Local meeting to examine ways to boost EBI score in CRP

Taking measures to enhance habitat for pheasants and other wildlife could be an avenue to a better Environmental Benefit Index (EBI) score for acreage proposed for enrollment in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). Boosting the EBI score would help chances of getting new contracts accepted or re-enrolling land that has an expiring contract in the Conservation Reserve Program.

Toward that end, Pheasants Forever, in cooperation with the Natural Resources Conservation Service, will host a CRP EBI workshop at the Hereford Community Center in Hereford on May 17, from 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. A similar session will be held in Perryton on May 15, and will be conducted by Curtis Greene with the NRCS in Pampa.

Jordan Menge, Texas Farm Bill wildlife biologist with Pheasants Forever, will be the featured speaker for the Hereford session. Menge, based out of Muleshoe, serves a territory that includes the "Magic Triangle" area of Deaf Smith, Castro, and Parmer counties as well as Oldham, Randall, Bailey, and Lamb counties.

Along with presentations and pointers on CRP and the EBI, the Hereford seminar will include a free lunch catered by local Tommy Wells and crew. Those interested in attending should RSVP to Menge at 806-664-0608.

"The next general signup period for CRP locally will be May 20 through June 14. Deaf Smith County has contracts on over 20,000 acres of CRP expiring, Randall County has 25,000 acres running out, Parmer County will see contracts on over 18,000 acres expiring, and contract expirations in Castro County will total 13,000 acres plus," said Menge.

'The higher the EBI score on land proposed for enrollment or re-enrollment, the better the chance of getting it accepted. We'll be going over ways to maximize points to increase the probability of acreage being accepted. The Hereford and Perryton sessions are open to any interested persons in the region," Menge explained.

Menge has been the regional Texas Farm Bill biologist for just under a year. A native of Grand Junction, Colorado, a high desert region, he majored in fisheries and wildlife biology and management at the University of Wyoming. He applied online for the regional post, was called to Lubbock for and interview, and ultimately moved to Muleshoe and a whole new landscape in the High Plains, working in a program based on the Lesser Prairie Chicken Initiative through the farm bill.

" I help with farm bill programs, wildlife projects and other efforts. I assist local NRCS offices with applications and do field work such as forage inventories, grazing plans, seeding mixes and so forth. I'm in the Hereford NRCS office for a day about every two weeks," he explained.

During the Hereford session Menge will go over sample scenarios on enhancing wildlife habitat to boost EBI scores. Full details on every measure that will be applicable in the EBI effort await word from the Farm Service Administration (FSA).

Along with Menge, Manuel DeLeon,

NRCS Zone 1 wildlife biologist, will talk about "pollinators" that can be planted to enhance EBI scores. Included in this category are wildflowers that can be mixed with native grasses.

"Native grass mixes on the landscape help the score and hopefully eliminate introduced grasses. Producers can also get points for wildlife food plots, and converting introduced grass stands to native species. Pollinators are a national initiative to benefit wildlife and the health of landscapes," he said.

"We're looking at a broad spectrum of things to enhance wildlife habitat," Menge emphasized.

Producers interested in enhancing wildlife habitat and their EBI scores, but unable to attend one of the upcoming sessions can contact Menge at 806-664-0608 to set up an appointment.

In spite of the 60 mph wind and a chill factor in the teens, 69 people came to the Friona blood drive.



The Good and The Bad

By Melanie Gallman Braun

Let's get out the microscope and examine a muscle cell and an adipocyte (fat) cell. What do we see? Skeletal muscle cells are long, thin, threadlike cells and are arranged in bundles. Adipocytes store fat in droplets and enlarge as they accumulate fat. When adipocytes become so abundant that they crowd out other cell types, they form adipose (fat) tissue. Adult muscle cells cannot grow in number, only in size and strength. Likewise, a person is born with a certain number of fat cells. The good and the bad about both muscle and fat cells is that they both can grow and shrink. Best case is that our muscles grow, and our fat cells shrink. Worst case is that if muscles are shrinking, fat cells are probably growing.

You cannot "spot" reduce fat. So, for example, if flat abs are a goal for you, doing 100 crunches every day is not going to get rid of the fat in front of the ab muscles. Now, that doesn't mean you shouldn't do crunches. You

are getting a great benefit. Your ab muscles will become stronger and lay flat, and that's always awesome. Plus you ARE burning fat as you workout, but your body is taking fat from wherever it is most efficient for it to use it. There's a fitness industry proverb that says, "Flat abs start in the kitchen." Muscle has a daily metabolic rate of about three times that of fat. Increasing lean body mass (muscle) and physical activity will improve your metabolism which helps to combat that kitchen thing.

Don't look at the scale! As you increase your lean body mass, the number on the scale may go up. Yeah, that bothers me, too. However, you can pack more muscle into a space than you can fat. Muscle is denser and lays flat. Case in point, over the last year, I have gained ten pounds, BUT I can still wear the same clothes size. As you

After the age of thirty, you begin to lose approximately three to eight percent of your muscle mass per decade, and the rate of decline is even higher after the age of sixty. Doesn't sound like much at first. However, if we use an average of five percent per decade, by the time you are seventy you have potentially lost twenty percent of your muscle mass from aging alone. This loss of muscle mass, strength, and function is a fundamental cause of and contributor to disability in older people.

So fight back! Regular exercise including strength training and cardio is the best way to slow down the aging process, kick up your metabolism, and preserve and maintain the integrity of your muscle. It doesn't matter how old you are. Aged muscle can still increase in size and strength. I'm sure you've heard this one before, but I'm going to share it again, "You don't stop moving because you get old, you get old because you stop moving."





Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions conceraing their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

· the market or appraised value of your property

In certain protests where the owner has submitted an independent appraisal before the hearing, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator or SOAH After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases originating in certain counties, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order, filing with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district a notice of appeal. Appeals to District Court, Binding Arbitration, or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

Tax Payment

You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the ARB approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.


Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

To complete the certification process, students trained at the WTAMU Research Feedlot with Extension Beef Cattle Specialist Dr. Ted McCollum, Dr. Mike Brown, Faculty Supervisor of WTAMU **Research Feedlot and Associate** Professor of Ruminant Nutrition,


and Robert Devin of Texas A&M AgriLife Extension. Trainings included cattle handling principles, and processing cattle, with an emphasis on Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) principles. The students were then tested over their skills through demonstration and with a written exam. They were also interviewed by instructors using hypothetical situations and questions on topics covered in the training. At the conclusion of the day's events, the students were presented with a certificate of completion and

Completion of this certification program enables students to be better prepared to obtain employment within a feedyard with a basic understanding of the knowledge and skills necessary to be an asset to the operation. Students in the program are identified by their Agricultural

Science Teacher, feedyard managers or have expressed interest to be accepted into the program. They should be enrolled in at least one high school agricultural class each semester, participate in extra-curricular activities such as FFA, have a supervised agricultural experience project, and they are required to either job shadow or have an internship within the industry before receiving a High School Diploma.

Individuals who work in the fed beef industry have one of the most important jobs in the world - to produce food for a growing domestic and global population. The vitality of having young people with a desire to work in a feedyard setting, especially in the TCFA-area of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico where 30 percent of the nation's beef is produced, is crucial in the future success of the industry.
