rests of 14 people Saturday night February 25 for cockfighting. Someone notified the Sheriff's department that there were several suspicious vehicles parked near Highway 214 and County Road 15 northwest of Friona.

A deputy investigating the complaint found a group of men and a makeshift ring for cockfighting. Sheriff Randy Geries said they found five live roosters and four dead. With help from other deputies, Friona police,

people and transported them to the jail in Farwell.

Vehicles at the scene were confiscated. The live roosters were being held by the Farwell police department for pick-up by the Amarillo Animal Rescue. Geries said of the 14 men arrested, six were illegal immigrants. The legal residents were processed and released on \$6,000 bonds. The six illegals were being held on \$100,000 bonds. Geries said after their charges have been satisfied, the six men

in Lubbock for deportation.

Charges filed against the group participants are Class A misdemeanors, the highest misdemeanor charge available. Sheriff Geries said the investigation is continuing and the organizers and promoters of the event could be charged with a felony.

The Sheriff expressed thanks to the citizen who reported the suspicious activity and urged county residents to be vigilant and report any suspicious vehicles or activity to the Sheriff's office.

Burn ban in effect to April 30

In their regular meeting Monday February 27, Parmer County Commissioners reinstated the county burn ban immediately to be in effect until April 30. In the event of adequate rain or snow amounts the County Judge can lift the burn ban for a designated period of time.

Until such notification

is received, the burn ban is in effect through April 30. Any questions about the burn ban should be directed to the Sheriff's office, 806-481-3303, or the County Judge's office, 806-481-3383.

In other action the commissioners have retained the Austin law firm of Bickerstaff Heath Delgado Acosta LLP to represent Parmer County's interests, operations, and business affairs. Judge Ellis said the Austin firm would be available to represent Parmer County in Austin if needed and the county would pay only for any time required.

The commissioners are proposing to charge an

archive fee of \$5 for recordings and filings in the official county public records. A public hearing will be held Monday, March 12, at 9:30 a.m. in the county courtroom for comments on the proposed fee. A Public Hearing notice is included elsewhere in this issue of the Friona Star.

Water board delays meter requirements

Following a February 21 public hearing, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) Board of Directors voted to adopt an enforcement policy and civil penalty schedule as part of the water district's rules.

The approved policy included a two-year moratorium on the enforcement policy and civil penalty for exceeding the district's allowable groundwater production rate (APR) during 2012 and 2013.

In addition, the directors also approved a two-year moratorium on the enforcement policy and civil penalties for (1) failure to install meters on new wells and/or well systems by the January 1, 2012 deadline and (2) reporting requirements for groundwater production.

"The amendments to the High Plains Water District rules that were adopted July 19, 2011 are still in effect. They have not been changed or rescinded. The February 21 board action establishes a two-year moratorium (2012 and 2013) on enforcement and penalties in these specific areas only. This will allow groundwater users additional time to familiarize themselves with the new rule requirements," said District Manager Jim Conkwright.

In other business, the HPWD Board of Directors approved an 18-month study to determine a methodology to (1) delineate areas within the district where the Ogallala Aquifer is incapable of producing 1.25 acre-feet per acre per year and (2) evaluate effectiveness and reliability of using alternative methods (other than water meters) to measure groundwater production. *

An agricultural stakeholder advisory group will assist dis-

trict staff with the study.

Created in 1951 by local residents and the State Legislature, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 is charged with the responsibility of conserving, preserving, protecting, and preventing waste of groundwater within its 16-county service area.



cogitations & aphorisms of jodok

By Uncle John White • 1868 - 1965

Previously we have printed news and columns from the 1925, 1935, and 1936 Friona Stars. By 1938 the Friona Star was publishing more news and had begun to include a few photographs such as the one here. The January 7, 1938 Friona Star had grown to eight pages and included more advertising from local businesses. Uncle John White was still writing his Cogitations & Aphorisms of Jodok column and most of the news items. We thought this story of a silver wedding anniversary was worth repeating. It was on the front page. Imagine Friona in 1938.

On Sunday, December 26th (1937) about twenty-two relatives of Mr. and Mrs. F.T. Schlenker gathered unannounced at the Schlenker home for an old fashioned visit. The party was staged in honor of the Schlenker wedding twenty-five years ago.

Their's has the distinction of being one of the very earliest of Parmer County weddings. Mr. Schlenker, with his parents, had moved to the Panhandle about five years previous (1907), and Mrs. Schlenker, formerly Miss Malinda Reeve, had moved to this county from Indiana about two years before(1910), as teacher of the Rhea School. The romance and wedding was thoroughly of Parmer County origin.

At the gathering Sunday, the reminiscence of the courtship and wedding brought out some interesting experiences. It seemed that the romance was principally developed either astride a pair of mustang cow ponies, or an old gray headed burro, that did not object to carrying double. The wedding day was one of the old fashioned Christmases. All day long it became whiter and colder.

Although travel was very difficult and somewhat hazardous, it did not prevent the groom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Schlenker and family from making the tenmile drive across the prairie to the home of the bride's brother, F.W. Reeve, where the wedding was staged. The vehicle for that occasion was a farm wagon pulled by old Beck and Jack. Several hours after the appointed time, Rev. Hurlburt, from Friona, ten miles away, arrived through the storm to perform the ceremony.

The picture above shows the bride and groom at the front of their small but happy "home on the range" at the left, and the home itself on the right.

During the quarter of a century that has flown since that cold but happy wedding day, Mr. Schlenker, with the aid of his worthy helpmate, has proven himself to be one of the county's most successful and prosperous grain and stock farmers, and in spite of their many financial difficulties, due to illness, they now have their comfortable home and a goodly acreage in their well tilled farm and well stocked pastures. Mr. Schlenker is now serving his second term as a member of the Commissioners Court of Parmer County.

A couple of weddings were noted, also on the front page of Janaury 7, 1938. Here is the wedding news, as written"

Private pesticide applicator training and testing Mar 9

A Texas private pesticide applicator training and testing program will be conducted March 9 at the Texas AgriLife Extension Service office for Bailey County in Muleshoe.


The office is located at 118 West Ave. C. The training will begin at 8:30 a.m. and testing should conclude by 2:00 p.m. An abbreviated lunch break (on your own) will be taken between the training and testing sessions, according to Monti Vandiver, AgriLife Extension Integrated Pest Management Agent for Bailey and Parmer counties.

AgriLife Extension will provide the training and Texas Department of Agriculture will administer the test. Registration is \$50 at the door and includes a Private Applicator Manual and a current TDA Laws & Regulations Manual. Attendees are encouraged to bring a calculator for use during testing.

A private pesticide applicator license is required if someone uses or supervises the use of restricted-use or statelimited-use pesticides or regulated herbicides to produce an agricultural crop on personally owned property, rented property, property owned by his or her employer, property under his or her general control, or the property of another person if applied without compensation, other than the trading of personal services between producers of agricultural commodities.

Individuals who want a Texas private applicator license must attend a private applicator training program offered by AgriLife Extension, pass the Texas Department of Agriculture private applicator exam, and purchase a license.

Forage silage alternatives sought

Silage worries have producers asking a lot of questions as spring planting nears, according to a Texas AgriLife Extension Service specialist.

Dr. Brent Bean, AgriLife Extension agronomist, said he's been getting a lot of calls from producers, dairymen and others who found themselves lacking good roughage sources last year for their cattle.

"Most of the industry relies on corn silage, which did not do well last year during our extreme drought and high temperatures," Bean said. "The industry is now looking for an alternative crop that uses less water and can tolerate high temperatures."

As a result, he said, many are looking at forage sorghum. Although forage sorghum may not yield as much as corn under full irrigation, it requires about 30 percent less water than corn and is more heat tolerant.

Bean said he has conducted forage sorghum silage trials in the Panhandle for many years and has recently summarized results from the last four years. The results of those trials can be found at http://amarillo.tamu.edu under the agronomy program tab.

While the primary interest this year appears to be quantity, he said producers should not ignore quality, especially on silage for dairy operations. Bean said he has included in his summary of varieties some indicators of quality, such as digestibility and estimated pounds of milk produced per ton of forage.

The varieties in Bean's trials were planted in late May on 30-inch rows at a seeding rate of 100,000 seeds per acre. Harvest started on early maturing varieties in late August and continued through mid-October on late-maturing varieties.

All the forage silage yields are reported at 65 percent moisture, he said. The varieties that consistently yielded above the test mean, had low lodging scores and were not photoperiod sensitive were: AS781, SS405, 849 F, 9500, FS-5, Millennium BMR, BMR Gold X and HiKane II. Two other varieties, Silo 700D and HP 95 BMR, finished above the test mean in two of the four years tested.

The average yield over a four-year period was 20.5 tons per acre, with a range from 18.4 tons to 26.8 tons per acre, Bean said. Eighteen varieties consistently yielded above the annual test average at least two-thirds of the time.

Lodging is an important issue in sorghum silage production and can vary greatly from year to year depending on the conditions, he said. Of the 18 best-yielding varieties tested, six had lodging scores of greater than 15 percent. If these varieties are planted, producers should plant a lower seeding rate and make sure the field is not over-fertilized with nitrogen to help prevent lodging.

"In addition, it is important that these varieties are harvested as soon as they reach the proper moisture, which is usually at soft dough stage," Bean said. "Delaying harvest past the optimum time can lead to increased lodging."

The response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or is on a mailing list for this application, and will be posted electronically to the Commissioners' Integrated Database (CID).


