Edwards removed from ballot following sexual assault arrest

STANTON — Would be Martin County constable candidate Jerry Edwards of Stanton has been dropped from the March 8 Democratic Party primary ballot following his arrest by Reagan County officials on kidnapping and sexual assault charges.

Edwards, 28, is being held in the Reagan County Jail charged with aggravated kidnapping and aggravated sexual assault of a Midland woman.

Justice of the Peace Cathy Sellman set total bonds at \$70,000 for Edwards.

Edwards allegedly ordered the woman, along with her 7-year-old son, to drive to a location where she was forced to have sex with him. The victim told police the assault lasted for two hours.

The victim told authorities her car stalled at the intersection of highways 137 and 1357 when they were approached by Edwards and forced at gunpoint to drive to the scene of the attack.

After the assault, the victim told police she was allowed to drive away but the car stalled twice. After the second time, Edwards drove the woman and her son to Midland and left them at a convenience store. From there, the woman notified the

police and was taken to Midland Memorial Hospital.

Midland County officials contacted officials in Reagan County who began a search for the vehicle and the site based on the woman's sketchy description.

Following a night search in which nothing was discovered, officials began looking from the ground and air.

The vehicle was located on a lease road and during the search of the grounds, officers found evidence which led to Edward's arrest.

Edwards is reportedly a former law enforcement officer who has worked as a police officer in Stanton and Junction.

Author, birder Kutac speaker for Cranefest

Edward A. Kutac of Austin, author of "Birder's Guide To Texas," will be the keynote speaker at a 7 p.m. Friday banquet opening Big Spring's second annual Cranefest.

The banquet will be held in Garret Hall at the First United Methodist Church.

Kutac, who describes himself as "a bird watcher who sometimes carries a camera," has also authored "Texas Birds: Where They Are and How to Find Them," and is co-author of "A Bird Finding and Naturalist's Guide for the Austin Area" and "Birds and Other Wildlife of South Central Texas."

A retired industrial accountant, Kutac has been birding in Texas for the past 30 years and teaching bird identification classes in Austin for the past 16 years.

He is past president of the Travis County Audubon Society, past president of the Texas Ornithological Society, past treasurer and board member of the Texas Nature Conservancy and a past member of the Texas Committee for Natural Resources.

Cranefest gets into full swing with a 7:30 a.m. Saturday breakfast at 7:30 a.m. in the Crestwood Hall party room at RV Park Of Texas, followed

by guided bus trip tours to view cranes in their feeding areas.

Scheduled into the morning tour is a stop at the Big Spring State Park/Scenic Mountain to view birds and to study historic rock carvings and then to Comanche Trail Park for hiking along the flora-and-fauna trails.

After returning to Crestwood Hall for a hot lunch, those attending will hear a keynote address from John Karges, the West Texas director for the Texas Nature Conservancy.

Following the lunch program, buses will take birders to nearby Knott to view cranes and waterfowl feeding.

Cranefest coincides with the annual "Around the World in 80 Bites" gastronomic fund-raising event beginning at 4:30 p.m. at the Heritage Museum, which adds variety to the already event-filled weekend.

Cranefest organizers have invited bird-lovers statewide to submit designs for a logo to represent the event, and a \$300 prize will be awarded to the winning artist. Should no entry be selected, competition will continue the next year.

The lesser sandhill cranes begin their migration in late October from summer homes in Alaska, Canada and the Arctic region.

In February, the peak of their migratory season, thousands of birds feed all day in the Big Spring area, and by nightfall, return to the playa lakes, some within Big Spring's city limits. The shallow lakes protect

Johnny Justiss has announced his candidacy in the Democratic primary race for Justice of the Peace in Precinct 2.

Justiss has been a resident of Coahoma since 1963, and is currently employed by the Coahoma Independent School District as a substitute teacher and bus driver. He also works at the Coahoma Town & Country convenience store.

Prior to moving to Coahoma, Justiss attended Howard College from 1957 to 1959. He moved from Sweetwater to begin employment with the Coahoma State Bank where he was cashier/vice-president until 1985.

Gin and raisins remedy wins medical praise

"Soak white raisins in cheap gin for seven days. Pour off the gin and eat the raisins, nine a day."

That homespun arthritis prescription has been around for 20 years, but suddenly, it is winning at least cautious support from credible medical researchers.

My first mention of this subject was more or less in jest.

I was amused to discover that a corporation executive of prominence was a believer and that he had convinced some other equally distinguished individuals to try it.

It's not a joke anymore.

Dorothy Beckvall of St. Paul, Minn., says bursitis forced her to sleep on one side for years. After taking the gin-soaked raisins for three days, she was "able to sleep comfortably in any position."

Ida Sudsbury of Holyoke, Mass., writes to report that she has been on gin-soaked raisins since Nov. 16, 1993, "and I feel like a new person, no more pain. Can't wait to tell my doctor about it."

What is there in this prescription that seems to offer arthritis relief?

Researchers suspect it might have to do with the juniper berries in the gin.

It may or may not be the juniper berries.

Mrs. Harvey Owen of Sun City, Ariz., heard my mention and remembered an item in her scrapbook.

A little verse that reads: "Little Aunt Dinah from South Carolina has a secret too good not to mention ... 'When she's by herself, she takes from the shelf a jar filled with raisins and vodka."

"One spoon is enough of this marvelous stuff; any more and Aunt Dinah gets odd-kah."

She says the clipping has to be 30 years old.

Gin-soaked raisins, of all things! Yet, Erike Babcock of Orlando,

Fla., after her 10-day test, wrote, "I can hardly believe the results; the pain is gone."

Mrs. Olen Kirby of Popular Bluff, Mo., after 10 days on gin-soaked raisins, wrote, "My neck was so sore, I could not turn my head without turning my body. I can now. I can enjoy driving my car again!"

Mrs. L.C. Kemp of Edmond, Okla., had arthritis for four years and then tried the raisins for two weeks. "My back pain is already relieved."

P.T. Johnson of Kansas City, Mo., had gout attacks regularly for five years but has not had an attack since starting on the raisins.

So, I've just about decided we are onto something!

Mary Council of Cisco, Texas, had such arthritis in her hips she contemplated surgery.

She writes that after a few months on gin and raisins, she is upaware of ever having had a hip problem.

There had to be one letter like this one. From Nan Triplett, Geysers, Mont.:

"Dear Paul Harvey News ...

"I couldn't remember whether you said drink seven pints of gin and nine

raisins or nine pints of gin and seven raisins, so I did both. Now I can't find the raisins ... BUT NO PAIN!"

Then there's one chap who wrote aying, "I heard your remedy for arthritis. I don't have arthritis, but I can't wait to get it."

How about you, Paul Harvey, have YOU tried it?

I have.

I am reasonably convinced that the prescription has merit.

Plant chemistry is the subject of three recent books which distill years of research by James A. Duke, medicinal plant expert at the United States Department of Agriculture.

His research involves 1,000 plants and 3,000 compounds.

Usually we discover some palliative in the lab and then test it on people.

This, already tested on people, is now being tested in Dr. Duke's laboratory.

So this is an interim report.

Now it's time to let competent professional researchers take over this project.

Then we'll see what they say.

These interesting birds stand more than 3 1/2 feet tall, with a wing span of up to six feet, and weigh from five to eight pounds. Plumage on young birds is brownish in color, changing to gray on adult which have bald red foreheads and black legs.

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Judge grants injunction against Klan

AUSTIN — A state district judge granted a temporary injunction against members of the Ku Klux Klan, saying their demonstrations at a desegregated housing project in Vidor have been "terrifying and intimidating to residents."

A white resident of the previously all-white East Texas housing complex choked back tears Wednesday as she detailed fears to state District Judge John Dietz that she and two daughters would be injured by Klan members.

Her testimony preceded a formal ruling by Dietz, granting a temporary injunction aimed at keeping two KKK groups from harassing or intimidating residents at the Vidor housing project.

"When they (Klan members) are talking about bombing and bulldozing the project and you've got kids in there, you get scared," said Linda Bagwell, the mother of 13-year-old and 20-year-old daughters. "We are all afraid."

On Tuesday, Ms. Bagwell testified that over a year ago a Klan member had offered her daughter, then 12, \$50 to beat up black children. She gave more details Wednesday.

"I was angry," said Ms. Bagwell, whose ex-father-in-law is a former grand dragon of the KKK. "He wasn't just making the offer to my daughter. He was offering that to other children."

Michael Lowe, grand dragon of the Texas Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, denied the allegations.

"I find that hard to believe because we do not preach such acts of violence against anyone," Lowe said.

The injunction bars the White Camelia Knights and the Texas Knights of the KKK from demonstrating closer than 22 feet from the entrance to the East Texas housing project. A previous restraining order handed down by Dietz in January

had kept the KKK members 500 feet from the property.

Dietz, who heard testimony over two days concerning the two Klan groups, said the injunction was more lenient to ensure the KKK's rights to free speech.

But he said, "It is uncontroverted that freedom of expression by members of the Klan upon the site of the Vidor public housing project is disturbing, terrifying and intimidating to residents ... who already have enough to deal with in changing a part of history."

Lowe said the ruling was not acceptable. "Any injunction is an attempt to strike down our rights," he said.

Dietz's ruling is the latest court

action in an investigation by the Texas Commission on Human Rights into alleged civil violations of the Texas Fair Housing Act by the two factions of the KKK. The civil penalties carry fines up to \$50,000. No criminal charges have been filed.

Previously, the Commission on Human Rights has attempted to gain the membership lists of the White Camelia Knights and the Texas Knights of the KKK. The commission is attempting to determine if threats against residents and supporters of the desegregated housing project are coming from the two groups.

Vidor has long been a Klan recruiting hotbed and members of the group have held rallies criticizing the desegregation effort.

In 1993, the Orange County Housing Authority moved four black families into the previously all-white 74-unit apartment complex.

By late summer, all four had left, claiming racial slurs made living in Vidor unbearable. Less than 12 hours after he moved, Bill Simpson was fatally shot in Beaumont. Police said the Sept. 1 shooting was not connected with the housing problems.

On Jan. 13, four other black families moved into the Vidor complex under the protection of Justice Department officials. There are now six black families living in the Vidor complex.

Homeowner says he'll never forget tragedy

HOUSTON — A frightened homeowner banging on his door in the dark said he is relieved a grand jury decided not to indict him, but added that he will never forget the tragedy.

Jeffrey Agee killed Andrew De Vries on Jan. 7, firing several shots through his back door at a man he mistook for a burglar.

A Harris County grand jury Wednesday refused to indict Agee in the 28-year-old Scotsman's slaying. Prosecutors had turned the case over without charges to the panel, which took less than a half hour to issue its decision.

Agee, 40, who testified for about two hours Wednesday, said he was pleased by the decision but did not feel triumphant.

"It's not a feeling of victory or anything like that," a somber and shaken Agee said at his attorney's office. "What happened at our house was a tragedy."

"The feelings that you have for the family of De Vries are not describable with words," he said. "That however, is something that I can't do anything about at this point, other than with some words and to tell them how sorry the feelings that are inside me are that the situation occurred."

Agee said he and the family he was trying to protect that night will move on, but he added that "pieces of it (the shooting) will last, obviously, forever."

Gelt and Fiona De Vries, who trav-

eled from Scotland to seek answers for their son's death, were outraged and refused Agee's request to meet with them.

"I'm not interested in anything he has to say," a tearful Mrs. De Vries said after the grand jury decision. "It's all too late. He can't bring Andrew back."

"I think the whole bunch are cowards," Gelt De Vries said of grand jurors.

De Vries was killed as he and Sidney Graves, another Scottish businessman, wound up a night on the town last month. They were being driven back to their hotel by a man and woman they had met. De Vries apparently thought they were going the wrong way and wanted out of the car.

Graves, who also testified before the grand jury, has said he also got out, and the two men started knocking on doors in an affluent Houston neighborhood around 4 a.m.

According to police, De Vries rang Agee's doorbell twice, hiding each time Agee came to the door. He then jumped a backyard fence and banged on glass doors. Agee fired three times through the doors, hitting De Vries twice.

Police initially said De Vries was drunk, but toxicology tests showed his blood-alcohol content was 0.08, just below the 0.10 level considered too drunk to drive in Texas.

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Schroeder admits several among Branch Davidians well armed with weapons

SAN ANTONIO — David Koresh strengthened his doomsday message and stockpiled weapons for a "final confrontation" in the months leading up to a deadly shootout with federal agents, a Koresh follower testified Wednesday.

"If you can't kill for God, you can't die for God," Kathryn Schroeder quoted Koresh as telling his Branch Davidian disciples.

Ms. Schroeder's testimony against 11 Davidian defendants charged with murdering four federal agents has been described by defense lawyers as the prosecution's most powerful weapon.

Koresh's alleged battle plan and his disciples' willingness to follow it are considered the crux of the government's murder conspiracy case.

Ms. Schroeder identified all the defendants as "members of the message" — meaning they were Koresh followers — and said the eight who were inside the Davidian compound near Waco during the Feb. 28, 1993, shootout had guns during the firefight or in the 51-day standoff that ensued.

"Everybody was armed at some point," she said. "Everybody was."

The gun battle erupted amidst a failed raid of the compound by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

At one point the federal agency was the target of Koresh's increasingly apocalyptic teachings about a final confrontation with "the king of the north, the beast, that we would all be a part of," Ms.

Schroeder said. Federal prosecutor Ray Jahn asked Ms. Schroeder who "the beast" was.

"At one time it was America," she said, then explained that "basically it progressed and changed to become authority, man in authority."

Ms. Schroeder, 31, said she and her husband Michael Schroeder moved to Waco to join the Davidians in August 1989. That was also about the time Koresh decided all women in the sect would be his, spiritually and sexually, she said, calling the proclamation "the new light."

"No more marriages were actually kept ... All women belonged to David," she said.

Another change in Koresh's teachings came in the summer of 1991, when Koresh began "to prepare for war" by fortifying his compound, buying guns and ordering the young Davidian men and women to practice shooting them, she said.

Koresh incorporated guns into his Bible study sessions, she said, recalling that he once displayed a large .50-caliber rifle that he had nicknamed "the bear."

"We were to have ammunition and weapons and we were to know how to use them," Ms. Schroeder said.

Koresh indicated to his congregation that some guns at the compound were being converted to fully automatic, and some of his male followers helped him do the work, Ms. Schroeder said.

Martin commissioners approve Blue Cross insurance proposal

STANTON — Martin County commissioners met in special session Monday, Jan. 31, to open and consider proposals for county group medical and life insurance.

After consideration of bids, that from Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Texas was accepted. The company's proposal called for a premium increase of 9.4 percent. The current county monthly premium per employee is \$294.29.

In addition to medical insurance for active employees, commissioners reviewed Medicare supplement plans. The supplement providing the

better coverage was chosen at a monthly premium of approximately \$120 per month, according to Davenport.

Other agenda items discussed included a report from the county's road foreman on the recent purchase and use of a road reclaimer. The machinery crushes rock and caliche in part of the road preparation and repair process. The equipment is working as planned and commissioners voiced their satisfaction.

Davenport reported the majority of the meeting was spent in an impromptu discussion with members of the Lenorah Volunteer Fire Department. VFD representatives discussed concerns centering on the

need for the communities of Stanton and Lenorah to combine efforts in battling grass fires.

Commissioners agreed with many of the Lenorah volunteers' suggestions, but Davenport reported that there are some necessary details that still need to be worked out before a mutual aid agreement can be signed. As a result, there is no set time line for actual implementation of the program.

"Both communities have excellent volunteer fire fighting teams," the county judge noted. "This is a nice step forward in community cooperation."

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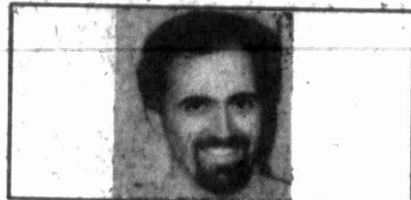

Thrill-seekers beware Sunday

Yawn. When you think of the Pro Bowl, what else can you do? We ate all the chips and sucked down all the drinks four days ago for a reason. It was Super Bowl Sunday, an unofficial holiday to celebrate the end of another season for perhaps America's most hallowed game.

Now what? They want us to tune in to ESPN to watch the Pro Bowl? Forget it. After four weeks of playoffs - stressful times to say the least for Cowboy and Oiler fans - the last thing we need is an anticlimactic, let's-go-out-there-and-not-get-hurt All-Star game.

Quick - search your mind for that exciting Pro Bowl memory. Can't find one, can you?

This game is a joke. The news of who makes the Pro Bowl is always a big story during the season, but the game itself is about as newsworthy as an annual bellybutton lint festival. It's nothing more than a vacation for football's best players. They head out to Honolulu nearly a week before the game, relax in the sun then hit the field Sunday for a comfortable scrimmage in generic AFC and NFC uniforms.

Why not just say, "Here, Emmitt. This is your plane ticket to Hawaii, your reward for making the All-Pro Team."

Forget the game. Many football fanatics could tell you the winners of the 28 Super Bowls in order, but most of those same people can't tell you who won last year's Pro Bowl. The game just comes at the wrong time.

Baseball's All-Star Game succeeds for two reasons. First, it's played at midseason during the peak of the baseball season, when little else in the pro sports world is happening (even the NBA doesn't play games in July). Second, American and National League players meet only twice a season - at the All-Star Game and the World Series.

If you want to see if Roger Clemens can throw a fastball past Ryne Sandberg, the All-Star Game is the only place you can find out since the Cubs will never reach the World Series again.

Basketball's All-Star Game is sort of Pro Bowlish (can anyone playing in this game say defense?), but it works because it's played in the middle of the season. Ditto for the NHL All-Star Game (including the aside on defense).

If the folks responsible for the Pro Bowl have any sense, they'll move the game to another time. Any day would be better than the Sunday after the Super Bowl, but if you're looking for the best time to run this dog, try the pre-season.

Think about it. Instead of playing the Pro Bowl this Sunday, let the players start enjoying their off time and save those Pro Bowl rosters until August. After the first two weekends of the exhibition season, give the average players a weekend in training camp while the Pro Bowlers go to Hawaii for the premiere football event of late summer.

The game could be hailed as the first big football game of the year, the one that tells sports fans it's time to start thinking about the pro and college pigskin.

Not only would more people watch the game in the summer, but the game would be improved. The Pro Bowlers' bodies will be a lot fresher in August than they are now. They won't be rusty either, because they've played two exhibition games already.

Troy Aikman and Emmitt Smith won't be playing Sunday because they're so banged and bruised. That wouldn't be a problem in August.

If the NFL insists on playing this game right after the Super Bowl, fine, but it ought to keep this in mind:

Last week, CBS's 60 Minutes was competing against the Super Bowl and begging for viewers. This week, ESPN probably is plotting to pull the plug on CBS.

It's the only way the Pro Bowl will draw any viewers.

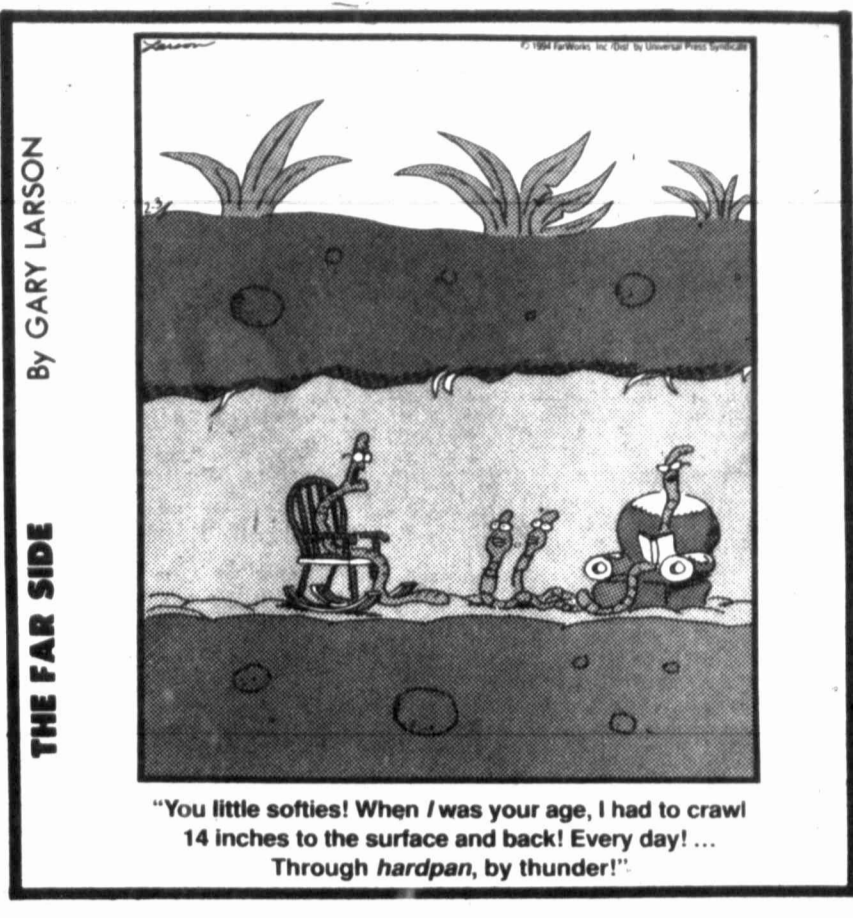
