## City council agenda for Monday

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Monday June 11 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers, 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

New councilman Greg Lewellen will be joining the council for his first regular meeting. The council will elect a mayor pro-tem for 2012-2013.

Minutes of the May 14 regular meeting and the May 29 special meeting will be considered. They will also consider moving the Monday July 9 regular meeting to July 10. In other business items the council will consider approval of the May accounts payable and May financial statement. Mayor Douglas will give notice of the appointment of Deborah Campbell as Municipal Court Judge for a two-year term, 2012-2014.

The council will consider and take action on approval of the 2012 debt structure schedule for the \$1 million certificate of obligation being issued for wastewater treatment improvements. And the 2011 Consumer Confidence annual report for the drinking water will be considered.

These agenda items are provided by the city and are subject to change. The official and final meeting agenda is posted on the city hall front door 72 hours prior to the meeting.

## Wounded soldier receives medals on Memorial Day

SFC Dale Smith, Jr. was awarded the Purple Heart and Bronze Star with Valor at a homecoming ceremony in Colorado Springs, Colorado over the Memorial Day weekend. He and his family traveled from Tampa, Florida to welcome the troops he served with in Afghanistan.

Sgt. Smith was wounded in Afghanistan on July 15, 2011, and was in a coma for several days. Another NCO was lost that day. When his daughter Cadence received the Purple Heart on his behalf last summer she prom-

ised him when he was able to stand tall and strong she would give it to him.

Words cannot describe the emotion that filled the building as Sgt. Smith stood tall, a fellow soldier bracing him up, as his daughter pinned his medal to his chest at the ceremony. Smith is the son of Dale and Cindy Smith, Sr. of

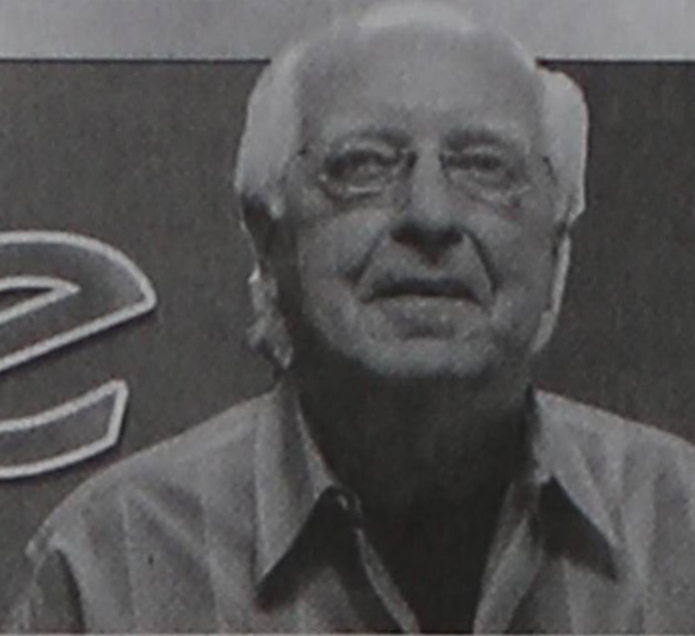

Some thoughts on voting.

*cogitations & aphorisms of jodok*

This article is shared by Calvary Baptist Church pastor Rick Burton. It is from a 1942 or 1943 edition of the Paducah Post of Paducah, Texas. Cletus Burton is Pastor Rick's father and Durwood Burton is his uncle. Both of these gentlemen, if they were still alive today, would be in their mid-90s.

## Burton Boys Guests of the Lions Club

Cletus and Durwood Burton were the most interesting honored guests at the Lions Club luncheon Thursday that the organization has had in a long time. The two brothers belong to the navy, Cletus with four years and Durwood with seven years service.

To say that these two brothers have seen service under the Stars and Stripes would be putting it very mildly. Cletus was in Pearl Harbor on a cruiser when it was bombed. His ship was shot from under him. He has been in every engagement of any importance between the U.S. and Japanese fleets, including the Solomon Islands and the Coral Sea.

Durwood was on a cruiser on the Coral Sea when the vessel was sunk by Japanese dive bombers. One of the planes dive-

bombed into the vessel. Cletus remarked that he "knew there was one dead Jap."

The crew from the sinking vessel took to life boats and were picked up five days later by a destroyer. In this engagement seven planes were shot down and as the remainder went out of sight some of them were in smoke. Twenty-one planes attacked the ship.

There were many questions asked the boys they would not answer, only saying the information would be given when "it is over." Durwood stated that it would take two years at least to end the war.

These two boys have a determined look in their eyes. They know there is a job out there that must be done and they are going to help do it. If people generally could look into their faces and hear them talk there would be very little shirking of duty by the people on the home front.

These boys were called home on account of the illness of their mother. Neither knew the other was coming until they ran into each other here at home. They left Thursday afternoon to take their places again in the navy.

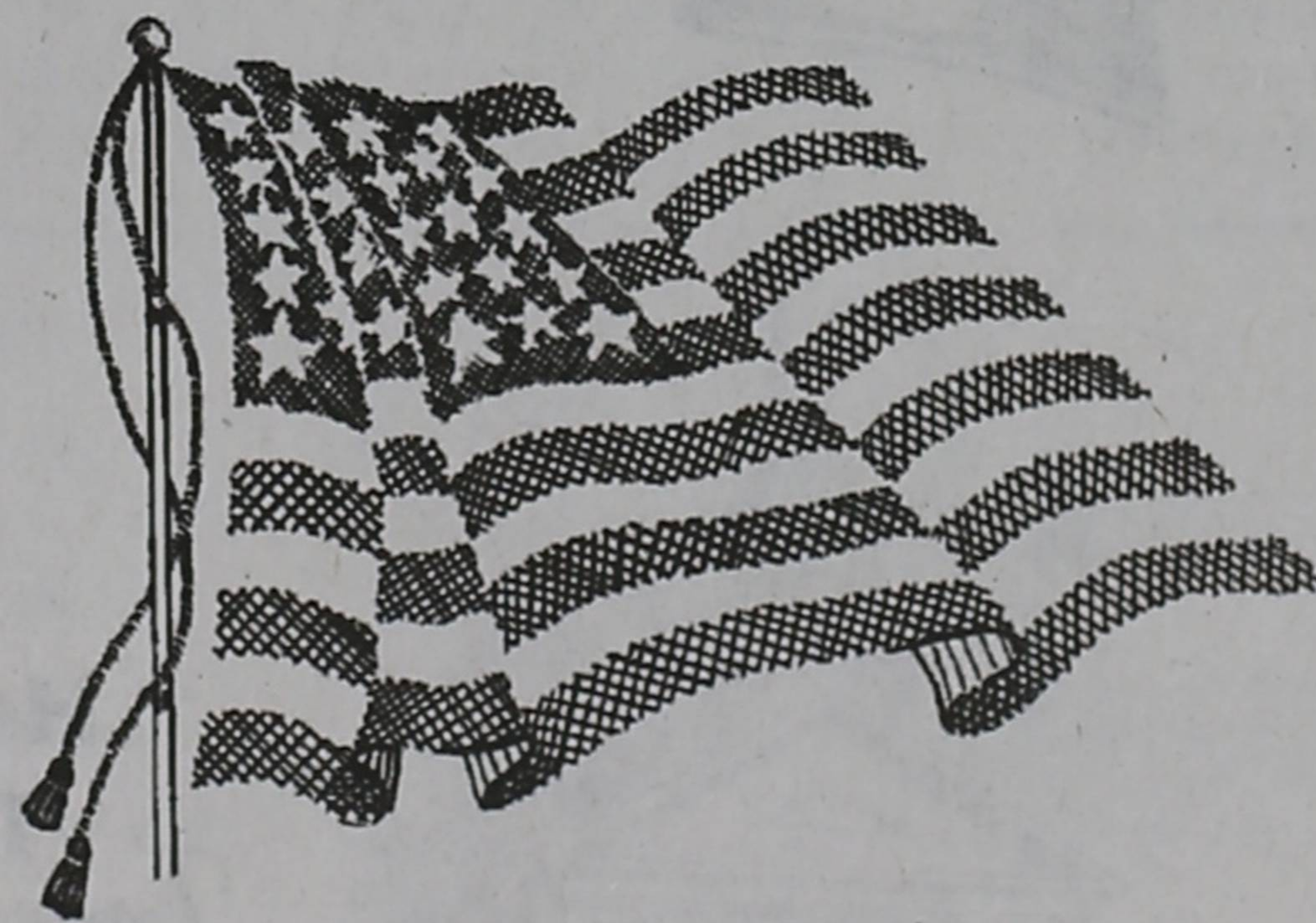

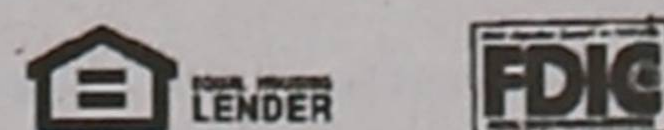

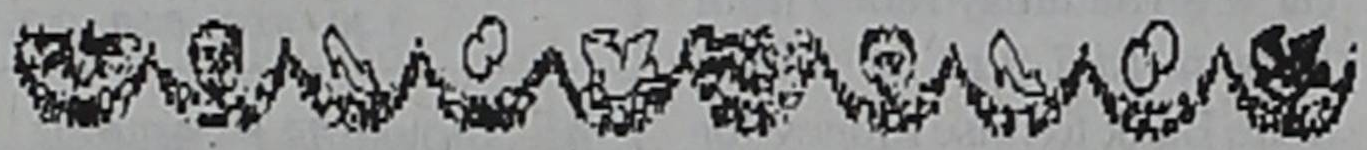

### Summer Time Means Gardening

Growing up we always had a garden. We had the "small" garden in our backyard. This garden was for our table vegetables. We always had tomatoes, peppers, onions and squash. Some of the time we would have a few other things such as green beans, black eyed peas and sweet corn, but usually those vegetables were reserved for the "farm" garden.

The farm garden was for the vegetables that would be canned or frozen. I hated the farm garden. It was always planted in the corner of Huck Nichols field and it was always big! I can remember standing at the end of those half mile rows of green beans or black eyed peas promising myself I would never plant a garden.

Having a garden does not mean you have to go to those extremes. Even if you live in town you can have an herb garden

or plant a few vegetables in containers to enjoy through the summer.

Last year I tried planting herbs in the flower pots in our front yard. (This was after I had killed all the flowers, twice!) I was truly surprised that not only did they live, they grew. I decided that I would continue to plant herbs in these pots.

This summer I bought several different varieties of herbs to try. I am not good about using fresh herbs when I cook but I hoped having them on hand would help me do better. I also planted a couple of pepper plants in one of the pots. In our backyard flower garden, I planted tomatoes.

Container gardening is becoming more and more popular because of the small amount of time and space that is needed to be successful. Clay pots, half barrels and window boxes are the most commonly used containers, but any

sturdy container that has ample space for root development and adequate drainage will do.

Sunlight is a very important factor to the success of your container garden. Make sure to check the amount of sunlight that is needed for each of your plants. Group plants with similar needs together.

With our West Texas winds and hot summers, it is very important that your containers are watered regularly. Make sure to keep the soil moist but you do not want your plants standing in water. Use a watering can or a spray attachment on a garden hose and use cool water to stimulate root growth. Also look for a water soluble fertilizer that you can apply weekly to provide your plants with the nutrients that they need.

With a little time and attention, you too can boast of being a gardener.

**We Have to Work Together to Fix Our Water Challenges**

In his 1852 expedition to explore the headwaters of the Canadian and Red Rivers, U.S. Army Brigadier General Randolph B. Marcy—a Captain at the time—described the Llano Estacado as “very smooth and level ... without a tree, shrub, or any other herbage to intercept the vision ... the almost total absence of water causes all animals to shun it: even the Indians do not venture to cross it except at two or three places.”

General Marcy's description of our region probably sounds unfamiliar to many who, like me, call the Texas High Plains home. Instead of being considered an ocean of short prairie grasses, the Llano Estacado today is known primarily as a sea of cotton, corn and cattle. So, what is the difference between General Marcy's view of the Llano Estacado then, and our experience today? Of course, the answer is water.

Irrigated agriculture has been the economic lifeblood for most of the High Plains region since our forefathers mastered the ability decades ago to tap the vast undergroundwater reservoir called the Ogallala aquifer using mechanical pumps. But unlike many groundwater aquifers found in other parts of Texas, the Ogallala doesn't fill back up—or recharge—as fast as it is pumped.

Think of it as a savings account that earns very little interest, but that is still relied upon often to make large withdrawals. Unless the pace of withdrawals is changed, it's likely that those finite resources are going to dwindle to unhelpful quantities before we are in a position to easily adjust.

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 (HPWD) has taken important steps to address these issues by recently developing new rules on groundwater pumping measurement, recording and limits. These rules were crafted and adopted after the HPWD held numerous meetings across the 16-county district to engage as many interested people as we could in the overall discussion. They also satisfy the requirements placed on the district by state law. Once the rules were finally adopted, however, my fellow HPWD board members and I all expected that we would continue to receive feedback on the district's path toward long-term water conservation for the High Plains.

We were right. After hearing from valued stakeholders across the district, my board members and I decided that a two-year moratorium on the enforcement of the new HPWD rules was needed to create a greater window of time for groundwater well owners and operators to better adjust to the new requirements.

In addition, the HPWD is using this window of opportunity as a chance to take an even closer look at available alternatives to water well meters, and to examine the reliability of those alternatives for groundwater management purposes. This technical study will also include an assessment of how to identify areas within the HPWD boundaries that, because of depletion, may not even be capable today of pumping as much as the groundwater production limits in the district's rules.

This work is being performed with the assistance and feedback of the district's recently created Agricultural Stakeholder Science Advisory Group. At the end of the study and the advisory group's work, which is expected to wrap up within the next 14 to 18 months, the District's board will consider the findings from the study, which will give the board an opportunity to re-evaluate the direction, scope and appropriateness of other aspects of policy in the rules.

As many of our valued stakeholders have said repeatedly, it is important that we all continue working together to tackle this issue that is so critical to the success of our farms, our families and our entire way of life on the High Plains. The HPWD is committed to doing just that—to keep our stakeholders engaged in the process while we all work toward addressing this important challenge.

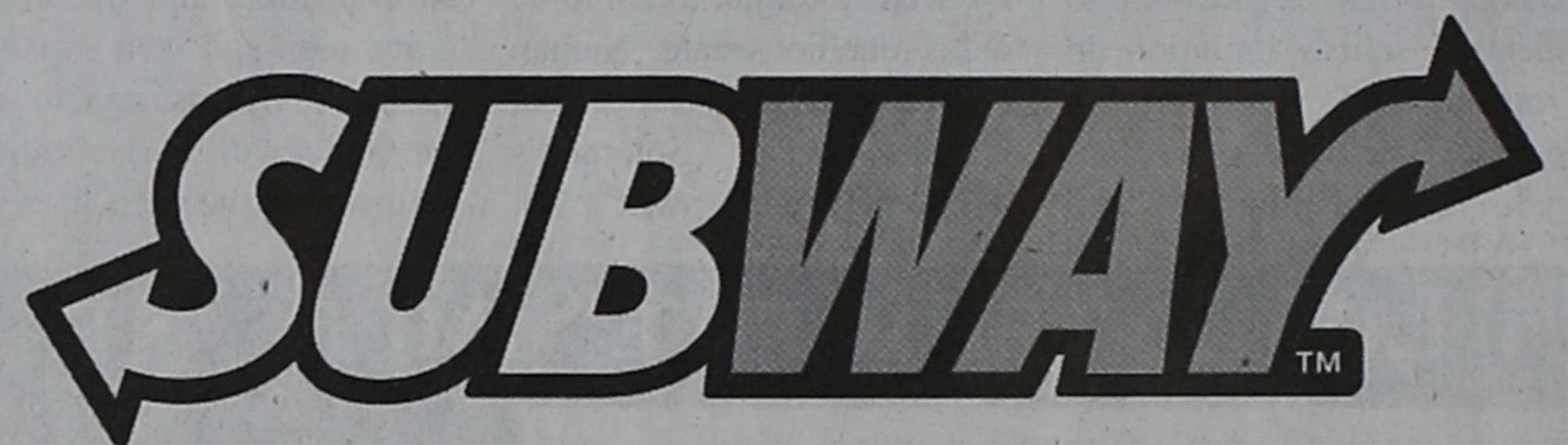
To those who live, worship, work and raise their families on the Texas High Plains like I do, we can't fathom a return of the Llano Estacado to the grassed, inhospitable mesa of General Marcy's days. In fact, we will work to do everything we can so that our future generations won't have to describe our region someday as having an “almost total absence of water.” This challenge is far too big to tackle alone, though. We will only get there by working together.

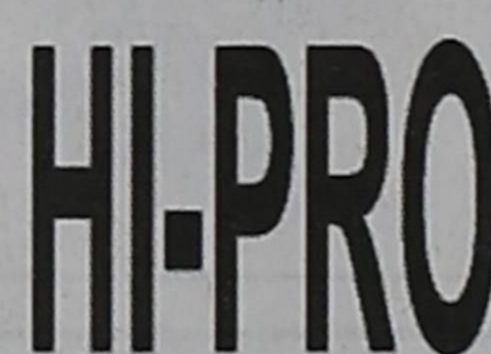

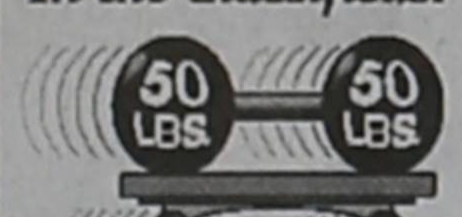

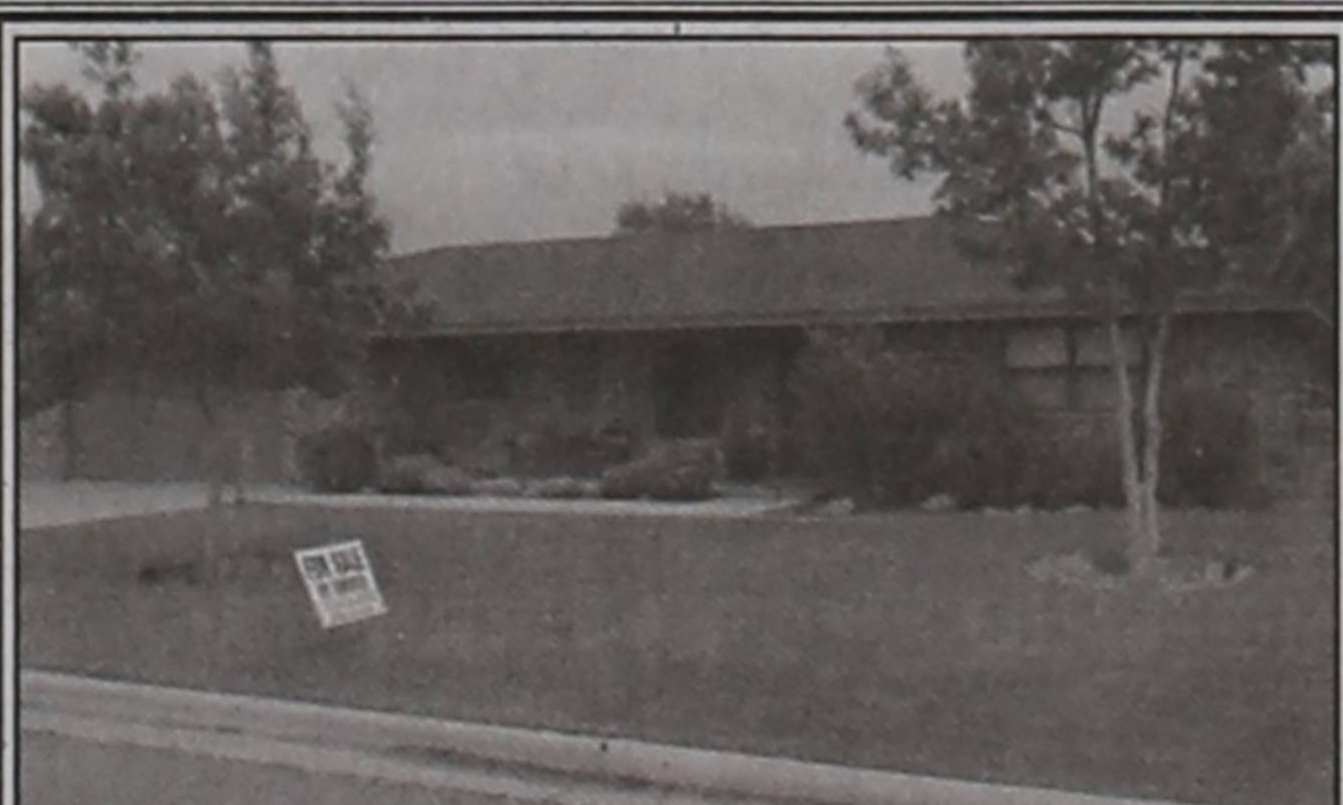
