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






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The Friona volunteer fire department recently tested two different versions of new jaws-of-life equipment. Firefighters tested the equipment on some old wrecked vehicles south of town.

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The undeniable damage of President Obama's Health Care Law

BY SENTOR KAY BAILEY HUTCHISON

Two years ago, against the tide of public opinion, Democrat-controlled Congress passed President Obama's health care legislation - the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA). Since then, Americans' doubts have been confirmed. In fact, opposition to the new law has grown. A recent Gallup poll reveals that two-thirds of Americans either support getting rid of the controversial individual insurance

mandate that is the core of the PPACA, or favor repeal-

ing the entire law. Growing misgivings about the President's health care law are easy to understand. Even with nearly two more years before the health care law is fully implemented, the significant damage it has already done to Americans' health care and economic security is undeniable:

(1) Americans are in danger of losing their current health care cov-

erage. In just two short years the president's assurance that "if you like your health care plan, you will be able to keep your health care plan" is one of many broken promises. A McKinsey & Co. study from June of last year found that between 30 to 50 percent of employers will stop offering health insurance to their employees once the health law is fully implemented in 2014. The former Congressional Budget Office

(CBO) Director Douglas Holtz Eakin warns that the law "provides strong incentives for employers to drop employer sponsored health insurance for as many as 35 million Americans." So where will those millions of people then get insurance: from government-run plans, subsidized by the American taxpayer - resulting in lower quality care and more deficit spending.

Economic recovery and job creation are suffering. According to a recent Gallup poll, fortyeight percent of small businesses say they aren't hiring because of the current and anticipated costs of the health care law. Small businesses create the majority of all new jobs in this coun- lion." try, so this is bleak news for small companies and for the nearly 13 million unemployed Americans. The

CBO reports that 800,000 jobs will be lost after the law kicks in fully in 2014.

Taxpayers' costs

are skyrocketing. In September of 2009, President Obama told Congress that his health care law would cost "about \$940 billion" over the next ten years - on top of our already enormous national debt. CBO's latest cost projection, however, estimates costs at \$1.76 trillion over the next decade - double the President's prediction. And Senator Jeff Sessions, ranking Republican on the Senate Budget Committee, predicts that in 2014, when the law is fully implemented, "The first 10 years, it will cost three

(4) Health care costs are rising even faster. For American families already struggling with stagnant

wages and higher costs for gasoline and other necessities, higher health insurance costs threaten to make adequate coverage unaffordable. President Obama promised his health care plan would reduce family health-insurance premiums by \$2,500 annually by 2012. But CBO calculates that the health care law is already increasing average family health insurance premiums by \$2,100 per year.

The U.S. Supreme Court will soon hear oral arguments in a lawsuit brought by a number of states to overturn the health care law on constitutional grounds (for which I and 42 other Senators have filed a legal brief in times that much—\$2.6 tril- support). The Supreme Court is expected to hand down its decision later this year. This decision will have a major impact on our economy and our health care.

Combs warns of cost of federal health care

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs urged the U.A. Supreme Court to consider the enormous cost federal health care legislation will have on individual states. This week the U.S. Supreme Court is hearing challenges to different aspects of federal health care reform, including mandated health insurance and expanded Medicaid eligibility.

Combs warned state lawmakers will have a hard time funding future state budgets if the Obama administration's federal health care rules are implemented. Medicaid spending is currently about 20 percent of the state's general revenue, and the federal health care mandates will accelerate the growth of Medicaid costs to about 37 percent of general revenue spending by 2023.

"As the state's chief financial officer, I am very concerned about the negative impact this burdensome federal regulation will place on Texas," Combs said. "It will cost our state at least \$18 billion dollars to cover increased

Medicaid costs in the first 10 years after the law is implemented. Other priorities such as public education and infrastructure programs in Texas will surely suffer."

State estimates project new federal health care requirements would contribute to a large jump in the number of people Texas would have to cover under the state's Medicaid program. Texas Medicaid enrollment is projected to grow from 3.5 million people in 2011 to an estimated 6.2 million people by 2020.

"It is my job as Comptroller to analyze federal regulations that can carry enormous costs to the state and affect our future. I will continue to monitor critical issues such as health care overhaul, and update Texas lawmakers and citizens on their impact."
