clear what happened. A lot of shots were fired," Burns said.

The officer was among about 1,300 police sent to upper Manhattan to keep the peace Tuesday night as a wake was held for Jose Garcia, who was shot by police Friday night.

The second straight night of violence left streets littered with shattered glass, and the wail of sirens was constant. The stench of smoke hung in the air.

Young protesters, some disguised with bandanas over their faces, tossed bottles at the police. Officers often appeared restrained, at one point catching a youth with two bottles in his pockets only to let him go with a warning after a crowd of onlookers closed in.

Russian aid approved; stalemate on recession

MUNICH, Germany Western leaders today wrapped up a troubled summit, voicing support for a \$24 billion aid offering for Boris Yeltsin, but stalemated still on world trade problems that have stymied them for years.

In a communique marking the end of the 18th annual economic summit, President Bush and the leaders of six other industrialized countries said the transition to democracy in Russia and other former communist lands 'will involve painful adjustments. We offer the new states our help for their selfhelp.

Bush, asked at his summitclosing news conference to assess Yeltsin's prospects, said, "He's up against big odds. We all know that. I don't know that there's enough money in the world to instantly solve the problem of the recession economy.

Bush acknowledged, though, the economic problems of the United States and the other industrialized democracies. He said he commisserated with

The agenda for the summit's final day reflected nations dramatically realigning themselves in the wake of the collapse of communism.

No sooner had they formally concluded their summit in a former royal castle than the leaders were reconvening with Yeltsin in attendance. He was expected to appeal for a two-year moratorium on repayment of the former Soviet Union's roughly \$70 billion foreign debt.

Later in the day, most of the same group was traveling to Helsinki for a European security conference, a group that today suspended Yugoslavia from its meetings in retaliation for Serbian attacks on Croatia.

Yeltsin, who arrived in the

summit city on Tuesday in time for dinner with the other leaders, pronounced himself "very satisfied" with his trip.

He had breakfast with German Chancellor Helmut Kohl, and German finance minister Theo Waigel said afterwards that the Russian leader told them that "Russia would meet all its obligations, but it needed a breathing space.

That was presumably a reference to Russian calls for a debt moratorium, a subject omitted from the summit communique.

Instead, the summit leaders said they were prepared to offer the former communist countries "help for their self-help."

That specifically meant approval for a three-part program worked out by Russian leaders and the International Monetary Fund.

Former ambassador charged with illegally soliciting aid for Kuwait

DENVER - Former U.S. Ambassador Sam Zakhem campaigned for the U.S. Senate as a patriot who rallied support for the war to oust Saddam Hussein from Kuwait. But what Zakhem failed to reveal

in his losing primary campaign was alleged Tuesday in a federal indictment: that he and two others secretly took \$7.7 million from Kuwait to prod the United States into the Persian Gulf War.

Zakhem, William R. Kennedy Jr. and Scott Stanley Jr. also were charged with evading income taxes on the \$5.7 million of the Kuwaiti money they kept for the themselves.

About \$2 million of the total allegedly was used for public rela-, tions and advertising to boost support for military action against Iraq

The three men were charged with failing to identify themselves as lobbyists for Kuwait under the Foreign Agents Registration Act.

Kennedy is a former owner of the now-defunct Conservative Digest, and Stanley is a former editor of the magazine. They were charged with two counts each.

Zakhem, a native of Lebanon who was U.S. ambassador to Bahrain from 1986 to 1989, was charged with 12 counts and faces up to 40 years in prison if convicted.

An acquaintance of the youth said he was in the cab when Alvin Bronson III, 25, was shot to death at Pflugerville early Saturday, according to Pfulgerville municipal court records.

Bronson, a University of Texas student, had been driving the cab for about three weeks. He was found dead behind Pflugerville High School in his cab about 7 a.m. Saturday.

Court records say that when the acquaintance asked the youth why he had shot the cab driver, the suspect replied, "Things happen."

AUSTIN - A state judge is warning that Texans might face a public school shutdown next year if lawmakers don't meet the state Supreme Court's deadline for fixing the school funding system. A decision on closing schools

ultimately would go to the Supreme Court, State District Judge F. Scott McCown suggested at a Tuesday hearing.

But he asked, "How can the Supreme Court say it's not going to shut the schools down? How can the Supreme Court give any more

time For his part, McCown said, "I'm serving notice today to every concerned party ... that I'm not going to move the (June 1, 1993) deadline.

"I'm simply going to let the time run out, and if we don't have a plan, I'm going to enjoin any state money going out, and I'm tentatively taking a position that there's no local tax authority, and there won't be any local money," he said.

McCown asked lawyers to submit arguments on whether school districts' authority to levy local property taxes survives after the court deadline. He indicated that schools still could impose taxes to

pay bonds and interest.

The judge said that if only state aid is cut off, property-poor school districts would be "wiped out" while wealthier districts could operate on local money. The school finance case was started by poor school districts seeking to equalize funding.

If the weather does not improve, Columbia will be forced to spend an extra day in orbit. NASA prefers the big desert lakebed at Edwards to the single runway at Florida's Kennedy Space Center when the shuttle is loaded with extra weight, in this case Spacelab, and when astronauts have been away this long

Sporadic violence continues New York mayor calls for peace

NEW YORK - Protests and sporadic violence - including the shooting of a police officer erupted overnight in part of northern Manhattan filled with unrest since the fatal shooting of a resident by police.

By late Tuesday, much of the heavily Dominican neighborhood of Washington Heights seemed to be heeding the mayor's call for peace. But early today, a police officer was shot in the leg outside a restaurant in the Inwood section just north of Washington Heights, said Sgt. Ed Burns, a police spokesman.

The wounded officer, William Feliciano, 31, was listed in stable condition at Columbia-Presbyterian Hospital.

Three men, including the restaurant owner, were arrested and charges were pending, Burns said.

Feliciano and other officers were driving by when they heard shots, Burns said. They stopped and went in to investigate. "It's not exactly clear what happened. A lot of shots were fired," Burns said.

The officer was among about 1,300 police sent to upper Manhattan to keep the peace Tuesday night as a wake was held for Jose Garcia, who was shot by police Friday night.

The second straight night of violence left streets littered with shattered glass, and the wail of sirens was constant. The stench of smoke hung in the air:

Young protesters, some disguised with bandanas over their faces, tossed bottles at the police. Officers often appeared restrained, at one point catching a youth with two bottles in his pockets only to let him go with a warning after a crowd of onlookers closed in.

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Supreme Court unremarkable in '91

WASHINGTON - The Supreme Court folded up shop on June 29, leaving behind a remarkably unremarkable record for the 1991 term. Of the 108 opinions handed down, only one could be scored as much of a surprise. Otherwise it was mostly the same old fives and fours.

The surprise, at least to some observers, came on June 24 in a case involving prayers at public school commencements. It was a close call. In times past the court has found nothing unconstitutional in prayers by legislative chaplains. The court's own sessions are opened with a ritual invocation by the marshal. There was some speculation that Justices Souter and Kennedy, and perhaps Justice O'Connor as well, would find nothing unconstitutional in the brief and nonsectarian prayers at the Providence, R.I., middle school.

As it turned out, Kennedy wrote a firm opinion finding that school officials were "pervasively" involved in a religious activity. Souter startled everyone with his crisp assertion that the prayers were "flatly unconstitutional." O'Connor not only joined the court's opinion but also signed on to a concurring opinion by Justice Blackmun





and intellectual energy in writing dissenting and concurring opinions. Often their judgments are so splintered that lower court judges shake their heads in disbelief.

In one entirely typical case (it happened to involve the sentencing of juveniles), Justice Souter announced the judgment of the court. Six members agreed in part. Scalia filed an opinion concurring in part and concurring in the judgment. Thomas filed his own separate concurrence. O'Connor wrote a dissent in which Blackmun joined.

The court regularly serves up such scrambled eggs. The term saw 87 dissenting opinions and 70 concurring opinions. Justices Stevens and Blackmun felt such an irresistible urge to write that they churned out 91 opinions between them, but only 22 of these were opinions for the court.

All in all, a good term but not a great term. The court erected no landmarks, but it toppled none either. The country should contentedly settle for that.



Webworms eat way through area

By MARTHA E. FLORES Staff Writer

The innocent-looking speckledwinged white moths that flittered around the yards of Big Spring residents last spring have matured into a problem of epidemic proportions.

Within the several months, the white moths, also known as webworms and falling under the Malacosoma Americana species, have attacked a variety of trees throughout the city said local insect exterminators and Howard County Extension Agent-Agriculture Don Richardson.

Their weblike coating protects them in their worm stage as they feed on foliage. Eggs are deposited in trees during the moth stage.

The worms are partial to mulberry trees, but have also attacked a variety of other trees, including oak, redberry, honeysuckle, geraniums, periwinkles, Arizona ash and pecan, said Terri Johansen, coowner of Johansen's Landscape and Nursery, 700 Johansen Rd.

Johansen's professional spraying division, as well as other exterminator services, have experienced an increased work load because of the webworms.

'We have been entirely bom-The memo contends POWs may - barded with spraying and selling chemicals to destroy the webworms," Johansen said. "We have never seen it this bad. It is the worst in Texas.

Max Moore, owner of Southwestern A-1 Pest Control, 2008 Birdwell Lane, said two-thirds of their workload is involved in exterminating webworms.

Moore says the problem began last year with the first hatching of the worm in the spring in the east side of the city. Since the first hatching, the webworms have penetrated all areas of the city and outlying communities.

The last wave of webworms was the second generation for this year. Moore said he anticipates another generation before cold weather arrives

"I would imagine with all the moisture, we will see another generation in the next few monhs.'' Moore said. ''High temperatures will increase their metabolism and cool weather does not bother them either. A freeze will close them down completely until next year.

Joan Woodward, who witnessed the accident, said both planes appeared to be traveling on a collision course toward the airport.





Staff Writer Transcending the art and culture of the Mayan and Aztec people into

a 20th century art form is the focus of local artist Ron Martinez, whose work is displayed at the Heritage Museum throughout July. The images used in Martinez's

work are of Mayan gods, rulers, warriors and the Aztec calendar. The original Mayan artwork dates back to the Preclassic period beginning at 1500 B.C. through the final phase of Pre-Columbian history ending 900 A.D.

Martinez's interpretation of Pre-Columbian art is done by enlarging an image and then adding color to the stone carved work found in Mexico. The detail of the original work is accented by the enlarged size and with the different colors balancing the piece.

His early paintings were done with markers and poster board. Today, he works with acrylics and has begun to manipulate the shape of the original work as seen in a circular painting of a Mayan religious figure. The painting is fit into a circular shape with the figure's feather head piece wrapped around the perimeter.

"He has taken the work one step beyond by changing it to fit a shape," said Angela Way, Heritage Museum curator. "It is a moremature picture because of the change, but all the work is vivid and alive. It jumps out at you with splashes of color.

The work is unique, Way added, saying she was not aware of another artist working with such a motif. "I have never seen anything father's books and being fascinated like it before," she said. "We are with Pre-Columbian history and



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



Devotees of the genre can get their kicks from not one but two stars, Jean-Claude Van Damme and Dolph Lundgren. Crossover moviegoers may be attracted as well.

The TriStar Pictures release comes from Carolco, the fiscally ailing purveyor of mindless violence (the "Rambos," `'Terminators," "Total Recall"). The action is almost continuous and frequently brutal. Yet there is a certain fascination in how far filmmakers can stretch a whopper of a premise.

A before-the-titles sequence is a puzzler. During a raid on a Vietnam village, a U.S. sergeant (Lundgren) orders a soldier (Van Damme) to execute a young native couple. When the soldier refuses, the sergeant does the deed himself. Then the two Army men kill each other in a gun duel.

Where could the movie go from there? Twenty-five years later, Van Damme and Lundgren are members of an Army SWAT team adds a welcome note of sanity. aimed at combatting terrorists. They have been repaired, frozen and programmed as killing Joel B. Michaels. Rated R for machines

are met. Enter the Universal Soldiers. The siege is quickly ended.

A nosy television reporter, Ally Walker, invades the Army's hightech camp and learns enough to threaten an expose. Meanwhile Van Damme begins to retrieve his lost memory, and his conscience. Lundgren also recalls his Vietnam past, and he vows to kill his fellow soldier.

Van Damme rescues the reporter from an Army hit squad, and they escape. The deadly pursuit begins.

"Universal Soldier" follows the Carolco formula of spectacular stunts, grisly killings, massive explosions and grim wisecracks, yet it has a certain vitality of its own. This is largely due to the inspired pairing of a two beefy actors who have starred in their own action films (how about adding Chuck Norris, Steven Seagal and Arnold Schwarzenegger for a sequel?).

Despite his killer status, Van Damme is personable and engaging, and Lundgren is terrifying as his crazed pursuer. Ally Walker



The term "human organ'' includes any human kidney, liver, heart, lung, pancreas, bone marrow, cornea, eye and skin. Violations are punishable by a \$50,000 fine or five years in prison. Virtually all 50 states have similar laws on the books in one form or another.

Seafood: Get The Good Without The Problems

An increasing number of health conscious Americans are consuming low fat seafood. However, as with other foods, seafood can cause' foodborne illness due to microbial contamination. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration inspects and analyzes seafood to help assure its safety. It also recommends these steps to take when handling and preparing seafood-especially shellfish—to further reduce your risk:


Storage

Seafood should always be refrigerated at 35 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit until preparation time. For added freshness and safety, put wrapped fish on ice when storing in the refrigerator: Because many refrigerator freezer compartments don't reach zero, they should be used only for temporary storage. Use separate freezers for long-term storage

Cooking

Almost any fish can be baked, broiled, poached, steamed or fried. Some people prefer to bake fatty fish and poach or steam lean fish. Fish fillets and steaks are excellent charcoal broiled or barbecued.

Allow 6 to 12 minutes cooking time for each inch of thickness. Turn it halfway through the cooking time. Fish is cooked properly



when the thickest part becomes opaque and the fish flakes easily when poked with a fork.

Bake at 450 degrees F. Broil about 5 inches from the heat source.

Shrimp can be simmered 3 to 5 minutes depending on the size and quantity or until the shells turn red.

Clams and mussels may be steamed over boiling water until the shells open (5 to 10 minutes). Oysters should be sauteed, baked or broiled until plump and opaque and the edges curl, about 2 to 3 minutes.

Follow these simple rules to help assure that the fish and seafood you eat is as healthful as it is delicious.





A third type of treatment is allergy shots; injections of a diluted extract of the allergen help the body build resistance to airborne exposure.

Even so, the National Association of Independent Insurers, a non-profit trade organization of property and casualty insurance companies, suggests you do a little research before selecting an insurance company:

•Talk to your agent. Question whether he or she is aware of any problems with your insurance company

•Check the company's "rating" Most insurers are rated by at least one of four independent rating services: A.M. Best, Standard and Poor's, Moody's Investors Service and Duff and Phelps. Your local library should have one of these guides, or ask your agent for a rating.

·Contact your state insurance department. Insurance is regulated through state departments of insurance. The department, will tell you if a company has been declared financially unsafe to do business and it records the number of complaints lodged against each company. Poor service is sometimes an indicator of financial difficulties.

In the unlikely event that a company does fail, your state's property and casualty insurance guaranty fund will pay your claim. The guaranty funds are financed by assessing other insurers in your state, and usually pay claims up to \$300,000.






A fabulous fig snack was first invented a century ago.

Celebrating its 100th anniversary as one of America's favorite snack foods, the fabulous fig actually has a far longer history that some say dates back to the Garden of Eden

Then: The foliage of the fig, it's said, provided the travel wardrobe for that Biblical first couple, Adam and Eve, as they fled Paradise. Testimonies to the sweet succulence of the fig are sprinkled throughout ancient Greek and Roman literature and songs. However, it wasn't until the middle of the 18th century, when Spanish missionaries first brought fig cuttings to California, that the New World finally got figs.

Drugs

Any sport that needs drugs to facilitate competition is seriously suspect. Horse racing relies on a number of drugs to keep ill and injured animals competing.

Phenylbutazone, nicknamed "bute," is prescribed for injured animals as an anti-inflammatory and a painkiller. Bute does not heal the original injury, and is too often used to keep lame horses running.

Corticosteroids are used to generate a variety of effects in racehorses, but a common treatment is injecting corticosteroids into damaged joints to reduce swelling and relieve pain. Corticosteroids mask injuries and keep horses on the track when the only real cure is time and rest.







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Solution Postal Pointers Facts From The U.S. Postal Service

Experts at the post office deliver this advice: look out for your letters

While incidents of mail theft are rare, thieves know that items of value travel through the mails and they are ready and waiting to steal mail when the time is right. Occasionally, they break into residential and apartment mailboxes, collection boxes and postal vehicles.

The Postal Service works hard to make sure your daily mail gets to you, but needs your help to keep it safe. By following the few tips listed below, you can make life more difficult for mail thieves:

 Never send cash or coins through the mail. Always send checks or money orders.

• Make sure your mailbox is in good condition. Mailboxes in poor condition often expose mail to theft and bad weather.

· Collect mail from your mailbox promptly, especially checks and food coupons. If you cannot be home when checks or food coupons are expected, ask a trusted friend or neighbor to pick up your mail.

·Always contact the local post office to have your mail held for you during vacations or other long absences from home.

 Contact the issuing agency right away if you do not receive an expected check, food coupons, or other valuable mail.



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
