the new brick building being erected by H.G. (Henry) Jones. The side addition of Friona was in town Wednesday and Thursday.



The Parmer County Cotton Variety/Economics workshop conducted by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service is slated for 10 a.m. February 7 in the Farwell Community Center. Benji Henderson, AgriLife Extension Agent in Parmer County, said the workshop is designed as a pre-season update for area farmers. "Its still a ways off from spring planting but now is a good time to study the many varieties of cotton now available and the economics associated with them," Henderson said. 

Rabies case in Bovina


According to the Texas Department of State Health Services, a positive rabies report was issued January 23, 2012 on a skunk killed in Bovina.

Chiefs in playoff hunt










