Council gets clean audit, four seats up for vote

Douglas presiding. A public hearing was held regarding an FEDC loan for Stowers/Creative Adriana Chaos but no members of the public were present. Later on the agenda the council approved the FEDC's \$6,000 forgivable loan to Stowers. The loan is forgivable at \$1,500 per year over four years as long as the business remains open.

Doug Field of Muleshoe representing auditors Randall Field PC, presented the yearly audit report to the council. After discussion, the audit was approved. Mr. Field noted that they gave the city a clean opinion with no deficiencies.

Police Chief Frank Mooney

The Friona city council briefed the council on police met in regular session Mon- activities. Chief Mooney spent day January 14, 2013 with all several weeks in New Jersey as part of a FEMA team assessing damage caused by Hurricane Sandy. He reported efforts are being made to add a School Resource Officer (SRO) to the local school district. Cost would be shared by the police department and the school district but details are not finalized. There is a new phone system at the police department and he is working on acquiring a new police car. The department policy manual and patrol operating procedures have been finalized and implemented.

Members reviewed and approved December accounts payable, the December financial statement, and the October-December first quarter financial statement.

There will be four seats on the city council up for election May 11. The terms of Jim Atwell, Charlie Pope, and Mark Osborn are expiring. The mayor position will also be open as Mayor J.B. Douglas will be leaving Friona around the first of April and moving to Amarillo. Anyone interested in running for a council vacancy can pick up a packet at city hall. Filing period begins January 30. Deadline for filing for city council is March 1 and deadline for filing for mayor is March 10.

The next meeting of the city council will be Monday February 11 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers at 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

a more nurturing climate

Having trouble getting started. I've tried three times to begin this week's column and be nice with my comments. After all, that's what they are, just comments by a nondescript community newspaper publisher with very little influence over not much.

This Wednesday morning I have scanned through all 22 pages of President Obama's executive orders and comments on gun control. He is one arrogant human being. And good old Vice-President Joe Biden standing by his side grinning and shaking his bobble-head in agreement. Friona grad & algae research

Mr. Carr,

My mom shared with me part of your recent editorial where you commented on the \$59 million included in the fiscal cliff negotiations as tax credits for algae growers. While neither she nor I were very pleased with the overall state of the fiscal negotiations, the tenor of the government discourse or the inclusion of so much pork spending in essential legislation, I did want to take a step back in support of algae research.

Government expenditures via peer reviewed research at the National Science Foundation, the department of Energy, and other such agencies makes the U.S. expenditures in support of alternative fuels, including algal biofuels, much greater than just this ill advised tax credit.

In fact, my research center at Washington University is actively conducting such research supported by the federal government. We are working to better understand the mechanics of photosynthesis in plants, including algae, so we can increase the yield of solar energy and capture more of the sun's energy. Though it seems the price point for algal biofuel may be too high to be used as a transportation fuel, we are working on this line of work to see if it might be good for jets.

I understand the Department of Defense is particularly interested in this application. We are also working on advanced computational and genetic biology approaches to see if algae can begin being used as a feedstock to replace petroleum in a range of projects, including pharmaceuticals and other chemicals.

This work is being conducted in collaboration with partners across the United States and the globe. The research conducted in our labs provides students (undergraduate and graduate) valuable experience and practical training that they can then take with them as they launch careers in their desired fields.

I should also point out that my natural favor is on peer-reviewed research because I believe this mechanism, where experts review and critique each other's work, is the best approach to funding the best science and is absent most of the political forces that would otherwise drive decisions based on party platforms and focus group data.

I appreciate your time and wanted to just share my thoughts on the benefit of this work as funded through peer-reviewed mechanisms to help us advance on some of the many promising lines of scientific inquiry that can help ensure the U.S.'s lead in innovation and address many important global concerns.



if you buy a tax program and prepare your federal tax return and electronically file it you are taking the risk that a computer hacker will be able to get into your return and have access to your social security numbers and your birthdays to use for their benefit. H&R Block has controls in place to prevent this.

If you have some one else to prepare your return, ask them if they are registered with the Internal Revenue Service and ask for their registration number. Use only a qualified preparer. Call H&R Block if you have any questions on this.

Applications for conservation programs at county NRCS office

USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) District Conservationist Earl Behrends announces applications for funding opportunities with the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EUIP) are currently being accepted at the NRCS office in Farwell.

NRCS in Texas has received its initial allocation of EQIP funding in 2013 and will begin ranking and obligating EQIP contracts after February 15. All agriculture producers interested in submitting a contract application for 2013 should do so before the ranking deadline.

EQIP—one of the largest programs in the Farm Bill-is a voluntary conservation program that promotes environmental quality and assists producers to meet local, state, and federal regulations.

"EOIP is a valuable tool to help Parmer

conservation practices that provide environmental benefits to help sustain agricultural operations," Behrends said.


EQIP is a continuous sign-up program that allows landowners or operators to apply for financial and technical assistance for the application of specific conservation practices; but the deadline for the first 2013 funding is February 15, 2013. Contracts are offered periodically depending on budgetary allocations. Applications made after the deadline will be considered in the next funding cycle. Higher priority will be given to those applications that address national, state, and local priorities and provide higher cost efficiency.

Technical and financial help is available to install or implement structural, vegetative, and management practices that can benefit the soil, water, air, plants, livestock, and County's agricultural producers implement wildlife. Each county in the state is funded website at www.tx.ncrs,usda.gov.

yearly to assist producers financially with these land management practices.

Last year NRCS in Texas funded over 4,000 EQIP contracts with \$76 million to accomplish conservation practices such as irrigation efficiency, minimum tillage, brush management, and more on 2.1 million acres across the entire state. In addition to helping our environment, Farm Bill conservation program funds support rural communities. In Texas it is estimated that each dollar of NRCS and private matching expenditures on NRCS conservation programs generates an additional \$2.54 in sales of goods and services.

Notice of Availability of Electronic Communications

Parmer County Appraisal Districts — Under a new law, chief appraisers of county appraisal districts, appraisal districts, and appraisal review boards may communicate electronically through email or other methods with property owners or their designated representatives. Written agreements are required for notices and other documents to be delivered electronically in place of mailing.

How does it work? Certain guidelines must be followed for this local option communication:


- Written agreements with the county appraisal district must be entered first, ensuring what electronic means of delivery are acceptable. If you are interested in receiving communications in electronic format, you should contact your local appraisal district.
- Public notice regarding the availability of agreement forms authorizing electronic communications may be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the district on or before Feb. 1 each year, or agreement forms may be delivered on or before Feb. 1 each year to property owners shown on the certified appraisal roll for the preceding tax year.
- The chief appraiser may determine the medium, format, content and method to be used for electronic communications other than notices required by Section 25.19 of the Tax Code, which are prescribed by Comptroller rule.
- A decision by the chief appraiser not to enter into agreements may not be the subject of an appraisal review board protest, a lawsuit or a complaint to the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation.
