Retired teachers meeting to discuss healthcare issue

Parmer County Retired Teachers and School Personnel will meet Tuesday September 4 at 2 p.m. at the Friona State Bank community room. Healthcare will be the focus of the meeting especially as it concerns the new Aetna Medicare Advantage Plan.

Retirees need to pay close attention to mail from Aetna/TRS-Care, especially page 2 of the "Get more, save more" booklet. Susie Spring, administrator of the Friona Rural Health Clinic and Gayla Quillin, administrator of Parmer Medical Center, plan to attend.

Legislative concerns will also be addressed. Among them is the push by some legislators to change the Texas Retirement System from a defined benefit plan to a defined contribution plan. "Retired educators should be concerned about each of these important issues," said Sharon White, president of the local organization.

The Parmer County group is affiliated with Texas Retired Teachers Association which is the only statewide group working to protect retired educators' annuity and health insurance. Credit Union robbed, suspect caught

The Friona Texas Federal Credit Union was robbed around noon Monday, August 27, by a bandit wearing a gas mask and black paint under his eyes and sporting a gun. The suspect, 22-year-old John Michael Garibay, approached a teller in his robber costume and de-

manded money. After he made off with a bag containing approximately \$8,000 and driving his silver Dodge Charger with black stripes, he apparently went home. Witnesses described the vehicle to police and said they saw him turn west on 5th Street. Local police, familiar with that particular vehicle, went to the trailer park in the 1500 block

Photos can be either 4 x 6 or 5 x 7 and should be mounted on foam core board. All entries will be on display at the Depot in Friona city park during Maize Days on Saturday, September 15.

"We are extremely disappointed in today's decision by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) forcing physicians to adopt ICD-10 — a 20-year-old boondoggle that only serves to help bureaucrats. It does nothing to improve patient care.

"Implementing the new coding system is a huge burden that deeply affects every practice. Instead of working with 13,500 diagnostic codes, we now will need to learn and use more than 70,000 different codes. For example, there are 480 codes for a fractured kneecap alone — up from a grand total of two in the current system.

"In addition, it is expensive. Switching to ICD-10 can cost solo physicians as much as \$83,000 each, and group practices of up to 10 doctors as much as \$250,000.

"The timing of the transition could not be worse, as many physicians already are spending significant time and resources implementing electronic health records in their practices, meeting meaningful use regulations, adapting to a host of new Medicare and Medicaid policies, and hurdling other administrative burdens created by the new health law." 
This course will provide an overview of the difficulties of growing vegetables in the Panhandle and how to overcome obstacles, Boughen said. The agenda will include soil preparation, 10 steps to successful gardening and a presentation called "90 percent organic and 10 percent common sense". Dr. Joe Masabni, AgriLife Extension state vegetable specialist in College Station, will be presenting the class.

Small grains silage workshop

The Texas AgriLife Extension Service office in Parmer County will conduct a small grain silage workshop beginning at 10 a.m. September 4 in the Bovina EMS building.

"This workshop is specifically aimed at dairymen planning to use triticale, wheat or other small grain cereal crops for silage," said Benji Henderson, AgriLife Extension agent in Parmer County. "With feed prices as high as they are, and with no real relief in sight, we hope to provide our producers with ways to better stretch their dollars when considering this feed source."



All of the Squaws played a consistent game against Plains with several great plays coming from everyone involved.


